## THE NAMING OF METHODS.

One of the most mysterious things about ringing is the curious manner in which certain words and names have crept into use in connection with the art. They have come in the process of time, though no one knows their real origin. The mists of the past surround them, and in these days we cling to them largely for the sake of tradition, but without knowing exactly why they came to mean what they at present convey, or how they came to be used. How many people, for instance, can tell us why the word 'Grandsire' was applied to the method, or whence comes the word 'Bob' as applied to Treble Bob? So with many of the names applied to other methods, they are presumably just the designation given at the caprice of composer or ringers, and in not a few cases they are ludicrous, and would seen so to ringers were it not for their familiarity. There is no reason, however, why these absurdities should be amplified and perpetuated when the opportunity occurs to remedy some of the ridiculous appellations of the past. Yet, in the report of the Analysis Committee of the Central Council, which is to be presented for adoption at the meeting at Whitsun, there appear names for methods which some may think picturesque, but which we venture to believe will be a laughing-stock to the majority of ringers. To give such names as Dahlia and Geraniun, to mention only two, to Treble Bob methods seems to us sufficient to kill the methods for ever. We can only think the Conmittee adopted flower names for some of this group because some unimaginative persons in the past designated a few of the earlier methods by titles such as 'Tulip ' and 'Primrose.' Then, too, they have retained such a name as 'Trinity Sunday' for a Treble Bob method, 'Francis' Gentus, for a third's place Delight, and ' Ringers' Surprise 'for one in the highest group.

The Committee tell us that they have been guided in their selection by priority of use and the advisability of retaining as much as possible, consistent with present definitions, of all that has been in use in the past. There can, however, be no advantage in extending the absurdities of the years gone by, and while there is much less objection to the word "abbey' or 'castle " as part of a title, there can be no gainsaying tile fact that nothing sounds so weil as the plain name of a county, city, or town applied to the names of the methods we ring. There is still a vast number of such names left, and if there were not sufficient of these, even the rivers would have given us a better type of name than flowers. At any rate, we fancy there is something a little more impres.

sive about such titles as "Thames," 'Severn' and 'Trent,' for instance, than 'Bluebell,' 'Fuchsia' and ' Marigold,' which, pretty as they may be in themselves, savour of fairy stories and nursery rhymes, instead of a serious art. If it is desired to preserve the ancient names which were given to some of these methods, it should have been sufficient to place them on record with a reference to the new desiguation, and thus kept the identity of the ancient titles from being lost. For the sake of the dignity of the art we hope the Committee will feel inclined to take back their report and amend it so that the Exercise may be rid of some of these absurdities. At the same time the question of naming new methods might be taken in hand by way of laying down some lines for the future. Only last week the Leicester men, ringing the first peal of Mr. Arthur Craven's new method, felt that the name given was-not a suitable one. It is difficult to dispute an author's right to call his creation what he chooses-that is how some of the names in the past were handed down to us-but if the Council expressed their views as to the limits within which titles should be found, it is more than likely that they would be readily accepted, and, in any cvent, when the day arrives that all affiliated associations acknowledge the rulings of the Council as binding, the Council will have power to change any names that do not comply with their requirements.

## ANCIENT WILTSHIRE BELLS RESTORED．

The ancient village of Ogbourne St．George，Wilts，lying in a pretby valleg between two ridges of the celebrated wiltolire Downs，las charming pastoral surroundings，and just below the venerablo parish charch the clear waters of the Ogbourne，a Lributary of the Kemet， flow placidly by．The church containg a grand old ring of five bells， with a nable tenor，described in Church Bells；by W．C．Lukis， M．A．，F．S．A．，as follows：－

1．To bee the Iaading bell，
To prayes and ring well．
I was given by Master Thomas Baude，R．T．，July fifteentlie， 1625.

