THE PROGRESS OF SURPRISE ROYAL
Gradually by the ingenuity of compusers and the entel prise of individual bands, the scope of ringing is being extended, and to the limited class of Surprise Royal methods, in which peals have been accomplished, we now have to add 'Leicester,' which has just heen produced and rung for the first time in the city from which it takes its rame. Writing from memory, we believe that the tolal number of Surprise Royal methods which Jave been rung is only nine. Ten-bell Surprise methods were first practised about a hundred years ago at Huddersfield and Wakefield, and then, so far as any history is preserved to us, there came a long break, during which this class of ringing was entirely neglected, for we have to cone down to the year $1 \$ 98$ before we find Surprise Royal ringing taken up again, a peal of Cambricuge Ten at Chetenham setting the modern fashion.

The ' Clavis, in which was published the methods of 1 ondon, Cambridge and Superlative Surprise Major, stopped in the section on Royal methods at Oxtord Treble Hols, with the remark, ' we here take leave of changes on ten bells entirely, as no practitioner can expect us to laneh into so much extravayance as to give crimp for Surprise peals on so great a number, there being so very little probability of their being practised. ${ }^{\text {. }}$ Authors who could invent a method like Superlative would no dotht have had the ability to provide-ten-bell extensions, indeed they refer to rules by which thev maly be produced from Ninor, but it is quite certain that in those days the actual practice of ten-bell Surprise methods was looked upon as beyond the capability of ringers.

When Shipway came on the scene he produced, 'for the speculation of the curious,' Superlative Surprise Royal, and included it in his "Art of Ringing." But he hat a greater foresight as to the future of rinsing than had the authors of the 'Clavis' for he added, "if at any time there should be found a set of intrenious men, bold enough to attempt such difficult methods on ten or twelve bells, 1 have no doubt that ther would be enabied to produce, if desired, more than is here inserted.' Shipway's prophecy very soon came true, for what he put forward as a possibility in 1816 became a reality within six years, for Cambridge Royal was rung in 1822.

Modern knowledge has enabled composers to provide the Exercise with many more and hetter methods than the two to which the pioneers of a century ago confined their attention, but comparatively few bands are to be found who practise Surprise ringing on ten bells. The diffieulties in the way of ringing these advanced methods, are, of course, very great. A ringer has to bre abov

## THE CRITICISMS OF CRITICUS.

## OUR CONTRIBUTOR DISCUSSES A VARIETY OF TOPICS.

At last soncone seems to he trying to get a move on, but I am not quite sure which way they are going to move, or how far they propose to move. With all my dounts, however, 1 read with pleasure that the Leytoustone ringers want to gel something done about the Minor method names, and i assume that, laving taken the initiative they will see that the subject is properly brought before the Central Council. As their resolution speass of enforciug a sensible decision,' I imagine I am right in supposing that they want to get rid of the 'nonsease' from method nomenciature. Personally 1 slould bave liked to see their resolution a little more definitely wordou, for-borrible thought-suppose they don't mean what I and worders, think they mean! But, there, what else can they have in mind excent those charming titles like Geranium Treble Bob, Easter Sunday Morniug Pleasure and Turkish Deligit? For the two latter, I am awner, the Council's Committee are not the sponsors, but they are the 'fathers ' of something equally ridiculous, and as thu pointed lendicg article in last week's issue, commented, these arc names that must be changed.'
But why did tha Leytoustono Associntion make their appeal only to six-bell bauds. In my opinion, which may not count for much, the whole Exercise ought to be up in arms against this style of thing. Everyone realised that 'Wait and see, as applied to a very select method was only the author's little joke, and the name disappeared when the first peal was rung, but some of those Minor methods, by the art of propagation, can be grown into Major plants, which by intensive culture might reach Royal dimensions even if they do not touch the Meximus of development; and when this is possible-well, cight, ten and twelve bell ringers are equally concerned with the subjeet, for have we not seen in the past how desperately earnest our experts are to fix the nume of the infant upon a method thronghout all the stages of its extension? Had it not been for the attitude the commitee took un last year many people would almost have imagined they were trying to introluce a spirit of humour inta their task of finding titles for the unnamed. But they were serious dead serious, and in equally. serious veiu this suhject has got to be tackled at the fitst opportunity

