## A REFERENCE SYSTEM.

Recent events have again emphasised the necessity of having available some system of reference by which the author of a method or the composer of a peal can ascertain whether be is the first in the field with his production. A method which turned out to be Lancashire Surprise has just beer pubished again under another aame by Mr. Ridgway, who had produced it without any knowledge of its prior publication, and who, as his letter last week explains, had tried all available avenues open to him to see if the method had been obtained before. Then there was Mr. Pitman's Triples method, which had long ago been worked out by Mr. J. W. Parker, but whicb had not been previously published. Here, within a week or so, are two instances which show the need for some central reference to which composers can go for information. It has been due to the want of these facilities in the past that some of the Minor methods bave been rung under three or four different names.

What applies to methods applies also to peal compositions. A recent case in point was the peal of Cambridge Royal, which tad been rung with the names of Mr. William Pye and the Rev, H, Law James as composers. It is only when some accident brings to light the fact that the productions of two or more men are the same thing that the real title to authorship can be decided; indeed, we have seen how it is possible for it to remain in dispute even when it is clear that one or other of the claimants must be in the wrong. Our contention is that the Central Council stould file copies of all methods and the figures of all peals that are in existence, so far as they are obtainable, so arranged that they may be accessible for reference. The subject was before the Council at the last meeting, but, being involved with a resolution that proposed the proving of all peals before they are rung or published, this part of the motion did not receive the consideration it deserved, and was defeated largely, if not entirely, because it was coupled with a proposal which the Council looked upon as impracticable. If methods and peals were classified-the classification on the lines of the Council's publications might not, and, in the case of peal compositions, certainly would not be the best way of doing it-any eomposer could at small trouble find out whether what he had got to give the Exercise had been previously obtained, It would be a source of satisfaction to the conscientious man, and save a good deal of heart-burning among those who know that peals which they have long since found are being claimed by composers who have come on the scene at a much later date. This is a matter in which no time should be lost. Delay will only add to the labour and the difficulties of the task of setting up the file, and even now it will be a big undertaking.

There $i_{s}$ such a fearth of bigher Triples methots, that something new, which would be really morthy of practice, should be welvamod by the Exercise. In our issue of August 25 th we published a new Triples method which Mr. A. J. Pimanl, of Port Talbot had evolved. $A_{\text {a }}$ subsequent information goes to show, the same methed in a better form, in that it keeps the division heurs in courging order, had been previously obtained by Mr. J. W. Parker, of Sunderland, who, howaver, hi4g not published it, mercly for the veason, we believo, that a peal is not possible without a call which has five bells lying still.
Mr Pitman's peal contains two Holt's Singles to achieve this end, with Stedman bobs for the rest of the calls. Mr. Parser proouced a peal containing Holt's Singles only, and remarkable for its simplicity.

For the benefit of our readers, we give flue method iat the form that Mr. Parker produced it, and in which form it ig more likely to commend itgelf to ringers. It is in metiond which, we believe, will be found more dificult than Stedman to iting, and deserves the attention of these who are looking for something fresth. Mr. Pitman's composition also ruks the to form.

## PROTECTION OF ANCIENT TOWERS.

## THE THREATENED CITY CHUROHES

A very joteresting volume to mutiquariand is the 45th annual report of the Society for the Protection of Aacient Buildinge, which hus just been issued. The work doue by the society since its founda tion in 1877 has been in many directions extremely valuable, although, in the light of modern knowledge, those interested in bells und bof tanging have had causb to differ from the views expounded by the society in some specific cases.
As we bave glready mentioned in connection with the proceedings of the Ceutral Council, there ia now the prospect of an agreement lwing reached between the society and the Towerg and Belfries Coanmittee. The report drawn up by the committees of the two or genigations is not yet ready for publication, as it is waiting con frmation by the Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildinge The Council have sooppted tho procendiags of their commitee, and in the now report of the socioty it is recorded that • During the pist year the cociety bess been in conference with the Central Council of Church Bel! Riagers an the vesed question of beli hanging tu old towers.

Among the notes on $\not \approx 2 \pi y$ of the cates flale with during the year the following exfructs will be of interest to riugers and those connected with bell reatoration.

## BALSHAM OHUROE TOWER, CAMBRIDGESHIRE.

'rhis is a case, says the report, ' which ghows the usefulness of the qociaty to those iu charge of Parish Churches who ure in dificulties as to what ahould be done for their preservation. Balsham church tower, with its grey walle and mollow stome buturesgeg and windows, is a very fine piece of thirteenth century work. ll is, however built on clay, and the old buiblers omitted to widen out the bottoms of the walls sufficiently to distribute the great Height of the tower gefely over this nono too securo foundation. Soon fier tho tower was fimished, as it wouk soem, cettlements took place which caused tho walls to crack and the westorn arch betreen tho tower and nave to spread.

