## THE EXPERTS AND THE EXERCISE.

From time to time one bears complaints that space in - The Ringing World ${ }^{\text {r }}$ is given up to the arguments of 'experts' which might be better devoted to other use. Such a suggestion was publicly made at the recent Birmingham dinner, and, looked at from the point of view solely of those who bave no interest in the theoretical side of ringing, and no immediate concern in its evolution, we can fully appreciate that there are many ringers to whom discussions on method building or method extension, for instance, make no appeal, and that they would prefer to see other matter than this in our columns. The reason, we believe, is mainly two-fold. First they do not really understand the subject, and therefore cannot get interested; and the second there seems to be very few among the fundamertal principles upon which the experts themselves agree, and consequently the a verage ringer imagines that it is waste of time to try and follow their arguments.

On the first point there is little to be said. Withont understanding there cannot be interest-and we say this without the slightest disrespect to anyone. There are a great many ringers who are satisfied with the pleasure they can get out of the practical side and they have neglected their 'education,' so to speak, of the other phase of the art; hence they cannot get any interest in the discussion of what are to them abstruse problems. For the second point, it must be admitted, there is some justification. We have the experience, year after year, of seeing men who have made a lifelong stady of the subject disagreeing on the most essential prisciples. Who, then, can be blamed for the fog in which many find themselves when, with little or no actual knowleage, they try to disentangle the facts, and then arrive at the conclusion that the subject is not worth pursuing?

There is, bowever, another side to the matter which 'The Ringing World 'does not overlook. While those who concera themselves only with the practical phase of ringing are content with the knowledge which they already possess, it is not sufficient for the future of the art rhat endeavours further to elucidate its mysteries should be smothered, merely because the experts themselves do not agree, or because the subject does not make a general appeal. Upon the research of to-day will be fousded the facts of to-morrow, and even out of a spirited disagreement some student may gain a crumb of knowledge which will lead to a wider and more intimate acquaintance with all that underlies the science of change ringing. The material of these discussions may not, indeed cannot, interest everyone; the temper of them may not always be all that could be

How simple the whole matter is, when one knows, can be illustrated by my giving the complete set of Round Blocks in Leek Hajor, together with the transpositions which prove tho theory to we sound and true, aut also flat Leck Major, as well as being unigue in its qualities, is next 10 the primary pringiples the most simple Irinciple ever discovered:


If will be noticed that from the halfway trausposition row, underEned, the transposition rows raverse, aud rounds is the last row; this is a fenture of all symmetrical methots, in asymmetrical methods rounds will not turn up
The haffay fransposition row ilself is in coursing order a further proof of the beatiiful simplicity of Leck Major which aren Boh Major does not possess, the halfwny transposition row in the lather method being 24567183 from which by adding extra pairs of lyells a mathematical progression can be obtained to infinity
Nothing further need he said of Leck Major, the method will, I an sure, commend itself to any band who onres to practice it

## THE CRITICISMS OF 'CRITICUS.

 SOLVING A PROBLIM-SHALL THE 'STANDARD' GO? -TREEMASONTY-LONDON RINGTNG.May one ask, just once again, if our experts are ever going to agrees over nuything ' Porsonally it anuses me to see them abtiempling to 'shyy' ono anothor, but it, does not seam ba lemi us anywhere nenrer a solution of the problems which they seem anable to unruvel to erach ahler's satisfaction. Insteded of being the jury which should decide these questions for us, they ate comsel whose avowod object is to pull one another's case to pieces. This is probably a congenial task, but what we, as, ringers, want is to know the trubly about these things. Can we not do what, I believe, the law provides for when juries are obstinato. slut them up together until they agree? - if it coulf tho lone without food, or fire or bed, so much the quicker in eflectiveness. Then wa should get a verdiet. Ii might bo only an accommorlation dic, and it might we no more satis factory than the bistorie decision of not grilty, but don't do it agains" but je it get the wranglers at restond gave us somo indica tion where wo rually nre in some of lhese matters: if it told us, for finstance, whether we are really bark the the duys of Probian Stedman or Annable, or whether we nue in fle $20 t h$ century, it would be something gained.
If, howerer, the slatiing up-in the bodily and not in the corre spondence sense-is imprrebicathe, I shall feel it ought to be possibie for tha Central Council to sati up some trincl of court of referees, who could hear the arguments of looth sides, and come to a decision which would be anceptable to the nverage man. One ean no mord expect men witls a divergence of viows, such as we linve recenty read, to agree, than litiganis in a law action, and the onily common sonse way out of the impnsse seems to ma to be an independent body to arrive at a judgment after considenisg the arguments. The loser would not, of course, be salisfied, but he could be deberred from inticting hig views again on the Exercise until he had some new evidence to suppori his contention. Now fow is that for a workable plan to settle these disputes, and what will the Central Council do about it?

