## ANCIENT BELLS.

Although the trouble, which has recently occurred in a Kentish parish through the 'mutilation' of old bells in the process of rebanging, was not connected with a peal used for change ringing, the subject is certainly one which concerns ringers. With the incident at Chalk, and apon whom the blame rests, we have nothing to do, but we bave on more than one occasion in this column pointed out that when bell restorations are taken in hand, the comparatively few really ancient bells which we now possess ought to be jealously guarded. The destruction of bellis of real antiquarian interest in the past has robbed the present and future generations of valuable relics, which, once lost, can never be replaced. Some of these old bells may have been perfectly useless in conjunction with a modern ring, and because of this they have been sacrificed. Those that are gone, are gone for ever, and no amount of lamentation will bring them back. With those, however, that still remain, it is a different matter.

When restorations are contemplated, the fact ought not to be overlooked that these ancient bells, particularly those of the pre-Reformation period, however crude they may be as 'musical' instruments, are, after all, specimens of the bell founder's art which in themselves are archeologically valuable, and which will increase in value as the centuries pass. There is also a sentiment in regard to them which ought not to be ignored, and to put them into the melting-pot is rank vandalism. Where there are precious relics of this kind, and it is impossible to utilise them in connection with a restoration scheme, they ought to be preserved and retained in an honoured place in the church. It is true that such action would involve a greater expense than if the old bells went into the new peal, but we think little of a parish that would not gladly meet this extra outlay to preserve such relics.

We are glad to observe that a strong point is made of this matter in the joint report of the conference between the Central Council and the Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings. That valuable old specimens of mediæval handicraft have been ruthlessly sacrificed in the past has been one of the reasons why antiquarians sometimes put obstacles in the way of the restoration of bells to make them pealable. It may be urged, and quite rightly, that what has happened has seldom been the fault of ringers; but, as ringers, we look upoo ourselves as guardians of the bells, and wherever a church possesses bells cast by an early founder, special responsibility falls upon the ringers to see that such specimens of ancient work do not irretrievably disappear before some authority has had the opportunity of expressing an opinion upon their antiquarian value.

## ELTHAM BELLS TO BE RESTORED．

 TO BE MADE INTO AN OOTAVE．An appeal is being mate for funds for the restomation and aug－ mentation of the bells at EILham，Kent．After the war the Council of the Parisl．Churclı was faced with several problems involving re－ pains to the structuro and furmiture of the church．Of these the most urgent were the eleaning of the orgnn，and the restoration of the bells and clock．The former has ticen completed，and the Coun－ cil now propose to take in hand the more formidable task of restor－ ing the bells and clock．For many years the clock，which was erect－ eni in the tower in 1884 las mot been roing its duty properly as the chief clock of the villarge，party on account of repairs necessary to its own works and partly because the mechanism which connects it to the bells for climing the hours and quarters is worn out．Fur－ ther，some montlis ago the wheel of one of the bells broke and the Council took the opportunity of having the belfry and clock surveyed $\mathrm{b}_{\mathrm{y}}$ an expert．The survey revealed the fact that the wooden framo－ work andi whecls are in a state of decas，that three of the bells are cracked，and that any money spent on repairs would be wasted－ total restoration being necessary
The history of the bells is lost in the mists of antiquity．Ancient records，however，inform us that in 1467 there were three great bells in the steeple and a Senctus bell of lurass．In 1571 two of these bells were recnst：the peal was again recast and a tenor added in 1610 ： the whole peal was again recast in 1794．In 1879 the tower of the present eharch was completed and the bells rehung on the old frame work．In 1897 the whecls were repaired and fha pells quarter－ turned．Hence，when considening their great age，the condition of the bolls is not surprising，and it has，tinerefors，been decided to embark on the work of restoration，and at the samo time to com plete the peal by the addition of two bells．
This will embatl：（2）Clearing the tower of existing bells and clock （2）fixiug a mew steal fame with eight bells，the metal of the old six bells bcing used in the mew peal：（3）repairing and cleaning the clock，replacing it in the fower and connecting to the bells with modern mechanism；（4）providing a new clack face on the east side of the tower，i．e．，facing up the High Street．
Tha modern melhod of casting and tuning belis，says the appeal， results iu a tone far superior to linat produced by the present bells， and this combined with certain alteralions to the windows of the tower，which will throw tio sound higher，will completely do away With tile ratber barsh tone at present noticeable by those in the close vicinity of the church
The total sum required for this is about e850，and the whole work will be entrusted to Messus．Gillett and Johnston of Croydon． Subscriptions（howewer small and by juslamments if desired）are in－ pited，and may b seut to Captain TT．Anderson，M．C．，8，Sherard Road，Eltham，S．E．9，the hon，secretary and treasurer of the Eltham Bells and Clock Frund．Should a person or group of persous wish to give a bell either as a memorial or from any other motire，the Coun－ cil would gladly allow the bell to he suitably inscribed．
The appeal has the support of many leading people of Ethiam，and it，is interesting to note that the lisp includes the names of the Wes－ leyan and Baptist Minisiers．

