## THE OPPORTUNITY OF THE M.C.A.

The majority of the ringing societies will, we imagine, envy the position of the Midland Counties Association in their substantial surplus of funds. None other that we know of is at this moment in such a happy position that it can say that it has too much money. On the contrary, many of them have been unable to make ends meet, and only the other day we gave an extract from the Lancashire Association report which showed that the reserves of that large organisation were on the verge of disappearing. Circumstances are, of course, widely different in the various areas, but the reason of the Midland Counties Association's financial success is not far to seek. It is fortunate in having as its president one who is no mere figurehead, but a hard worker in the cause of the association. Coupled with this he has a position of infuence in the northern midiands, and his personal efforts have resulted in a large acquisition of honorary members, whose subscriptions have been largely responsible for raising the association's funds to their present high level. An equivalent of Aiderman Chambers is not available to every association, but we are convinced that much more might be dore by way of gaining honorary members than is done by many of the ringing organisations. The methods adopted are usually of a very casual kind, and yet it is realised that a society must have honorary members' support if it is to be free from financial anxiety.

The Midland Counties Association is now in the strange position (for a ringing society) of having to discuss how best to dispose of its surplus wealth, and in our report last week various alternatives were put forward. Among the suggestions, however, we did not notice any mention of educational work, such as the possession of funds would enable an association like the M.C.A. to undertake. The explanation of this may be that in this respect, also, the association stands in a singularly happy position in being able to get the work done without expense to the society. But if this is not the case, we should like to see some of the association's surplus funds earmarked for educational purposes, and by that we do not mean merely sending out an instructor to help a band of ringers master the rudiments of change ringing. We have often urged that associations should assist ringers, eitler in bands or individually, who are otherwise without the opportunity, to advance from the bottom to the top of the campanological ladder, and there is no doubt that both financially and in the possession of competent men for the task, the Midland Counties Association is in the position to carry out the experiment on a scale never yet attempted. How best the funds available could be (Continued on page 82.)

applied to this purpose is a matter for the M．C．A．to consider，but it now has a unique opportunity of starting a real educational scheme which would be of far greater value to the art than any trifling reduction of the mem－ bers＇capitation fee could possibly be and the giving of the suggested local autonomy will probably be found a useful step loward the carrying out of an＇educational＇ scheme．

THE 'PITCH’ OF BELLS.
A correspondent has asked us to what 'pitch' (or keynote) belp founders cast their bells.

We write subject to correction, but we believe it is a fact that English founders do not mako at preetice of exting bells to any particular piteh, unless requestod to do so, and the tuning of the kells depentis npon how they come from tho mouldis. A peal of bells might by chunce exactly agreo with a standard pitch, but more often than not they would be somewhere between high and low pilch. In naming the pitch the foumfers, we believe, use the nearest note according to concert pitch (i.c., high pitch). For instance, if the tenor of a peal is one-eighth to a quarter of a note flat or sharp of ' $F$ ' they would describe the peal as being in the key of 'F.'

## BELERY GOSSIP

Mr. R. Mayadrd, semr., who first handled a bell ropo in SL. Mary's toner, Walthamstow, in Seplember, 1865 , has runy fur 52 cousective yenrs (with one exception, when D.O.R.A. was in oporation) for the carly relebration of Holy Commution on Christr as Day and also on New Yerr's Live.
The peal at Oaklinm, reported elsewhere, was tho u'farewell " to Uncle" Joe E. Sykes, who sailed on Saturday for Manchuria, Asia, It is more than doubthal if lie will fand sny of lais tavourite 'Iorkshire Glory" in "hat part of the globe, bat bis absence will give "A. K.' fime to find the few remajning 'between' numbers, so that Joseple can complete his ambition on his retum.
Ninety years ago to-day the first peal of Superiative Surprise Major was rung. 'lhis was at St. Giles', Norwich.
tethe first peal of Lumaton Surprise Major on handbells was rung at Romford on Febranty 6th, 1904.
A wonderful fachicvement in Minor ringing for those early rays was accomplished at Bingley, Torks, on Feh. 7th, 1826, when six local men rang in one day thrge touches of twelve twolve-scoces each, comprising in all 8,640 clianges in 36 different methads.
The last survivor of the band, James Lilley, lived until the year 1879, when lie died at slipley at the ago of 74 yerrs.
Jolin Cox, one of the most moted ringers in London lanlf a eentury and more ngo, was buried at Nunhead Cemetcry forty yearb ago tomorrew.
The first peal of Forward Major was tung at St, Jolan's, Deritend, Birmingham, on Feb. 8th, 1889, composed and conducten by John Carter.

