## MULTI-METHOD PEALS.

The peal in thirty-five methods rung last week at Norbury, Cheshire, teads us once again to urge a much wider practice among six-bell ringers of ringing multi-method extents. We have emphasised the matter on more than one occasion, but we make no excuse for returning to it. The Norbury band, who are heartily to be congratulated on ringing a record number of methods in seven true seven hundred and twenties, stand in a unique position among six-bell ringers. They have reached the top of the ladder in that particular department of ringing, but they have done it only by patience and perseverance, coupled with enthusiasm and determination. It is difficult, and often dangerous, to make comparisons, but we §venture to say that nothing finer in method ringing has ever been accomplished on tower bells. It may be there are some ringers who will disagree with us on this point, but they will be very few in number. But while the Norbury band seem to be far in advance of any other company in this special phase of Minor ringing, what they bave achieved is equally open to others.
There are mayy accomplished six-bell bands up and down the country, and we would like to see a much more general application of method splicing in the peals they ring. We are sure they would find that it gives an added interest to their ringing, and it is certainly another step in raising the standard of performances on six bells. No one would expect a band to strike out at once into the splicing of thirty-five methods. The Norbury men have only reached that number by stages, but a small expansion of the repertoire of a six-bell company would quickly enable them to include multi-method extents in their peals. As Mr. Wheeldon aptly pointed out in his letter in our last issue, it does not follow that a Surprise Method is necessarily more difficult than others whics are included in a different classification, and some of the methods included in spliced extents give a ringer all the mental exercise he desires. Surprise method companies, therefore, need not think that they are dropping to any lower standard, so far as methods are concerned, when they take up multimethod peal ringing. On the contrary, they will probably find it not only more interesting, but a good deal more difficult, than a peal in seven, or even fourteen, Surprise methods each starting from rounds. There is a big scope for enterprising ringers in this attractive field. Minor ringing is opening out upon a very large but little explored region, and there is a great opportunity for pioneers. For those who desire to make a start, the material is already provided, for the metiods are to be found in the Central Council Collection, and 'spliced' compositions are available for the asking.

We met for a peal of Cambridge Minor at a strange clurch in a strange village，at least，it was strange to we three．Our con－ ductor met us at the gate，with the ether members of the band， ductor met，us at the rate，witheh，bade us beware the step near the lectern．We have still to find that step，but after a deal of shufl－ ing we struck the riuging room also minus in step．This we found to be＂illuminated，by a single tlat－flame burmer，12Ft．up the wall．Our cicerane，nothing daunled，produced trona a linad－ bag a complete incandescent fitting，remarking that he had＂pinch－ ed it from the front room．＇By tille aid of＇long Fred＂and a bit of agility，the burner was soon＇in situ＇and the peal ran merrily until near the end of the third 720，when anotjer step occurred， over which two tripped liadly，and the fonors came up wrong way． Result，peal＇Napoo．

After carefully removing the gas fitting，and hanging up the mantle（for fulure possible use）out of larm＇s way by means of a hook ingeniously fashioned from a bair－pin，we repaired to a place described by our official french linguist as a＂Estimate．＇There we regaled all and sundry．with courses of Triples．Major and Caters on the most weird set of haudbells in existence．These bells are truly effeminate．having their tongues made of clothes－ pegs with springs from the ubiguitous hair－pin．They hava a nasty knack also of occasionally fifing of the headstack．and proved most disconcerting to the waiters，who bach kept recognisiag his own particular bell and answering it．

The six-bell band at Norbury, Gheshire, who are mithout question the premier company in spliced method ringing, have added yet further to their laurels, by ringing a peal in which no fewer than 35 methods have been linked up in seven true extents. This is really a wonderful performance, and the whole Exercise will congratulate this enterprising band opon their unique achievement.
On lis departure for Brecon, the Rev. T. R. J. Jones, curate of Knighton, was presented by the ringers with a solid silver inkstand as a mark of their respect and esteem. The presentation was precaded by an excellent dianer, generously given by the Ringing Master (Mr P. Jones)

Mr. R. Palmer, of Hatherleigh, North Devon, lats died at the age of 94, in the house in which he wha horm and had lived all his life. As verger of the parish church and the captain of the bell ringers up lo recent years, the had rung the ourfew at $80^{\prime}$ clock eacl evening.
Leatherhead bells are to be restozed by Messrs. Mears and Stainbank. They have already been taken to the Foumdry, where the gth is to be recast. They will be rehung in complete acw fittings.

Mr. B. Fullwood, of Bedgloy, offers For sale the rights to mantfacture a patent locking device for bells. Such a preventive against accident when bells are up is most desirable, and sooner or later is likely to be added as a sort of 'standard" equipment in belfries.
Both born on December 5th, 1865, in the county of 'Glister,' Mr. J. W. Jones, the hon. secretary of the Llandaff and Monmouth Diocesan Association, and Mr. W. B. Biss, of Cardif, have several times rung a birthday peal togatier. They added another to those successful celebrations ly ringiag in a peal of Grandsire Caters last week.
A record which stood for over 150 years was set up by the College Yeutlis on December 15th, 1735 , when they zang 8,008 Grandsire Cinques at Southwart. This is supposed to be the first peal ou the bells, add the lagth was not beaten until 1887, when 9,020 was rung at Birminglam. At Southwark, "Mr. Benjamin Aneable call'd bobs," and the peal was 'the longest that ever" was done.'
On the old peal of twelve at Spitalfields on Dec, 20th, 1806, " a peal of 6,334 Cinques upon Stedman's Principle' was rung by the Senior Cumberlands, "being the most ever rung in that method." Only five dajs before the Junior Cumberlands had ruag 5,886 in the sume mathod on the same bells, and these two performances coming sa close togethar are all the more matewortly from the fact that previously only two other peals of Stedman Cinques are known to have been rung.
The first peal of Stedman Triples 'jn hand ' was rung at the 'Three Kings," Clerkenwell, London, seventy years ago oext Weanesday by the Cumberland Fouths. The recold of the performance says the peal was brought round in fine style, the ringers boing John Cox, Thomas Poweli, Henry Haley and Thomas Brithan. The ringing took place in the presence of 19 members of the College Youths and Oumberland Sociaties, some of whom checked the sixes as they were rung. Later on, we believe, Cooter condemned the peal as Ialse, This is a point, perhaps, upon which some of our readers can give us delinite information.
On December 15th, 1904, the first peal in South Africa was rung at Woodstock.
The fire peal of Canterbury Pleasure Major wag rung at Waraham, Sussex, on December 17th, 1888.
A meeting of the London County Assaciation (Soulhera District) bas been arrangod at short natice for Saturday next at St. Luke's, Chelsea.

The question raised in this column recently as to the Foungest canductor of Holt's Original seems to be settled by the performance of a yroung Leicaster ringer, Walter Whitehead, who last week called the peal before reaching the age of 16.

Last Saturday the first peal was rung on the bells at Westoning, Bedfardshire. Originally a ring of five, they were recently made into a peal of six by the gift of a treble by Mr. H. Spensley, of Westoning Manor, in momory of his mother. The work was cerried out by Messrs. Mears and Stainbank. The back five hells are deted respectipely as follows: 1672, 1743, 1829, 1722, 1743.
