## AN OLD-STANDING TROUBLE.

The recent determination of a Devonshire Vicar (as already recorded in our columns) to lay down two conditions for those who ring at his church, has caused some little discussion both in and outside the parish. The conditions, in effect, are first, that the ringers should be Churchmen who recognise the duty of attending the services to which they summon others, and, second, that they should be ready to attend some instruction in change ringing as an addition to the ordinary round ringing: which has prevailed for so long. With the reasonableness of these conditions very few, we think, will quarrel, and our comment on the subject is merely general and nut specially directed to the parish in question, where the immediate circumstances, beyond those already published, are unknown to us.

The question of ringers attending the services for which they have rung is an old-standing source of trouble. In principle, where the ringers claim that they are office bearers in the church - and that is a point which the associations have been urging the clergy for years to accept-it is obvious that the ringers' obligation does not end in the belfry, any more than that of the sidesman ends when he has shown the peopie into their seats. Nor should any question of attending the services arise, because the ringer, apart from his allegiance to the Church as one of its officers, has an even higher duty to perform, and his conscience will impel him to join as often as may be in the acts of public worship. But there is also another type of ringer-the man who rings for what may be termed purely selfish ends, and who thinks he has satisfied his debt to the church, which gives him his opportunities and facilities for the practice of his art, when he has rung the bells for the Sunday services. We think that little is gained by attempting to drive ringers of this type into church.

The remedy is the exercise of persuasion and influence, and here is to be found the ground for that other argument so often advanced-and put forward with truththat the ringers would be more often seen in the church if the clergy were more often seen in the belfry. There is a great deal in this. If the clergy never visit the ringing chamber, the ringers, after a first feeling of neglect, may become callous in their attitude to the church. A parson who appreciates his ringers can show his feeling by many little acts, and one of them is by going to the belfry when the ringers are discharging their duties and by interesting himself in their affairs. An influence thus judiciously exercised would be bound to have its effects is other directions, and is likely to have results which

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hard-and-fast rules would never produce. Moreover, rules of the kind which insist upon ringers attending service whenever they have rung the bells, become irksome in practice, because it is not always convenient to observe them; and the man who recognises his duty to his Maker needs no artificial spur to drive him from the belfry to the church.

Upon the second of the conditions mentioned above we have not space here to dwell at length. Men who refuse to get beyond the round ringing stage, if the opportunity offers, are but a drag on the wheel of progress, and are usually better out of the belfry than in it.

## WILLIAM DOUBLEDAY CROFTS.

## A HISTORY OF THE FAMOUS NOTTINGHAM RINGER

Last Saturday was the anniversary of the death, in the year 1809 , of that famous old Nottingham ringer, William Doubleday Crofts, and through the kindness of Mr. Albert Coppock we are able to-day to publish for the first time a portrait of this old worthy, who made ringing history in that part of the country a contury and a half ago. Our picture is reproduced from a photograph of the painting which hangs in Notingham Castle Art Museum.
William Doubleday Crofls was n Nottinghnm atlorncy-nt-lnw, anil the achieyed fume as a carmpanologist not only through Notts nnd the aljacent counties, but even as far afindid as London and York. In Whis day', the 'tin 'Lizzie,' the Penny Posi, and a ringers' weekly, were

things undrearmed of, and the finoumt of literature arailable for ringers lanentably small. Cufts when fully allue to this position, nond his mannscripls, which ore still in purfect presurvalion show him 1.6 have been fully rwave of the fact that disowories must be property and enrefally beporded if they ure to be of any use to a tater generation.

It is a matier for regret thal, apart fromt lise winging recorkls and MSS. relating lo ringing, penctically nothang is known of the tifo of this celebrity, bus exery sonse of infortation is being earefully followed up by Mr. Coppork, to alhonn wr are indebted for this sketch.
Crofts SES. hnve drisun prame from Insper Snowdan, who has futerleaval llam with written jemarks, and present-dav axperts. His ability as a ringer is proved by lis persl recorits, l'lysicalls, a very powerful man, be performed some very remarkable feats at ithe heary ond, and the heavy and in those days was a nuch more formidntate task than at the presem time. For instane, the first pera on the bells at Gainshoraugin was one of Grandsire Triplen, in when Crofts rang the 4 h , and two men rang the tenor hohind. Ome yoar fater. Crofts turmed in this stame temor to Boh Major, single-landen, the perl being the shtue lenglh. ant only wo mitater longrot in exerution. At the thine the peal of 10.260 Crrandsire Caters was rang at S1. Marys, Notinglam, in 1778 , the bells were rung from a loft insite the chareh, requiring at least 30 leet more rope than is the case now. Fel Crafis conducter the preal fromilhe 9 ih, single-hamded, during the whole 7 hours and 22 manates.
He was elected s momber of the Collage Foulth in 1765, and in-
cluded in that society's band that scored tha first peal at York Minster m 1787. An address noted in lis MSS. reads, "Mr. Roscoe, White Horse, Copper Gate, York.' Perdaps there is some connection. He condticted miny at 'first peal on the hells," including St. Peter's, Nottingham (old penl) in 1768, new peal 1771, Uppinghans 1773. Newark 1773, Mansield 1774, Granthum 1775, Norton-by-Galby 1776, and Caythorpe 1778. Two of Lis compositions, a 5,280 Treble Bab Major and a 5,000 Treble Bob Royal, find a place in Snowton's
'Treble Bob.' One of his suceessors as conductor of the sherwood Youths, George Dickisson, reputed to be his son-in-law, and buried in the game rrave as Crofis, conducted the sirst peal ou the bells at Aslibourne, Derbyshine, in 1821, where a free fight occurred after the peal, with the locals in the charehyard.

