## THE LEISTON RECORD.

The record set up at Leiston Church, where one hundred peals in Surprise methods have just been completed, is a noteworthy thing. We have no information of so many Surprise peals being rung in any other tower, and we imagine this must be unique, although one or two places occur to mind where possibly, if the records were searched, it might be found that such a number had been rung. But such a list requires years of steady and persistent peal ringing, and we are really doubtful if any other tower can claim a similar performance. Of one thing, bowever, we feel quite certain, no other tower can claim peals in sucb a variety of Surprise Major methods, for the century at Leiston was made up of no fewer than thirteen different methods, and, when one thinks of it, this is really a remarkable achievement and is another to add to the records which this band can claim.

Leiston bas been fortunate in being able to maintain for a long period a band of able and enterprisiog ringers, of which the backbone has been the broLhers Bailey. What has been done by this band is something more than the ringing of a considerable number of peals; they have shown that on eight bells, as on six, ringers can introduce extensive variety into what they practice. As we have often remarked before, it is really surprising how little ringers go outside the common track to find diversity in the art. It is not that other methods are not worth ringing--there are mady that are-but even Surprise bands who are regularly practicing rogether seldom get away from what one may be excused for calling the 'big four' of the Surprise category. These four methods are so well established among ringere that their claims to first consideration are unlikely to be displaced, but where there are opportunities for introducing variety we should like to see the ringers show a somewhat more enterprising spirit.

Although these remarks are prompted by what has been done in Surprise ringing at Leiston, they apply equally to ringing in less difficult metbods. As we pointed out only a few weeks ago, there is an interesting series of plain Major methods for those who can ring Double Norwich ; indeed the group whicla has been put into practice at Willesden forms an easy stairway from Plain Bob upward, and those who really take a delight in their ringing should apply themselves to these methods. Not so easy, but even more interesting, are some of those ratber complicated odd-bell methods evolved from Stedman and Erin by Mr. J. W. Parker. We still await the performance of a peal in one of these methods, which in their complexity look worthy of the time and attention of the most advanced ringers. They form a new world to be conquered, and the first to conquer it will bave gone a step beyond their fellows.

It began with the report of the dedication at Eyethorne, whercin it was asked, with justifiable pride regarding the two ancient bells in that tower, if any other church possesged two beils wwich lad nevar bean vecast of earlier diates.
Our Eythorne friend, in giving details of the inscriptions, saye: The inscriptions un the betis are as follows ':-

4th. SANETA: KATHERINA: ORA: PRO: NOBIS.' W. JORDAN, 1470.
'Tonor-- NOMEN : MAGDALENA: CAMPANA.' W. JORDAN, 1470.

The invoctory chnuacter of ille 4th inscription is in perfect keeping witlz thu perjoul, so is also the inseription on the tenor. One would assume that the Iatter was at its dedication given the name of the patronal saint, to which the churela is nedicated?
Doubl, howevel, exists in my mind concerning the founder's name anc data being inscribed on the bells. It is possible, but rery innprobalale, when we consifer the peried. Perlans your Eytherne corresponcent will make that point clear, as it is of great importance to anyone who indulges in 'bell lunting' ; possibly that information whs callated from a documentary record or source.

