## THE CLERGY AND THE BELFRY.

In proposing the toast of 'The Church' at the College Youths banquet on Saturday, the Master made an appeal to the clergy generally to take up change ringing, and to join one or other of the societies which exist for the promo. tion of the art. The appeal was well-timed, for the company included many influential clergy who, if they may be themselves past the age and without the leisure to take up practical ringing, can nevertheless pass on the suggestion to their assistants and to others with whom they come in contact. There is a general desire among ringers to see a far greater number of clergy coming into the belfry to share with them the duties and pleasures of bell ringing. The advantages would be found not all on one side, for the clergy would find the benefit from physical exercise ind interest in the fascinating hobby, as well as having the satisfaction of knowing that they are encouraging the ringers by their presence and doing their part in bringing about the further recognition of the ringers as church workers.

Happily the status of the ringer is becoming much more widely recognised, and when we hear from the lips of such an emiaent divae as Bishop Ryle that during his occupancy of such honoured and important offices as the Bishoprics of Exeter and Winchester, he made it one of his first duties to inquire wherever he visited into the state of the bells and the efficiency of the ringers, we realise that the time bas gone by when the ringer's oflice is of no account in the service of Church. At the same time, while we can count to-day many clergy in the ranks of the practical ringets, there is room for many more, and in this, perhaps, the Central Council's circular, which is to go out to incumbents as well as Bishops and Archdeacons, may do something to help the matter forward.

That the majority of the clergy appreciate the ringers' worls is now unquestioned, while the public also, on occasions of local or wational importance, look to the ringers to interpret through the bells the feelings that are uppermost in the human heart. At that memorable ceremony at Westminster Abbey last week, when the Unknown British Warrior was laid to rest with all the honours a nation could accord, the muffed bells gave that final touch to the proceedings-which nothing else could give. The Dean of Westminster recalled it on Saturday when he said that on that day, full charged with moving and affecting incidents, nothing stirred the emotions more than when, at the moment the King left the Abbey by the west door, the bells sent out their muffled music. It is on such occasions as this that the bells express the feelings of the people, and when the people recognise the part the bells play in our national life.

It was to the Chureh thet meonle thrned in time of sorrow, for proyers and for advice: was
 girint on a mational oceasion nud sometimes even on family oemsimes. It was the Church which anmomeed by its bells as well as hw ins servies the dear' of king nat shatesmen. and even flo humble iowfal tidings of areaf wictories, it wash its bells that numonneed file iovial cidings of great victories ; it was throngl the Clurel that they a ve thanksiving for fue harreets, ar offered their pravers for thos wh were sict. Tliev as ringers thok their parto in all these thinus.
 miwht be partoned for expressing pride in the fact that lle Churetr hat mever nppealef its vian to that society fon a bathd of riugers tin heln in those services fromi time to lime. Fle lagd mado as Mastru several anpeals foy rinters for speoial occnsions, both Sumblas ame weekelays, suri even though it sometinhes meant loss of time at work

 courdesy in allowing them the uge of its belle fom mombed for the nine why in whinh the batls and belfrie. were kept. There whe one
 wera masemp, watla pass it along to thei. friende, that it whild be
a big belp to the ringere if more of the clorgy could spare time to leavi change ringing and become meurbers of that or some other sowiety (epplause). That evening they werc honoured by the pre sence of seweral of the Gity elergy, and be appealed to then ant to all those prosent to do their uthost to help in any reasonable scheme which misht be putt formard to save the ninetean threatened City ohurches (applause). These churches had been handed domn to then as precions relies and hoirlooms, and they should take cere to hand then down to future generations (applause). These clurches werb the homes of the City of London, and he appealed strongly to them all to give their hearty stupport to any reasomable scheme brouglo forwarl to gate these churches (applause). If it were a matter of money, surely in that woalthy city there wore business men capable of finding it and gaving those juagnificent specimens of the work of past generadions (hear, hear). Fe Itad to conple with the toast the nown of Lhe Dean of Westminster. Dr. Ryte (apmlause). It needed no
words of his (the Masler's) to say how welcome the Dean was among them, and the Gollege Yontlis were proud to think he had lronourer them by coming there to gite them his sumport. The great whrk th Dean liad done and was doing at the abbey was well knowu to them nupien in their hearis an mace anequalled by ansthing else. Tho restoration of the peal of bells and the work that whe being done in but thic magnificent fal fil: in menain was largely owing to the inferest and activity of Dr: Ryle, and he could only lope the Dean would be sinsted for many fears to continue that coor work, and that he would lee able to aftema the nmasal banouet of the College Youtha (apilatise).