2．God be our guyd．IR．B． 1603.
3．Gere thanks to Gol．R．B． 1603.
4．William Goddard，Willinm Dixhon，Curuchwardens．William Purdue and Thomas Purdue， 1652.
5．William Goddard，William Dixon，Gurchwardens．William Purtiue and Thonas Purdue cast meo 1652.
For many years these beautiful bells have been pructically uuringr－ abie buth they lave recently been relhung in a new steel and iron frame with entirely new futings and ropes by Messrs，Gilleti and Johuston，and，needless to say，the work has been admirably dono． The tono of the bells las been greatiy inproved by careful tuning．
The Vicar（the Ikev．A．H．Smith，M．A．）has worked with oharacter－ istic energy iu collecting tie funds amounting to sj75，and a fur－ ther sum is reguiced to curry oul somo necessary tepairs to tho tower and the provision of a now floor．
A dedication service was held on Saturday，April 14th，when the openiog ringing was performed hy lacal ringers，and their experi－ ences were not too happy，the transformation to the eusy－going luelis somewhat upsetfing them，and one enthusiast soon harl a stay off．A number of ringers from neighbouving towers were also plesent，and the bells wers kept going until a late hour．
The rivgers were enterlained to tea in the Parish Room by the Vicar，to whom a vote of tharks was aceorded for his kind lospitality．
The Rector＇s subject in his sermon was a unique one．It was based on simplicity and the snperiority of all things yepresonted by simple words or monosylibbles．＇In the farm，＇he said，＇you．have the sheep，the borse，ho com，the ox，the goat，corn，wheat，hay．In life you have love，light，food，slcep．All tha best things were ex－ pressed by simple words．What mors musicul word could you find than that of＂bell＂p＂The preacher congratulated the people of Og－ bource on their efforis which had culminated so successinuly that day，and on the compasatively short period which hacl elapsed from the inauguration of the scleme to the completion of it．He greatly regretfed that indisposition had prevented the Archideacmon of Willi－ shire from performing the ceremony，which he had been ealled upon to do in his place．
At the conclusion．Mry E．Bishop，of Swindon，proposed a liearty wote of thanks to the Wicar for his joospitality，aud expresed his en－ tire satisfaction at tho cxcelleat way in which Messr＇s，Gillett and Johmeton had restored the lells．Mr．O．F．Johnston seconded the vote of thanks，and expressed the liape that the Ogbourne ringers would soon master the art of change ringing．
Thus another of Wiltshiro＇s grand old rings bas been restored， and it is safo to say that if the bells．Frame and fittings ure properly cared for they will continue to ring ont then mossiages for many generations to come．The tonor is $18 \frac{1}{2}$ owt．in E．

His works in this country are, of courge classical, his best engravings beiug " The Death of Lord Ohatham, aftor Copely, and the 'Virgin and Child.'

## TEN-BELL TOWERS. <br> BECCLES CAMPANILE.

## By J. R. JERRRAM.

Beccles, in Suffolk, whose chief interest for ringers is its peal of ten bells hung in one of the very few detached Campaniles in Engtand, had a peal of eight bells over a hundred and sixty years ago, and on a board in the tower is the following record:-

This peal of ten was east by Lester and Pack at the Whitechapel Foundry in 1762, the tenor being stated to $b_{0} 27 \frac{t}{2}$ owt. The fifth bore the inscription:-

THE CAMPANILE OF BECOLES OFURCII
The late Canon Raven, in his account of the bells, mentions that several were cracked when he took inscriptions, the 8th and 9th boing hooped round with iron bands, while some of the belk had wooden crowns.' Messes. Taylor and Co. carried out a complete overhaul of the bells in 1909, when the 4 th, Gth and $9 t h$ were rearst (Hie 8 th haring been recast twenty years before), and the whole ring lung in a steel frame. The present tenor is 25 owt. 1 qr. 25 lb ., in D flat.