The suggestion that a peal of bells should be provided at the British Empire Exhibition, in order to interest overseas visitors in these instruments, and incidentally, I suppose, in the art of ringing, Is quite a good one, but surely the suggestion has come rather late in the day. Moreover, I imagine, that even if a peal could be erceted, there would be few facilities for ringing on them. I have no knowledge as to whether either of our firms of founders is to be represented by an exhibit, but to put up a peal in ringable condition would now te nimast out of the question. Such a scheme would have needed planning long ago. If it were to be of use, from a campanolorical point of view, arrangements would lave been necessary for a dafly display of ringing, but, facing the thing squarely, one has to ndmit that the likelifood of the exhibition authorities permitting this, except perhaps to the extent of a very few minutes, is most unlikely. To think that any Tom, Dick or Harry and his band would have access to the bmilg is aut of all question. But discussion of the possibility of ringmble bells at the Wembley Exhibition is, I fancy, quite useless at this dime of day. Oue can recall, lowever, that a ring of bells (hung in a wooden staging for chiming only) was used at the Fentival of Empire at the Crystal lalace in 1911, and an octave, with frame and fitings complete, figured in the great exhibition in London in 2881. If I remember aright the former bells are now at Ott lands Clurch, Surfey, and the later were purchased for some counfiry churola in Sussex.
Having been an occesional visitor to the tower of St. Peter's, Brighton-and how many hundreds of ringers have found their way to this splendidly nppointed belfry, I wonder?-I was interested to read of the peal of Yorkshire Surprise Major rung a week or two ago, and the 'Belfry Gossip' note in connection therewith. The panels which adorn the walls in St. Peter's, contain records of many firsts in the method' in the county, and some commemorating the first ever. ${ }^{-1}$ Bristal Surprise was ring there for the first time, and, I fancy, Gloucoster, Narfolk and oxford Surprise, as well as one, which never seems to he lieard of in these dava, and, of which, I believe, Fenry Dains was the proud author, Champion Surprise. Gave been told that about two courses of this-or was it three?made a peal. Bit mavbe my informant was pulling my leg 1 Perhaps it wes the werrying leneth of the course that caused weariness to the ringers, and so the method has slipped into tho limbo of forgotten things. Rut those who rememher ringing mathers of twentrfive to thirty pears ago will recall the great achievements by St, Peter's Society. for those wre the days when of peal in a new method whr really a memoralble performance.
The competition among ringers in tondon for the wise of the twelpebell towers has slways been pretty kern, but things must almest have remetind a dimax when we liear of one torer booked up for fwrlve months ahend! There are eight rings of twelve in London, hut the facilities at six of them are now graatly curtailed. Peals at

St. Paul's Cathedral are few and far between; indeed, an aroruse of oue peal in about eight or ten years seems to be the limit, although, of coursc, there nue ather uttempts, but in any case tho belts are the saerod proserve of the Ancient Wociety. St. Bride's, Fleet Street, is a "olosed" tower so far as peals are conceract, fand I think it may be said that, temporarily at any rate, Cornhill is the same. St. Martin's and Shoreditchappoar to bo available only very occasfonally, and the11 'for Cumberlanis only,' while Cripplegate, which ased to ater opporiunities for all and suadry, within reason, seens now to be "an the sholf." Bow nnd Southwark are all that remain, and I trust that the scramble for these bells between the active London Societies may not end in 'putting up the shutters.' Peals whe overdone at Cornhill-and the inevitable happened. Sympathetio as the authorities at Cheapside and Southork may be, there is danger in too mugh peal ringing jn towers such as these, although it is, perlarps, useless to counsel restraint.
Two hundred years ego two peals in a couple of days at St. Mart tin's-ia-tre-Fields may lave been quite all right, hut lwo pals in a month on any one of these big rings of bells in the heart of at gread city may, in this twentieth centurg, eventualiy bring down a ban on the whale catagory of peal ringing. Individunl bands may be quite rersonable in their demands, but it is the concentrated energies of geveral societies which cause the troubio. And then there is another plase. With practically only two twelvo belf lowers available, fhere is poor chance for angoun, guf side the spenially favoured companies, getting a twe we-bell peal in London, and if we to on at this rate wo may expect Solthtrark and Bow to be booked up to eternity by the select aircles who bave the ear of the authoritics. The end is hardly likely-to be to tho general advautage of ringing. What I would sug gest is that the authorities should refuce to receive applications for the bells more than three monthas ahead, and that when reccived should be dealt with with due regard to the use of the thells which the society las previously had.
Prittlewell ringers set min excellent example the othor day in giting away to needy towers two sets of disusen but serviceable rapes. I hare not yet seen any response to the lint thrown out in the column of "Belfry Gossip" that other londs with superfloous ropes might follow the example of the Prittlew oll men. As a rule, bell rones are generally pretty well (this is not a pun, so save your lalf-hricks and matured eggs for someone elsc, plense, gentle reader) worn ont by The time they are discarded, for ropas are often one of the last things which church authorities seem to think are needed in the belfry. However, there are some lowors more fortmately placen and ropes aro fortheoming upou demand. It may he that the action faken by Prithlewell had not ocenired to these other happy hands, but daubtless they will bear it in mime in future.
I have not helil up the example of Prittlewell for nothing. I am pronosing to apply for the noxt set mf ropes that is to be given arraty, if, in the meantime, I am successful in finding some tower which has a peal of hells to dispose of, merely for the cost of earriape. I know a parish church, where the helfry equipment consists of one bell (cracked), and if any weathy place is thinking of disposing af ils present ring of bells in order to provide a new one, this lititle parisla will be glad to receive thom, and no inquiries will lye made as fo whether they are Simpson tuned or otherwise. I bardly expect fo be embarassed with offers, but if any are forthcoming-well, a letter addrensed to me, c!o the Editor, is certain to reach me. And, bv-the-by, if someone will turn aut their old hells, I know of muther fower whare it might be possible to turn ont some of the old Bills, if anybody wants them. For forty years they have rung the 'old ten. " and they 'don't want any of this 'ere other scientific stull." Old ten's alwavs been נוng in this tower, an' it's good enough for we, they say. Now who wants a reaty-made band in exchange for some ready-made bella?