## DEATH OF MR．SPENCER MARSHALL．

It is with regret we Tiave to recom the death of Mr．Spencer Mar－ Ghall，whicli took place suddenl $T_{5}$ on March 17 th ，at the early age of 35 years．The deceased was horn at hainham，Kent，and started
ringing there in 1904．He rang his hiss peal at Sitingbourne．About， 1906 his family moved to Bromley，Kent，and he joined the band at the parish church，and rang several peals with them．Working at Bexley Heatla，lye used to visit Crayford on practice nights and do his Sumday ringing at Bromley when ho went home at the week－end． During the war lo morked at Wogbridge，Surrey，and took part in Wlatever rimging was available in that district．
Returning to his old employer after the war，lie resided permanently t Bexley Heath，and joined the Grayford band，being a most regular attondant．He rang his last peal at St．John＇s，Deptford，last De－ cember，this beiug a Foresters＂peal，conducted by Mr．W．J． Jeffries．

The President expressed the Counail's thanks for the welcome given to them, and for the kindness of the Dean and Chapter in placing the Chapter House at their dis [porn].
The minutes of the last meeling having beon published, were taken as teau, and duly confinmer and signed.
Apologics for absenco were received from tho Rov. A. H. Boughey, thu Thov. Maitland Kelly, the Rev. C. E. Mathews, tio Rev. E. S. Powell, Kajor J. H. B. Hesse, Mrsars. G. Bolhawd, J. Carter, Wh. T. Cockerill, R. A. Daniel. C. Ldwards, P. J. Johneon, E. H. Lewis, W. Shepherd, W. Shorey, 'W. R. Small, A. Paddon Smith and J. A. Trollope.
The Fresident arplaincd that owing to an important ongagement in Lontion ho would bavo to leave early (much to his regret, as he bad nol unissed a meeting sule the Conncil was formed). It was resolval, on the motion of the Rev. C. D. P. Davies, that on the presidenthetiring. Aderman J. S. Pritehett should take the chair.
The Presidenti hen referred to the serious loss the Council had The Prestenti then referred to the serious loss the Council had
oustaned by libe death of Mr. A, T. King, and made special reference to lis arnunus work on the Peals Analysis Commitued. As a loken of respect, and to express sympalhy with Mr. King's family, those present rose in silence.

L. Coloman, seconded by Mr. W. A. Cave, the report wus adopted.
The President here relinquished the chair, which was then taken by Ademman J. S. Priteliett, who expressed his appreciation of the compliment paid to him, arad referred to the honour which was about to be conferred umon the president, and which was the canse of his now leaving for London, wiz, to receive st the hand of the Duke of Conmaught ho appointment of Provincial Grand Chaplain of the Mark Masons of Enpland. Alderman J. S. Pritcliett, as Recorder of Lincoln, in the absence of the Mayor, and on behalf of the city, also extended to the Cotucil a most cordin! welcome.

The Methods Committee. Tho lies, If. Law James gare a general report on behail of this committee, and said that he thought the time had now come when some of the work done by this committee slould be put into print, for which lie hat an estimato for 22055 . 6d.-It was puoposed by Mr. J. Griffing and seconded by the Rev. Fi. Ll. Edwards, that the tender of the 'Ringing Word ' to print 500 copies each of Plain Major Methods aud the collection of Little Methods be accepted, and this was carried.-On the suggestion of the Chairman, it was also decided to leave to the committeo the responsitility of naming the methods or otherwise.