Some three hundred yearg latar, Blizabethan masous not only itrengthencd the walls, but also added massive stone buttresses eight feet wide and four feet thick, and this work beems to heve more
joss effectually stopped auy further cettlement
During last summer, however. the custodian of the chures thought there wero agair $\mathrm{kigh}_{\mathrm{B}}$ of movement in the tower; and, becaming concerned for its safety, they cume to the saciety for adyice.

After a careful survey, the socioty guve the Rector and churchwamlens a report on the tower's condition, with detailed recomnendationg as to the works required for its becurity. This report sated thet the recent mischief did not arise from any eettlement of the foundations, but as a matter of fact had had its origia in the undue stresses imposed on the ancient wullg by the ringing of the church kalls. of these balls there are gix which. excopting one by Toune w well-known founder of Heary the Eighth's fime-were probably cast in the first twenty years oi the eeventeenth century. They are lung iu a ligh bell cige, of the same age as themselves, the oak timbers of which are for the most part atill guite sound. The joists of the timbers have, howerer, worked loose, with the Fesult that, when the bells are rung, the cage sways. Moreover, the stout bearas supporting the carge transmit the momenturs of the swang bolla directify to the encient walls and concentrate the Elrasges thereon at the points where the baam ends rest. go that at these places there is a clefnite tondency for the masonry to become dierupted.

The remedies recommended are to strengthen the bell cage by strong iron bolts, and to distribute the Gereseg from the bean ends over the walling by constructing in the thickness of the masonry momediatoly below the beamg continuous trouding courses extending ound the inside of the tower. Other works jnclude the repair of cracks in the walls; tho recovering of the tower roof with cast lead, and tho reconstruction of the gutters hetind the parapets in asphalie
a bed of concrete to $b_{e}$ laid on the wall tope
The Rector and churchwardens have been most appreciative of the uciety's tielp; and the necessary work is going to be done.

## LONDON'S CTY GHURCHES

The report contains some shrong comments upon the suggested removal of ohurches in the City of Landou, and quotes the resolution passed by the Netioual Assembly on Frebruary 7th, on the mation of the Bishop of Loution, directimg the setting up mittee sto preprre an measure making provision for the union of benefices, und, if tho oommittee thinkg fit, for the removal of churches siluate within the Metropolitan Police District and the disposal of their sites.
Tho commilites of the Socicty for the Protechion of Ancient Buik? ings point out, in the report, that while the motion undoubtedly emlodies $a$ formula which would eabblo nany excellent and muchnceded reforms in Church administration to bo given effect to, quite ministaknbly the terms of reference would enable the special committeo so to cank the proposed measure, presumably a Bill to be put before Parlimment, that the destruation, noti only of Gity
tan Police District, extenjing from Hatfield to Ewell and Epping to Watiord, which might $b_{B}$ regarded $x_{g}$ havigg outlized their qsefulaes to the Church, could be setermined upon and put into axecution at the sole discretion of the Church Authorities, wittout Ie or hindrance.

It is, therefore, of singular importance, adds the society's report, "that all who have regard to the preservation of these national historic buildings should be thoroughly well arlyised of what. $i_{a}$ afoot. Unopposed measures such as thia nave a way of fagding themselves on the Statuts Book before the general publio is even aware that powerg are being sought. In this instance the importance of watchfulness and of timely opposition to any measure which would give to the Church power in its absolute discretion to demolish ang of the ancient buildings in its care, are of paramount necessity because of tho attitude of the Bishop of London, and of his advisers toward them.

