## A COURT OF APPEAL?

Much interest was exeited by Mr. John Carter's announcement that in his opinion Bristol is not a Surprise method, and the prompt replies of experts who take the view that it is rightly included in the Surprise category was only to be expected. It our article a fortnight ago we showed how Bristol first came by its mame, and how by all the accepted views of that time it was entitled to be classed with the highest group of methods. The correspondence which we published last week showed how the method was, by the intention of the author, kept within the delinition of a Surprise, for the definition which wats embodied in the report upon methods and adopted by the Central Council, was drafted by the Rev. E. Bankes James himself. With that explanation before the Exercise it will be difficult to quarrel with the designation of Bristol, but there is still room for argument on the views put forward by Mr. Carter, who tells us this week that the passing of the treble from $7-8 \mathrm{up}$ to $7-8$ down is a cross section, no more and no less.

While the complexity or interest of a method is neither increased nor diminished by the name we give it, it does seem that the definition of a Surprise method might have been still more closely laid down, if the point had been clearly made that the treble's whole pull in front or behind was not to be considered a cross section. . But in this, as in many other things in ringing, we see that definitions that are provided for our gridance are not all they might be. It is quite certaith, from this discussion on Bristol, that our experts are not agreed upon what the meanings of some of the defintions are, for here we have Mr. Carter, who we believe signed the Central Council's report, differing from other members of the committee as to the exact application of the terms. What we need is a court of appeal to settle these matters. Indeed it would add quile a refreshing variety to the procedure of the Central Council if a bencil of, say, five 'judges' were set up and the contending parties argued their case on something lite the same lines that legal actions are conducted in the High Court. This, perhaps, might be the solution of one of the complaints against the present procedure of the Central Council that the debates on the scientific side of ringing are too dull, or else too technical to interest the main body of members. Specches by 'counsel' and the examination and cross-examination of witnesses would certainly add zest to some of the discussions, and even if it tended to introduce a litte levity into the pracectings, we should, at all events, be able to have a 'considered judgment' of experts upon a subject after they had heard both sides of the question.