Mr. A. E. Parsons moved, "That the Council consider the advis ability and practicability of proving and recording all new composi tions before they ale rung or published. -This was seconded by Mr W. Short, and after some debato 'Standing Committee' was substituted in the place of "Council." But on being put to the meeting the motion was defeated
Mr". E. Alexr. Young, referring to the proposed exhibit in respect to Campanology at the Science Mrusemm, proposed *Tat a committos he appointed to deal with the oase generally, and suggested as members the aames of tho Rev. C. D. P. Davies, the Rev. D. Bank James, Mr. C. Dolinston. and himself.-This was seconded hy Mr. E. Irarsons.-By general agreement the names of Mr F. ti L Lewis Mr. Prye Taylor and Mr. A. A. Hughes were added, and the forma flon of the committee, as augmented, was carried.

A resolution, of which Mr. H. H. Banks had sent late notice, was formally moved by Camon H, J. Elsee. It was to the eflect ' That in future no method be named after a county or county town, with out the consent of the principal ringing association within the area. "The motion, however, did not find favour, and was defeated.

Grifin. but was subsequently withdrawa in favour of Flymouth; Mr. J. Hunt proposed Bath; Mr T. II. Beams, Salislury: and Mr. Bibby. Clester. All were duly seconded. The latter, however, was withdrawn, and plymouth, Bath and Salisbury receiving 2, 15 and 28 votes respeclively, it was accordingly aecided to hold the meoting at Salisbury.
On the motion of Mr. J. Griftin, secouded by Mr. G. Williams, it was resolved to communicate officially in report of the proceedings of the Council to the affilated associations, by sending a leafletr, being the summary appearing in "The Ringing Forld.'
It was proposeñ hy the Rev. Canou H . J. Tilsee, and seconded by Mr. J. H. Griffin, that the librarian be asked to ascertaiu the cost of engrosing on parament, the vames of ringers who fell in the great war, and that he report the same to the Council.-This was carried.
The Chairman moved a vote of thanks to the Dean and Chapter for kindly allowing the Council to meet in Ele Ohapier House. - This was carried with acclarnation, as was also a vote of thanks ta the thairman, proposed by the Rev. C. D. P. Davies. - The ©lairman briefy roplien, and the meeting closed about 4.30 .

Born in Devouslire in 1867, he first learnt to ring a bell as a lad in that country of cream and cider, and, although, wherever ho went fund he was a great roamer, laving been to several English Coloules) be always visited the nearest fower nad rang with the ringers there, he never learat change ringing till he weat to Bolsterstave about eight or nine years ago. Sineg then he bas geen most enthusiastice and regular in his attendance at serpic, riuging. On the oocasion of his first peal two years ago, on New Year's Eve, he rang the tenor to a peal of Minor on the front six, with tho 7ith ard ierior cowering, a monotonous job which wo one but a real enthnsiast whuld attompt. After much struggling and many attempte he rang the 6th to a peal of Bob Major, good peal, on December 3lst lasthis firsi and iast peal inside, for he was eyen then suffering from the complaint of which he died. After the peal he presented a aplendid oak framsid mirror to the tower, in appreciation of the ringers' efforts to teach him clasge ringing.
His death occurred after an operation at the Sheffield Ropal Inffrmary. When lie knew he would have to go there on sonia date urknown, ho said. "If I don't wurn up somg Sunday morniug or to a pratice you will know where I sm, and we did

During the last saver or eight yers the deceased has also fulfilled the duties of sidesman at St. Mary's, where his regularity at service was much appreciatod. A man who had worked hard all his life, chiefly on public works, lug was noted for his great physical and moral strength, his uprigltness and honesty of elfaracter, and ho will be greatly dissed, both by his fellow workmen and his brother ringers. In the tower, his quiet geniality his kintly and practical help and general ability in all mafters comected with the bells were invaluable, and his unfimely death will lerwe a gap not easily filled. May he rest in peace.

The first recorded peal on the ancient bells at st. Bartholomew-theGreat, Smithfield, was rung io commemoration of the 800th anniversary of the dedication of the church on Wednesday in last week, when forty-bwo six-scores of Grandsire Doubles were rung by five ringers, who, on Saturday, by way of contrast, took part in a peal of Cambridge Surprise Maximus, at Bow!

Congratulations to Migs Melly Johnson, of Hinton, upon calling a double-handed peal of Kent Treble Bob Royal. Mr. F. J. Jonnson has a gifted family of ringers, and must be proud of his ohildren's ability.