Rending, lest week, the listi of Mr. Trollope's peals made me wonder who can claim the biggest varinuy of methods rung in his poal collection? Probably the banour gaes to one of those Clueshire men who have put three dogen or so into one pent, but evaryone will agrec that, considering he has only rung two peals on five nad six bells Mr. Trollape's is a goodly collection. Those " three-dozen-a-time" men, howerer, put loops romal the majorits of us, who stick in the siodgy rut of the "Standard" methods. Whinh leads one to ask. what really are the "Standar?" methonts? We know that in the old days, when Surprise ringing was looked upon as a 'crazk' job ilve standatd' was Grandsire, Plam Bob, Treble Bob and Stedman. Efen poor old Double Norkich was outsite the pale. That 'standard' was all right fifty years ago, but wheq the word, as applied in this cose, mans that which is authoritatively eatablished as a rule: that which is establislied by public opinion or custom, then we ollght to bring our group of methods more in ling with modern practice. Double Norwich and tho four comnonly rung Surprise methods ought certainly to ln included when the tern "Standard methods' is used. but probably the best solution of all is to drop entirety the word 'stardard' in this connection. Can we have a reommendation from tlio Council, plesse?
What are we going to do about this sumgested Freemason's Lodge for ringers? I hope ilhis prophenl is thot going to be allowed to ent in words. The suggestion of the Rocorder of Linaoln ought to develop into something really good. There are mans ringers in the craft, and a lat more would no doubt come in undel such congenial conditions: indeed, methinks Aderman Pritchett, whose services to the craft lave brought him sienal honours, wonla probably do an eved greater service to Freemasonry than any he has erer done (if the introduction of new members courts in the scale of service) by putting this lodge on its feet-or, onght I to sidy, laying the foandntions and building the superstructure. I nom not suffeiently versed in the 'rules and regutations' of the Order to express an opinion as whelner sucla a thing is possible, lum $I$ nuke the suggesfion that the louge, althougt it may be founded in London, or Birminghan, or some other big cenfere, sloult have itincranf. powers, so that it might meet in varions parks of the counfry and so be within reach of many who could not oflerwise attent its meetings, but who would, nevertlicless, like to be in actual associntion witll ib: Go ahcad, Alderman Pritchett; you will have a big luacking in this scheme-and there is nice time now between this nad the next banqueting season. J have noticed iately, in one or two cases, that searetarims are complaining of umpaid subseriptions. The litite depression of these daye is, no doubt, to be blamed for a grood many of these arrears, for nmemployment is, unlappily, as rampant anong ringers as anf other class. At the same time 7 am ruite sure there is n good deal of unnecossary delay in paying their conliributions on the part of some who ought to know better. Subscripifons to ringing sqeieties are not a leavy exaclion, and there onght not to be tise difficulty in collecting them that I nim aftaid is only too ofien the ease. As-
socistions cannot carry on willout funds－I slall be told that all ringers know khas．My reply is：Then why do they not sce that tue funds are provided prompliy，not wait for the poor secretary to drag形 out of then．IIe pays twioe who pays quickly，they say，and it wuald be well if same of the sluggards took this proverls to hearl．
Chere is greal competifion for the use of the only two twalve－beld towers in London where peals may be rung with any frequency，and the rivalry does not ereate any too friendly it spirit． 1 onIy hope that the aumerous peal attempts on the firoous bells of Bow will not ullimately result in the same thing happening there as appears to hare lapyened ati Cornhill．This latter chimrel was at one time con－ stanlly accessible for peals，but the prosent position there is just the reverse－the almost inevitable result of＂overdoings it in the leart of a great city．I suppose I shall lue tolt that，so long as the church authorilies are willing to give permission，there is no need to decline the opportunity aflorited．Tliat is frue，but what if presencly there comes a reaction－as it has come in regard to other towers If anything of thaf kind happens at Bow and South－ wark it will be a sorry day for the twelve－bell pealers of London． london has enough twelve－hell ringers to uso ull the eight towers in moderation，bat the present position of affairs drives all the peal ringing into about three of them，and my fear is that sooner or later even these wil！be rlebarred for this purpose．Mhat incleed would lye n eatastrophe．
And，winle touching upou London ringing，ante camot help notic－ ing how the London Coonty Association is losing the characteristic which brought it，as the St．Janes＇s Society，into existence．Some of tus are old enough to rememker when it was really the common meeting ground of tie two old Lonton Societies．Now，while it is frue that its membership embraces members of both the Colifge and Camberland Youtiss，if is becoming，if it lias not already become，an enlimely separate society，with no specially distinctive character．I holieve that originally peals rung ly the St．Jawes＇s．Sociely jad to be low bands of half from the College Youtles and half from the Cumberlands，but I dayesay there are peals rung for the society tonday br men who are members of neither．But be that as it may． those who like to see the old traditions upheld regret to see how the Tastion Countw Association，vigorous as it now is，has departed，in spiril，if mot in letter，from the intentions of the original founders．