Oh Fes, whey both came from the hands of the same founder ihs quaint fleury stop, following the word PRO, on the treble, atad here again it is reprodtced on the second bell following the sacred monogrank, and ance again it follows the word Ring (REX).
But what about the date of founding ? That is to be arrived at partly by the Old English on the treble, which proves that they were not cast before 1400. Sec, the tenor las unfortunately been recast in the gear 1614 by Ohdield, of Nolts What a pity ! what a pity!
Now. let us get down into the church agein from amid the dirt ant grime of past conturies.... El, gutio, just sniff! What a trong perfume of paraffin! Ah! that reminds mo, keep clear of the 'raeter'! it's at the battom of the tower steps.
Come this way, here we have at the cast end of the north aisle, phated in the foor. a collection of encaustic tiles. Thege tiles were made and fashioned by the Premonstratensian Canons of Dale Abbey. 7hoy ware fired at the king br those Norhertian Monks. whose ashes aro crumbling to dust amid the ruins of that once stately pile.
And see, what a raziety of designs are imprinted, from a simple initial letter, to the finest heraldic 'conts' of Lancaster. Grey, Beaumamp and 7ouch. But, lere we are, thic is the ane of most interest It us on 'thits' bell-hunting expedition. On this tile we lave in Rampant Lion lineally crowmer upon a shield ; the shield is canted. so that three bells may be placed within the margin. Yes, the pious Monks of Dalo designed and fred that tile to commenaorate JOHN STATHUMS' munificent gift of three bells to Morley Chureh!
Now. reader, leave those conaustie tiles, and let us examize this slab of Purbeck marble. Tou will see if had originally several lurases lef into it: most of the lueraldic shields are missing, but on this efaborate portion, Joln Stathum is represented in armour; barehoaded, and kneeling on bis belmet. Opposite, lis wife Cecily is representerl clan in a loose robe, kmeding also.
Now let us read the inscription, it is in Engligh, and records Statlhames gifts to the church and poor of the parish of Morley- We toht as follows: "Fere lieth John Stathum, Squyer sometime Lorde onf this towne and Cecily his wite; which yat, to yis clurche fij belles

pore folk of 55 prasli 1 ye day of ye Obit of Dame Godych sometine Lady of js lowne. Ie said John dyed ye $j \mathrm{j}$ day of Novembre ye yere of our Lord MCCCCLIIJJ-and yo said Cicely dyed $\bar{y} \boldsymbol{e}$ zavth day of April we year of arr Loril MCCCCLXIIIJ, of whos sowles God have mercy. Amen.

Hore wo have sufficient proof that Morley bells were cast previous to 1454 so rest content they are, also slighty earlier than the mediavals at Eythorne-and, reader, they still are

## BELLS IN MUSIC. <br> By ROBIN HOOD.

To imitate the sowd of bells with fle instruments of the orchestra is admittedly dificult, and sucls imitation is ravely attempled. Composers of music for any instrument are fresuently required to illustrate bells, the principal medium being the octave of tubular bells, familiarly known as 'gaspipes," or the gonge usually found among the effects of the drummer. 'L'he writer remembers, ats a child, singius iu a then pophian temperauce cantata in which the aty of "Caller Gerrin' " was miapted to the following words :-

I love a merry peal of bells,
Of hope and joy their music tellg,
When travelling homeward wearily
They grect us cheerily.
Fark! 'tis the bells of the village ehurch,
How pleasantly they strike on the air,
How merrily they riug.
The Brooklyn Comedy Fout, a combinution travelling the thallis a few years ago, diaz a splendid vocsl imitation of an un-Simpson tuned bell, the waves of harmong being very realistic, aud must have cost hours of practice. The usual method of including a bell in the orchestra is to fif its oceasional strokes to the larmony, as in Marilana " (Alas those chimes!'), 'Il Trovatore' (Miserere scene), and the - Yeomen of the Guard, (execution scene). A much more effective number is the organ solo ly Forsman, entitled the 'Curfew.' This is a wonderfully beautiful tone poem, illustrating a calm summer eveaing, accentuated by the recurring strokes of the curfew boll, played on one note of the carillon stop in the organ.
Then we lave passages of music undoubtedly inspired by the composers' knowledge of English ringing. The church parade for troops is usually preceded ly a composition, entitled 'Hark! the merry Clitist Ohturch Bolls, " 12356 ;" the numbers being the correct sequence of a peal of six. A six-bell change also ocours in the hymn, " There is a blessed home," curiously enough, repeated, as for n whole pull, this phrase also being employed by Mr. John Carter in his humorons sidit on change ringing. "The scolding witch.
Sir A. Sullivan was a known lover of bells, and probably change rimging had its eftect on the very numerous diatonic melodies which literally poured from his pen. I have heard the chimes of Big Ben reproduced over the 'wireless' on the piano so realistically as afmost to deceive, and 1 heve seen them scored in one selection with fearful diseords and an explanation that such discords were included to give the proper effect.
Then we come to the carillon effect. There are dozens of these. and they make rery attraetive ftems, being often ciever and ingenious adaptations to the orehestra of the oatave of tubular bells. The opera entitled 'Ies Cloches de Corneville." is too well known to escape notice. This also is a carillon device, played dither on the glockenspiel or celeste, hut the charch at Conneville possesses no such bells, here being only two indifferent ones, quite incapsble of doing justice to Planquette's melody. The Whittington change on eight bells occurs completely in Mendelssohn's 'Ruy Blas' overture. though there is no evidence that the composer received any suggestion from hearing it at any time. Gounod cewainly betrays infuence in the accompaniment to his "Angeltis.

