## YORK MINSTER BELLS.

Several important bell restorations have been carried out since the war, but none, we think, has excelled in interest and scope that now proposed at York, where a scheme is rapidy taking shàpe to recast and rehang the peal of twelve at the Minster and to provide what has always been badly wanted, a ceiling between the tinging room and the floor of the bell chamber. It was only in the year 1914 that the bells were it the hands of bell hangers, but the condition of the peal is now such that the Dean and Chapter have resolved no longer to put off rehanging, and it is because this task is inevitable that the further proposal has been made to recast the whole ring. The bells are reputed to be the third heaviest peal in the country, but they are lacking in quality of tone, and if anything is to be done to make them more wottly of the glorious Minster, now is unquestionably the time to do the work.
As will be seen elsewhere, while the cost of the rehanging will be provided out of Minster funds, there is no available money at the disposal of the Dean and Chapter for the recasting, but this part of the scheme bids fair to become an acconplished lact, for already there has been a generous lead given, and promises, headed by three of the Canons, have been made which guarantee the cost of casting seven of the bells, the ringers themselves being responsible for one. There is little doubt, therefore, that the full proposals will be carried out, and Messrs. Taylor and Co., who, we are informed, will be entrusted with the work, will have a magnificent opportunity of producing a noble peal of bells for one of England's noblest churches. That they will rise to the great occasion goes without saying, and the Minster will doubtless hereafter possess an outstanding example of the English belf founders' art.

It is a matter for real gratification to find cathedral authorities so ready to enter upon a comprehensive scheme such as is proposed at York. It is not often they are prepared to do so, and still more seldom is it that so handsome and speedy a lead is given without public appeal. But the people of York have a great pride in their Minster, and, with the opportunity now before them, will add to the glories of their magnificent fane. Fortunately no point of antiguarian interest enters into this recasting project, for the present bells are but eighty years old, and a clean sweep can therefore be made of them without injuring the susceptibilities of anyone. We expect to hear in a very short time that donows for the recasting of the rest of the bells have come forward, and when the work is consummated there is a prospect of York Minster possessing what may well be the finest peal of bolls in the world.

## THE BOSTON GUILD．

RINGING AT U．S．A．＇s OLDEST TOWER．
On Sunday，November 9th，members of tha Boston，Mass．，Guili of Change Ringers met at the Memorial Tower of Hingham Church， which is the oldest church in U．S．A．，having beed built in 1681．The occasion was the unveiling of a memorial to the late Mr．Fred L． Ripley，who was for many yeurs a leading citizen of Hingham，and died at the age of 88.

No peal was attempted．but througlout the afternoon several 168＇s of Grandsire Triples， $276^{\prime} s$ of Boly Minor，and ofher touches were rugg．

The greatest interest was displayed by local residents．to whom，af course，our method of riaging is sombthing of a novelty．The ring－ ing chamber and staircase were crowded，and a large number con－ gregated in the churchyard to listen to the bells，in spite of the in－ clement weather，The ringers were afterwards entertained at tea by ladies of the parish．The hanabells were then brought out，and courses of Grandsire Caters were Flag．This concluded a most suc－ cessiful meeting．
The following members took part in the ringing：Mrs．Margaret H． Shurtleff（President of the Guild），Philip J．Allfrer．William Bash－ ford，Joseph Goodhead，George E．Hubbard，James F．Laker，Richard Newton，Tony Price，Somers H．Sturgis，and S．Warren Sturgis．
The Boston Guild．which owes its existence to the antiring labourg of the late Dr．A．H．Nichols，lins，at the present time，a member－ slip of about 20 ．Unfortunately．owing to the great distances apart at which members live，and to a certain amount of prejudice agrinst ringing，regular practice is impossible．Despite these handicaps，the band still retains a high standard of ringing．

## YORK MINSTER BELLS TO BE RECAST?

GENEROUS OFFETS PROMOTE GIG RESTORATON SCFEME
Ong of tho greatest bell restoration schemes promoted sincts the war is to bocurried outs at York Minstel. Hung in this gtately pile is one af the herviest rings of twelve in the country, but they are et present in luad ringing condition, nllhough they were relung only about ten yeare ago. The Dean and Chapter have liad the matter under consideretion, nad, having recoived a report from Messrs. Taylor and Co., of Longhborougla, have decided, out of their own funds, to lave tho bells reliung.

