## PAYING UP.

Although the question forces itself very strongly upon association officials, we doubt whether the average ringer gives more than a passing thought, if that, to the financial affairs of his society. Certain it is that many ringers do not realise the importance of promptly paying their annual contributions. Several associations have recently drawn attention to the arrears of subscriptions due from members, and it ought to be appreciated that association work cannot be efficiently carried on unless members realise their financial responsibilities and discharge them -not, as appears to be the habit of some, a year or more after the due date, but when the time arrives for the liability to be met. The committee of the Chester Guild has had to bring this matter with some emphasis before its members in its annual report, and not for the first time, but its experience is by no means uncommon. A balance sheet of the East Berks and South Bucks branch of the Oxford Citild indicates that there is the same kind of failing in this area. and other societies find themselves similarly placed.

What is the remedy Probable none, except to appeal to the instincts of fair play among those who seem to make an unfortunate habit of getting into arrears. The Secretary of the Hertford County Association, which is another society where dilatory contributors make the official work difficult, suggests that the members' contributions should be deducted when the belfry funds are distributed. This would be quite a good arrangement in towers where there is anything due to ringers in the nature of a share out; indeed it should be a first charge upon the funds; but in many cases there is no such distribution. Leaving the collection of the subscriptions to the local secretaries is not dways an effective nethod, although the man on the spot ought to be able to do better than the secretary who lives at a distance.

The Chester Guild, we notice, has taken the step of indirating in the ceport those who have not paid their subscriptions for the past year, and this means of drawing attention to the 'oversight' ought not to be without effect. We think, however, that associations might deal a little more firmly with those in arrears. Their finances could not suffer-because they are already without the contributions-but it might save expense if the peals in which these ringers take part were excluded from the reports, for it is the printing of the peal records which runs up the cost. Then, too, if ringers realised they were to be excluded from the 'benefits ' which are extended to paid-up members, it might aiso be an induce-

But this line of action pos. sibly might not be altogether acceptable to some associations, as it would affect the nominal ' membership,' and, maybe, reduce the peal records to smaller proportions; but, after all, statistics are not everything, and a 'live' roll is a far more valuable asset. Perhaps, however, the importance of the prompt patyment of subscriptions misht figure with advantage in the forefront of the "educational ' work of our various ringing organisations.

Some months afler we went again for another peat, and thought we should have to clo same more packing, but instead of fincting pernies at the gudgeon end we foum? itsern gone, and a pisce of iron plate inserted. We did nof score on that trip. The first packing thus took place 37 years aro next Jume. I was living in Batlı from 1886 to 1890. Yours, ete.,

## TWO KINDS OF PEAL RINGERS.

## NORWICH RECTOR'S VIEWS.

Recontly wo commented on an artiele which appeared in the public Press from Canols Meyrick. Rector of St. Peter Mancroft, Notwich. with regard to the bellis. It is, therefore, a pleasure, especially in yiew of the reopeuing of the fawous ring of bells at Maycrof Cinteh on Sunday, to guote the following from the "St. Peter Mancroft Parish Misgazine' for Appil: 'The Churela,' Canon Meyrick says, 'is immensely indeited to her fatthitil sons and daughtars, who, while happy to ring penls, primarily love the belfiy for tha service they are able to offer to Gad and His peoplo on Sunday. Church ringers, like other church workers, must be elear about their motives. The elroiman does not join a clareh choir beeause he wishes to sing in a concert. From time to time he and his comrades delight us with a concert, but the main motivo is to lead God's worship in the church. So with the ringer-if his one airn is to ring innumerable peals of London Surprise, Dambridge Maximus, Superlative Surprise, Stedman Cingues, Trehle Bob Muximus, Double Norwich Cours Bob Roynl, and the rest, he will be of little use to his church. He will be merely getting his chief anusement in life very cheaply. But sloould he join the Ringers' Guild, in the same spicit that a singer joins the choir or a Sunday School teacher joins the teachers' association, then ho (or slee) can be of untold value to his chturels and to the life of ringing. Because I am very anxious to see the art of belt ringing. whioh has been woll nigh kitled in Narwich, revive, I would see beil ringing lreated as a definite piece of Church work. I want to see all rusgers take an honoured place among the voluntary workers of the parishes, whose beatiful helfries are now silent. There are peal ringers who have made ringing live. There are other peal ringers who lase strangled the grent art:; men who cold-shoulder young aspivants while they are as yet useless for peal ringing; men who cave nothing for their church and who have no desiro to worship with those whom they have shmmoned; men who use some of out helfries simply to gratify a lust for peal ringing. We at St. Peter Mancroft are vory fortumate. We have as aur master Mr. G. Barton, as lis assistant Mr, C. Borreit, as our secre-