## DEATH OF MR. WILLIAM GRIMES.

## A SDFFOLK PIONERR.

It is with much regret that we lave to record tho death of Mr . William Grines, of Delmenham, Suftolk, which sacl event took place on Sadurday, April 24th. As announced in our columns a few weoks ago M1. Grimes had been seriously ill for nearly two years, and the end wris not altogether unexpected. It was chielly owing to his energy and enterprise that change ringing was started at Debenham, when lie came to reside there some 42 yoard back, and ha had always taien a leading part in the advancement of the art in the district. He had also been a member of the choir for just, on 40 years, and Was connected with many other public bodiss in the town.
His peal records show that ho had rung 118 in all of which 116 were to the credit of the ald Norwich Diocesan Association. The methods included Minor 1. Bob Triples 2, Grandsire Triples 3, Stedman Triples 2, Bob Major 20, Kent Treble Bob Major 10, Oxford Treble Bob Major 28 (including 16,608 ), Double Norwich Major 30. Cambridge Surprise Major 1, Superlative 9, Kent Treble Bob Royal 5, Kent Eroble Bob Maximus 1. Of these he had conducted about 30.
The funeral took place on Thursday, April 19th, and was attended by a large and representative gathering, including sereral past and present offerers of Court 5318 "Star of Suffolk, A.O.F. of which deceased was a Past Chief Fanger. A course of Grandsire Triples was rung at the graveside $\mathrm{b}_{\mathrm{v}}$ Hubert Day 1-2, Widiam Rose 3-4, Wm. C. Rumsey 5-S. Ernest F. Poppy 7-8: and in the evening half-mufflen touches of Cambridge ant Stedman 'ľiples were rung upon the bells of St. Mary's Church. These were followed by the whole pull and stand. after which the age of the deceased (64 years) was tolled on the tanor. On Sunday afternoon a peal of Double Norwich (deceased's favourite method) was rung as a last tributo of respect to his memory. A record of this will be found in its ploper plnce.
It is proposed to keep the fund (started for the benefit of Mr. Grimes) open for a few weeks on behalf of the widow, and subscripfions will bo thankfully received and anknowledged in the usual way by Mr. W. There wis a great day for ringers at Trowbridge on Easter Mollday, when the hwo new bells added to the existing oclave to make the first peal of ten in Wiltshire were opened. The bells have been added by Messis. Llewellins and James, of Bristol, and are inseriberd as follow :-

gathering of nearly 300 fingers was pregent for the opening, Among the towns aud willages represented were London, Bristoi (which sent thirty or forty). Bath, Wells, Newport, Frome, Shaftes hary, Warminster, Westhury, Devizes, Chippenham, Swiodon, Melkshav, Midsomer Norton, Powsey, Bratton, Steeple Ashton, North Bradley, Bislap's Caunings, Rowde Seend, Radstack, Holt, Bouruemouth, Milverton, Bradford-on-Avon, Hilperton, Wootton Bassett, Colne, Bromalam, Theading, etc.

The proceedings began with two houre" ringing on the old eight beils, and then, asgembling outside the Town Hall, the dimgers formed a procession and marched to the church, headed by the Comrades" baud. The church was fuli to overtlowing. A service was held, at which the Rev. P. A. Nasb, Rector. gave a shorl address of welcomo to the ringers, and referced to the circumstances leading up to the addition of the two bells. The lesson, from the service appointed to be used by the Salisbury Diocesan Guild of Ringers, was read by whe Rev. F. Li. Edwards, Fectol of Kington Magna, Gillingham, who is general secretary of the Guild. The actual 'openine ' of the enlarged parl was rlone by Trowbridge ringetrg, followed by a touch by a picked banc? from Bristol towers.