Onte hundred and ninety years tomorrow a pen of 6,876 Grandsire Caters was rung al New College, Oxford, where on March 27th, 1815, 10,008 in the same mothor was ramg.
The Royal Gumberland Youths rung a peal of 7,104 Treble Rob Maximus in 5 lis. 30 mrins. at Southwarli on March 22nd, 1802.
O1F March 23rd. 1837. Elijah Roberis 'tapgen ' his famous peal of 19,440.

A peal of 6,048 Albiar Surprise was rung tht Liversedge on March 24t.11, 1837.
A record which stood for 130 years was aet up on Mazch $27 t h, 1784$, when the Royal Cumberland Fouths rant 12,000 Treble Bob Rayal at Slareditch. Tbis peal was not nnsurpassed until the yenr I914, when a band at Ashton-uador-wne rang a longar length by R,000 cliauges.
The rivalry which exisled between the Cumberland Youths ant College Youths, in those far-off days, is eremplified by the following lines, written by one John Tichborne, and preserved in the Osbornos MSS. in the British Musemm:

- Come ringers all, and view this church, wilhin the stecple-fioor,

Thwelve thousand Oxford Treblo Bob was rung in eighty-four, In houm nine and minutos five, the Cumberlands did campleat, And on the fwenty-geventh day of March the Callege Youths they beat.
Success unto the Cumberlands wherever they do go,
That they may always have success to beat their baugisty foo:
Another intoresting anviversary that occurs on March 27 ih that of the first peal of Superiative Surprise Rayal, which, composed by Joseph Tebbs, of Leeds, was rung at Wakefield, Torks, it 1826, "nobly conducted by Mr. William Woodhend."
Tho poal at Wyrardisbuty, Bucks, on Fei. 23 rd wns R. A. Fardon'r first peal of Double Norwich, and not W. F. Juted's. The ringer of the 5tl was James R. Mackmen.

Fis many friends throughout the Exercigs will learn wath regrat that Mr. Witliam Rock Small, of Tipton, the "Black Cousiry" reteran, is soriously ill. Mr. Smail has reached the adpanced age of 84 yerrs.
'Real Double Twelve In was a wethod whin the College Foutho practitsed a good deal a hundred and forty years ago. ha fuct, they racg two peals in three days in 1784 . The first of these was 5,160 at St. Bride's on March 24th, and 6,04B at St. Saviour's, Southwark, on March 26th. The peal it St. Bride's is recorded as the lirst true peal ever rung in the above method on any number of bolls.

An old and respected member of the Lancastaire Association has passed avay, in the person of Mr. James Alleed, of 'IYldesley. For 45 years lo gave faithful service at the Parish Church as ringer and conductor.
Members of the Deron Guild will learn witin regret of the illness of Mr. Harry Payne, of Huntshan, and will wisk him a speedy recovery. Mr. Payne was one of the tirst mombers of the Guild, and did a lot of spedework with Calonel Troyte.
Mr. E. C. Gobey mrites to point out that the Ilkeston Variation of Spliced Treble Bob is not the same as Hadson's 'New Liglat.'