## RESTORATION OF CHARLWOOD BELLS.

I added a footnote explaining this to the copy which I sent you, but presumably you were unable to insert same, otherwise the guery might have been averted. With veference to the alterations whin Mr. Jacques suggests, the single at 3 produces a repetition with the second course, and tlie boh nt ly brings rounds at 1957 , not 1955 . In conclusion, I would like iomention Ehat when we rang the date touch here on March 24th we rliscovered that it contains 'Queens' and "Tittums in lise 20th aud 2lst courses respectively. ## NOISY BELLS <br> To the Editor.

Sir, Most peopla will, I am sure, advise Mr. Upton io keep gab ranted iron, or indeed metal sheets of any kiad, as far awhy as possible frow the beltry. They would certanly make noisy bells much worse, rather thas better. Nohning less that 2-ineln wood is of any use, find then only for small beds nnd windows. Fer lavge bells and large windows I have found a wall, a single brick thick, built against the inner side of the louvios, has an excellent fesult.
But whatever is done, care must bo taken that all openings are covered evenly up to a foot or so above the lighest point any bell reaches in its swing, and that all the apenings are covercd up to the same height, Whaf makes the sound of bells trying is when somme bells sound louder flann others, lueing nearer the openings, and so spoll the proper blending of the riusie.

The material also in such positions soon rusts nway, It is e pity he is restricted as ta cost, but in that ense probably the cheapest sound deadencr would be a double thickness of sizent and oiled canvas, say, l-inch apnrt, stretched across the openings. I would, however, suggest filling them up to the areh-spring, with $\$$-inch matelnonrding lined inside with one or two thicknesses of felt.

## IMPROVED FINANC1AL lיOSITLON.

The ammal meeting of the Chester JJiocesan Guild whs held at Nith wich on Monday.
In bheir report far the year 1924 the wommittee stated: A jear mgo the Guild was in an nomviable linancial position. The high cost of priniing, and, indeed, of everything else, had made it impossible for it to pay ils way, and in orter to make ends neet expenditure had to be ruiblessly reduced. For this reason only a skeleton report was published foi 1922, but last yene we were able to include both the prosls rung in 1922 and in 1823 . In the hopes of raising fresh funds an append was nade to parochial churel councils of the parishes in Which there are taells, asking them to give the diuild liala a gainer each. The appeal was only moderately successful, but those who helped hafe made it possible to turn a mesty cornes. The Gujal thanks them. The decision, also, to include advertisements on its covers the considerably lightened the cost of the report. In consequence, du'ing the year under review, we lave managed to pay our way and to earry forward a eredit halanee of over $£ S_{0}$ which may be yegardud as Eatisfactory. Meanwhile, the outlook for the future seems to be jmproved.

