## JOHN CARTER'S MASTERPIECE.

We are enabled to publish to-day the figures of Mr. John Carter's new peal of Stedman Triples, which is likely to become known as his 'Odd and Even Bob Peal.' The figures will be examined with great interest; by composers who will desire to investigate the manner whereby the complete 60 courses can be pieced together by a method so complicated; by conductors who will desire to call a peal which, we think, the majority will write down as the most difficult that has yet been offered to the Exercise. Some few may be inclined to say that from the conductor's point of view the peal does not present greater difficulties than the famous, Odd Bob One Part, but as there are a greater number of calls, it certainly will not prove any easier. Be that as it may, the task of calling the composition is one which only the raost expert conductors of Stedman Triples are likely to succeed with, although it has already been shown that the peal is within the range of practical conductorship by the fact that it has been called by Mr. T. H. Taffender from a non-observation bell.

To turn, however, to the other side of the question-the task of the composer-it is, we have no hesitation in saying, one of fle greatest triumphs that has ever been achieved. Only those who have made a study of the composition of Stedman Triples can appreciate the diff. culties of the composer. At one time a peal in the method with only bobs and singles was considered impossible except on the twin- bob plan, and it was less than twenty years ago that Sir Arthur Heywood wrote that 'the slightest divergence at once lands the composer in apparently hopeless difficulties.' Yet in his Odd Bob peal and in his newest production, Mr. Carter has shown that even these hopaless difficulties can be overcome. In the old days peals of Stedman Triples were got on the multi-bob plan, by which composers utilised bob blocks to keep the bells belind togather for as many sixes as possible, and which also involved the use of special calls in place of singles. Then, in the evolution of peals, came those on the bob and single plan, to be superseded by the twin-bob system, of which Thurstans' was the first and greatest. Peals with odd bobs and in which only two ordinary singles are used hecame the next step forward, and now Mr. Carter has combined both odd and even bobs in one peal.

Mr. Cazter is a genius, but such things as the Odd and Even Bob peal do not come merely as a flash of inspiration. Long and patient investigation lies behind the production of such a composition. [^0]believe he has in his dinner hour, it is only because much patient labour has gone to prepare the way; if he has given us what ringers believe to be the most wonderful piece of mechanism ever designed by the wit of man-his ringing machine-it is only as the result of twenty-five years of untiring application, coupled with the exercise of that creative skill of which in the pursuit of his hobby, as well as in the serious tasks of life, he has so often given proof. The Odd and Even Bob peal may be to him but a step from the Odd Bob peal, but it marks a new departure which goes to demonstrate further how the Exercise is making progress, and, what is more, it provides us with an example of what may be achieved by those who care to devote themselves to study. From this standpoint should be an inspiration to others.

## YORKSHIRE ASSOCIATION.

HASTERN DISTTEICI AND THE PONTUTRAOT IOW RRS.
The anmual meebing of the Eastern District of the Porkshire Asceciation was held at Selby on Suturday, February 18th, by the kind pormission of the Vicar (the lkey. Canon Solloway). The ane peat of ten by Taylor und Co., with a tenor of 251 cwt., were at the disposal of ringers, and various touehes in the standard methods were succescfully brought round.

Choral evensong was atteried by between forty and filty visitors, repremantigg towers at Doncaster, Goole, Hemingbore', Howden, Hull, Market Weighton, Pontefrectr, Sutton, Thorne, York. Au inspiring address was delivered by the Vicar, who gave the members a most hearty welcome, and said he marvellad at the enthusiasm of ringers for their work. He wished that ather brancheg of church workers would display as much earnestness in their respectiva duties as dad ringers.

Selby Abbey, dedicatee to SS, Mary and Germanas, may be inchanood es the most parfectly preserved specimen of a monastic church in Yorkstire. The antiguity of the noble edifice may be gituged by the different styles of architecture-Norman, Transitional, $13 a r l y$ English, Decorated and Perpendicular. Itg great glory $\mathrm{i}_{5}$ its choir, described by tha late Sir Gifbert Soott as "in the finest Decaratod or midile-pointed style. and of the most perfect design and execu tion. ${ }^{1}$ The wonderful restored east window lias been accorded second rask anong the epleadid examples of ita alass in the word. The propertion of its parts, the beauty of the tracery, and the slender tofty mulions unsupported by transoms, aro unoxcelled. Another very interestily feature, in one of the choir windowe (the second lyut of the gecoud window from the oust end of the south side) are the arms of the Washingtan family, the most dietinguished member of which becrme the first President of the United States. Selby folk, of all classes and creeds, take a justifiable pride and interest in their beautiful Berodiclino church, whose fing erchitectural proportions form a notable handmark.

The business meeting of the district was feld immediately after tea in tho seriptorium, the rite-president (Mr. A. ©. West) being in the chair supported by the president (the Rev. O. O. Marshall).