## BELFRY GOSSIP.

An attempt for a peal of 7,392 Cambidge Surprise Haximus is to be made at Bow Church, Cheapside, London, on Satarday, by metrubers of the Middlesex County Associndian nad Landon Diocesan turid.
Apart from their weight (the tenor is 53 ewt.), Bow bells any a difficult peal to xing, and die lask hefore the Mindesex mentomorrow is at very big one.
The Parish Church, Kingston-on-Chames, where a penl was rung last Saturday-the first for something like seven years-overiooks thi spot where, in the courso of the tenth century, seven Saxon king were crowned. The stone upos which the ceremony took place in preserved on the site.
The bells are a mised lot, the earliest dating from 1748, but thern were eight there before that time, for the inscriplion on the presumb eight records, 'The 8 old bells recasf, and 2 new trebles nedded to make X Ey subscriphions.- S . London, S. Belchier, collectors, 1748.
There were' Fywo great belles in the steple a sauns hell and at chyme for the belles' in Wdwrrd VI's roign, and records of paymeats in connection wilh the bolls are to be found in the Kingston Town sccourts as far back at 1503.
In 1535 and 36 there is ne catry that one of the bolls fell. There are clanges for mending the bell, and the 2 ad and 3 urd belis were reonst at Reading.

A peal of 6,876 Graulsire Caters was rung at New College, Oxford, on Match g2nd, 1734. Another and longer peal in the sarme method rung at Osford was the 10,008 Grandsire Caters at Now College on Merch 27th, 1815.
A peal of 7,104 Treble Bab Maximus was fong al St. Saviour' Southwark, by the Cumberland Youthy on Marcil 22nd, 1802.
On March 23 rd , 1887, a peal of $8,0 \mathrm{O} 0$ Grandsire Cinques was rung at 5 t. Martin's, Birmingham, in 6 hours 17 minutes.
It was on March 23rd, 1837, that the celebrated Elijal Roherls tapped a peal of 19,440 cllanges on handbells. Roberts enderl his life by suicide in the year 1865 .
A 6,048 Albion Surprise was rung at Liversedge an March 24ih 1837.

The 27th March is memorable for a round twelvo thotasned Treble Bob Royal ruag ly the Curnherland Youths at Shoreditel it 1784, and For tile first pent of Superlative Surprise Royal, whicls wath rung at Wakefield in 1826.

