## "CLOCKING" AND CHIMING.

The subject of "clocking," raised in our article last week, has brought au interesting letter, which puts, what one may term, the other side of the question. Our correspondent's experience has been a fortunate one, and so has that of many other people in regard to this method of chiming ; but, unhappily, the day has come to not a few when, despite long immunity, a cracked bell has resulted from the process which is so emphatically condemned by those who speak with authority. A good deal may, in all likelihood, depend upon the manner in which the "clocking " is done, and there is very probably less danger in it when, as our correspondent points out, it is operated by an " expert chimer, with fair knowledge and experience and a tender consideration for the bell." But the unfortunate part of it is that, when "clocking" is resorted to, it is generally in order to simplify the chiming for some inexperienced person, who knows nothing whatever about bells, and possibly cares less.

We are unable to speak from first-hand knowledge of the methods adopted in Belgium, but we believe that, though the bells are sometimes struck by puiling the clapper against them, as in "clocking," there is a spring to each, one object of which is to ensure the clapper immediately dropping away from the bell-and this makes ail the difference. Moreover, there are (or were) many cases, as at Bruges, where the bells are struck by separate bammers operating on the outside. Cbiming bammers, as everyone knows, are fitted in many Euglish towers, and, if chiming is to be done, this is unquestionabo the best method to adopt. The installation of these hammers is not really costly, and removes the danger that arises from "clocking," although it gives rise to znother risk, which needs to be specially guarded against, viz., damage to bells through the apparatus being left in gear.

With all that may be said to the contrary, it seems to us that the opinion of experts is heavily against "clocking," and that the practice should not only be discouraged but prohibited. At the same time, we are only too pleased to put the experience of our valued correspoudent before our readers. It has to be recognised, of course, that there are many occasions when the bells are required, particularly on week days, when the services of ringers are not available, and provision must be made for the chiming to take place. The swinging of the lighter bells for this purpose is not an arduous task, and requires no more " knack" than " clocking" with care would do. But the swinging of the bells for this purpose eliminates the risk of damage - even if it be only remote-and church authorities, we hope, will see to it that "clocking" is banned,

 ANNUAL MEETING AT YEOVILThe 27th annual meeting was held at Yeovil on July 14th, when 19 towers were represented by 65 members, Visitors were also present from Bridport, Wyke Regis, Dorchester, and Newport. The splendid peal of ten bells (with tenor 45 cwt .) were raised in peal soon after 2 p-ml, and touches of Grandsire and Stedman Caters rung until 3.30 p.m., when a shorl service was held in the church, al which Preb G. G. Monck, of Stoke-under-Ham, officiated, and gave an address.

The business meeting wais held in St. John's Schoole, tho Master (the Rev, C. C. Parter) pressiding.

The Master read his report, in which it was Etated that the Associa ion was making progress, in spite of the difficult times in which we are living. During tho gear eight honorary and no less than 134 performing members have joined the Association. Of these latter 43 were ladies. There were three new towers added to the list, vic. Huish Episcopi ( 6 hells), Tinlinhull (5), North Barrow (5). The list of those serving with the forces numhered 310 members. Several had been killed, gome wounded, and some discharged sick. Fe regretted to eay that the Association had lost a very staunch suppotter by the death

Archideacon Brymer, of Clrariton "ackrell, who was always willing o gire a helping hand whenever the opportunity resentell itself, mad book a keen inferest in bells and ringers. Only one peal had been rung, and that by members of the Assaciation at Path, who hat all attested under the Derby acheme, and were expecting to be called up. The Secretary (Mr. E. ©. Burgess) then read the balancs sheet, which showed receipts for the year 8483 g .5 d , and an expenditure of 8382 s . 10d. The report and balance sheet ware adopted, and Mr. D. G. Tayor, of Ilminsfer, wag thanked for nuditing the accounts, the eleated auditor (the Rev. A. J. Hook) haring gone as chaplan to the forces.

An honorarium of $E 10$ 10s. was granted to the secretary, who was congratulatex on the wery favourable balance sheet.
The Rev. C. C. Parker was unanimously reelected Master, and a vote of thanks was addef for the very able way he had conducted the business of the Association during the past yarr, and Mr. Parker thanked the memberg for the hononr they had done him in re-electing him. - Mr. Burgess was re-elected secretary and treasurer. The Rev. A. J. Fook was re-elected auditor, and Mr. Trylor promised to audit the accounts if be should not have returned in time to discharge the duties.
Three new members were elected, and the places for quarterly meetings were selected as follows: Corston, in September; Curry Rivel, in December; and Wrington, after Tasier.
The representatives on the Gentral Council were also re-elected, and are as follows: Rev. C. C. Parker, Messrs, A. E. Coles. J. Maddock, nd E. F. Burgess.
Tine Master then proposed a rote of thanks to Preb. Monck for offciatiag at the service, to the Vicar of Yeoril for granting the use of Lhe bells. church and echoolroom, and to the organist for assisting at the service. - Preb. Monet replied, and apologised for the absence of the Vicar of Yeovil.

## THE "CLOCKING" OF BELLS. <br> A CLERICAL RINGTRS EXPERIENOE. <br> To the Editor.

Deav Sir,-I have read with great interest the article on "clocking " in this week's "Ringing World." With its main contention I am in hearty agreement, viz, that it is not in the interests of bolls and ringing that the practice of clocking should increase. There oan bo no doubt that many bells have been cracked by this proceses in Fangland. On the other hand when we turn to a country renowned for its beils, Helgium, we find that "clocking " is almost the univeraal method of sounding them! In Rice's" Carillons of Belgium and Hol. land," a book which I procureal lately on the recommendation of Mr. J. W. Taylor, and which I heartily recommend to al lovers of beilsfacing page 136 is an illustration of the bells of Mechlin (evidentiy laken from a photograph). All are " olocked," and, moreover, the clappers have very large " balls," and appear to bo much heavier llan they would be in belle of corresponding size in England.

