# BELLS, CARILLONS, Clocks. 

## BELFRY DANGERS.

The fatality which occurred at Thetford last week is an unpleasant reminder that danger lurks in the belfry. A clock repairer went among the bells to carry out some slight adjustment to a clock hammer while some of the belis were up. Exactly what happened will never be known, but it is surmised that while down under a bell he pushed against the slider and the bell turned over, crushing him to death and pinning his body against the bell frame. The injuries received were of a terrible nature, and death must have been practically instantaneous.
It is, happily, seldom that such a tragedy happens in a belfry, but it provides a lesson in the dangers of leaving beils up. In this instance it can be said that the unfortunate old gentleman was not ignorant of the peril which he ran, and it may have been a case of familiarity lsreeding contempt; but that only adds, in our opinion, to the importance of never leaving bells up when there is any possibility of anyone being able to get amongst them. As a matter of fact, there is seldom any need to leave up bells of average weight, and the argunient that to do so saves time or trouble is a poor one. In the case of very heavy bells there may be some excuse for not lowering them after they have been used, but wherever bells are left up and for whatever reason, special precautions should always be taken. The belfry door should be locked, the ropes drawn up out of reach, and a large notice placed in a conspicuous position giving warning of the danger. But there is no question that the safe plan is to let the bells down after ringing. Whenever they are left up there is always the risk, as at Thetford, of some person going to the belfry for a special purpose, and meeting with an accident, when, so far as the ringers may have been aware, no one was likely to have access to the tower. The practice of leaving the bells up all the week prevails in a great many places, but it cannot be too strongly deprecated. There is no real harm done to beils or fittings by leaving them up, unless it be that a deep set bell may strain the stay or slider, but there is a real risk of harm in other directions.
And while on this question of belfry peril, may we once more refer to the danger to ringers who go up among the bells in che dark, perhaps to turn a clapper or some such thing ? To do this is simply inviting trouble. However familiar a man may be with the particular bell frame, the operation is full of risks which it is folly to court, and zet it is constantly done. Wherever it is possible, church authorities should be induced to extend the lighting system to the bell chamber, and at very least (Continued on page 802.)

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a proper lantern should be provided. These two pointsthe danger of leaving bells up and the risles of going among then in the dark-might well be emphasised by associations at every opportunity, for it seems that " education ' in this department is still sadly needed.

The first peat of Stedman Triples *in hand was rung on December 1941 1853, and was perforaned, in the prosonce of nineteen members of the College Youths and Cumberland Societies, by John Cox, Thomas Powelf, Hemry W. Hulcy and Thonas Brittan.

## THE LIGHTEST PEAL IN HAMPGHIRE.

 A NEW ZEAATAND MEMOKLAL.The new ring of six bells of the Parish Chureh, Brockenlurst, Hants, were dedicated on Sunday, Demember 7th, by the Rev. C. E Mathews, R.D. (Viec-Presidenti of the Wimehester Guild). The church was erowded, and there was a gathering of about 85 vingers from Christehureh, Ringwood, Lymington, North Stoneham aud the Jocal band. Mr. J. H. Shepherd, of Swindon, was also mresent.
Just prior to the dedication, a marble teblet to the memory of the New Zealand soldicre, who died at the Brockanhurst War Hospital, and were buried in the elhurchyard, was unvelled. One of the new bells was given by their rolatives and Iriends in New Zealand as a memorial of their self-sacritice
At the dedication 120 Grundsire Doubles was rung by C. W. Tucker (Brockenhurst) 1, G. Willame (N. Etoneham) 2, F. Sparshott (Clinistehureh) 3, G. Stone (Ctristehurch) 4, A. Woofi (Christeltureh) 5 , $G$. Preston (Christehureh 6. 'This liand also rang 720 Bob isiner at lie completion of the seryice
The three old bells that formerly lung in the fower lave been recast, and three new bells added, all tuned ou the Simpsea principle, with new frame, filtings, etc., the work having been carrjed out by Messrs. Mears ant Stainbank, of Whitechape
The weight of the tenor is only 4 cwt. 12 lbs., and the bells are the lightest ring in Hampshire All the ringers expressed their sppreciation of the lime tonc and "go' of the bells, which are a credit to the founders.

## KILLED IN A BELFRY.

CLOOK REPAIRER CRUSHED BY A BELL.
A distressing fatality oceurved in the tower of St. Peter's Church, Thutiford, Nottoly, on Tuestay of last woek, when Mr. Williann H.' Harris, is well-known watchnaker and jeweller of the town, was kulled by once of the hells lurning over on lim and crushing him against the frame, whilo he was attendiug to one of the elock hammurs. Thero are cight bells in Lhis tower, and it scems to bave been the practice to lowe the bells up. Mr. Farris was responsibie for tho upkeep of the clock, and was in the habit of going to the belfry for this purpose. On this occasion he had some repairs to exceute, andi when he friled to return homo his wifo went to look for him, anal found him in the hell frame, luwing been obviously erushed to death. ft was only with differity that the hody was rcleased, and was found impossible to bring it throtgly the bells and into the belfry. It was therefore carrice to the top of the chureh tower, and supported hy ropes under the ernipits, lowered 80 fect to the ground on the exterior of the north side of the tower.