The College Youtlis rang a peal of 5,232 Treble Boh Maximus at St. Bride's, Fleet Street, on Feb. 9til, 1777.

February 11th is the anniversary of a terrible aedident at sit. Nicholas' Church, Liverpool, which happened in 1810 . It is thas recorded in the 'Farington Diary' for that year. 'On Sunday, Feb. 11th, the spire of St. Nicholas' Church, Liverpool, fell upon the roof of the church while the bells wero rimping for Divine service; 15 or 20 grown persons were in the clameln at the time, and of these the greater part escaped. The whole manber of bodies taken out of the ruins whs 27. Of these 22 werc cither dead or died immediately after their removal. They were chiefly girls, children of the Moorfield Charity School. The fall of the spare was supposed to be in consequence, of the bells being rung while the spire was undergoing a repair.'
On February 12th, 1821, a record lengith of Kent Treble Boh was accomplished at Oldbam, tho peal consisting of 14,016 changes rung in 7 houts 26 minutes.
The first peal of Cafers in two melliods was rumg last week at Neweastle, when a 5,133 in alternate hlocks of Stoxman and Erin was Jung. The composition was that by Mr. A. J. Pitman, publishet in 'The Ringing World' of December 26th, and Mr. W. Fi. Ferber (the conductor) and the band are lo he congratalated upon ringing a peal of this desoription at the first atempt.
The Parish Cinurch tower af High Wyconbe is now nndergoing repairs, and ringing has censed. It is foared the work will probably lake thite or even more monlis 10 complate. It is understoor that the Wracombe men intend to holrl an open ringing meeting, when it is again possible to ring the bells.

## TOO MUCH MONEY.

## THE PROPOSALS BEFORE THE M.C.A <br> To the Edifor.

Dean Sir, Tho relerance to surplus funds, ete, wh the account of the Matarnd Counties Asseciation at Long Haton in your issue of Jatuary 30 th is very misleading, as it gives an enlicely wrong impression of the business to be brouglat before the meetiug of the special committee, and I shall be glad if you will give me the opporiunity of explaining the siturtion.
The numbar of yingiag members in tho association is very large 736 at the end of 1923, aud, I'think, exceeding that number considerably at tho present time), the area from which these members are drawn covering the counties of Deiby, Leicester, Notinglan and Stalford, making it very inconvenient for menbers living near one side of tho area to atbend the quarterly meetings when held uear the opposite sjale, nud as the associntion is already divided into sevea districts (tor the purpose of callecting subseriptions and as gisting in the formation of the general committee) it must follow that in each year at least floree of these districts have no general mecting of the association in their particular area.
Cousidering the above circumatances add the inconvenience arising therefrom, it was thought by certain memhers that local goverament whould be given to each of these seven districts, who should each hold three quarterly meelings in their respective districts in each year al iheir owa expersc, learing the annual meetimg to he arranged by and at the expense of the central body who should do this and certain other things, funds permilting.
To provide the funds for the above, it was suggested that the central body should take all honotary and life members' subseriptions, and one-third of all ringing members' subsariptions, leaving the remaining two-thirds of the ringing members' subscriptions for the use of the districts in providing postage, advertisements, expeases of their meetings, etc.
If ihe above scheme is io lue carried through, new or allecations of existing rules become necessary, and for this purpose the sarae have been drawn up and submitted to the principal oflicers of the associnfions and the district secretaries, with notice that they would be proposed tht the mext anmual meeting.
In making the alterations in the rules to oover fle above, and no or two other minor suggestions, it was thouglat belter to redraft the whole of the riles, and, if possible, to pat them in a clearer or less ambiguous form.
It will be seen that the proposition is not that the eapitation fee he sixpence fuer nacmber, instead of one shilling and sixpence, but onethird of rall ringirg zuembers' subseriptions, which, with the subseriptions at one shilling and sixpence does work out at sixpence, shonid Fo to the Central Fund of the Association, Bui wont if the subscription was reduced to one shifling or raised to two? It do not think a rebate at the end of a finaneinl year showjng a profie very practicable or fair to the lardworking districts.
Now, it is far from me to wish to upset the association (it has no more loyal memiser), nor do I wisl to go conlrary to the majority of its members, of to do anylheng which would not be for the mutual benefit of us all, buti I am afrain from what lias heen said and written I am misunderstood, I hope not wilfully. I believe there are guilds and associations of rugers working on the suggested lines, motainy the Lincolu Diocesan Guild. I should be glad to know names Cotgrave.

