## EASTER MEETINGS.

Easter Monday has always been popular as a day for meetings of ringers, but the number of such gatherings which are to be beld on Bank Holiday this year is probably unique. At many places throughout the country ringers will foregather for business and for pleasure, and it may well be anticipated that some of the associations who are holding their anaual meetings will find their members turn up in record numbers. After the anxieties and restrictions of the war period there is the feeling of relief which all are experiencing, and this alone will be a great incentive to many to take advantage of the opportunity for a little relaxation and enjoyment.
The annual meetings of ringing associations are always pleasurable events, bringing the remaion of old friends and the making of new; and while husiness is the ostensible reason for bringing the members together, the importance of the fraternal side of these gatherings is not to be underrated. The spirit of freemasony that exists anoong ringers is a characteristic upon which the Exercise prides itself, and it is a trait which is extremely valuable to the associations. Human nature being what it is, little differences of opinion are bound to creep in sometimes among members; but for all that, the brotherly feeling that binds the ranks of the Exercise is supremely important. Meetings, whether small or large, promote this good feeling, and the annual gatherings of associations unite the members intheir mutual interests in the widest sphere.

Annual meetings, however, are not always made the use of by members that they migbt be in ventilating matters which might be of interest or increase the utility of their organization. Too often the business of the day is of a 'cut and dried' order, and members are content to deal with the business put before them and leave the rest. Those associations are the most 'live' where suggestions and proposals come from the rank and file, where there is constructive criticism, and where the members show that they have more than a passive interest in the concerns of the organisation. A ready acquiescence in the formalities of a meeting may be all very well, but the officials who are responsible for the conduct of affairs welcome belpful debates on subjects affecting the concerns of their society.
One of the topics which is likely to be common to most of next Monday's meetings is that of war memorials; another might well be the best methods of reviving activities in ringing circles; and a third-which would be helpful to the representatives-the question of improving the usefulness of the Central Council, which that body is to debate again when it meets at Gloucester.

We have certainly a gront deal of leeway to make up regnding neal maging; but it will behove those mhose enthusiasm lies in that direction to observe moderation, particularly in the large towas where the clutches are situated in crowded anors, and prolonged tinging would cuuse amoyance to 'gronsers ' who invarialbly live rigltt tudet the belfry, and who hate the scoud of tie bells.
Regarding • Reconstruction' whe would dernimy live to see ringing in the higher methods more genemaly practiserl. Trake Yorkshire, for instance, with ils many beautiful peals of aight. The method pracLised is nearly always Kent Treble Bobs. True, the Yortshiremen know low to ring it and strike it, but just a fittle more effort, and the same men could ring the Strpitise Nitbods.

Amolher instance where a little more effort and enterprise would work wonders is that of ail dwelve bell companies. Ono can san. pretty coabidently that the Birminghan men call yius Sterman Ciaques-second to none, bui why stop there? There is Cambitge Maximas to be concuered, and these mon who an ring Stedman Cingues so faultlessly ctin do il.
I know from experience with muny socictios thet whon it peal in a ceitain method hus leen accomplisturd, there is a great temptation to go for the same methed afain, whele is in my opinion a mistake. "fleres is notling like the practice of new metlicds to stimulate enthusinsm. The value of the work of lkeconstruckion in ringitg matters will de pend upon the ideal rimed ul, and th will be much more gratifying Is me, at any rate, to see in the Miscellameol Performances colmans touches by all in a new methort, than it will be to see our peal colums crowderl.-Yours, etc.

The reasori has nol locen the war, but the faed that the bals frane, centurios old, in whied the bells hang, is now unsafo.

I am loping lo give back the beils to London, by puttiug them in a new steel frame. Queen Alextudra and the Queen of Norway hise both displayed their interest by gracionsly semling a contribution lo the purpose, and the Danish Minister, recalling the old Aswociations of the Danes with this parish; the Lord Mayor of Loncion, and others, tave also subscribent.

A sum of 8800 is required, and I lope to ring in preace with the rolitng peal in June.
