## IS IT APATHY?

The apathy of the average ringer is a subject of frequent comment in the Exercise, and we have had an extremely good example of this failing in connection with our attempt to ascertain the feeling of our readers upon whether they are prepared to pay anotber penny a week for a larger paper. The hope of receiving something like a full response to the inquiry which we put forward seemed, when last we wrote, likely to materialise; but the promise did not mature, and we have had a response from less than half of our present readers. In view of the fact that only about two per cent. of those who have replied have staied definitely that they are unable to support the suggested new arrangement, we feel that in all probability the great majority of those for whose postcards we are still waiting will continue to back us up. Perbaps it really is a case of silence giving consent, and we make one more special appeal, therefore, to those members of the Exercise who are at present subscribers to this journal and who either will not or cannot agree to paying more for a larger paper, giving them matter of wider interest than the present limited space permits. Will those readers who will not continue their support piease send us an iatimation of the fact by Monday next? We do not ask them to elaborate their reasons, but simply on a postcard say they will not remain readers if the paper goes up to 3d.

Let it be clearly understood that we are not proposing an additional charge without being prepared to offer something in return. The enlargedt paper will give a much wider scope and enable attention to be given to a variety of subjects relating to ringing which are at present perforce excluded. As we mentioned last week, special provision will be made for articles for young ringers; we hope aiso to introduce a Sunday service ringers ${ }^{2}$ page, as well as other features which we bave long hoped to provide, but which the crippling limits of the present size of the journal have effectually banned. It bas, indeed, been disappointing that we have not long since been able to return to something like the pre-war ' Ringing World'; but in the newspaper business, as in every other concern, it has not yet been possible to eliminate war's effects. During the year 1920 over 650 newspapers increased their price without-in the vast majority of cases-increasing their size. Not a few of the journals devoted to some special subject and appealing to an even wider circle than a ringers' paper can do, bave gone from the pre-war penny to a post-war sixpence, and those who follow the pastimes for which these papers caters have had to pay the sixpence or go without. Nobody will be compelled to purchase the 'Ringing World 'if the price goes up, but we do ask those who are Contisuta on pago 36.

Baker was urgiag that bell ringers abould be exompteal from the olause, aud asked that bis efforts might be etrengthened by rasolutiong from maetings of asaciated rinserg. He (Mr. Coleman) felt that if thers game uncier tha control of the Church Councila it would desiroy that happy relationship that had so long exieted between the dorgy und rjagers. If the clavso beommo law it would not benefit either the riugerg or the Ohareb, and if the Chureh Councts once rot the power it would ba the stepping-finane for munioipal and other Counchls to make a bid for life authorita. With regand to gatting perarission for riezung, at proserat they only had fheir Rector or Vicar to cleal trith, but if they lad to apyly io A Cotpoil they might lare to wait a moall before gel king prrsiswion. It recognition of his urirty years dovoled servied in promotiar fthe art of riaging in Doncastor and disbrith，a Dresentation lias been made to the Eurish Cturde Ringing Master，Mr．（f．Halkgworth．The oc＝ caston wes a combined practice of the Doncasfor and Arkecy monictics． Therg were present in the belfig Arohdeacon Sandiord（Vicar），the Eav．II．T．Lhdershaw（curato），the Rer．A．RLys James（Vicar of A ch－ sey），Mr．W．C．Atkinson（rerresenting the churchwardense， 22 rivgers， and a mimber of firends．After several chort touekes bad been rhng， tha Archdeacon said it wha a great pleasure to acoede to the request of his ringing frionde to make ihe presentation．He knew Mr．Hallss－ worth was a devoted and capable member of St．Goorge＇s belfry．Ee （the Arohdenoon）knew somethimg of the science of change ringing， thourh he mast coufesg he had been unable to master ite intricades． When at Foung ourale at Slieffeld he ras sufficiently intergsted to abopt tuibior ir the art，and was laver botstrained to purchazo get of hardlualjs to enlarge his knowladge．It wus only than he realised the persisian f aplication needed to acquire the necessary effeiendy and small grogresg he had made in that direction．Though he had not proceeded further with elango ringing le had not lost interest in it． He wiahed to congratulate Mr．Halksworth upon the completion of $3:$ years an a ringer at St．George＇s Church，and also unon lis activitieg in the district．Ho hoped that Mr．Talkswortli would lourg be spared to carry on tho good work（applensa）．
Mr．Llozed read a letior from Mi＇．Frauk＇willey，of Sheffeld，rice－ presideat Yorksinie Association，regratting his inabiliby to atterd．In the courge of an interesting letter AIr．Willey wrote：＂Alliough I am not able to be presents at the presentution to Mr．Halksworth，might I add my testimony to so worthy a gentloman and brother string，for I know fell well that no man in South Yorkshire lins done so mith as miy extcemed and honoured friend for the advancement of the art and science of change ringing．By lus geniality，kindness，forbearance， and by his thoughtfulnes for otuers，he had endeared himeelf to the ringing world．And like all good sportsmen and zealons workers is atill rumnimg．＇
The Rey．A．Rhys，James，himsolf a rerular ringer at itksey Parish Clurch，spoke in culogistio terms of the stimulating effects of Mr． Halksworth＇s Tisits to $A$ rksey belfry，and Mr．G．Clark（Aplssey）re－ ferred to tho good work Jy．Halksworth had done for them both before they bad their peal augmented to eight and ainoe．－Mlp．Woodlouse （Arlssay）said be liad known Mr．Halksworth 13 Years，and he was the b⿴囗十力 ferring to tho fuct that their Vicar was a ringer，he said that if the clergy as a whole would take mone interest in bell ringing and bell ringers，e groad deal of pood would be done（bear，hear）

 Parifi charell．There was a．Lime when they lad one of the fixest basds in Thgland，and were able to ring ahmosis any sethod from Flain Bob to euperlativg．Tbat wae Hie time when r quarter－peal of Grandsice．A fate touch of Double Norwich．and a quarter－peal of stedman．ght in one Sunday，was considered an ordinary performane． He was boriz to kny that there wers only two or three of the oled land left，the otherg having passed ovel＇to＇whe better land．＂The isterest ut bell ringigg was sot so widespread amongst the young men of the hopn today as it was 18 years ago．Lately，howewer，there had been a ware of anthwiasm，and they trid recruited to their ranke a number af young mear．Twelve monthg hence he honed he would be able to say that they would he up to their old standard of 18 years ago．

Mr．Halksworth is well known ins the nopular Ringing Mastar of the Totksbire Assooiation（Southern Distritut）．He was for many years masidont of the Sheffield and Old Fast Derby Society，and is a men－ bey of the Gollego Fouths and marly otller sociaties thin and down the soluntry．Hie has rung and conducted betweon 80 and 70 perle．