## ST. PETER MANCROFT BELLS.

## RESTORATION OF FAMOUS PEAL.

The accompanying picture shows the removal of the bells of St. Peter Mancroft, Norwich, which are to undergo rehanging by Messrs. Taylor \& Co., of Loughborough. The restoration of an historic ring is always a noteworthy event, and is of especial interest in the case of this fine old Norwich peai. The photograph was taken last week by Mr. G. P. Burton. In the foreground are the gth (marked with a cross) and zoth bells, while the itth is seen in the background beyond and beneath the suspended tenor. I he smaller bell to the right of the ith is the 5 th of the ring of 12 .


## REMOYING THE BELLS FROM THE TOWER.

The bells of St. Peter Mancroft have a wonderful history, and a remarkible interest for ringers. It was hero that the first true peal of Triples was rung on May Rud, 1715.
'Here was rung by the ringers calt'r Norwich Scholars that most I-comparable Peul called Grandsir Bob Tripies, it being the $3 d$ whole l'eal that they lave rung, but the first whole peal that ever was rung to the truth by any ringers whatever."
This was followed by tho first peal of Grandsire Triples, in
and the first peat of Stedman Triples on October 25th, 1731. During this time there were eight bells in the steeple. Originally, in the fifteenth century there were five, increased to six in 1602 , by a treble cast by William Bread, u Norwich Bell Founder. In $1675-6$ they were made into an octare.
' Tn 1736 this ring was made at perl of ten loy an addition of two bells subscriu'd for by Genthemen in ye Parish, ${ }^{\text {' }}$ snys an old record,
and in the following jeur, on 3Larch 8 th to be exact a peal of Girndsire CuLers was rung ' which for excelency of its ringing, Harmonious changes, and ye number of them was certainly superior to anything of its kind ever donc in the World; an io Remove all doubt of the truth of the performance soperal ingenious Ringers were abroad the whole time with proper rules to prove if certainty of ye same. Thus was this great peal perfeckly compleated, to the entire satisfaction, surprisc and mmazement of thousands of hearers in the space of 8 lours 15 minutes. The number of changes were 12,600, rung ly Hine men belonging to the stecple; the tener siagly by a yonng ringer 8000 , then a second ratg her so the end of he peal. The persous names and the bells they rung more as follows : Tho Melahior lieble, Wm. Pettingall 2. John Gardiner 3, Tho Barrett 4, Robert Crane 5, Wm. Porter 6, Tho Blofield 7, Edwd. Crane 8, Christ. Booty 9, James Jerom, Robt. Liddeman tenor.'
Nearly forty years later it was deciked to replace the ofd bells by a new pual of iwelve, and the present ring was the result, the tenor having been recast in 1814 . On March $16 t h$, 1778 , a peal of 6,240 Treble Bob Maximus, in 5 hrs. 22 mins., and among subsequent famous peals was a peal of Norwjoh Court Bob Naximus in 1817, and 7,126 Stedman Cingues in 5 hrs. 17 mins. In this latter peal, conducted by James Truman, Charles Middleton and Heary Habbard, look part.
Snmuel Thursion, who did so much to make and maintain Norwich as one of the clicf centres of ringing, had diad three years before, and his memorial is to be geen on the wall to the left of the accompanying paotograph. The memorinl is inscribed as follows:-

## THIS STOKE IS ERECTED <br> TO THE MEMORY OF

MR. SAMUEL THURSTON,
MANY YEARS AN EMINENT RINGER OF THIS PARIEH IN
COMMEMORATION OF HES GREAT ABILITIES AND PER-

Samucl Thurston was born in Norkich in 1789 , and rang lifs first peal (Bob Majar) at St. Gjles', in 1813. He joined the St. Peter Mancroft Society in 1814 . In 1817 be rang in a peal of Norwich Court Boh Maximus, and in 1825 was presented with a silwer gilt jewel by the "United Ringers of St. Peter Mancrolt for his eminent services in composing the peal of Norwich Court Twelve-In, and ringing the tenor in Superior style? Tharston conductea the first peal of Lordon Sarprise Major ever rung. This was at Si. Andrew's, Norwiche, in the year 1835.

