## INSTRUCTORS.

The question raised at the recent meeting of the Hereford Guild as to providing instructors for new ringers is one which ought to occupy a much more prominent place in connection with the work of many of our ringing associations than it actually does. Some of the organisations, it is true, provide facilities for teaching, but there are very few which really give systematic effect to them. Generally, an instructor is more or less indiscriminately appointed, he visits the tower for a certain number of lessons, and leaves the band to their own devices, so that they may or may not thereafter make progress. The association, unfortanately, takes very little interest after the instructor has been appointed. - We have known more than one instance of a band who have had a course of instruction, but who, so far as future effort is concerned, have failed to profit by the trouble expended upon them, and, in fact, bave, on the contrary, very quickly slipped backward.

This, not infrequently, is the faule of the association and the lack of organisation to follow up the advantage which has been gained by the instructor's lessons. Except that the rules may provide for sending out paid instructors for helping beginners, Iew associations have any settled plans for carrying the teaching beyond the very rudiments of the art; indeed, it is often considered that when a band has been instructed in the way to ring a plain method like Bob Minor or Grandsire the responsibilities of the association have been fully discharged. Would it not be to the greater advantage of the Exercise, however, if instruction could be carried some stages further than this?

It may be advanced that, having been initiated into the elements of method ringing, a band ought to have sufficient interest and keenness to go on by themseives. Given the right kind of company, they will probably do so ; but the majority of new companies are not so gifted, and in country districts, where they may be some miles removed from the nearest change-ringing tower, the absence of help and the difficulties which confront the beginner not only deter them from further progress, but sometimes result in the evaporation of interest and the gradual dropping away of the men until the band is so depleted that no change-ringing can be done. In some cases the band has, perhaps, to be content to confine its ringing to the one method which the instructor may have taught them. That they are unable to go abead may be due to their limitations, and not to their fault. What we should like to see is in all associations a scheme for sending out instructors to teach the ringing of higher metbods to those who are still unable to get further than plain methods. Why should there not be instructors for Stedman and Double Norwich as well as for Grandsire and Plain Bob?

## KLNT RINGER'S DEATH.

With much regret we recond the death of Mr. Fred Hayes, of Milton-next-Gravesend. He caught a cold, pneumonia set in, and he died on Thursday, Decomber 1st, after quite a short illoess.

Fred Hayes had been connected with ringing practically all his life, his association with Milton Perish Church exteuding over 40 years. He was a nomber of the Kent County Association for the whole of hit winging career, fand lad been a member of the College Youths sinoe 1866 . Only lagt monlih he journeyed to London for tine Collegr Youths Dinner, and remarked that it was the best he hard attended. It was very singular that on that occusion he had his first and last pull on twolve bolls at St. Giles', Oripplegate. As a ringer ho was very safe, and his frst thought was ※unday Service ringmg. Duriug later yoars he suffered with slight deafness, and found this a drawback at times in visiting a strange tower. Of how many peals bo rang be didinot bimself keep a record, but during the past nine years the writar has rung over 30 with him, and can clam some knowledge of bis ringing capabilities, comradesbip, and good nature. He walked miles to further tho cause of the Exercise, and how many ringers be has twught it would, indeed, be hard to say. In ali his wanderings no belle were the equal of his favourito pal of six at Milton-nextGravesend, and ho will bo sadly and soroly mised in many towers in the district.

He was buried on Tuesdar, December 5th, amid many manifestations of sympathy. The first part of the burial service was read at Milton Priligh Charch umber the shadow of whose tower he lived and died, and where be bad done much yeoman bervioe in the cause of ringing. The remains were afterwards interred in the beartiful cemetery at Swancombe in the family greve. Many beautiful foral tributes wero sent, among them being wreaths from Dartford, St. Stephen's, EsHing, W., Swanscombe, Gravesend, NorthHeet, Shorne, and a large belf from jis past and presant comrades at Mitton-nextGravesend. Mr, Hayes led a life that was well worth followiag, and now, at the age of 60 years, his earthly peal has finished.
By specinl request of the bereaved widow, the belfs at his favourite tower were not rung during the time he lay dead, nor on the dey of the funeral.