- Real Double Twelve In ' wrs practisen a good deal by the College Youths in 1784. On March 24 th in fint year they rafg the "firs true peal' (which rather suggests there had been a previous falsw one). This was 5.160 at St. Bride's, Fleet Sireet, and two days later they went to Southwark and rang a 6,048 , "being the most ever yet rung in that method.'
From the information lianded down to 1 is by the 'Clevis,' the courpositions lad two bobs in one lead, and included courses "which come by the great bells making bobs.'
The ringer of the treble in the peal of Supenative at Mayfichi (published last week) was Arilur n . Miles, and not William Miles, us printed. A correction fiom the couductor reachea us ton lale for the original report.

## PRINCIPLES \& METHOD CONSTRUCTION.

## BY THE REV. E. §. POWELL.

A pronciple is a collection of rows whin form a round block in which-
a) Each bell does the same work;

No bell moves up or down more than ono place at a lime;
No bell lies more than two conseculive blows in any one plece. This defritiou appents to be perfectly clenr and simple, but no oue who las followed at all closely the recent controversies on the fegitratacy and character of various new methods which have been pur before the Exercise can fail to linve noticed how frequently there fins arisen at discussion, and only too often an acrimonious one, on the moaning of this term 'principle.' It must lave been equally avident fo your readors that the number of those who can be said to understand the definition, i.e., the meaning attached to it by its sputsors-lhe Methods Committec-is small indeed. The writer of the prescht article freely confesses that he has no knowledge of the history of the term, nor does lie claim to have an exact understanding of ifs bearing as used to-day in the official publications of the Central Council. He must nol, therefore, be regarded as criticising adversely the Legitimate Methods Committee for bringing fortard the delinifion origrinally. Still less minst he be charged with suggesting that the existence of this defintion did not serve in its day a good and useful purpose in discouraging the publication of rabbisla in the form of what were known in those days as mongrel methods. 'Tweuty-five years ago all the leaders of thought in the Exereise were confined to experimental means in their search for new thethods to ring. A method was observed to contain so many places, so nueh douging, and such and such hunting forward and (or) hackward. That was all there was to it. But in the last quarter of in century attempts have been mede to go deeper inta the problem. Sucir quastious as the following have bech asked: What is that brings it about that, if certain operations take place, bells after leaving rounds will-return to trands again? No one would be so foolish as to claim that the shibboleth Places' aflords ant answer to a guestion of that kind. Of course we koow that if phaces $A, B$ aud made the bells retura to rounds, but why don'o they if places $A, B$ and $D$ are mede?
will probably be granted that fhe employment of the term Principle in Pules and Decisions arises out of the experimeata] stage of mothot construction. It may even indicate a groping after more scientific aneaus than were then available. Allowing all this it anay he thete that its day of usefulness has passed.
Jo will hardly he forgotten that a l'ather unchityitg controversy covered lys the Hate Mr. J. W. Wrshhrook, Even at that time it lonked to some olsempers that the real merits of the problem, viz. : the value or otherwise of the method, were obscured by the guarrel as to whether fial method could rightly he called a principie.
Probmbly again, this term had an intimate connection with the instinctive feeling of the leading minds in the Exercise of the impartauce of the so-callent Bob Major lead ends. That they were right in their instinct is not to he denjed, though it must be confesed that while the rights, lay with the believers in thase lead ends, the sounctesi arguments were then generally found on the other side, owing to the lack of kuowledge hy all parties of the fuodanentals of mexhad construction.
the beginaige of this year a plain, straightforward, simply Worded artiole by Mr. Trollope whs putblished in "The Ringing genesis of ructhods is proceeding. Is modern investigation into ilue preservation of ihe term Principle? Would it not perlaps atear the air if a proposal were, brought before the Central Council to put the definition into (say) cold storage? But before this could be wisely done, the opinions of those competent to express a considered judgroent should be sought as to the value of the term at the stage of knowledge whici has now been reached. In particular it would he usciul to learn what the remaining members of the first Legitiznate Methods Commitice have to say about il.
so far as the present writer can see, for all practical purposes the tarm "Principle" is now usedi as synonymous with ' Original, except wiven some or other misguided person puts forth a method wheh lve calls a principle, though it would equally have suited his purpose to deseribe it simply as a mothod. When this happens, it is oor is thouglat to be) necesssry to correct the statemens on the prith of the Methods Commitites. And theroupon follows the inevitable jovial dog tight. It cortainly looks futile to the outsider, to say nothing of the undoukted fact thast sympathy for the supposed underlog arouses in a good many minds an undeserved interest in a prekimably worthless production. If it he true that the employment of this greatly debated term arises from tho day of experimental athe artifual regulation, the time has probably aryived when a ireal reparfure can be ruade in the generni interest.