At the seme time they went into the muestion of recesting the luelle, and making them anead worling of the Ninster, bute this project was beyond the means at the disposal of the Cuithedral muthorilies. Further, tho Dean and Chapier felt it, was diffeult in view of the pressing claims of the Catledral Windows Fumit to launch an appen] for the bells, bui it was thought that, with the other work to be carried out, the opportunity of recasting the bells ought not to be lost. To give a lead in the matter three of the Canons of the Minster generously oftered to kiefray the cost of recasting three bells, and their example was followed ly the Chanter Clerk. Now the ringers hawn underlaken the recasting of one of the remainder, and two more offers lave lien reaeiver, bringing the promises up to seven holls, inelading the $9 t_{1}$ and tenor. Thas, there is every prospect of the complete recasting of the peal being antrien out.
In addition to the rocasting and relanging, it is proposed to inser g new ceiling about 19 fobe above thn floor of the ringing room, ant to encase tho clock weights. From the ringers' point of view, this altaration is a very necossary one, as hitherio thennise in the ringing room has bech almost tuhesralile, and a great improvement will he effectod if this proposal is earried aut.

## IWTERESTUNG HES'ORY OF TTFE BELISS.

A rery interesing history of York lyells has appeared in flee 'Yorkshire Weckly Post, from which we take the iollowing extracts -
 church penag go. $\mathrm{l}_{1}$ wns lang in 1844, sticeeding a peal which perish-
ed in the fire of 1840 . The linstory of the York Minster hells, like the listory of any mart of that magnificent herjtage of York people, is full of interbst. The first record of thells at the Minster is contained in a note of ta foelftla century quarrel between the Arelibishop of tho day, Copfroty, and the Deah, whom he inlibited from perFornaing service or "having the bells rung." From this data.onwart] reforences to the bells are frequent, both in the Fialoric Rolls of the Minster and in contemporary documents.

York Xinster wells. lospever, have suffered greator vicissitudes than atmost any ather part of the equipmeat of that glorious fane. "Falling down' scems to linve been among tha lensl of the misfortunes they encountered. In 1359 it seems that the "grent bell' fell. and was hrokon 'by defathe of the Treasmrer', and it was not 1 ill fan yoars lafne that it was replaced. A bew clock ated beveral bells wore set up, at this time, and there is a most interesting list of items in the Fabric Rolls of the expenditure incurred. The 'bill' throws a good denl of light on hoth encleaiastical ind ceonomic listory of the time. Not only ate the lathour costs sel out. hat the cost of material.
The acconit slows floardy that the founding of the lells was done it situ. Tork, inderd, whs one of the four leading centres of the hell-fonding induslry in medicwal times, and several notable York bell fonmders' names "ppear the makers of thells un and down the country.
The lisfory of the gork bell-fommery is a finsemaling one. It enmo tia an end tuibh the teath last century of the lagt of the Daltons, who had their foundry in Stonegate. The 'Rell founder's window' in the norilh aisle of the nove is in itaclf testimany to the importance of the craft in the city, and to the substantial charamer of one of its leadinge practidioners in Rirhard Thnnoe, who wns bailife of the city in 1380, and its trepresentative in Prilinment in 1327.
In 1459 tho bells of the Minster were remover from the central fower, hefore it was reloritt, and weve lung in the north-west tomer. The late Mr. W". Th, Howatd, York's most famous rimger-he was a beld finger at the Minster for 68 years-with infinite patience and research compiled a history of the belfs which was published some sixtern years ago, and to which the witer is indobted for much of the information comtanet in this article. Among the fruits of his rescercla in the Finhric Rolls are entries for 1473 showing four hells. the 'Ladr Bells' lung in the north-west tower, and elimes to the bells in the soutli-west Lower.

## FIRAT [PEAL OF TWEJVE IN TEE COUNTRY

Coming thown to 1655 , the four minor bells were remaved from the north-west tower to the sonth-west. Llie damaged bells being recasi. They formed the 'ring of twelve bells,' which is spoken of by the authors of the 'Clawis Campanologia' as the earliest ring of twelve bells in England.