## DEATH OF MR. JOHN RICE.

A WELL-KNOWN SUSSEX RINGEIR
The death ocourved recently at Crawley of Mr. Johns Rice, a wellknown Sussex ringer, who was 52 years of age, had for some time past been in indifferent health, and partial paralysis aud other com. plications brought about his death after a short but painful illness He was laid to rest on the Tth of March, near the tower in whick he bad spent so many happy hours. The sad service was attended by a great gatlizring of townspeople to pay their last repects, many local bodies, ringers and friends being present. Besides his interest in ringing John Rice was secretary of the local Co-operative Society a past Grandmaster of the Oddiellows, and was ever foremost in working for charitabie objects in the town.
His loss to ring at Crawley, with which tower he has been associated with for over thirty years, is irveparable. A good ringer and a good striker, regular for service ringing, he was an examplo to all who came in contact with him. Fe was of genial and retirimg disposition, but into any task he undertook he put his whole soul and energy. For some years he served ou the committee of the Susser County Association, and le was also a member of the Sussex Association and Royal Cumberland Youths.
He had taken part in 161 peals as follows: Minor in 7 methods, 8 Grandsipe Triples, 14 (conducted 5) : Bob Tripies, 1; Court Bob Tripies, 1: Stedman Triples, 13 ; Bob Major, 7 ; Kent Treble Bob Major, 3 (conducted 2): Oxford Treble Bob Major, 1; Spliced Oxford and Keat Major, 2; Granta Treble Bob Major, 1; Double Norwich, 13; Alliance Major. 1; Superlative Surprise Major 54 (conducted 1); Cambridge Surprise Major, 9: New Cumberlend Surprise Major, 1; Londor Surprise Major, 2; Stedman Caters. I: Tyeble Bol, Royal, 1; total, 161 (conducted 8). Whis pals lad been rung in 31 difevent towers, with 95 peals at Crawley, including at this church the 9,312 Superlative Surprise Major, in 5 houts 20 minutes on Dec. 26th, 1894; at that time the longest composed in the method.

## NOMENCLATURE OF MENOR METHODS.

## DENTRAE CODNCIE COMNTTEE'S RDPORT,

As insfructed by the Central Goneil at Lincoln last May, we have riven this matter onir careful consideration, and beg to submit our report.

Wo have been guided in our work by the principles me made known at the Lincoln meotiog, via, by prionity of use, and lay the advisability of retaining as much as possible, consistent with our present definitions, all that has been in use in the past. We have also had fn mind the decision of the Council at London in 1921, that all claims to give names to unnamed methods in the collection should be sent to the librariac within six motatis.
The result of our effort is, we believe, quife in accordance withs these conditious. To secure this we lawe been obliged to get aside a number of clains which were sent in at shorter or longer intervals aifter the lapse of the time allowed. Duder such treatment some of these may be described as 'hard cases,' and we lave real sympathy with all who are concerned in them in their disappointment. But we realised that to have dealt with them othervisa we should lave been obliged to cluaw a dividing line between claims, al! which, nevertheless, share ilu a common feature, viz, being too late. We were not willing to aitempt the sottlement of a question so justly open to a diversity of opinion, nor did we feel our terms af reference required us ta do
It is, of course, open to the Council to modify or reject onl decisions, This We think, will afford the pecessary opportunity for any clamant, who considers himself aggrieved, to renew his claim.

Dear Sir,-There is yet another method of splicing, not used in the Norbury peal. This can best be explained by an examplo. In the Collection of Legitimate (Regular) Minor Methods, pases 14 and 15 , it will be seen that Fourth's Place Delight, No3. 3 and 5 . contain the sume changes in a lead except for tle two middle changes.

Therefore; if in a 720 of No. 3, three leads be picked out which have tho arme bells in the same position in 4th's and 5th's places at the "lear heal," Method No. 5 can ba substituted for No. 3 in these three leads. Similarly Nos. 10 aud 14 and Fos. 11 and 15 can bo spliced by picking three leads with the same bells in 3rd's and 5th's, as shown by the figures belaw.

It is impossible to get a true 120. Also there are only thrce triat nethods in Triples, Piz., Grandsire, Stedman and College Singie. Take Double Grandsire, for instance. Thare are three false rows besito the hand stroke treble lead 564732, 764235 and 567243 , so that it is impossible to get a true peal; and the rest are all about the same.- Yours truly,
