## ASSOCIATIONS AND THE COUNCIL.

Several of the associations have considered the question as to whether or not the Central Council meeting should be held this year, and, so far as we are aware, with one exception, they have decided that it would be best to postpone the meeting. This is the view we expressed two months ago, when the preliminary notice of the meeting at Gloucester was issued, and the reasons which were advanced have not been in any way modified. Since then associaticn meetings in London, Lancashire and other centres have endorsed the arguments put forward; but this week we report a meeting at Bristol which was in £avour of the Central Council meeting being held for the election of a president, and a further suggestion was put forward that a scheme of voting by proxy on the various resclutions which the agenda might contain should be acopted.
This would be quite a novel procedure so far as the Council is concerned, and we doubt whether it would be in any way satisfactory. It is not always possible for a person to make up his mind on a resolution antil le has heard the arguments on both sides, while it is also quite possible that proxy votes might be used on exactly the opposite side to that which a member might wish if he had the opportunity of hearing a subject discussed. An ordinary postal vote would be equally unsatisfactory, and neither method, we think, is likely to commend itself to the members. Moreover, we doubt if the Council's rules would permit its general business to be disposed of in this way, and until its constitution provides for the adoption of such a method, neither its offcials nor its Standing Committee would bave power to malse the arrangements to transact the business in this way. It seems to us that either the meeting must be beld, and the business dealt with by those who attend, or it must be postponed.

As has been pointed out, the preoccupation of practically everyone in the work of the war, or in work which the war has made doubly heavy, and the fact that the expense, now that there is a great additional cost in travelling, would bear unduly on the associations who have to provide the funds, offer strong reasons why the meeting should be postponed this year. The point on which a decision ought to turn, however, is whether a meeting of the Central Council this year is vital to the interests of the Exercise. If it is, then those of the Council who can meet at Gloucester should do so ; but if it is not, then, bearing in mind the present circumstances, the meeting, which at best is likely to be only poorly attended, might well be postponed. It is difficult to think that there can be any business pending of such importance that the Standing Committee could not take action, if immediate action is necessary.

The number of peals rung on Cburch beils daring 1916 was 134 ; and on handbella, 83 . Oping to the continuage of the war there has been a further drop in the number of peals rang, the total for 1916 being 217 only, as compared with 259 for $1915,1,415$ for 1914, and 2,359 for 1913.

The contiousnoe of the war has ance move rendered the work of the Analysic Commithee a comparatively light one, and the apportionment
of points has little meaning, though they have again been included in the Anelygis.

A notable festure is the number of peals ef Sledman Cinques rung by the SL. Martin's Guild, viz. $: 4$ on tower bells and 8 on handbells, totai of 12 peals out of 25 rung by the Guild.
Of the 134 peals rung on tower bells, 94 were muffled peals, the lamented deaths of Sir A. P. Heywood and Mr. H. Dains adding to the number rung on account of the war
Of the other peale, one was the first on the bells, and three first after restaration. Six were arranged for ringers on leave, and seven for Church Festivals, elc. Five were farewell peals, four wedding and three birthday peale, while no specisl reasons were given for the other eleven. Six ringers rang their first peal as conductor. (Signed).-

## DEATH OF A CHESTERFIELD RINGER.

It is with profound regrol we have to record the death of Mr. George Davies, which sad event took place on Monday of lath wrek, at 31 Figber Albert Street, Deceasml, whowas 47 years of age, firbl learned the art of ringing at, Sutton Coldfield. going to Ghesterfielat about 28 vears ago, since which time be had been a most respecten minmer of the Parish Cluuch company
A rixater of mo mean ubility, he could atways be relied upon when thking part in a peal. or touch, to make no mistake. especially in the way of striking, and for Sunday service ringing fimetuality wis his molto.

Unfortunately, for a number of years. he had nat enjoped the best of health, a fact which kept hin out of a number of peals, but although unable to take part, he was such a keen critic of the striking that he wonlt invariably be outside the tower at the finish, having heard most, or the whole of the peal, and if not to his entire satisfaction, rach man had to go "through the mill," generally commeneing with the " skipper.
Mr. Divies was a great lover of handbell ringing, and mas never happier litn when segted with a pair, his wery lust touch of all being one of Steriman Triples, a method which tad a fascination for him, and. in his opinion, put all others into oblivion. His last wisit to the tower was on Sunday. February 24th, when he took part in the ringing for both bervices, hul le pras evidently suffering then, wind gradually losiry strenth, he was obliged to take to Fins bed on Friday, March Sth, and at last his big, brave heart, and indomitable pluck, which latl helped him through many an anxious time, give in, and thin Great Gonductor of all called him home.
T'lle deceased leaves a widow and one son, Pte F. Daries, who is at present in hospital in London recovering from wounds,
Mr. Davies had rung 39 peals, made up as follows: Grandsire Triples 2. Grandsite Caters 9, Stedman Triples 3, Stedman Caters 5, Stedman Cinques 1, Canterbury Triples I, Caters 1, Bob Major 3 Treble Bob Mrjor 1, Treble Rob Royal 3, Double Norwich Major 2, Little Bob Roynl L, Forward Royal I: and on handbells one each of Bob MIajor Bob Roygl, and Litlle Bob Royal, and three of Grandsire Caters, all runc under the Midland Counties on Yorkshire Aseociations.
The funeral took place on Thursday, when he was carried to his last pesting-place by six of his brother ringers: Messers. Allwood, Gore. Hallis. Thyng, Thompion and Nuitall, the four first named ringing a course of Grandsire Triples over the grave. The Chesterfeid hranch of the National Union of Railwaymen, of which the late Mr. Davies was a member, wes represented by two of his fellow workmen, and among the floral tributes was a cross from his brother ringers.