 of the tower". Mrati is a problem which I conmend to von, becanse I lave nof hecis able to ansuer it myself. I an getiog an old man, but I ann even now not aute sure which cane first, the bells or the tower. Was the lower mado for the bells or were the bells mol* for the tower? I sometimes think that the tower was made first and thatio in the past, when the chnch, was very meak, the tower was userl as a blare of refuge, so that the peomle might repair to it to defend thouselves atainst invaders and loandits. Th later years, when hell rimping liad become an art, evergone said, "There is the place tho bells, in the tower.' If that were so, the tower cane first, and the
 mumher of the church to wers with which I have bara acduanted sines I was a looy, I should say that the fowers were huilt aftor the bells and the art of bell ringing hach bexome known. When I go hack bin memory to zecall the great towers of the Fistery Counties, of Suffa and of Norfole (applanse). I know you will not find mans tomers to surpass them in beauty and strength, and they carry their bells well I beliere many of them were built in the fifteenith century, and tha thay were built with the idaa that they would have to fuppork the bells that wore ruag al times of loppiness, sud also as sounds of wanning and of sadmess: and they have done so for five centuries That being so, I thank it is very likelp historically the case that large number of our finest towew in England were erected for the purpose of holding a good peal of bells (applanse). As I have wan dered about the country. whenever I lavo some to ar good charch tower. my first question has always been, How many bells have youl have always said, Are you going to add to then? I have nlwass found the poonle teally keen to liave, if possible, cight bells whelto there were only gix. People were really dend keen to try to secure the auldition of wo more belle, and that, I am sure, is the right spixit

## DUTY FOR THE OLERGY.

I would fain hope that my brother Bishope and Arehdeacons and the leading Church muthorities will. as they go un and klown in their parishes, almays make if a duty to inquine how the bells are being caved fol" (hear, hear), whether the ringers are a good term; whelleer the helfry is in proper ouder: whether, in a word, the townr, whe peel of bells and the ringers aire worthy of the best traditions of the Charch (applanse). Eometimes, I do not think in these chays, but the times have been, when the Chuth netlecter the subjeck of the bells and bell ringing. In these clays I think a happy change lans Passerl owar the mimds nnd feelings of the Church and the Chureh Futhoridies, nul they melcome the fornation of a good band of hell angers. I am ghat to know that lady hell ringers are mol unknown
I do not know how lone ago it is sinco laties loean to ring, bu;

vommber, whan I whs Bishop of Exelor, fwenty years ago, Elacy was one exceodingly good lady feell ringer. I think sho was the Hrs in that port of Devonshirg, and there have boga severul to follow ley examplo. We go back in menory mosi of $4 \leq$ to the time wine wa werg boys, and looked up at tho old ehureh tower at night, perbaps on the last evening of the sear, and conld see midway thp the tower. when tho stars wero owerhead and the sky almost blus-black. a winciow letting out it hrifht strean of light. 'fie hells are ringing out the old yoar, wad you know that there are men who are fingigg oll, wit a scose of the solemuty of the duty they we discharging and dispots fur 'far ant wiclt over many miles, the sacred messago, which mathe peoplo in their homes, old and young, blink of the phast, aburl the posyibilities and the hopes of the now yare. That is ane of my eatlime recollections, I pass on to another slage in my life, when I yns Cambridge. I used to think that listening to gt. Nany's bells was ole of the privileges of University life. I had ny rooms at King's and used to have the window wide open to lighen to tho bells of 3 t Mary's- I wemember so well, on a bright summen evenjug, henrine for the firgt time n muffled peal, and being enormously struck wit the banty of that muffed ringing, and not knowing what it meant I fincuired, nut was told that ono of the ringors had died, and hi bwothorg ware ringing a mulfed perl in memory of one who had been with them for many years. Side by side with that, I think of that other day in the Abloes, of that extraordinary eervics whioh we hat on Thuradey, when we tried to do honour to the Unknown Brijic, Warrior. As the Kinr stepped aut of Westminster by the west door -at that very moment, the bells sounded an mufled peal, and $I$, nm muite sure it was one of the most moring and aftecting incicent $\mathrm{m}_{\mathrm{s}}$ is a day which wos full eharged wilh extraordinarily affenting and moving scelles.

## THE KING AND TUE ABBEY BELLS

I cannot refer to the Abthey batls without thiuking of my frient opposite, Mr: 弄ughes (applause), who did our bells for us. No longer is tho old tower of Wesmmenter dumb. When I first came as Deat I whs told the bells were never rung becansa it was dangerous and the tower would eorne down, lut. I said, when the Kiug was crowned, wo musi have the bolls mung, whatever happated (applanze). I topu the King thate and he satd, 'I sappose you do not mind if a lie cowercloes come down unon us?' (Inugher). I fold ham I thought it was worth the risk (renewed laurhter). Well, the tower survived; the King survived, dud I survived (applamse), so that was all risht, lbut gince then the bells have been done and two now ones added; a proper oradlo put up, nad now we can ring the Abbey belis, and personally I delight in hearing them. It is a goot sound (applanse). I am wat an expert, but it has been a perfoct ioy to me to hear Wesinimster Abbey tower speak again. I know that, we have good ringers, anul Fon are responsible, I believe, for seciring that the ringing is cood I am ablo to tall people, when fliey ome to Westrainster Ablocy that we bave a firstrate heat of bells and a first-rate set of pingers (applatse). If them want to hear food bells fund good ringers thev may, of untse, go to St. Paules; but don't led us forget that at Wresiminster Abhey we are indetted to Mr. Hughes and to his man for lariug put dinem straight. It $j_{s}$ a matter for which I thank him and I thank al! of you, beanse I yealise that You are College hrothers and what is prosperily or fame or honour for one man. Afr. Thyles is prosperity ound fame aud homour for Fou all (applauge). There is a groat privilege in belonging to follege, which is a congregation u real brotherliood, nud I ams glad to think that ille elurelh towers which are the glory of the land, and the luells which are the mory at the fowers, should be and are n hond of union betwen you, the the brothers of this sdeiety (Ioud aprinatee)