The late Mr. Farris was for many yeurs a prominent thedesman in East Dereham, where he was caplain of the Fire Brigade, and an achive clarch worker. At Thefford he was for some years superintendent of one of the Clurch Sumlay Schools. Despite his age the was over 80), he was a skilled motor cyelish, and would also undertato the most dangeraus jobs in connection with lall und church clocks. Only legt year he panited a vane rit Lyufard Hall, which, an account of the dengerous nature of the task, lew olicers would undertuke.
The full gtory of the fatality was told at the inguest beld on the following duy.

Mra. Sarah Am Earris, the widow, said about cleven o'clock on Tuesday morning her husband left home 10 go to St. Peter's Chareh to puta new wire on the bammet strikel. About 11.30 she heard the hell of the elock हitrike onee, antil she thagght he lade linished and was trying the striker. After about half an hour, as he did not return home, she went to the chureli to see if she could give lim suly help. On going into the clock chnmber she saw his fools there, and the clock open. She, however, could not find deecaset, and wont into the boll chamber and called him, but got mo reply. Slie then came down the lower and made inquiries, but could hear of no one hating seen him, and she returned again to the belfry und elimhed amongst the bells. There slye saw the deceaserl pinneat unter one of the bells. Slie felt one of his hands, and foand il cold. She attempted to exiricate him, but was unsuc cesstul.

The Coroner: Ho has had charge of this clock for many years? He put it ap 57 years ago.
And since lhat time he has had entire clarge of it?-Yes.
Did lie wanally ga alone to do these repairs?-I lave gone with lim fately.

Mr. James Gootman, watelnoker, of Thetford, ataid he had assisted tho decensen witti the repait of Si. Petor's Clurch clock on many nccasions. Ho incard of the accident, and went to the clourch about 12.45. Ahout hanlf an hour later he went up into the helfry and stopped the clock for the safety of thase above. He then went up to the bells, and saw the hammer tail wre had been disconnceted ready for putting in a new wirc-

The Corencr: What does this wire do? - II works from the clock and goes along the roof of the elock chamber into the bells, where it is connecled with the alriking hammer.
Was anything being tho to this?-It had been disconnected ready for repairs.
You saw the deceased there?-Yes, lying under the third beil.
The bell wns upon him?--It was resting on the hody. Witness was of opinion the deceased hat gone under the bell to repair the striking apparatus insleat of going by the side of it.
He know there was a danger going amongst the bels when they ware up? - Oh yes; there is at notice in the clamber facing you fas you go in, warning you of the fanger if the bells are up.
I suppose you had helped to repair this elock when the bells were up?-No, never when the bells were up.
But you luad nesisted to repair this clock several times?-Yes; but if the bells were up we always got them them let down.
Dr. Geoffrey Cowan, Thetford, said he found very serious damage to the right side of deceased's chest, which was smashed in. There was also a fracture of the spine and the faw hone brokers on the rightit silit. There were other injuries. The injury to the chest wus sufficient to enuse death.
The Coroner: Dealh was practically inslanlancous?-Yes. I should say so, as the injuries were very severe.
Mr. Alfred William Macro, of Thetford, said he was captain of St. Peter's Change, Ringers, They rang the bells on Sunday evening, and at tho finish left six bells up and two down. It was usual to leave the treble and tenor bells down-the treble to facilitate gotting up the siceple and the tenor for the clack to strike on-and the other sis up, except when they were being used for chiming : titen they were all left down. He knew that the deceased had been in the liabit of goin ${ }^{\text {en }}$ inta the church tower to repair the clock, and tinoght he was fully aware of the danger of teuching the bells when they were up. The bells that caused deceased's donth weighed $5 \frac{1}{2}$
owt. Wifness produced a diagram, and gave an explanation as to how ho innagined the accident occurred. He thought, he satd, perhaps decensed was stooping about under the bell which caused his derth when lut probably pushed his back against the slider attached to the bell and swung it over. He was of npinion deceased must have put some bit of weight against the slider to liave released the bell. Sometines when deceased lad gene to the church and the bells were up he liad let thern down himself, so was aware of the danger of working amongstit the bells when up.

Police-Constable Warren said ou Tuesday Mrs. Harris said, My husband is dead: a bell has fallen on him. Witness went up into the belfry, and examined the deceased, and fonnd he was dead. He tried to remave the bell, but failed, and sent for help. He assister to remove the hods to the morlutry. When be went into the belfry five bells were up and three down.
The Coroner remarked that lie thought the deceased had been up the tower so amany times that he did not realise there was any danger.