The frame is a massive struefure of steel girders and rast iron, to hold eight bells, the infention being to add a treble and tenor at some future date. The present six are an intoresting and ancient ring.

## BELL HANGERS $\mathcal{E}$ 'ODD=STRUCK' BELLS.

 To the Rditor.Dear Sir,--In your issue of last week a speaker at a Cirencester weeting is reported ats laving expressud the opinion that 'the beilfoundars hatd brought the art of casting and hauging to perlicetion. As to the easting, 1 would not conlradict the speaker, bui 1 would like to tarike a little grumble about certain instanees of modern heli linugrg which 1 have come across.
A few years ago, the 'hoad.' of one of the leading firmas of bell lounders, speaking in my hearing, said that in his opinion the time was fast approaching when the heaviest of bells would be ring in changes with very little physical ciltort. Jee this as in may, 1 was rimging on a peal of bells recently roliung by the from alluded to ringing on a peal of bund found that the tenor, which had not bean zecast and which was miz "ofld-struck' bell, was lung sa thut its quick stroke was at hand-stroko, and its slow anc at back-stroke. Now, since I believe the practice af making a fatise before the lanat-strokn round change is a uriversal oue, mad since, if the bells are heing propezly struck, this pause must affect not only the leading bell, but each other bell ge well, I guit: fail to undershat why any boll hanger wio knows anything about our system of ringing sllould hane ia bell, al any rate a heary one, in this way.
to mako myself quite clear ahout ithis, let us suppose that eight bells are being rung, and that they are ringing at the rate of on round per two seconds, and giving a pause of a laiffeseond hetore each land stroke sad. «lisely is, 1 think, nbeut the customary thing (I was faught when learniug to make the pause equal to double the intermal beiween each bell during the round or change, whecher ringing on five bells or on (welre.) In this case, then. iwo and a half speonds will elapse between the back-stroke blow of a bell in rounds nand its ensuing land-stroke blow, but only two semonds before fis next backstroke blow. In the ease of the bell 1 have referred ta I should say that if jit wore fung nuil an equal pull given on each stroke it would give just the veverse of what is required for hand-stroke open leads.
1 have been told that such hells as $]$ ant referring io can be rung properly if slowly enongh. That is quite correct, bus even thep it is makiag the ringing more lahorions tham it need be; sacondly, the defeets in bells of poor quality ate mull move prostonneed when rung slowly, and, further, a much more skilful ringer is required to ring such a bell. Whisist I know that we have some bauds of ringers whe could rimg alnost to perfection a peal of bells, each bell of which was odd-struck, they are few and far telween, and in any case the aim of hell hangers should be to hang bells in sach a way as io make the art oi ringing them as ensy to accuire as is pessible. I wersid even go sa far as to advocate that bells slould not be cast so as to strike porfectly evenly, find that they sloould strike slighlitly quicken on the back-stroke ilian the hand-strake when lung.
I have been prompted to make this 'grouse' ' about the work of our bell hangers on necount of ilhe number of instances of heary bells beiug lung in the manner of which $I$ have complained, and because I realise thitt we lare thousands of bells which, although odid-struck, are too good in quality to be recast on that ateouma but which will at some time or other renuire the hell hanger's attention. Those bells, when rehumg, might just as well be luug in the manner best suited to the style of ringing, which las heen in eridence for longer than anyone living can recall (and for all I knots much langer than thati, is in the laplazard mamer T have found many to he--Yours faithfully

Sibid one euthusiast: - You should hear Birstald hedls. When we were there we had bexti up and rung a louch, and gol the bells down, put on oup coats, and came down into the ehrelhyard, abd when we got there we cotal hear the bells still liumoning.
Wher munt' said another, 'that's nowt. Tha should hear Oldham. When the ringers go there to ring at Sunday marning the trelts are jus, finishin' hummin' from i' sumbay hefore.' If there is any truth in this, Mr. Elitor, I think that Mr. Caroe's sfatement lian charels bells (or at least, inorlorn ones) are not musieal, is, to say the least of it, all exaggeration.-Yours, etc.,