After b He service there was tem at the Town Hall. The chairman of the Devizez bramoh, Mr. C. D. ITegimbothom, opened the proceedinfs after Lea, and in the course of an interesting address, said: "This is a red-letter day in the Church listory of this county, and in the history of the Devizes brauch of the Diocesan Ringing Cuita, for we have wiluesser tho formal opening of the first peal of ten bells in both. We are I bink, quite naturally, resy proud that our brauch of the Guild shomld have this homour. I have heard that this branch also contains fhe frst peal of eight rung as an eight for ringing in the whole nounts, viz, at Bishop's Camings, mad if this is true we lave an additional reason to be proud of our [ramel. We naturally think on an oceasion like this of the donors, througlu whose generosity the peri of elglat in the parish clurcla has been aurmented to tent As most of you are aware, one of the bells was given by the late Mrs. Mackay in grateful memory that flurough the mercy of Gonl her two sous were spared in the recent deplorable European conflict. Ono cannot help thinking what a splendifl method of showing gratidude to Amiahty God this is. The other hell and the remander of the work, inclucling the chiming apparatus, has been enabled to be carried out througl the generosity of Trowbridge citizens (nof of one denomination only), and they may well be proud of the result. We are told on all sides to-day that the prevailing elements where Church work and wouship are concemed, are "apasiny's and "tudiflerence" But 1 say " Mr. Apalhy " and " Mr. Indifferenee ${ }^{1 / 2}$ never caused a clumph bell to be hung in their lives. No! To organise work like this needs patience, needs hope, needs a burning and unquenchable enthusiasm, and in the Trowbridge ringers, and especially in the man for many pears their leader, you have these gualities pepmonifert. I refer to Mr. S. J. Mector.'
Mr. Heginbothom went on to refer to the great general improvements whtch had been effected in the belfries during the last thirty jeals, and went on to speak of the constructive programme which he would like to see carvied out. 'First and foremost,' he continued. 'Wo want, a more definitely pronounced recogntion of ringers as Charch warkors. To emable us to achiere this wa must have hoarty co-operation lefweon clemy fild ringers. I strongly recommend that one or more fingers from every lower get a place on their respectwe parochial chnch councils. which now regulate and control parisin finnees, and with the assistance of the inoumbent obthin from them a grant, however small. either from an offertory or the freewill ofering funds, in airl of their Ringing Guild branch funds. A course like this woutd fave far-reaching advantages. The ringens woult have belter chances of obtaining instruction in change ringing. It Would also hring lefore them the fact that they must not be selfish and imapine their own tower and their own packets are the only consideration. From the incumbent's point of view it. would prevent any remarks, such as I have frequenty heard, that the ringers are unrecognised by himself or the other Church workers, and quite maturally he would expect to see that the branel, funds to which his parish had contrihuted, were properly expenden, and as a cortseguence would take a greater interest in the Guilds is a whole, and
in his own branch in particular. Secondly, I wish to see more mobility on the part of the ringers. Enen if they sre only round ringers they can and should visit other local towers, and rubbing shoulders with their fellows is bound to make them feel more keenly the bond of fellowstip and brotherhood which unites all who take patt in ringing the alurch bells. I want to see all ringers recognise their responsibilities. Never was there a time when sterling men and true were mone wanted in the Church and by the Churelt than to-day. If ringers and choristers-many of you are botl-especially the younger generation, will recognise their responsibilities there is no need to be disheartened. In the course of my wanderings over the South of England I have never met a body of men who on the whole are mare genial, more ready to help a comrade in distress, more ready to extend the hand of good fellawship. than church bell ringers: and as loug as the Church Ringing Guids ean count among their followers such men as Mr. Cave of Bristal; Mr. King, of Batlı: Mr. F. Green, Whe secretary of this branch, and others here present too mumerous to mention by name, we can look forward to the future with an unclouded wiston.

The Rector also spoke a few words, and the Rev. F. Ll. Edwards thanked tho Trowbridge ringers, on belialf of the Salisbury Guild, for the kinduess extended to the visitors.
Two bauds of handbell ringers came from Bristel, vepresenting respectively the Guild of St. Thomas in that city and the Guild of St. Philip. They gave"exbibitions of ringing outside the Town Hall before the processiou started, aud again from the platform of that building after tho tea, and were listened to with interest and arprectation.

Ringing was later resumed at the parish chureh, and seweral good tonches of Grandsire and Stedman Caters were rung. From every point of view the day was most successful.