The fecline in membership which has been so noticeable during the preceding thee years apperars now to have slowed up. As the figtures given show, our numbers have practically remained constant during tine last year. The list of non-resident members has not hoen rewised since the war, end it. is now in rather no unreliable state. The Rev. A. Tr Beeston has undertaken to revise it during the prosent yeat; and any non-resident nembers who read this can greatly help him by sending bin a postcand will their nane and present addiess on it. This clase of menther bow numhers alsout 150 ; but. for purposes of more acenrate comparison, it is omitted from the subjoincei figutes:-Fonotary life members: 19235,19243 : Jonorary members 192358,192467 ; ringing and probalionary members: 1923 587 . 1924577 ; total: 1923 650, 1924647 . Towers in union: 72. Out of union: 29.
One point of which mention must again be masle is the numher of subseriptions which are in arrear, slowing, as they do at 115, an increase of 37 . It is to he hoped that during 1925 a special effort may be marle fo retuce iliese outstanding tiems.
The Guild has again thoken its record for the mumber of poats ramg. The high total of 86 peals was reached. in which 166 memhers hots part: the highost number of menbers who have ever performed in peal ringing in any jeaf. This in itself is a most phoasraging sigh. And indicates a higher geactal standard of vinging floraughmit the diocese. Amongst these there are 21 first pealers, again an increase, and five lave for ibr first time acted as confluctor. Mr. Sprring lieads the list with 42 peals rung. of which hes has conidunted 39: if lie beals his own recort noxt year lie will be a clever man.
there has been little work of restoration during the year. The recasting of Norbury bells is to take place shortly, and the finild is asked to make the usual grant in aid. The four bells at Tilston, near Malpas, havo bern untingable for many years, but they are now being recast hy Messis. J. Taylor and Co, of Loughborough. Next year the Central Council, for the first time in its annats, in to meet at Chester. Thus it is our daty to act as their hosts aud to do our luest to welcome them among as. The committee has voted a special grant of elo towerds their antertainment, and detailed armagements will be circulated to towers in union later.
The Master has again been present at many meefings rhuring fice past vear, nud the sncretary has visited all the branches.
The thanks of the Guild ate due to the brancli secretaries, who have again worked wisparingly (thougly in one ov two hranches we would like to sen a little more activify among the orfinary monhers), amt also to Messes. J. P. Fidler and $\{$. Cooke for conupiling the peal records.

## WILLIAM ROCK SMALL.

A CELEBRATED STAFFORDSHIRE RINGER.
As bricty amounced in our last issue, Mr. William Rock Snzall, of tiptor, Staffs, died on Saturday, the 4th April, at his residence, at Whe ripe age of 85 years. Mr. Small Iad beon riling for some time, and for in considerable period lag been umbla to take any part in ruging, althongh his koen interest in it was manfested right up to tho eut. A blati, but genial chameter, Mr. Small was well known furonglout the Mjetands, and had a host of ringing friends. Nothify gave him greater delight than to mix with members of the Exercife and one of the greatest plensures of his declinigra clays, when lin couki no louger mount the belfy steps, was to receive an visit loon some ringing friend or other.
Born at Wednesbury, Stailis, on Nor. I2tii, 1839, Mr. Small received Ditte selooving at hite Parish Chanch Schools, but he started wowk at the catly age of nine years, and led an active and industrious life un to a few years ago, when Nature, at length, insisted upon a balt luing called. Mr. Small's working life, we beljeve, exteuded to anothisy like 70 years, and for more than 60 years lie was a church boll viuger, In the year 1855 le went to work in the jron tas tube Irade ab Wednesbury, and, after being turner, fitter, madime tund teol maker, rose to the position of Coreman of the works. He remained for 17 years with this firm, athe, after spending five thers wilh another, weat to the Fictofia Tinle Works, Great Bridge, where he remained for the rest of his working years, and gained the nypect of his foHow employes, and the esteen of his employers.
Mr Small eckebrated his goldex wedeling on Feb. 8th, 1913, but his wife did not long survive this event.
Iv lis young deys, Mr. Small was in Wednesbury Church chair, and whild there becane interested in the bella, then a peal of eigit. They wore recast and made into a peal of tels in 1855 , and ME. Small wad gormetimes to chisue the bells for service, and occasionally pull pone of them up. In the year 1863 he joined the lan and on April䖲h, $1866_{1}$ rang his first peal, one of Kent Treble Bob, the campany ledng all hatives of heduesbury. Mr. Small was the last survivor of thot company, but of the many jeals he rang afterwards there was osne of Which he was prouder. His first peal of Bob Major was also nuge at Wednesbury, in 1867, and his first of Stedman Caters in the shme tower in 1870 . Curiously, to was not until 1880 that he rang ${ }^{3}$ pual of Stetiman Triples, which he scored at Willentrall, and in the sue yenr rang his fret peal of Stednan Cinques at St. Martin's, Bimingham. At this tower also he rang his lirsi. of Grandsure "ingues, in 1805, and liis first of Kent preble Bob Maximus, in 1890. Some of the 330 prals which Mr. Small rang were noteworthy for their leugtls. Fe took part in 9,020 Grandsire Cingues, in 6 lirs. 17 mins. at St. Matein's, on March 23 rd, 1887, on the occasion of Queen Vintoria's visit to that city; 8,064 Grandsire Caters, in 4 lurs. 59 2ills, on Wecmber 29th, 1988 , to commemorate the centenary of the 2,000 IBol, Major rueg at that church in 1789 ; 6,354 Grandsire Caters, u 4 hra. 4 thits. at West Eromwich on December 21st, 1889; and 8,009 1.randste Gaters, in 5 lisg. 11 mins. at Wolverhampton on April 3rd, Ye9s. In conmection with this last-2named peal there were sad circumThe nceasion had been fised for a record langth of 17,015, lut the $\mathrm{m}^{\prime} \mathrm{n}$ who was to have ruag the tonor died, and was buried 10. Whe way arranged for the peal. The reduced lenglin was, therelore, rung mufited instead. Mr. Small has also ween concerned in ther long peal mttempts, including 13,104 Grandsire Caters at Aston Janutry 29th. 1884, which was lost after 11,000 changes, in 7 hes. ming, the tenor clapper broke. To finisin of the day on this ocmasion the hand rang a ponl of Stedman Triples at Wombourn. In ISH Mr. Smali houth paris in a reterans' peal, the average nge of the hat beine 65 years 4 months, the oldest member of the party being \$he daie Mr. S. Spittle, who had turned 77 years, and the youngest, Mr. Jemos George, who liad just passed his 60th birthday. His last peal was a peal of Sterman Triples ni St. Martin's, Tipton, on Nov. ist 1920, in honour of the veteran's 80ih birtinday. It was aiso his Why peal of Stedman Triples.
Mr. Small, besides daking part in more than three lundred peais, Wis gigreat rmount of spade work in the plack Country. Fe luegan hero werg at a time whinn the art was not held in ligh repute, and are were many places in that part of the country where change ming was never practised. Mr. Sinall look his parl with others in trieriong his state of aftairs, and his active and painstaking intheman was the menns of making many change ringers, and io thrafing the tone of the belfry. He was, indeed, one of the pioneers 0. Whan the Excreise of to-day owes a great rleal.