A mare glance througlt the MSS, gives an impression of careful and detailed effort, which characterises ill his work. His personal pealhook is a dainty specimen of cullured writing and engrossing. One of the two copies of the Chavis possessed by him shows in his awn writing that evary page has beon catefully read and cortreted even to the most minute detnil, also that cvery peal in the book was proved by lima, and the trosition of the false changes shown. He rang in nJl 31 peals, 27 of which lie conducted, the details of which are :-

Grandsire Triples 15 , conducted 14 .
Graudsire Caters 6, condueted 4, including 6,012, 8,046, 20,260 Rob Major 4, conducted 3, including 6,000.
Bob Royal 1, conducted 1.
Oxfort Treble Bob Major 3, conducted 3, inclucing 7,040.
Oxford Treble Bob Royal I, conductied 1.
Double Bob Royal 1, condicted 1.
In one peal at Nothinglam, in 1782 , the ringer of the 3 ra is described as "an honest Yorkshiyeman,' No explanation is offered, but probrbly 'Samivell Peppery' might be able to throw light on it. The portrait which is published by kind permission of ithe Wottinghan Castla Art Museum, where the original hangs, was painted by Richard Bonington, a one-time stump orator, artist, and jack-of-all-irades, who eventually succeeded his father as jailer at the Noftingham Fouse of Corvection, in which latter capacity he probably encountered Crofts. Bonington afterwards marrind a Birminglaner lady, named Parkes, setled in the nearby vilage of Arnold, where a son was born to them. This hoy grew ip to be the famous Nottingham artist, RinThati Prokes Bonington, whose work is internationally known.
This article is intended 10 justify the efforts of the present generation of Nottingham ringers to keep alive the memors of this local giant by tholdigg an ammal memorial dinner bearing his name. Fis grave, so long neglected that its position was forgotzen. has now been elcaned and edged with marble, and as a compliment to bim the Saciety of Sherwood Youths has heen revived.

Writing of the Croftg MES., Mr. T. W. Parker, of Sunderlant, has said ' The whole of the papers are extremely interestiag, and. considering fle time when thes were writtom, raveal the wrifer as a wonderful man. At that time there could be litlle or no chance of learing from an outside souree, and yet the eontents of the whs. slow Crofts to have the knowledge of and a keen incight fing many things which would put him in the farefront, esen to-dar. His torehes and penls secou surprising for the time . . . . Thn mosl. surprising and interestiug to me is the writer"s proof of Treble Bob mothods by the lead ends. In the case of Oxford Treble Bob the moof its as exact and detailed as that puhlished 100 reacs later br the late fasmer W. Stowan. Though set out in atifferent way, the method of deducing the false course ends from the false lean ends is the some.

Mr. Grorge Taker, who has also examined the Miss.. espressed thu view: ' Considering the time it was whitien, the knowledge he hat ni proving thanas trofts as one of the mosi remarkable men it tho history of ringing. With one nxceplion (Cambetdee Surprise) his proofs are nqual ta anything that can be done to-day, athongh the wnot wae far more liborious than now..... His collection of peals ant tonches is very wonderful. and one can only lon surprised that af sareti an garly date there was living a gentrman witl far greater kmowledge than many firk-tate ringers porsess to-day."