Had it not been for some lew keen menbers of the Oxford Guild, wlo cycled or walked miles to be present, and were blus alle to give their assistance, one wonders what the rosult might have been, especially on an important occasion of this kink, there being no one present from the foundry to see that the bells were properly handled.

THE CONSTRUCTIUN OF BRISTOL SUAPHISE Aえ以 ALLIED METHODS.

Some time ago, Mr. Geo. Hakev brouthi to my notice ble connec tion luctweeu 'Dublin Court Majov' auxi 'Byistol Surpuise, bui it was not until I read a subsentent article by Mr. J. A. I'rollope that. the solution of certain difficulties 1 have hat beeame apparent tu me. Fou inseance, I have loug helx bhe opinion that Mr. Cuaven's Bristot Royal is a true extensiou of the Major, now I see hat at $\mathrm{v}=1 \mathrm{y}$ slight alteration of the work when the treble is in $5-6$, which 1 will show later, amotming only to a varintion, gives a more cotrecteriension. Also, I have a Maximus onethod whith I thought was 1scistol, and now see my crror atad the reason. It bears exatly whe same relation to Real Sristol Maximus as Double Norwich Court Major does to Dublin Court Mujor; therefore. I suggest it be called Double Hristol Surptise Saximus, Norvich Court Variation. Figures appeal later.
In all 'Ireble Bob methods, on any even number of bells, whilst the freble is dodging in finy one position, it is mecessary that an even umaber of bells be phan bunting; this causes as many bells as take prot in tho phain hunting to alter then coursing order relative in thu dodging bells, whilst retainiug theil coursing order relative to themselves. The effect is not quite the same as a bob, because an ever number of bells sue moved, aut it takes fout rows to comphete the movemeat, whereas, in a bob an urd number, not less than three belfs aro moved, aud tire movenent is complete in two rows; iu ofher words, bobsana only be mate at cross sections, anditho boly bell makes a whole pull right (hand atd backl.
The plain hunting may be of two kinds, annlagous to the guick ant slow sixes in the Stadman three-boll work. In oue finci, the whole pulls are made liandstrole and backstroke, sand may be teraneni "quick hanting." In the other kind, the whole pulls are anade backstroke arat landstroke, Bud nay be termed "slow hunting. Fixmples of quick lunting are to be Found in Oxford Theble Boh, where hever more than two bolls take part in it, and in Superlative Surprise, where there are always four hells quick hunting; also in Combrige Surprise, where sometimes two, sometimes four, ol six on mote bells are quick Iunting. Examples of slow lunuting are to le lourd in Kent Treble Boh, where two belfs take part in it, whea treble is in 1-2 only, and in Atbion Treble Eob: also in London Surprise, where as many belts as possible an one side of treble only are slow lnunting, with the exception that when Ule treble is in $3-4$ the two bells under the treble quick hant.
If we add two rows of slow hunting to three rows of quick lunting, a very curions result is prodnced, namely, thai the plaja lunting bells are returned to the original coursing ortien relative to the dodging bells; in other words, the final Fow is the same its if the hells had conlimued dodging; also, it does not make the slightess (ifference to the fimal result, whatever eren number of hells take part in the movemont; and, finther, the terors always come up the right was at backstroke. Of eaurse, when only two bells take part, it is necessary to lave at, least lwo bells dodginy abose them, Fsamples follow. I algo show the bells siyply dodging fou couparison, anci fo each case we commence with whole pull right.