There were in addition I wo faells in $a$ bell turret on the contly transept, one being used as the clock hell and the other for daily service. They were removed in 1752 . What happened to the clock hell
is uncecorded. The service bell was placed in a turret on the lantern tower, and in 1803 was removed to the south-west tower. The peal was formerly lung in two tiers. In 1765 they were taken down, and a peal of ten, east lyy Lester and Pack, substituted for them. In 1840 the hells were completely destroyed by a fre caused accidentally during the cleaning and repairing of the clock. The southwest tower wns involved; the whole of its contents, including the ring of ten bells and the clock, perished, as well as the roof of the nave. In four years the restoration was completed at a cost of £25,600. In Jity, 1844, the present peal of twelve bells, founded by Mears, of London. was hung, having heen purchased from a bequest by Dr. Stephen Beckwith, a great puklic benefactor to the city, who left 545.000 to the Minsier, the Museum, and other York institutions. A tablet in the ringing chamber records the bequest

## DEATH OF MR. J. F. PENNING. SAFFRON WALDEN RINGER AND GOMPOSER.

We very much regret to report the death af Mr. J. F. Pemmine which ocetarred on November 13 th. at his resideace, Satron Walden. Deconsed had boan in failing health for the past two years, and during the last iwelve weeks was confined to his bed.
Mr. Penting acgan his ringing career wilh the Saffron Walden Suciety in 1871 and was sill a member of this ancient society at the time of hir death. In flie etaly payt of his ringing career he was closely astociated with the brothers Pitstow, and wish fhem and the late Mr. Samuel Slater, ind other mombers of the Glemsford company, he rang his first peal, which was one of Kent Treble Bol, af Long Melford.

At this time the walden company wis at low ebb, Treble Boh and Bob Major only tocing rung, hut ile illtroduction of young blood catised greal protress in all standard methodes and Mr. Penming was one of the band which rang the first peals in the following methods on tha halls: Sterlman Triples, Double Norwich Court, Superlative Surprise (first peal in the connty of Essex), Cambridge Surprise (first peal in the Fastern Counties), Joudon Surprise (firsi peal in the Country of Essex). ## GREAT BADDOW BELLS.

## RING OF EIGHT RECAST

The dedration of the bells of St, Mary's Church, Great Baddow, after restoration, took place on Saturday, November 15th, the cereznony bemg perfomed by the Bishop of Barking.

The bells have beeu recast aud tuned on the 'true-harmonic* system, axd, in recrsting, all the old inserjplions lave beeth reproduced in facsimile. The bels have also been rehumg in a new, strong, and massive cast-iron frame, the foundation of the framework consisting of heavy rolled steel girders built into the walls. The standards which support Elie frame are of heay cast-iron. The new hean-stocks are of cast-iron aud fitted with patent self-aligning ball hearings in massive iron pedestals, iotally enclosed, and are absolutely dust and dirt proof. There are also new wrought-iron clappers, with independent crown-staples and joiats passing through the head-stack and secured by patent lock-gut, which canat be sliaken loase by vibra tion.

The bells lave been fixed at a lower lavel in the tower, thins producing a much softer tonal ettect in the immediate vicinity of the tower, and at the same time a further carrying power. The old bell chamber floor has been removed and replaced with a new one, fixed miependently of the hell frame. The cost of the work will bu over fgoo, of whioh about five-sjxtlis has been raised.

## DEDICATION BF IHE BISHOP OF BARKING.

'lhere was a crowded enogregation at the dedication service. The dhoir wrate piesent, amd hir, A. Burton was at the orgar. The Vicar, Rev. D. G. Donklas, commenced the service, and the hyma, All people that on earth do dwell, was sung. The special lesson wis taken from Numbers x. 1-11. During the singing of the hymn, I Pleasant are Milyy courts above, the clergy, charchwardens, and choir, proceeded to the tower. Hare the charchwardens, Dr. P. T. Spuncer-Phillips and Mr. F. Howard, taking the zopes, prosented the hells to the Bishop for dediation. Tinis onmpleted, the Bishop delivered the ropes to the Vicar, requesting him to receive the beils as u sacred trust to be used for the glory and service of God. A few rounds were then rumg, during which the Bishop, clergy, and ehoir returned to the stalls. The hyma, "Hark on higli the jogful music,' was 1 hen sung, after which 168 Grandsire Triples, conducted by Mr. (?. H. Howard, was rung, and a collection in aid of the Bell Fund was taiten, amounting to Eg 4 s .9 d . This was followed by the hymu, The gaspel bells ate ringing.
The Bishop, who preached from the words, "Rejoice in the Lord slwity, aud again Isey rejoice, cammenced by saying that it was somewhat diffeult to find a suitable text for such an occasion. Bels were ondy mentioned twice in the Bible-namely. Exodus xaviii. 33, and Zechariah siv. 20 . Gells were not as old as charches, and Lheir vrigin was somewhat obscure. They probably came juto use about lie ninth eentury of the Clisistian era. Abbeys liad hells in olden times, hat they were probably cast upon the spot. As Eransport would he then impossible. He rejoiced with the parislioners that the betls whre now in order, and also that the old inscriptions had been remaney (LSOO) had heen rrisod. He reforred is hindiy terms to the ringers in the diocese and to all the folmotary work they so readily gave, and trusted that their labous would brjos many fute the followalip of the Church. The message of the bells could be interpretred in mony wajs, suols as joy, whoh was the predominant note; sorrow, as at the passing of some loved parishioner; wedding peals, signifying the kuitting together of two in Jesus; and national liappiness.
The recessional hymn. "Now thank we all mur God, concludet the service.