Regarding Tchaikowskr's "1812 Overture, frankly I am puzzled. Dín he write the tell ofigato as played by British bands? I think not. The usual method of expressing joy through bells on the constiners is a pandemonium of jangling, and not the well-ordered sequences of our own isle. In fact, outside Belgium, bells in any number are rare. Anyway, our methoi of treating the overture is no more bizarre than that of the composer's, who introduces into an '1812' episode a melody nof composed untsl 30 years lster.
The best rlescriptive hell song that I have heard up to date is min entitled 'I heard the bells at crentide.' It is not an ambitious numher by any means, bust the composer has gone one better than most descriptive composers in this particular task. Now the final ithestration is, perhaps, the figest, and it would be difficult to find a better piece of tono painting. Massenst was a prolific composer, and quantity of production offen spells porerty of quality. Still, we have a gem in the 'Angelus' from 'Scenes Pittoresgue.' An atmosphere of praver pervades the whole number. The three bell notes, the first tbree notes of an octape, are given out by the horns, with a running accompaniment by vialins (or clarinets in the military band running by the orchestra possible. No perfect and poetic illistration of belle oy the orchestra possible. No one can listen to if wilhout acknowledging its fidelity to its title.

A seuvice was held, and whs of a singularly appropriate character. The lymas, lsalin and lesson, as well as tha prayers, all emphasised the importance of musie it chureh worship, and the shotit address of the Rechor (Ltic liev. lly. Greenwood) was on similar lines. After the service, the company went to the Parish Roon for tea, at the conclution of which a short business meeting was presited over by the Res, R. H. Gundry, of Shroton (chairman of the brathels, and Ringing Master of the Guild).
A hearty vote of thanks was passed to Dr. Greenwood for inviting the branch to Bfandford, and for allowing them the tse of the tower andi beils. They also thanked him for his address in the elarch, in whicle he hat splendidly pitt before them tho exacl objects of the Guild. They also thanked Mr, G. W. Essex, the organist, for his serrices at the orgnn. The Chairman amounced a Ietter of apology for absence from the Rev. R. E. P. Goringe, of Manston, secretary of the brancli, who was laid aside with an attack of lumbago.

The names of several new members were sdded to the Guild, and the election of the Blanford band of ringers was received with applatse.
Replying to Dr. Greclwood, the Clairman said the Guid existed for the purpose of encouraging change ringing. It was quite unmecessary thak, any should wait until they were clange ringers before they joined. If a band of ringers wished to learn the scieatific method of change ringing, the Guild woulfi instruct them in twelvo lessons free of cost.

Tonches were also rung in the evening on the bells of Bryanston and Durweston Churches, each of whith contains a peal of six.

CHELTENHAM BIRTHDAYS.
Un Saturday cwening, Fels. 28th, the company of the Parist Church ind St. Mary's Guild of Ringers, Chelvenlam, met to celebrate the himiludays of the captain, Mr. W. T'. Pates, who was bora Vebruary $28 t \mathrm{~h}, 1853$, and Mr. W. A. Humphris, born February 26thr 1865.