## STUDENT RINGERS AT GROTON SCHOOL

On Sunday, November 23 rd, speeial ringing took place at the chape! of Groton Suhool to culebrale the Anterican Religious Festival, kown as THmakgiving Day (November 27Ll). Members of the Guild met at tlic School at 10.45 a.m., but, owing to wet weather, the attendance was small, only five being present.
Tho loed band, reeruited entirely from the studente of the sehool, show marked proficiency at rounts and call changes. Thes rimg regularly for the services of the Chapel, but, with two or three exeeptions, have not mastered the more afluanced method ringing.

Members of the Boston Guild arriving by train were too late to ring for service, hut immediately afterwards they assembled in the belfry, where thuy were joined thy the student ringers.

Bufore ringing on the tawer bells, however, handbell practice was carried out for ahoul twenty minutes. This was followed by a few short wouches of Grandsire 'liples on the tower bells. A move was Ihen made to the diaing ball, where the wisitors were entertainet to lunch, in company with the whole school.

On reluming to the tower, fiuild members rang several well-struck 120's of Grandsire Daubles, and when joined later by the student ringers, ahorl louthes of Triplen were rung. ## PRESENTATION TO DEVON GUILD'S EX-PRESIDENT.

REV. MAITLAND KELJY'S LONG SERVICES.
In recognition of his long and devoted services to the Devon Guild the Rev. Maitland Kelly, who relinquished the office of President last Whitsur, has been presented by the members with a handsome nddress. It is in the form of an album (beatutifully executed by Messrs. W. J. ## LOSTWITHIEL BELLS RESTORATION.

UNITED GATHERING FOR THE DEDLCATION.
The five bells which had hung for many years in the Church of Lostwithiel, Cornwall, have been recast and increased to six, and huag with all modern fittings in a new steel and fron frame, the work having been carried out by Messrs. Gillett aud Johaston, the well-known Croydon firm, and on Wednesilay, Decomber 10th, the borough was en fete in connection with the reopening. The dedication service was attended by the Mayor, the Gorporation afficials, and meabera of the Town Council; the procession to the church being headed by the Lastwithie] Town Band.

The service opencd with the lymm, "We love the plice, 0 God,' the get of dedication being periormed by the Rev. Stanley Windser, the Rural Dean of Bodmin. A few rounds having been rang upon the bells by the Lostwithiel ringers, the service proceerled with the hymn, 'Now thank we all our God,' followed by an address l'rom the Rov. R. D. Purves, at one time Vicer of Lostwithiel. Basing his remarks on the words, "The earth is the Loud's and the fulness thereof,' he painted ont that the bells had come to that tower because God had giren to the minds of man the power to search into the earth for the metal which was there long years beforc, to refine it, purify it, build it aud place it in the belfry. We were inclined ta say "Our Bells": they were God's bells because of tho metal which anme from God's earth. The ringers bedame fellow workers, with God. They would feel they-were doing a great work. They were Gorl's messengers, and when the sound of those hells went out Sunday by Sunday it would ge to the cars of the rich man as well as the poor, calling men and women of the parish to the service and worship of God. Every time the bells ploaled forth they tayghi a fremendous lessou; that those who worked for God should use the word 'we.' Their work had to be done in peace and in liarmony. If every ringer considered that he was going to set the time and each ringer lind a diferent jutea of time, there would be no harmony, but discord and clashing, and that taught them they must work in harmony, which who never more necessary than it was to-day.
Luncheor was afterwavds partaken of in the Drill Hall, and after the loyal toast liad been proposod ly the Mayor, Alderman J. A. Feswarick proposed "Ministers of Religion." After referring to the high place ministers of raligion took in everyday functions. the speaker saiti they heard a good deal in these days about flac union of the elurches. Possibly there were some people who had reversed tho telescope, and they saw that union affar off. Whether Ghtrch Union or organic union were far off or not, he know that the snirit of unjon was in their midst, 8 s whs evidenced by the united and felpfal service they lad had that morning, and demonstrated by (We assembly that afternoon, showing that there load been a anity of epirit prevailing throughont the whole of the procedings.
Responding, the Ficar remarked tliat cerfainly not only those who governed State affairs, but those who governed ecclesiastical aftairs found the difficulties tenfold more than they wore thirty yonrs ago. As he thought that the laily were shaned by the ministers so also he thought it was true that the ministers were shaped by the laity. In having a wirm-hearted laity they created atmosphere which made the work of ministers possible. Remembering that they all belonged to the common Lord, they got mily and warmth, and out of that they got what they saw in the perish to-ing. He concluded nis remarks with a reference to the splendid way in which everyons in the horougl, and some out of it, had workod well to make what they had that dey possible.
Also responding, the Rev. J. Highley Coles (Dnited Methodist circuit minister) raferred to the splendid spirit of the Yienr of Lostwithiel. It took most of them a lifetime to distinguish between their projudices and their convictions, and he was perfectly sure thak there was no lowering of their convictions in meding at that penind and Christian table. Fe wis sure they all wished the fiverly in Lostwithiel great prosperity, ant congratulated them on their most impressive service that morning.
During luncheon and Elaroumhout the day the belts were rung by bands of ringers from all parts of Gornwall, the ringers expressing their complete satisfaction wifh the "go' of the hells. The purity of the tone of the bells was greatly appreciated $\begin{aligned} & \text { Fy the inlabitants of }\end{aligned}$ the forougl, and the risitorg from the surrounding fistrict.

