## DIFFICULTIES IN THE METROPOLIS.

The College Youths' dinner on Saturday was again the occasion of an enjoyable gathering of ringers from many parts of the country. Each year seems to bring a bigger 'fnvasion' than ever of visitors from distant centres, until the event bas become almost national in character. The Ancient Society has behind it some fine traditions in ringing, and there was never a time when the College Youths had greater prospects before them. No longer are they that 'one company' organisation which, in years gone by, they seemed to be, but they combine now among their active members the experience of age, and the enthusiasm of youth so essential to future success. Indeed, the promising young material to be found in the ranks of the College Youths in and around the Metropolis must be one of the most gratifying features to the older members.

Our article on this page last week seems to have been not inaptly timed, for it served to give the Master of the Royal Cumberland Youths, in responding to the toast of London and Provincial Societies, the cue for a serious speech on the difficulties which in these days confront London ringing societies. His remarks, in our riew, give point to what we said with regard to joint action among the Merropolitan organisations. Quite frankly, Mr. Matthews said that the fact that some Metropolitan towers are closed to-day may be due to the action of ringers themselves in the excessive use they have made of them for peals in the past. Here, surely, is one strong reason why an effort should be made to get derelict rings put in order, so that the peal ringing may be spread over more towers, and thus reduce the risk of outranning the welcome at the churches at present used

Another of the points which Mr. Matthews made was that it was almost, if not quite, impossible to maintain any Sunday service ringing at the London churches. Here again, we think, the suggestion of our article might be utilised. Joint action by all the London ringing societies is just the method by which such difficulties could be met. There are examples to be found, even in the Metropolis, of the successful inauguration of Sunday ringing companiesnot for every service probably, but, at any rate, oace a day. St. Clement Danes, with its own Society of Youths, is, we believe, a case in point. We can quite understand how reluctant men, who have net with constant rebuffs and disappointments in their efforts, may be to make some new attempt, but if only the initial difficulties between the societies themselves can be overcome, we believe, some such course as we suggested last week might, in the process of time, have valuable and lasting results, because there are many subjects, beyond the actual restoration of dilapidated bells, wbich might be taken in hand.

## BELFRY GOSSIP.

On Novenber 16th, 1880, a 5,040 Treble Boh Royal was rung at Solian, 'in honour of the Queen's acquittal.'

The first peal of ' Real Double Norwich Major,' that is, wilh bobs both in front and behind, was rung at Woolwich on Nov. 16th, 1848. The band was that whith came into existence through the efforts of the Banister family four of whom took part in the peal whieh was composed and conducted by Win. Eianister.

A peal of London Surprise Major ( 5,280 changes) was ruse for the first time on Nov. 17th. 1835. at St. Andrew's. Norwich. It is recorded on a tablet in one of the oflier Narwich Churches beneath the record of the firgt poal of Superlative Surprise Major, which had heen rung earlier in the samo year. Having referred to the method as the most difficult system in the art of campanologia,' the tablet proceeds, 'This almost insurmountable task was nceomplished in 3 hirs, and 24 mins. The hold and regalar striking of bolh peals must ever reffeed great credit on the company. Thicy were conducted by $S$. Mrurstan, and are the first peals ever rung in the above varinlions.'

St, Giles' Norwich, was the belfry in which the first peal of Imperial Treble Bob Major was rung. This was on Nov. 17th 1760, and immediately affer the ringer John Webster, who had rung the 6th, dropped dead.

This John Webster it was who wrote in 1753 to Dr. Mason, of Frinity College, Cambrẗdge, informing him that he (and presumably the rest of the Norwich men) could not subscriba to Holt's hroadsheet. 'I must Confess' (he says), 'Our Company Seem Intirely to slight it. though I must Own ik is not a generous Way of Treating Mr. Holl's performance, but I believe they are Indue'd to this by that Ingenious Ringer, Mr. Aitable's not Encouraging of it; had be Approved of it, his Influence on the College Youthe I presume would have been sufficient to have sent it to the Press withont any Furiher Subseriptions, ${ }^{\text {, }}$

## WORLD'S BIGGEST BELL ORDER

MESERS, GIEJETT AND JOFNSTON'S RECORD CONTRACT.
The carillon which Mr. John D. Rockfeller, jumr, is installing in the beautiful Gothic tower of Park Avente Clurch, New York, in memory of his mother, is to be increased in size and ulumber af bolls. Some of the best brains in the architectural ant engineering world of America lave been engaged for some montlis in devising better accommodation fo: the bells than that which liad been possible so far.
The result is that New York will possess the Iarges and moat important carillon that the world has yet seen or heard. The holls will $b_{e} 53$ in number. The hass bell is to weigh 9 tons, whilst the total weight of the bells-apart from the gigantig framework (witioh will be in five sections) and the fittings-is to be over 50 tons.
The premier carilonon hitherto bas been the famous one at Malines. wliere there are 45 bells and the bass bell weighs $7 \frac{1}{6}$ tons.
Many of the bells for tile new carillon are already cast ani in readiness at the Groydon Bell Fonndry of Messrs. Gillett and Johnston, who secured the contract in the face of keen international competition. This is the largest order for bells that lias ever been
placed.

In all my previous articles on the subject have always indicabed the positions at which the treble passes over a cross gection by ruling a line between the two rows on pither side of the posithon at which slue is crossing; and I rather fancy that Mr. Carter must lave thought that I intencled these lines for the cross sections:

I lierewith enclose a lead of Eristol Surprise in which the theee cross sections are ruled in, and it is ensw to see that an internal place is always marde when the treble passes over cither of them. -Fours truly.
