## LANCASHIRE AFFAIRS.

The Lancashire Association has always been one of the best managed of the ringing organisations in this country, and it is quite certain that it maintains among its members as great an active interest in its affairs as can be boasted by any society. Another proof of this will be found in to-morrow's annual meeting at Eccies, when the agenda for the business proeeedings will give the members some real, live topics to discuss. There is, for instance, keen competition for the privilege of representing the Association upon the Central Council, and it must be some 'years since an association had nine candidates putting up for the maximum of four places. This seems to us an indication of revival of interest in. Lancashire in the Council, and we hope to see this revival followed in other bodies in the Exercise.
An important matter bearing upon the future of the Association will be discrissed upon the motion sent up by the Boiton Branch, viz,, that probationary members be admitted to the Association. A good many of the ringing organisations already do this in some degree or other, but Lancashire, up to the present, has received only those who can pass an elementary test in change ringing. The experience of those societies who admit probationers has, we believe, been such that none would now draw the stricter tine of limiting membership to qualified change ringers only. Probationers cannot, of course, expect to have a full voice in the affairs of an association, but the fact that they are enabled to become attached to the parent body tends to quicken their interest, and to encourage them to seek to advance in the practice of ringbing, so that they may at the eartiest moment enter into full membership. The Association also benefits financially, and there is no respect, we think, in which it can be urged that it is against the interests of a Change Ringers' Associstion to admit probationers-under proper rules.

Another matter in which the Lancashire Association will be interested to-morrow is the date of its future annual meetings. This has been a vexed question for some time past, but it is doubtful if any day could be selected for such an event which could even be made convenient for all who would like to attend. But in Lavcashire there is another matter which complicates the issue, and that is the holidays which the textile workers in the great industrial centres take en masse during the late summer. To-morrow the Lancashire ringers have got to decide whether they can with advantage change the date of the annual gathering, and whatever their decision, the discussions which this matter has raised at the Branch meetings shows that the members have a live interest in their association.

## BISPHAM'S NEW BELLS. <br> AN ENTHUSIASTIC INSTRUCTOR.

A handy rintr of six bells have been placed in tlié tower of Bisphanz Chitich, near Blackpool by Messirs. Mears and Stainbank, in memory of the fallen heroes of the war. As soon as the scheme was begun monoy flowed in very freely from many quarters, and after all demunds have been paid there is still enough money left to put in two trobles, which is the wish of many parishioners. As the ringing chamber is only about 8 feet 6 inches squne there will not be muca room left when eight men are at a similar mumber of ropes hanging there thotgll the beil founders say they can make a good ciecla should they get the ord cr. The tenor is 11 cwt.
Acconding to rumour, many years ago a wealthy parishioner decided to present a ring of eight bells to the church and one Saturday night be invited the Vicar to supper nidd discuss the pros and cons of the scheme. Owing to the lateness of the evening, and as the gentleman was about to maka out a cheque, the Ficar told him not to tronble about it, and he prould call round on Monday. Alas! the gentleman was taken seriously fll on the Snumay aud died before the Viear contid see him, so Bissham Chureh the mother churels of Black. pool, has had to wait nearly twentry years for the bells.
A promising band of men have lacen got together for the purpose of pinging the bells under the tutorshis of Mr. C. Sharples, mans years leader ai Immannel. Oswakitwistle, but now residing in m!nekpool, Norlh Shore. Mr. Sharples, along with Mr. Robt. Parkinson and Mr. Isage Whalles, were the pioneers of change ringing in Oswaldtwistle, and were practically self-taught by 'Ropesight.' thoumit much encouraged by varions members of the Blackburn Branch of the Laucashire Association. A great hely and impeths was given when MIr. Shargles bought a sel of eight handbells, and here the throe call claim to be absolutely self-taught, for they received instruction from no one. They were the first in the annzls of change finging to riug $n$ peal of Winor in seven methods, donble-handed, now alont iwentyfour years ago. Owing to presblure of business, Mr. Parkinson, who had been beader and conductor of Immanel for many years moves oul of the district, and Mr. Sharples was elected leater, a position he held for nearly ten yoars until business calls eansel him niso to relinguish the leadership, thongh he offen took pary in the \$unflay ringing. Uuder the leat ership of Mr. Parkinson who, by the way, is now living and tenching a band in County Durham. the first peat on the bells, Plan Boly Minor, was rung after the lekits had beon in the tower twenty pears. Then followesk leals in three and fonr methods uatil, iust before leaviug, in peill in serm difierent methorls was rung. When ifr. Shampes got the reins his desive was to ring peal of Trehle Bob in seven mothods, which was spored in Year two after struggling with leamers. This was the first Treble Roh Minor ly the Blackburn Branch. Mr. Sharples nexi. aimed af a Surprise linor peal. and this also was achieved afler sereral years. This peal was the firsi Surprise peal by the Blackbum Branch. His next step was for to.000 of Surprise in fourteen metlioxls, and this waz rung on May 17th, 1908 in tive hours forte-two ninutes, a commemorative brass being placed in the porch, at the cost of the Vicar and church officers, in honow of the event, the Vicar giving the wortliy conductor a most excellent. 'rutibling ' of this brass mountert in a suitable oak frame. A feys monilhs after Mr. Sharples left Oswakltwistle, his one regret being that there was still one more field to concurer, namely a nonsconducted peal. This latter he was the chief means of getting in 1913, the band calling on his aid owing to femprary absence of one or two men.
At Bispham, Mr. Sharples has slready imbued his well-known enthusiasm into the recruils. who, like Oliver Twist ara asking tor nore. He is a great believer in tefolking every ringer as much as possible, both in method ringing and conducting. a contradiction of Mr. Bankes James' recent letter in the