## COALBROOKDALE BELLS TO BE RESTORED. HROVISION FOR AUGMENTATION TO TEN

A scheme lats been set on foot for the complete restoration of the bells ab Coalbrookdale, Salop, and it is felt that many ringers who have had the pleesure of ringing on these bells and have experienced the hospitality of tho tower may like to contribute to the find, towards the completion of which another 5400 is required.
Seventy yoars ago Holy Trinity Church was built and endowed by the late Abralam Darby, and the bells were given by bis brotber, the late Alfired Darby. The bells, eight in number constitute a very good ring in the key of $E$ (tenor 19 owt. 2 qr .10 lb ), and, apart from some repairs to the gudgeons and iramework in 18s5, the betis bave had no attention from the founders (Messrg. Mears and Stainbank) or any ather firm of bell founders. They lave been attended to, rung and cared for all the years they have been in use by the ringers, and for the past 28 years Mr. William Saunders and his band have done all in their power to keep them in a satisfactory condition. Now the time bas arrived, when, in the opiaion of experts, the hells require immediate attention. It is thercfore necessary, say the committee irt a circular, to appeal for funds to place the belis in a modera fron and steel frame, and carry out many mecessary reaovabions and repairs, which will safeguerd the fower and bells, as the two main foundation beams, suppotting the whole weight of the bells, aro badly worm-caten and rotten. Also the whole of the present timber frame is worn out athl condemned. The committee feel the money can be easily raised, if all who hear the bells, all who enjoy their sound, and all who heve rung them, will undertale to give all they can, and to solicit all they can, for the Bell Restoration Fund. 'He gives twice, it is snid, who gives quickly.' All subscriptions will be immediately investod in War Saving Certificates, amal so will increase in value before the work is completed, but, on the otlter hand, they will be very gratefut to anyone who will scept a collecting book, and undertake to raise the cost of one or more War Saving Certificates within the next few monibs.
Sttberiptions mey be sent to the Wicar, the churchwardens (Messrs. H. Eugles and F. Johnson), Messrs. W. Saunders, Richard Jones (hon. treasurce), Alfred Bayley (hon. sectetary), any member of the Bell Restoration Commit*ee, or 'Goalbrookdale Bell Fumd, Lloyde Bank, Irom Bridge, Shropsbire.
Tho scheme proposes the complete restoration of the present eight, also the addition of two trebles, the old bells to be rehung in complete maw metal frame, ete., on one level. $£ 470$ is required for the restoration of the old eight, and to pat in pits for the trebles. It is hoper, however, that sufficient money will be forthcoming to allow the trebles to be added at the same time.
The fund up to date is well over $£ 100$. This includes fe25 from the patron (Mr. A. E. Darby), whose fathor 官ave the bells, algo 555. from Mr. Jolan Carter. The other has been given by the ringers and friends.
At a meeting of the Parochial Church Council and Bell Restoration Committec on December 9tb, wlien the Rev. Preb. C. B. Crowe (Vicar and Rutal Desu) presided, and was supported by the churchwardens and most of the in日uential church people, the Ghairman reported that the sub-committee had bcea very busy- A letter hy Miss Barah Barker lad been published in tho "Wellingtor Journal, and 1,000 illustrated circulars were ta hand for distribution. -Mr Greenlalely explained that he hoped to get the $£ 250$ worth of $1 s$ stamp hooks in a few days. After a report by Mr. W. J. Fleteter (foreman pattern maner for the Coalbrookdale Co.) hed been heard as to the dangerats condition of the main foundation beams and the wornout Erame, it whs decided that after the Christmas and last nigint of the old year ringing the bells should not bo rung again till they were completely restored.

It was proposed to ask tine editor of "The Ringing World " kind? to help the scheme by publishing the appeal and other information, so that all ringers who know Coalbrookdale, its nice bells and their loyal friends and ringers, will do all thay caz to get tle job going with the brighter days.

The work will bo entrusted to Messrs. Mears and Siainbank, the founders of the present cight.
