## THE COMING COUNCIL MEETING

The agenda for the Central Council meeting on Whitsun Tuesday promises to provide the members with a「airly 「ull day's work, if one may judge by the time which has hecn accupied over the business in former years. The meeting in the Metropolis is the first of the triennial period, and there is consequently some additional husiness to be transacted in the shape of the election of officers, committees, etc., which does not occur in the two succeeding years. The rest of the general business follows the customary lines, but it is to the new motions to be proposed that the outside ringer will turn with most interest.
Precedence is taken this year by the subject of the nomenclature of methods, and no fewer than three separate notices upon this matter have been sent in, but doubtess some arrangement will be come to whereby the question can be disposed of under one motion. Without question it is the desire of a large number of ringers, as indicated by the resolutions passed recently at several association annual meetings, that there shall be a revision of the present ill-fiting names applied to many methods, and the majority of the Council will doubtless be prepared to sec that some amendment is made. What remains, then, will be to find the best method of acting upon the expressed desire of the Exercise, and from the three resolutions it ought to be possible to find an acceptable scheme, concerning which it may be noted that two of the motions specifically set out to legislate for the future ats well as remedy the mistakes of the past.
Of the other resolutions to be proposed, that requiring at qualified umpire for all handbell peals recognised by the Council, may well find general acceptance, but whether it will please all those who ring handbell peals is another matter. An umpire is already usual, but there is a growing tendency to ring peals. 'in hand ' without such an official if one is not available. It might create some feeling of hardship if a band is to be prevented from ringing an 'olficially recognised ' peal because a qualified umpire is not present, and a difficulty likely to arise will be found in deciding whether the 'umpire ' is qualified or not according to the proposed rule. It is quite certain that the Analysis Committee, acting merely on the published report, could not adjudicate in every case upon the umpire's qualifications, and if his (or her) ability is challenged, who is going to decide? The proposal is just one of those which, in theory, commend themselves to ringers generally, but which, in practice, are by no means certain to be effective. It opens the door to quibbles and dissensions, and yot, on the race of it, there is nothing in the resolution to which any handlyell peal ringer could take exception.

## literature and press committer

The Following report, of the Literature and Press Committec will be presented to the Central Comnititee on Whitsun Tuesday:-
There lave been varions criticisms of betls and ringing in the public Press iluring the past year, mainly due to peall ringing. The record performance of Stedman Cinques al Southwark, ealled forth a torrent of verbiage from writers (who were nowiere in the vicinity) who overtookel the fact that the peal was ruug on a holiday-Wlint Monday-witen busizess was suspended, and the annorance, if any, almost uil.
The ' Evening News, in a leaderette headed 'Too much bell,' commented as iollows: ' Bells arc delightful when their musie reaches you faintly across the mealow on summer evenings, but the London belt ringes, who rang 12.675 changes in 9 lours and 48 minutes at Southwark to make a world's reterid- ดh! these world's records-what are we to say zbout them? A rcasonable amount of hell riaging is not lurtin!, but nearly Ten Hours of it! And all for what? If the ringers were writing those few lines they mighit have much to sav in theip defence. On the othier lhand, if these few lines were fieing written hy residents near bell ringing orgies, they would be nuch divelier reiding.
Your commitlee will not quarrel with this. There will always be a percemtage of people who will eriticise anylling under the sun. On the otlier land, the opening of the Loughborough carillon in Jutly last ynar, alforded an opportunity to the Pres, and the resull was is hooming ndvertisement for bells, descriptive and pictorial, such as the Ezercise liad not seen hitherto. Although carillon playing is outtside the splere of clange ringing, the oceasion linked ap erarything in the matter of hells to our adteantage.
Again, when the Bouraville carillon was reopened on May 3 rel, the recitals of thic Careilloneur of Bruges were troadrastert loy the British Sroadcusting Co., aud there is litte douht that by these means, recruits to klse army of hell losers were made from the ranks of sturdents of wirelcess. Tlir • Morming Post '-always well disposed towards us gave halif a column to a eulogy of the art.
Antipatisy lias been shown elsewlere. In Scptermber, an attempt was made in the "Luallow Advertiser 'to supprose change ringing at ithe Parislt Clurch. The following is an excerpt

Beils are io call people to church onfy, und slroufd be uked solety for that purpose. The prublic pares not whother Carmuridge Surprise or rounds are rullg-and righitls, too-but bell ringing outside of worshing is a nulisance anywhere
As the letters bore the signature of a B.A. of Oxford Thiversity, the loral soriely of ringers appealed to your commitice to reply on their behalf. 'This was done, with the result that the opposition relited disconifited. The help given in this case alone wonld appear to justify the existenee of this commitite.
A 'Ringers" Strike' in Dorset provided copy for the Press early it the year, and furbisled a jest For ' Paneth.' The local Press geve a fairly necurate necolut of the matter, and recorded in a subsequent issue the settlennent of the dispute, through the timely inlervention of the Salisbury Diacesan Guild.