## ELTHAM BELLS DEDICATED.

## SIX RECAST AND TWO NEW TREBLES.

The newly recast bells of Eitham Parish Church, Kent, were dedicated by the Lord Bishop of Southwark on November 1st, in the presemce of a large and representative congregation.
The first step in carrying out the setheme was taken at a public meeting in the Parish Hall, at which it was unankmously decided that the sis lower bells in the tower shouldi be recast aud rehung in meial Iramework, with new filtings, and two now trebles added. It was also decided fluat electric winding apparatus be fitted io the tower clock, and that a third dial be placed on the east side, so that it could be seen from High Street. This is the scheme which has been authirably carried out by Messrs. Gillett and Johnston, of Croydon.
'The restoration was organiser. by Captain W. Anderson, who has worked with eonsiderable enthusiasan, beeping the scheme constantly before the public, special emphesis being lnid on the fact that the bells and ciock existed for the commengood of Eltham people, who, one and all, were asked to contribute to the cost of the work. The tirst, or treble bell, bears the inscription 'Mary,' and is in mennery of Mary C. L. Yeatman and E. L. Yeatman.
On the second bell is Inseribed 'Restoration, organised by Capt. W. Anderson, M.O., and the cost defrayed lyy public subscription, 1924,' and on each of the eight bells is inscribed "Recast by Ginletit and Jolusion, Croydon, 1924
The history of the bells is given on No. 8 hell, and is as follows : The Iower six 万eils, recast by Thos. Mears, of London, in 1794. Were ugain recast and two trebles added in 1924. The Rev. 1. Kcnyaril, Vicar; Thos. Noyes, Wm. Glazbrook, churchwardens, 1794. The Rev. Elphinstone Rivers, Vicar; Thos. Reed Parry, Geo. Wn. Chidley, clurchwardens, 1924.'

## THE DEDICATION SERTIOE.

Despite the distinctly inclement weather, the church was well filbed for the dedication service. The Lord Bishop was attended by the Rev. S. G. Hooper (Bislop's chaplain), the clergy in the stalls and snuctuary being the Rev. Elplinstone fivers (Viear of the parisio), the Rev. J. C. Grey (Parish Church), the Rev, H. A. Hall (Wicar of Hely Trinity, Elliam), he Rev. R. H. S. Gobbitt (SE. Luke's, Elflam), the Rev. R. B. Janvrin (St. Peter's, Lee Road), and Father E. Tiornton (All Saints'. Hatchant, New Cross, who assisted at E]tham Parish Church durine the wir). Occupying front seats in the nave were the eight bell ringers (members of the Kent County Association, one of whom whs Captain Anderson). Col. H. B. Tasker and Mr. R. R. C. Gregors, representatives of Messrs. Gilletif and Johnston, were also present. The organist was Mr. G. Kelson Prior. Evensong was begun with the Lord's Prayer, and the act of dedication having taken place, the bells were ring in rounds for a few minutes.

In his address, the Bisloop first said they were taking part that eveniug in a service, which, throngh the nature of the case, could very rarely occul-the dedication of the bells of the church, either as new bells or after recasting. Norraally, bells were recast every 200 years, and so it followed thint it was in the highest degree improbable that any of those who were in the church that nigit would, unless some strange accilent occurred, hear again the ringing forth of the bells immediately after their declication. Their earliest bells dated back to the reign of Henry VI., and it was possible that some of the metal in some bells to-day was used for the ringing of the peals of triumph at the destruction of the Spanish Armada, at the restoration of Charles II, at the release of the bishops irom the cower, at the coming of William of Orange, and after the victories nf Trafalgar and Waterloa. The bells of their Parish Church in many cases linked the church with the distant past, and it was diffcult, he thought, to exaggerate the place hells had hat in history, in architecture, and in art. Sometimes the bells in the past actually made listory. Chey were rung to wara the inhabitants of the town of the approach of the enemy: they were rung at other times to stir the people into revolt: they were rung as a signal that ali fires were to be closed; and frequenily in the past there were occasions when the ringing of the bells signalised some really important act in history. Speaking of the effect bells hard on art, his Lordship said that at one time our churches had no lowersi they had litile turrets through which lighti and air were admitted, but presently there came the need for a place in which bells could be rung, and so were built the towers aud spires as tabernacles for the bells, and gradually those towers and spires were adormed until they becime oljects of real heanty on our English lamilscape.