## RINGER'S DEATH IN THE BELERY.

TRAGIC ENOING OF A PEAL AT MANCHESTER CATHEDRAL
We deeply regret to recotd the suilden death, in the betl chamber of Manchester Cathedral, on Wernesday, Nov. 30th. of one of the ringers, Mr. Richard Matsey, who was 40 years of age.

An attempt was being made for a peal of Grandsire Catere which Mr . Massey was conducting, the ringing beimg in bonour of the quincentenary of tho Cathedral. The band were: C . Melouchlaz $\mathrm{I}_{4}$ R. Massey (conduetor) 2. R. Ravenseroft 3, W. Owen 4, J. Simpkins 5, H. Arcter 6, W. C. Bridgeford 7, W. Sanders 8, A. Ridyard 9. .T Wrielst 10
After ringing 2 hits. 50 mins., Mr. Massey was seen to collapse and fall backward, his head striking the mat near the door, and his rope flying all over the room. In the excitement of the unexpected happening, it was a minute or so before anyone could go to Mr. Massey's help.

Every effort whs then made to bring him round, but it was found he was beyond aid. Some difficults was experienced in getting the deceased down the staircase to the ambulance. A doctor, who was called, said Mr. Massey died of a blood clot on the brain, csused by m degenerated artery, awl denth might have occurced at any time, at home or at business. An open verdict was given at the inquest.

The decrased was buried at St. Luke's, Glecham, and many friends of the deceased and solnolars from the Cathedral Sunday School attended.

## EXTENSION OF METHODS.

BY THT REV. H. LAW JAMES.
The subject this week is Doubla Court: The bell the treble turne from lead hunts up $\frac{\pi}{2}+1$ places, makes the place, changes with the treble in the middle; she then hunts $\bar{x}-1$ places if she crosees the treble ou' $x-3$ places if she does not cross the treble and dodges, the continues to do this untiz the treble turns her from lead ar behind.
These rules will ring the method on all even numbers, and on odu numbers also, by ignoring fractions and taking the next whole number above aud crossing the treble and belf in the hunt between the making of the places.
In Minor, $x$ equals $6 . \frac{x}{2}+1$ is four, make fourth's plece change with the treble in the middle, make third's, lunt $x-1$, that is, five places and dodge, 3 more places and dodge, 5 more places and dodge and tweble turas you.
In Triples, $x=7 . \frac{\pi}{2}$ is 3 , call it four.
Major Caters and Maximns producs four blows in front and behina, and are, thercfore, useless.
Rogal $\frac{x}{2}+1$ equals 6 , and $x-1$ equals wine
These tules will ring the methoc; what do fhey tell us about its extension?
From 6 to 7 add a bell in the hunt and hunt two more places betweon the dodges, that iE, funt one more place, for each added bell from 6 to 10 , add four places to the dodging.
This proves that the extension of a double method with a pian hunt treble is simply the extewsion of the plain huntiag between tha dodges in proportion to the number of bells added, and no ggein the practical and theoretical extension agree
I now think anyone can prove the game truth for Bouble Bob for themselves, and next week I shall deal with Double Oxford.

## To the Editor.

Sils,Mr, Law James is ambigwous. What does he mean when lie says . We liave to take both (rival theories) into account? Does he mean (1) that after the tweorefical extension of a methorl has been obtained it is necessary to take into account its ringing value before starting to practise it? If eo, we should, of course, all agree, but; it hardly seems neeessary to have mentioned so obvious a tact.
Or (2) is he trging to bring home to the practical ringer the value of the scientists efforts on his behalf by pointing out that the scientific extension is likely to appeal to the ringer by producing on all num. bers similar work on the part of individual bells oceurring in the sume order? His illustration seems to suggest this, and it is a valuable addition to the points mentioued in my lasit letter.
Or (3) there is another possibility which I should lesitate to suggest owing to its utter absuxdity, were it not that others of rour recogaised experis appear by their writings to bave fallen inio the heresy- Does he really means that the investigetor is to try to combine in his extension mathematical considiorations with the requirenents of praotical ringing? To this the answer is simply that the exteusion of a method is either 8 mathematical process or it is not. Mathematics will allow no half-hearted following. Fou must go wherever it leads sou, or you must leave it alone altogether