Reter-al-Arches (8), St. Peter-at-Gowts (6), and St. Hotolph's (6), were mate good use of during the aftennom, the towers being closed in time to allow the ringers to gather is the Cathedral at 4.30 for eveusong.
Tea was provided in the Co-operutive Fall at 5.30, and was lollowed by the ususl business meeting, at which Mr. F. F. Linley presided. All the officers were re-elected, namely, the Dears of Limoin, president; the Rey. H. Law James, Master; Mr. F. F. Linley, treasurer: and Mr. F. W. Stokes, secretiary.
The balance sheet and report was passed as printed.-The Clinirman drew attention to the margenent of the report by the addjtion of the names of the officers of each branch, and of the homonary members. He regretted that for fimnacial reasons it wats not possible to print the report as in pre-wisr days. Alluding to the Cathedral Bells Memorial Fund, M2. Limley drew aitention to the fact that, approximately, 115 is still required before the ndditional fnur bells can be installed in the Cathedral tower, and stated that the general view of the Northern brinch is that two hells (to wale a peal of ten) should he added now, leaving the other two to be put in when funds permilted.-N1. S. Proctor, on behalf of the Southatr branch, strongly supported this view, and, on a voto being taken, the meeting expressed agreement. The matter will be taken up by the Guild Committee at as early is date as practicable.
The Rev. H. Law James, the Rev, H. T. Parry, Mar, Genrye Chester, and Mr. Rupert Richurdson wore elmeted to represent line Guild on the Central Council. In this connection the nomenclature of the Minor methods came in for a good deal of adyerse criticism, anil great amusement was caused by the quotation by one of the speakers of the names of various vegelables, fmits and flowers, which might possibly come into use is the present sysiem were cantinued.
The following motion, proposed by Mr. C. McGuiness, and seconded by Mr. J. T. Brown, very well represents the feeling of the meeting: "That this meeting considers that the nomenclature alopted for the various Minor methods is in many chees ridiculous. and asks the Guild representatives on the Ceniral Council to do their best to advocate a revision.
Reference must be made to the atisenco from the meeting of Mr. C. W. P. Clifton, of Eincoln, llirough illness. Mr. Clifton is one of the oldest members of the Guild, and has been a great worker for its good. He las been espreially enthusiastic abnat the proposed nugmentation of the Cathedral bells. Rnd the Chairman mentioned incidentally that in this canne he had raised a larger sum of maney than any other singla member of the Guild.-The meeting passuri in unanimeus rote of sympathy with Mrs. Clifton in the illness of har husband.
The various towers wore open for further ringing until nine o'clock. At the Cathedral a rather nmusual ineident accurred, the rope of the 2nt bell breakige in the middie of a good course of London Surprise. necessitating $\Omega$ short pause for repairs. It is encoursging to mote ycar by year an increasing interest in the higher methods, honth en six and eight hells. Peals of Cambridge and Superlative Surprise have slready been rung by the Guilh, and it is hoped thal at no very distant date a peal of London will he accomplished by resilfent members.

## EASTERN ERANCH.

The quarterly meeting of the Eastorn Brenclu was Jeld at Stichncy on Saturday, Mzy 24th. Although this wss only a five-bell Lower, a very pleasant and successful meating was held. ## SIXTY YEARS A RINGER

## PRFSFNTATTONS AT BEESTON.

There was an interesting cercmony at Beeston (Notis) Clurch on Mondey, May 12th, when Mr. Williars Clifford was congrafulated on altaing his golden wedding, and completing 60 years service as a ringer at the church. The aseembly in the belfy foluded the Vicar (the Rev, L. N. Phillips), wardens, past wradens, sidesmen, and many visilors.
The proceelings opence with the ringing of Cambridge and London Surprise, after whieh the eight aldest ringing members rang 60 Stedman Triples in honour of Mr. Cliford's 60 years ${ }^{3}$ service: L. Price 3, W. Clithord, senr., 2, W. Clifford 3, A. Lowe 4, J. C. Dicken 5, F. S. Frice (conductor) 6, E. J. Boot 7, P. Price 8.