At 7.30 the ten bells were raised in peal, and touches of Stedman, Grandsire and W. T. Pates' combinations of methods were rung, after which the captain invited the campany to the spot where ringers sometimes congrogate, when past birthalays were recalled, and tho opportunitios of young ringers of to-day were discussed.
Mr: Pates called the record peal of Grandsire Caters in 1889, having nefor called a bob' in the method before that tay, while the long peal of Sterman Caters in 1888 was his firsi peal as conductor. The young members of the company are proud of their captain, for the devotes at great deal of time ab his residence tenching them how to call touches, brimging bells round, explaining "in and out of course,'

Mr. Pates rang his first peal, Holt's Original, on July 21st, 1876, conducted by the late C , Hounslow: Mr. Humpliris, Holt's Ten-Part, at. Upton, St. Leonari's, August 6th. 1883, in which Mr. Pates took pert. Messrz. Sid Haywnrd and W. Fick wero unable to take part in the birthlay ringing, but the former was able to join the company later in the evening.

It. would be very nice if more evenings of the same sort could be spent. They arco thorongliy interesting to young ringers, who thoroughly enjoy finding out ahotut the various melhods whels are digcussud at suel gatherings.

## A BATH ABBEY MEMORIAL.

The ringing incluted 216 Grandsior Caters by C . W. Bell I, Miss Willinms 2. W. Temple 3. T. Grant 4, A. Princo 5, E. King 6. Rev. F. Ll, Forwaris 7. W. J. Prescott 8, Cr. Hariling (emmbelor) 9. T. Fogsfesla and IL. W. Frown 10.

## DUMB=BELE APPARATUS.

To the Editor.
Dear Sir,-A furthec refercace to the above (as quoted by Mr. G. P. Hurton in your Iazt issue) is to be faund in Dr. Raven's 'Charch Bells of Dorset, Which work I am fortunate in possessing, through the gencrosily af Mr. C. H. Jennings, of Wyke Regis.
" In the "Antiquary " for Octaber, 1903, is a short article by Mr. C. Ensenhiglt Corke on an ancient dumh-boll, from which, by permisaion of the nuthor and edito some extrats fand illustrations are taken. Some I wetve years ago Mr. Corke was nuch puzzled by hearing the housckeeper at Knowle speak of thu Damb-Bell Gialery. He went to the nltic, which bore this name: it "was unfurnished and empty, exeapting that in the middle of it stoorl a cutiaus wooden machine resembling a windlass. A rope was wound round tle middle of the roller, nand at each end were four iron nums, each with a poise or ball of lead at eacli cod. The rope formenty passed througla a hole (which still exisls) in the floor into the Leicester gallery below. A persom, by palling the rope in this gallery, woud cause the roller with the iron arms poised with learl Ho revolve at fhe first pail, and the impetus given would rewmul the rope again, and so continue to wind and anwind at eacls pull, thus giving the same exercise as that of ringing a hell in a clurch tower, except that it was ooiseless." "
The attic, or dumb-bell gallery, forms part of the additions made af Krole by Thomas Sackwille, first Earl of Dorset, 1603-8, iu Jacobean atpte of architecture, rehult upon the shone bamement which is 15th century work. This might suggest the approximate date of the madhine, whien is very old and decayed.
The fate Chancellor Fergison, F.S.A., to whom a photograph ancl description were given fully concurred as to the derivation of the anme given lo smaller dumb-hells, and Sir Fenry Diyden attributend il to the 17 th century, when beti ringing was part of a gentleman's palication and practice.'
Joln Nothbrooke, in a treatise ngainst "Diceing and Dancing,' 1577, snys: - In the reign of Queen Eliznhetl: the progress of building in lonalon was likg an jnundation: it overfowed the ancient fields anl vacant spaces within and around the cily, so that tily yards, slonting grounds and racecoursea were covered with streets and nlleys, and thus active civic sports were of a necessity in a great degree laid fiside. As a substitute for these heathful exercises, young gehtlomen were exhorted to lahour in their chambers with poises of loall-that is, to exercise with rlumb-bells. -Yours simcerely,

Tea was served in the Temperance Cafe at Groft Spa, when 23 sat down, Mr. C. Todd, the president, being in the chair. The following towers were represented : Darlington (St. Joln's and Holy Trinity), Newcastle (Cathedral and St. George*s), Tanficli, Staindrop and Hurworth. At the meeting after tea, one honorary and four active members were elected.