I vemember when an undergraduate at Cambridge some 34 years ago listening to the boils of Great St. Nary's, Cambridge. The back ten were chimed for Suntay services in those days by the late Mr. George Taylor, the then stecpickeeper. No one hearing their subdued musi cat "hum " could ever iream of them being cracked in the process although they were clocked glso. You may remember, about five yens ago publishing a letler in the "Ringing World "from the Rev. t . L Papillon, about the recasting of our tenor, in which "clockill " was mentioned. Alrout that time I happened to meet George Taylor among his bells at Great; St. Marys, and our conversalion haturally turned apou clocking. "It deponds on how it's done, Georger" I said; aud never shall I forget the tone of conviction with which he rephiel, "That.'s just it, sir!"

And now with regard to our own femor. She has to be tolled for funerals as a minule bell, To begin with, she was folled with the rope and wheel but this mecessitated the constant heeping her on a gentle swing with a sudden check at jniervals to malce lier speak. The ob vious wearing of gudgeons and bearings which an bour of this kind ot thing suggester, drove me to think of a fresh expedient. The plen eventually adopled was an follows: The elapper is hitched to a crass bar of the frame by a pieco of cord, so as to bring the ball of the clapper within two or thre inches of the sound bow. To the middle of his cord is tied a thin rope (in this case a superannated piece from the flastafi). This rope is then laken brough the mouseholes of the tenor pope to the belfy foor beneath. It requires a shavp jerk te make the bell sound at all, and sucte is the elasticity obtained by the thinmess of the ropes and the indirect pult, that $i$ it is next to impossible to pulp the clapper loo hard, and (a very great point it cannol be teld aganst the side of the bell-making a soft melodious note.
I must confess to being rather puzeled by the vary positive slata ments of Mi' Papillon, the late Stir A. P. Heywood, and others, upon lhis question. It seems to me that they require madiftertion in the lighe of the abvve considerations. Witlo an expert chimer, i.e., ouse of fair knowledge and experience, and who hits a tender consideration for the bell as a musical instrument. I canot myself see that there is any flanger in "elocking," much as I prefer ringing or swinging as a means of producing the sounds. However. I know what the vilage sexton is capablo of, and have no wish to linder the effect of your " lender " in thwarting his designs.- Yours faithfully,

## 5008 DOUBLE NORWICH COURT BOB MAJOR

## SOLDIERERINGER'B DEATH.

J.ANCE-CORPL. J. THOMAS BOTTTRILL, R.M.L.I. (OF ANSTEY)

Broken in the wars, in the Dardanelles and Gallipoli " Tommy Hottrill-as he was affectiontately called by his friends-found a soldier"s grave at the easly age of 26 . $H_{e}$ was one of a remarkable ringing band thab starled to study the art when Anstey (Leicestershire) bells were rehung and augmented to eight in 1907. Mr. W. Willson, of Leicester, was their instructor, and the decensed was the youngest lad. Within twelve months they rang thair first peal-Grandsire Triples. The second year came Bob Major and Treble Bob, in which were peals of 7,056 and 10,192. The next saw Double Norwich, in each case the first peal in the method by all (except the conductor). When Stedman and Superiative were reached the band began to fall to pieces through unemployment. One went to, and remains in, Canada "Tommy " himself migrated to Manchester, where, at Pendieton, with Mr. Harry Chapman, he rang several peals for the Lancashire Assacintion, including one of 6,000 kaximus ai Ashton-under-Lyne, and a peal of Cinques at Liverpool.
When war Groke ont Tom Bottrill offeren himself at once, joineti the Roya! Marines, and went east. The result of privation in the ever memarable Galipolif Expedition brought the deceased to Plymouth Hospilal, where he passed awny, emaciation and brain fever being the firmediate carse of death.
The body was brought to its native place for buriai, and on Sunday, July 22nd, was laid io rest, being accorded the last honours due to a soldier by a firing party and bugiers of the "Leicesters "from Wigston Barracks, Covered by a Union Jack, the coffin was borne into the parish church, whero Tommy rang his firse peal, and the Rector (the Rev. J. Kerry Williams, MA.) conducted the serfice. After the ceremony the route to the cemetery was lined with sympathetic onlookers, nond when the three volloys were fired, the "last post "" sounded, andl the lads in khaki hacl marehed away, the bells, with chippers muffled, added their tribute. There is a stern grandeur about a military funeral, and the volime of respect accorded the deceased would be unthought of in civil life. It is a glorious finish to a life given in the service of one's conntry, and, methinks, not a few who looked on the scene with swelling hearts echoed the words of the Psalntist, "May my last end be like his."
It should be mentioned that even while slationed at Plymouth the deceased fid what he conld to advance the art of ringing in that neighbourhood, and assisted the ringers nt Tavistock, and other places ith the vicinity, till ill-health stopped what might have heen a britliant career. Two of the deceased's brothers, also ringers, are " out there"-one in France, and one in Mesopotamia: hul alihough thr anstey band is broken up, its memory is sweet. What it did in its day is written in the records of the Milaland Counties Association, and the sound of Anstey bells will ever keep green the memory of one of its leading spirits. liequiescat in pace.