Atr. H. A. Pried (parish wariten) mentioned that there were only Huree bells in the tower in 1880, and in an interesting speesh traced the gradual augmentation to eight. He congratulated Mr. Clifiorii on his remarkable ringing achjevements.
The Vicar, on belalf of the church offeials and mombers of the cougregation, then handed to Mr. Cliffortil a substantial cheque and insoribed ebony walking stick, and to Mrs. Clifford an inseribed umbrclia. The Vicar commented on the general ignorbnce prevailing on the subject of bell ringing, and reminded those present that Mr . Clifford must have spent an enormous amount of fime attending to the bells.-After congratulatory speeches by Mr. A. Nicholson (Vicar's warden), Mr. J. Bostock and Mr. C. Mason, J.P. (ox-wardens), the company were amused by some remisiscences of Mr. Peter Burton. an old Feeston ringer, who rang in the first 120 changes on the ofrd peal of six. He caused lamghter by his description of how, when a piece trapped out of $\pi$ bell during ringing, all the ringers tried to get througl: the eoor logether.

Responding, Mr. Clifiord thanked the company, nud sfated he hat viene his work beceuse he loved the chorch, the parishl in which le was born, and the bells.
Mr. F. S. Price pointed out that bell ringing consisted of sorne:thing more than mere rope-pulling, and stated lhat considerable menlal eftort is required, Mr. Clifford had taken up Surprise ringing aince his Goth birthriay, and bad rung peals of Noufolk. Superlafive and Gamhridge Surpriae, and soon hopent to score Landon, for which abtempta had already been marie. As Mr. Cliftord was 75 rears of age. Hie company wount realise these were no meat feats. He concludenl by proposing a wote of thanks to the Vicar for making the presentaiion, and parishioners for their nttendance-Mtr. A. Lowe seconded, and the motion was carried... The visilors' hook was signed by sll present before dispersing.

On Saturday, May 17th, a peal of Lomion Surprise was attemptol at the church, hist, unfortunabely, lost after ringing balf the peal in 1 hour 30 minutes.

AN APPRECIATION BY ONF OF HIS 'BOYS.
Mr. Barnett's 600 peals represent 43 yeare of ringrieg, 35 of whidi toe has spent at Craytord. at which tower and the Parish Church, Erith, it can fee safely said he has called more first peals for voungsters than any other ringer living. A ringev who rang his first pual at Crayford over 30 Fears ago, remarking on this fact to the writer the other chay, caid, "If ringing is going to have any effect on getting a man to heaven it will be old Teddy Barnett's efforts for youngsters t!at will get him thiere long before the man who has rung 1,000 pesls."
Of lis 106 peals of Grandsire Triples quite 75 per cent. have sotme special feature, such as somehonly's first peal or first as conductor, or liave been rung in helping a struggling hand.
How many ringers owe their first penl of Double Norwich to fim? The late Samuel Slater, in some verses published at the time he rang in the 13,440 at Romford, truly said:-

Eidwin Barnett rang the second, and did his equal part,
Far Double Norwich Court is rooted in his heart.
The writer can remember as a small boy mbny now well-known ringers coming to Crayford to learn to ring Double Norwich, among them, Mr. J. E. Davis, and his consin, Mr. H. N. Davis, who oftea came from Camberwell fwice on a Sunday for this purpose.

As a conductor no man ever starts for a peal with a greater knowledge of his composition han Mr. Barnett. and his knowiedge of the in and out of course of course ends is to the writer almost uneanus Of the 120 he can tell the insiant he hears any one of thenn, whether it, is in or out of course.

He also has that rare gifi among ringers of being able to taka off ' anything from outside the tower. On one accasion he took of a peal of Stedman Thiples which Mr. I. F. Cheesman was ealling a new composition by Mr. Lindoff. End wher he had finished be eave him lontli the figitres and the calling.

Mr. Barnett has also yung considerably over 100 peals on two different peals of bells. I do not know how many it is now, but at the time he rang his 500th peal in 1917 he had runt exartly 100 ni Crayford, and 114 at the Parish Church, Erith.