The President expressed the sentimen of all by congratulating the Fiev. A. W. Lister (one of the vice-presidents), now curate of Tanfield, upon his hecoming Rector of St. Steplen's, South Shields. He was sorry St. Stephen's had no bells, and hoped Mtr. Lister would be able to alter that.

Slipp, of Staindrop, upon the death. at the age of 84 , of his father, Mr. Daniel Shipp, who was one of the original members of the Durbam anki Newcastle Association, when it was formed in 1877 as the Durham Association. It was in 1882, when the diocese of Newcastle was Cormed, that the name was changed to the Durhan and Newcastle Diocesals Association.

The President expressed the feelings of all when he deplored the fact that Mr. Shipp liad not lived to see the old ring of six at Standrop (which he had loved and rung for upwardg of half a century) rehung and augniented to cight by the Loughborongh firm.

Mr. H. Shipp remined thanks, and said he would convey the sentiments of the meeting to his brother, Mfr. J. W. Shipp. He said he hat come to the meeting armed with an invitation from the Ficar of Staindrop for the association to try the hells on Easter Monday. The hells are to be dedicated by the Bishop of Durlam at evensong on Palm Sumday. Thev fill he rung on Easter Sunday. and be onen for ringing on Easter Monday.

## BELERY GOSSIP.

The first peal at St. Martin's-in-the-liolds was rung on March 14th, 1727. Tlie church had been consecrated on Oatolecr 26th, 1726 , and it would seem that the London Scholars wero enfilled to a lirst ciaim on the bells for a peal, for they were the first anceessful band. Their peal was B,006 Grandsiro Oinques. Only two other peal perfamaneus by the Loudon Scholars are recorded.
Ou the day following the peal above mentioned, the Coltege Youths rang a peal of 6,314 Grandsire Cimques at St, Martin's, "being the longest that was rung.' 17. Amable conducter this peal, aud Roberi Catin, a well-known London bell founcler of that lime, also took part in the peal.
On Mareh 14th, 1837 , a peal of 10,133 Grandsire Gaters was rung in 5 hours 54 minutes at Christ Church. Bristol.

A peul of 10,080 Bob Major was rumg at Dubenham in 6 hours 1 minute on Mareh 16tli, 1767.
The first peal of Violet I'reble Bol was rung at St. Peter's, Hutl dersfield, on March 16th, 1767.
A peal of Duffield Maximus was rung for the first time on March 17th, 1891. This was af St. Marthn's, Binningham.
The weight; of the tenor at Mells, Somerset, is 26 ewt., not 12 cwl , as published last week.

On March 11 th, 1887, J. C. Mitchell, W. II. L. Buckingharn, C. F. Wiuney aud G. T. Mclaughen, of the College Youths, rang Holl's Original 'non-conducfed' on handhells, at the Goose and Gridiron, City. This was the first time this hand been done.
The peal of Stuperlative at. Soberton on February $28 t h$ was the first peal in the methad by R. Linter, F. A. Buractit and T. It. Taylor, and it was also G. Pullinger's 50tir pen.
Mr. I'ullinger, who is secretary of the Winchester tuild, lost an arm in the war, but his managenent of a bell is really wanderful.
In connection with the dedication of the recast peal of ten Rotherhan Parish Clurch next Wednesday, notice is given that itue bells will not be open for ringing by visitors except from about live o'clock to 6.45 p.m. The local band are jssuing the anaouncemeni save disappointment to ringers in the district.
'IThe new bells at Shilton, nenl Coventry, are to be wealicated on Salurday, Mareh $28 t \mathrm{l}$, at 3.30 p.m.
While complimenting Mise Foulk upon the peal she rang at Duit field, Mr. Biggin vrites hant glte whs not the first Derbyshire laty to ring a penl in the county. This distinclion belongs to Miss Elsie Smitly, of Norton, who rang in a peal of Bob Major for the Yorks Association at Norton on Nar. 18tl. 1922, and a peal of Biob Major at North Wingfield for the Midland Courties Associafion on March 102 ln, 1923.