He joined Collegerting Guild, Birminpham, in 1880: the Ancient Society of Colege Youthe, 1885; the Midland Counties Association, 1891: tho Dunley and District Guild. 1899: the Worcestershire Associntion, 1887; the Ramely for the Archacaconry of Stafford, of which he was one

## THE FUNERSL

The fumeral took place on Wednesday weck, amid ranty manifestations of the respect and esterm in which the deceased genticman whs held. The first pari of the service was at Tipton Charch, where the cotfin (heavily laden with fowers) was receired by the Nicar (the Rev. Gco. Mortimore) and the eurate (ilhe Rev. (! Jaraes), with Mr. Dunn (churchwarden) and Br. F. Harris, acting for Mr. Jinks (Vicar's warden). The bearers were Messrs. A. Rowley, J. Evans, A. Clarke and $G$. Hughes (Tipion), A. Greenfield (Netherton) and Hall (Great Bringe). As the coltin, which was placed an a bier in front of the chancel, was carried in, Mr. G. A. Banmer (organist) played Spohr's "Blest are the Departed' and the well-known hyma tone, 'Ring the bells of Heaven.' The service was taken by the Ficar, and the lesson was read by the curate. The lytind, "Rock of Ages," was sung, and the congregation revercotly stood mhile the Dead March from' Saul' was being played. At the coffin was taken out of the chwrels, tlie organist played ' 0 lest in the Lord.' In the course of a brief address, the Viear touched on Mr. Small's long aequamtance with the Parish Churcl, his devotion to its service, and bis great foudness for clatch bell singing, from whieli he removed many of the objectiogable belfry practices common among ringers lalf a century ago. He alse touched upon the lowing family life of the decensed, and said lis long life was an inspiration to all who knew him and to those he had left bohiad.

Fallowing the service at St. Martin's Clurch, Tipton, the remains were taken to the Parish Churchyald at Wedneshury, where they were laid to rest in a family varilt, the Rev. C. E. Mortimore pronouncing the comnittal sentences. A course of Grandsire Triples on the hathbells were rung over the grave after the coffin had been placed in its Inst resting-place hy Albert Walker (Birmingham) 1-2, John Jagger (Oldhary) 3-4, Alfred Rowley (Tipton) 5-6, A. Paddon Smitlı (Birninglam) 7-8.