Commenting on the Bishop's attitude, the report says: ' Although the Bishop of London eees, of course, clearly enough that by celliug the sites of the City Churches a very large sum of money could be got with which to extend the Ohurch's activities, it is little short of amazing that he should apparently have mo perception of the enormous loss whick the destruction of its ancient listoric churches would entail. It follows, therefore, that he can, up to now. have no conception of the blighting eloud of obloquy which, when the loss wan realised, would most inevitably descend upor those who had adrocated or lent themelves to so dubious a meane of raising money Nor can he luwe ang prevision of the great damage to the Chureh' prestige which would presently follow, togethor with the consequent ripaster to the Church's ajms and aspirations. ${ }^{1}$ The report adda: "That the Bisbop call have but scant sense of the true value of the historje monuments of the Church has recently been cleariy diaplayed by his action in the case of his own palace at Fulham, There, in the last few months, in the face of protests from thi gociety, he has filed in the well known moat-the lest which remained in London-a noat which, be it noted had been kept in order by each link in the long dhain of his prefecessors jn the See extending from tite seventh century. What confience, then, cad be reposed in the Biskop or to his adyisens as conservators of our priceless national relics? It is significant that the Diocese of Lon don is one of very few which still bave no Advizory Committee.
This question of the City Ghurches is one of special interest to ringers, for several of those that it was originally proposed to abolish contajn historic risgs of bells. It was tho subject of a resolution at the Central Couccil meeting at Northampton in 1920 . when the Council resolved, 'That an appeal be sent to the Bishop of Loodon's committee, urging the deairability of preserving all towerg in the City of London in which there are notable rings of bells.' Severs! members urged tife inclusion of a reference to the churches as well as the towers, but it was felt that fo do so would be going outaido the province of the Council, however strongly the members iadivirlunlly felt on the matter

At the meeting in the following year it was reprorted that the resolution was forwarded as diracted by the Council but that all that could be ascertained mas that the Bishop of Loudons committee har gone out of existence.
The report of the Society for the Proteotion of Ancient Buildinge hows that the danger of losing the towers may soon appar again, rnd in this matter the Council may join their foreen with tho society in protesting

## BRISTOL SURPRISE.

## THE EXTENSTON OF THE METEOD

The Rev. E. Bulkeg James, the author of Bristol Surprise, writes: In a recent letter I seo that Mr. Arthur Craven puts forward a claim for Lanchshire Surprisa to be regarded as a twin gister to Bristal, and I amafrad that I cammot agree with him. It is a relation certainiy, but only a poor relation, and 1 am afrid a very poor rolation ali that. Its chief fauls is to be found in the rows where the treble is going into 3-4, after leaving the lead, and when we find such row日 ds $51376482,53174628,35716482$, in the plein courge, it is quite sulfiene to condemn it, Then the three-pull dodgiag in $3-4$ and $5-6$ is not a pleasath feature, and the making of eqventh's plees when the treble lies tehind is a blemish fram which Bristol ix free.

Fut the truly "practica] innger, (to whom Mr. Powel| alludes) is certanly hot of wat order, for he prefers to kow not only what lies bencath the jam, but also what constitute the pil] xtself! As we lamarked once before, during a discussion on the extension of Londons, there is an unfortanate tendency on the part of $\mathrm{some}_{\mathrm{e}}$ theorists, to enstroud the seience of the thing in it clonk of mystery, Fitfalls, if any there loe, are created dinectly by this pernictous halit; sfrip off this artiticial vosture and the real thieg will appear, beautiful in its simplicity. To this very end was deroted considerable attention in the fist two sections af the article in question; and if Mr. Porell's letter had been intended Eeriously in tho spirit of constructipe critioism it would surely have appewred some time earlier; in fact, after the publication of that section of the article (pago 357) which dealt with the zualysis of at change-block or lead, in method consfruction. He speaks of the need for distinguishing beween features furdamental and leatures accidental in methods: but this is indeed one of the strong plank in our platform! The presence of figures at the conclusion of the letter in guestion whets the appetite for something of a prachical andure; but it is with somothing lize a fonse of clisappointment that we unearth what is virtually a paradox! It must be borme in wind that the whale fabric of the science of ringing rests upon one or two arbiurary conventions. For example, from the peint of view of theory only, it might egually well have been established that suocessive rows of change should be produced by causing the units to jump over one another, in accordave with certain rulcs, instead of ehagging adjacent places only. As we have remarked on a former wocasion, for the production of our pemutations, or changes, there are no fized laws, swoh as hold in chemisury for the production of compouzts from elearents. $I_{11}$ ziaging, convention simply have been established. and out of these confentions orise methods, consfructed at will. Tho methods may be sorted and classifiod. by virtue of the very fact that selectivify in production has been exercised; and thus we aryive at the inconthowertible fact that having fishoned a method with certhin immate features, those features remain with is in alk its ramifications, whether tup the scale in extension, or down it in contraction. Duplicity of Hesige is buch a feature; "association " of learls 5s another, ag we have previously illustrated in a different article.
Most of us will require all the proverbia] salt in the cellar to swallow Hir. Powelb final statement. But with the omission of thee worals- "true, " unlimited,' and its syanym " infinite "-it might go down without any at all!-Yours merrily. A. YORK BRaMBLe.