Otfaw is to share with New York the distinction of possessing one [ the two fargest cavillons in the world, os the Dominion Government of Canadr has just pluced with Messms. Gillett and Johnston the conHact for a magutifent carilion of 53 bells, to bo identical wilh that for the Purk Avenue Baptist Clucela, New Fork, which is now noarjus completion at the Croydon Foundry, this second aarillon being inslallation in the Fietary Tower of the new Houses of Parliausent of Dttawa,
Mossig. Gillett und Johaston have atso secureri the order for the large clock whiclt is to ciriwe the bands of the four 16[t, diameter dinls and to chime the Wrestminster Quarters, and strike the hours on the 9 -ton bell.
The position and setting of a marillon aro of wital jmportance, and ilu would be difficult to imagine a more ideal campanite for these bells than the Otiawa Yictory Tower. If great laeight and elevation, fommanding a wonderful panorama of thas city of Ottawa, the Ottawa River and the Gainenu Hills, ensure that the Gells are effectively hourd over a lacge acea, wille architectare of the tawer is of wonderful heanty and its position on the summit of a hill surrounded by quiet parks and terraces provikles an audilorium from which the music of the carillon can be heard to the best possible advantage. Thae loity belfry is about 180 feet above the ground level, and in this the bells will bo arranged lier upon tier in such a way that as the passenger elewator travels upwards to the Observation Gallery escry bell will be visible, while the works of the great clock will be dipplayed in a large glass case in the centre of the clock chamber. Ih is interesting to mote that Messrs. Gillett and Johnston supplied the clock and bells in the tower which was destroyed by five when the origiaal Houses of Parliament were burat down.

On Saturday, vingers from valians parts of Essex assembled at Brnintree far the purpose of unveiling and dedicating a peal board which liad been erected in the tower of flee Parisls Church to record peals of 5,000 changes and upwards in each of the following surprise methods: Bristol, Cambridge, Superlative and London. At 4 p.m., the Vicar of Braintuee the Rev. G. P. Bassett Kerry, R.D.., who was tobed, proceederi to che riuging rhamber of the church, whieh is approadled by a long and hearly vertieal ladder from the foom at the tower, and iliere found a large number of ringers resembled. Before the ceremony commenced, Mr. C. H. Howard, Master of the Essex Association, staked the object of the meeting. The purpose of the peal hoard was, he said, to record successinl peals being rugg in four of the most difficult and complicated methods in hiajor elazinge ringing, and turther to act as au incentire to those who come after to aspirc to the ringing of those higher methods. He mentioued that the bonad had been made, and beautifully mritien and painted, ty one of the ringers, Mr. A. W. Coles, of Briston, aml had heea subscribal for entirely by those whose names apparred upon it. The peal of Bristol was conducted hy Mr. Wh. Pye, of Lertanstone, and the other thee hy Mr. W. Keeble of Kelvedon, both of whom ranked anong the ablest conductors in the kingdom.
The Yicar of Brainttee commenced by reading Psalm 84, and offered an appropriate prayer. Aftrmwads, he dedicatwed the board "in the failh of desus Clurist and to the Glovy of God, and then pronounced the Benedicion.
In thanking the Vicar for arranging the zeryiee, Mr. W. H. Dysetr district secretary, Nothern Division, stated he considered the service whs unique iu the history of Braintree Charclı, which dated from 1199. He believed that was the fivst time a service had ever been couducten in the belfry by the Vicar of the parish, robed.

The original edition, I see, is still on sale; mad I turt that, even in this age of rapid change and forgetfulmess, the memory of Mr. Rabinson's wort for the chuse of change ringing and belfry reform nay be preserved in as many belfries and elured tibreries as possible. lt wis indeed a remarkable work. To quote the words of a preachar an the Sunday ufter his funemal: 'In the art of bell ringing he used all bis powers for the glory af God. Only those who kuew the condition of beliries fifty vears ago eould realise the influence of Mr . Robinsoln, rmong oblecrs. In former fays, the parson's presence in has bedfy was often rogarded as an intrusion; and tho ringers seldom attended church, or consitered it a necessary part of their work. Now, the belfry has been consecrated to the worship of Gon; the ragers are regarded as clureh workers; the clergy are welcomed in the belfry, aud profitency las been maised to a higher level.'