T'hey came from Baddow, Bramoree, Borelam, Broomicld, Clalmsford, Clacton-om-Som, Danbury, Dummow, Earls Colne, Feering, Great Bentley, Greensted Green, Kelvedon, Loughborough, Little Waltham, Maldon St. May's, Maldon All Snints', Rayne, Romford, Rettendon, Sandon, Stisted, Springiteld, Writtle, and Witham. Among the visilors was a lady ringer, Miss A. E. Waldouk, from Maldon St, Mary's, and Mr. E. Newman, for 53 years a yingol at Great Baddow.
Mr. C. H. Howard, Master of tho Essex Association, and a Baddow ringer of 40 yedrs ago, but mow living at Eraintrac, cougratalated the Church Council on the spleadid work achieved in the restorationt of the bells. He staled that expert opinion was obtained, tenders invited, sad excellent work secured, so that Baddow now possesses a very fine peal. He congratulated the fonnders, kifestrs. J. Taylor and Ca., of Loughtoorough, on the fine results achieved, and said the peal would be a lasting eredit io that firm. Fe knew there were ringers who would take up the work in Baddbw in the right spirit now they had such a peal to work upon.

Mr. Taylor Thanked Mr. Howned for his kind remarks. He stated that when 10 inspected the ald bells on the wooden, rickety frame he knew that nothing bit complete restoration wotild make a satisfactory job of it, and lie was efad that the Council had agreed on such a course, instead of attempling to patch up the old ones. He wes most lappy to meet such a number of ringers, and oxfenden a very whrm welcome to any who visited Loughborough at any lime.
Mr. E. A. Amoss, secretary of the Parochial Chureh Council, extended $n$ warm weleame to the ringers, sud thanked Mr . Howard for all the assistance he had given, and also Mr. Taylor for the very courteous and prompt mancer in which he had dealit with the whole busizess.

## UNIVERSITY GRADUATES AS RINGERS. A COMMENT OF FIF?Y YEARS AGO.

The Hon. Librarian of the Central Counctl (the Rev. C. W. O. Jentyn) sends us tho following interesting extract from 'A Note on Jentyn) sends us tho fonowibg interesting extract 'Church Bells, of November 21st, 1874 :

In its towex (St. Bride's) some of the earliest feats of ringing were accomplished. The ring, originally consisting of ten bells only, was cast in 1710 by Rudhall, of Gloucester; and shout seven years later hae firsl peat of Girandsirg Caters was rung an thern. In 1718 , two trebles were adden, and within eight years from that date the firsi peal of Cingues and the first peal of Maximus hari been accomplished on these bells. Those were the aristocratic days of ringing, for wo sre fold that each riager in the last-namea peal drowe home in his own enrriage. The possession of a carriage is a very good thing in its wry, hut we hope that in a few ycars peals rung by men with the hallmarte of a Unumsity education will be so common as to pass without special comment, and then the art of riaging will have gainand the posilion to which it is entilfed, as the most perfect form of combinct mental ami physicn! exercise. Oxford, by the inaugaration of a Univetsity company has slown how this desirahle end is to be attained; fand we trust inat ere long Cambridge will have follower? such an excellent example. For many vears there were not wanting at Cnmbrirge instances, though rather raye ones, of men graduateg and uniergraluntes who could ring: if any of these remain, it ought nof to be diffleult to get a companj together.