## BARNSLET AND DISTRICT ASSOCIATION. FORTHCOMNG SIX-BELE CONTEST.

## THE BELLS OF ST. MARGARET, LYNN.

 By J. R. Jevran.The number of bells at St. Margaret's, Lynn, previous in 1663 is uncertain; but Mr. L'Estrange, in his Church Bclls of Norfolk, 1874, says: 'Mackerell tells us that the great bell was called the Margaret, and was for her curious sound one of the finest, and might be heard (the wind favouring, as I have been assur'd) full ten miles distant. Others has likewise their distinet names, as the Trinity, the St. Thomas, \&c., so christened, I suppose, as was usual before the Reformation. But the biggest and least of these was purposely broken, and with some addition cast into others, to make a Ring of Eight, which was effected in the year 1663 , as they remain to this day."

He also tells us that the 4 th bell was new cast in 1627 by Draper, of Thetford, yet in 1673 the two great bells were called the Margaret and Thomas, as appears from the churchwardens: account for that year.
In 1766 these belis were recast into a new peal of eight by Lester and Pack, of the Whitechapel Foundry, who also recast the bells of St. Nicholas into a peal of eight at the same time.

The present peal at St. Margaret's consists of ten bells, tenor $55^{\frac{1}{2}}$ in diameter, 30 cw . The two trebles are 'Jubilee' bells, added in 1887 to Lester and Pack's peal of eight. The inscriptions are as follows:-

## To the Editor.

Dear Sir,-I reat with interest your leading article of Mareh 14iln, and agree with every line of it. Our Parliament is by no weans consistent in its work. The naming of the six bell methods, bnd as it was, is only ore of the points thut will heve to be rectified as soou as possible. At least lialf the methods puilished had been namod years ago, anti many aie still rung under their original titles. The ijoaril recording the 15,120 in Wath tower bears mames of 21 mothods, some of which have been renamed. That board is proof of publicistion or copyright. Other boards were in existence at Horbury and olher Yorkshire towers wore than fifty years ago. 1 have a wath1script book thinty years old, with about 150 six-bell methods in it, all of which Had been rung anil named.
Then there is tho question of Treble Bob romposition to be gone into thoroughly. Some years ago the Council, I believe, decided that peale of Kent with Gta's plece bobs were not to be countonanced, aud at least one large association decided not to publish these peals in their report on that account. Now we liave peals of Treble Bob 85 a regular thing in which two kiuds of calls are made. Call them spliced if you like, the result is the same. Jf you ring Kent with 6th's place bobs it is out of court, hut if you call it Kent and Norwich splived you can do it with impunity. Kent, rung with what are knownas treble extremes,' viz., with treble, making Geh's and dodging 5-6 down, while beils behind troble dodge, is out of court, and cannot be thought of in the best circles, but if you ring Plain Bob andi let the treble do the 'extreme' 1 rick ench lead in 4th's, you can call it. Little Ifob and put it in court and be proud of it.
The Council, through hair cammittee, grve us graeions peraission to scramble for these collection of six-bell meliods and rename then as we liked. Had we chosen to tako a broader view of this privilege, and taken a dislike to the name of Stedmen, and someme ladi publishex a peal of it as St. Benet's Triples or "The Camblidge Principle, who was to say us napp It is admitted that ihe Councij's commiltees have done a marvellous amount of very lediuns work in their scant leisure maments, and that it is an honorary position, hut all fize honour goes to those who have the honour to carry out to the last jot the duties for whicla they allowed themselyes to be elected. No one should allow himsele to be elected an the Council unloss he intends to carry out the duties, and a member flected on a committee should do his utmost to fulsh his dulies, or retife. Tlise Erercise las long ego passed the happy childhood in which it played at ringing when the idea of a Conncil was first conceived. It is now a serious proposition; and its alfairs must receive scrious end businesslike treatment if it is to be the respected and prominent hranch of church work that it is our aim to make it. It is oftimes said that the Church has need of all her sons; the Exercise needs hers as well. and the sons she should rive to the Council should he those when intend to liand it on letter perfcet as a going concern. Let us waslı out chaos, leave oul the door slamming, and write up ' Businnes only meant.'-Yours sincerely,

I believe the Columbia firu manufinctured the plionegraph under licemee in the year above mentioted.
I still hold that recork, and I helieve, in the absence of bruises and seratelas ili might still be of interest to 'listen in,' and when a fhonograpla is availablo I slatl have lue pleasure of producing the cord (a consse of Joh Minor on hella which will be nameless for the lime heing) nt bonc ringers' meeting, At ithe time of repronucing the rocord ib met will appreciation, and a record was takon of liandbed ringing. This, and the foregoing, have recnived compliments from noted ringers in the years now past. It is generally cknowlenged that gramophones have had mone oflier than fat dises.