Perry, of Aberavon, who passed away on Sunday, Marel lst, at the ripe age of 75 years. Mr. Perry had been a very faithful ringer at St. Mary's Ghureh, Aberavon, fov upwards of 50 petis and was highly respected by all who know him,
The Chairman proposed a very hearty vote of thanks to the Rev: Canon Wilson for his kind permission to use the bells, and For providjug suen a splendid tea. This was seconded by Mr. D. J. Lewis (Cedoxton), and carried with acclamation, Mr. J. A. Hoare being asked to convey the thanks of the mecting to the Ganon.
The belfry was then revisited, and the hells kept going whtil well after 8 oclock. The towers repiesented were Swnnsea, SketGy, Gorseinon, Llanstephan, Aberavon, Morriston, Cadarton and Neath. afout 40 members being present. Thej wisll to thank Mr. J. A. Honre for so kindly having evergthing in order for the meeting.

## ANOTHER GREAT BELL. <br> A GERMAN ' MASTITPIEGE.'

Cologne is now in possession of a huge bell, already consecrated, the cost of which has been met by the State Grand Municipal Lery and private subsaription to replace the "Kaserglocke," which towards the end of the war was lowered frons jis place in the south tower and cut up to be converted into manitions of war to be used agrinat the French, even as it ilself lad been mainly cast from French cannon eaptured in 1870. In height, $10 f t$. Sin., and 10 fl . 6 n . in diazeter, it weighs 25,000 kilos, or just under 25 toms, thus ranking in point of size about fith in Europe. It is richly ornamented with Egures of S. Peter and the two patron sanis of Cologrie, St. Ursule-a Britisl martyr-and St. Gerean, and on it are recorded the names of the cathedral dignitaries of 1922, when the bell was cast by Heinrich Ulrich, of Apolda, whose name is also recorded.
It is anid that it is for jts musical qualities that the 'Petrusglocke' at Cologne wil! become famous, for tests have proved it to be almost perfect. Indeed, Domkapellmeister Hartmem, of Erankfort, one of the experis, who made mosb exhaustive tesis, declares that the bell is unique, a masterpicee of the bell-faunding art, which it would be difficult to equal throughout the warld. The tragedy of the "Petrusglocke" lies in the fact that Heinrich Ulrich, its maker, only lived to know that the bell ho designed and made was tested and fourd true, and then le died before fulfiling his cbief desire-to aed his life's maslarpiece in the Dom Tower, and to lear it ring out from its lofty position.

THE GREAT BELL AT MOSCOW.
The Irrgest bell in the world is, of course, the famous bell of Moscow. In 1651 a bell weighing $320,000 \mathrm{lbs}$, was cast, by order of the reigning Czar, which was destroyed by firc. In 1733 the present great hell was cast by order of the Empress Iranovna by adding $80,000 \mathrm{lbs}$. to the metal of the old belf. In 1737 a great fire took pluce and communicated with the woodwork covering the great bell of 1733 , and, the water coming in coutact with the heated metal, a large triangular piece, about seven feel bv two foet in size, was broken out. The bell remained in the pit till 1836, when, by order of Emperor Nicholas I., it was ruised from the casting pit and placed on a stone pedestal near the Kremlin, in the presence of the great offeers of state and the inhabitants of Moscon, to their great joy. The bells weigh 192 tons 3 qus. 2 cwi .14 lbs ; it stards 21 feet higb; its tiameter is 21 feet 6 jnches, and the somnd bow is 24 inches thick. The inscriplion it bears is a very long one, relating also to the origioal bell of 1651 as follows

Cust for the chief catherirs in the year 7162 from the Creation of the World and from the Birth by the Flegh of God the Word, 1654 . This bell was cast from the 8,000 poods of copper (and tiu) of the former bell that was destroyed fy fire, with the addition of 2,000 poods of copper (aud tin) in the rear 7242 from the Creation of the Horld, and in the yerr of our Lord, 1734.'