## THE INPLUENCE OF BELLS.

Bells had also left their influence on poetry. It would take volumes to gire anything like an adequate account of the way in which bells lad influenced the poets of every generation. If bells, continued the preachar, had liad their part in history, in architecture and in poetry, they lad had their part above all in religion, calling the people to church, ealling them to worship, ringing out merrily for a wedding and mournfully for some passing soul, reminding people of the world
sage lrom the sphereg of heaven. Ant they brought their messgge to meny who often stead entirely apart from arganised religion. Sume of them might remember how l'aust, when about to commit suicide by drinking from a cup of poisont, suuldenly heard the belfs mag out, aud he mementuened low, Jung ugo in bis boyhoud, he had hetred them, and they stirred him to better thoughts. Then again, deer Gyot, when wresling with the bestialities of the lowar woxld, was dielivered by the samal of the belis ringing out in the mornity Whert the bells rang out, what was their message? They called people to worship, aud if they themselves were not able to come into the church when they heard the bells, they could lift up their heurts in sombe sloort prayer, act of thanksgiving, or act of recollection, recalling to thomselves the Presence of thod, and the invisible world. They also rang out a mesenge ol peave and goodwill; they called them to realise the fellowship they should all hufe one with another as menders of the great fanily of thad. To the bell ringers, his Lordship said they must perforn their Ifulies rightly with co-operatiou aul unity. There must be no disharmony aud dispute in their own lives, and in their own work, ant the parishioners must in their own lives show forth the same unity und goodwill. When they were gomelimes depressed and disappointed ut all the disharmony of their day, when they saw the world divided so often by class division and social and intermational strife, flen let them remenaber God's purpose. Let hana realise thut in dues time His purpuse would be accamplished.

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## METHOD CONSTRUCTION.

## To the Editor.

Dear sir, -What Mr. Baker calls a two-held shunt will be better underatood if it be regatded as a three-bell shunt. The three hume are shunted from a position in which bhey course after 4 and 5 to a position before these bells. The operation by means of which this is done is known as an 'Extreme.' Similarly bis four-bell shunc is actualy a ome-bell shuat. Also un Eatreme. To many people the differcnce will doubtless appear merely a maiter of words, but in fact it is in points like this that all the difference lies between undergtanding what a shunt is and complete failure to grasp the point at issue. If he will allow me to say so, Mr. Baker would do well to spend his next half-hour of leisure al Brighton Goods Station. He will then learn that a shunt consists of cutting a block of trucis out of a train and re-unting them to the train in a fresh position. Any railway porter will inform him that the shunt is not completed when the train is cut in half. This is wherc the theory of the place-makers
breaks down. It is true that it might be argued that the two rows

24136 correspond to a train of 6 trucks in which 1 and 4 are interchanged, and similarly 5 and 6 . But no one is foolish enough to say just this, for everyone recognises that coursing order has something or oflee to do with a shunt in ringing. What most people fail to grasp is that this coursing order has eversthing to do witb it, and nothing else at all eaters in. Gising puomiuence to the place invariably cauges a confumon of thought, though this is cot always erident when applied by really able men like Mr. J. W. Parker, thoughi it is present all the same.

What is needed is freedom from all artificial prejudice. Nothing has stood more in the way of a recognition of the true principles whicl underlie all change ringing than the assumption that London Minor nad Lonton Major are the same method. Why this andient auperstition (for $\mathrm{j1}$ is nothim else) should prove so long lived is hard to understand. Take any other method whatever in which the extension is unquestioned, can jou find a single parallel to the work of the scejnd in the first leat? In Minor, after making 4th's it bunts up, whereas in Majo- it turns round and returns to the !ead. Surely this oughe to raise suspicion. And yet we actually int thef the assumption that it is a true exteusion is used to controvert an argument, logionl in itself, which goes further to explain Melhod Construction than anything which has previously teen produced.
Mr. York Bramble is mistaken about my second tentative definition. It is the familar story of confusing Construction aud Composition. At one stage they have much in common, but at the point with which these definitions deal it is mecessayy to keep them cuite separate. Thus, we are not concerned here with the possibility of the repetition of rows. That comes later. The defnitions deal with the primeiples which will rastore a certain number of bells to the order from which they started; we are got as wet dealing with the way in whioh repetition is to be avoided. Mr. Bramble's suggested addition. I fear. will only increase the contusion in most people's minds. The root of the whole matier, so far as Construction is concerned, is that if bells are started from rounds they can oalf return to rounds when they are in 'original' coursing order. Incidentally, that is the reason why methods ought to hrve Bob Major lead ends. The regular divisions into which a plain course fis divided sbould exhibit at their junctions the complete work of the method. They do not strictly do this if some or other shunt is not campletelr resolred within the lead. Or, to put it another way, a lead must contain completed shunds within itselp and not part A of one shunt and part B of a second shunt.
21345: 124365 124365 withit the lead, whereas in the second at the go 123456123456 off from rounds the first stage of a shant on 3.4 214365213465 takes place, but it is not completed tild the 5th lead of the course. That is why Canterthury should the rang in its rewerse form alone. In its earliest form a saealled leail contains part of four scparate leads. This spoils the symmetry, and synmetry is one of the most important features of change ringing.-Yours fnithfully
