

## METHOD NAMES 8 CLASSIFICATIONS

The report of the Nomenclature Committee of the Central Council, which was published in our last issue, will have been read with interest by our readers. The effort to bring order out of chaos was begun by the Analysis Committee a few years ago. The new Committee has carried this work a step further, and, in accordance with its terms of reference, is seeking to correct what the majority of ringers consider to bave been a blander in the expansion of a class of names for methods which, whether looked upon as picturesque or otherwise, are totally unsuited to what is, after all, a serious science. The probability is that, if the Analysis Committee had been willing, at Lincoln, to take back their proposals for the reconsideration of the method names, instead of insisting upon the Council taking the report, and nothing but the report, there would have been no pressing demand for a revision of old names, such as is now demanded, in conjunction with the desire for suitable titles for new methods.

Many of the methods with quaint and undesirable names are dying a natural death, because the ringers of to-day have something better to ring, and because of the recognition given by the Central Councia only to methods of a particular standard of construction. This recognition, which finds its fullest expression in the 'Collection of Minor Methods,' has bad an increasing effect upon Minor ringing in the last fifteen years, which is not a little remarkable, and whatever those who desire to belittle the work of the Council may say, there is no doubt that in this direction the central authority bas done a great deal to uplift the standard of six-bell ringing. It was unfortunate, therefore, that anything should bave been done, even unwittingly, by one of its committees which should tend to lower the dignity of the Exercise in the eyes of the public -and it can scarcely be denied that an action which would enable Press or public to point the finger of ridicule at it would help to undermine the dignity of the art

The work of the Nomenclature Committee is, therefore, a very necessary one, and, since the revision of the new names is necessary, alteration of oid ones, even of those of 'dying ' methods, is not inappropriate at this time. But there is in the report an indication that the Committee desire to go further than dealing with simple names, and to revise the means by which the classification of methods has been distinguished in recent years. It is in this, we think, that the Committee is most tikely to come into conflict with the Methods Committee. The larter is bardly likely to agree with the Nomenclature Committee that the words 'Pleasure,' 'Court,' 'Delight' and 'Bob are non-essential words in the designation of a method, nor, we imagine, will they agree that 'Plain,' 'Treble

Bob ' and 'Surprise ' are sufficient classification for all the methods (apart from Principles) which are practised. The terms used in these classifications have a now clearly. defined meaning, and if, for example, one followed the Nomenclature Committee's argument to its logical conclusion, there is no use for the word 'Surprise,' for all 'Surprise' methods, like all 'Delight ' methods, are included in the category 'Treble Bob.' To eliminate the distinctive names used in classification is not quite a simple matter, and the Nomenclature Committee may, we think, find it necessary to revise their recommendations in this respect.

It was the scmeral opinion that the bells ranked amongel the very best we had ever heard. Ned Lansdell's words were, 'I'hey ure all hrothers and sisters, everg onc of them.
I hope the ruthorities will never agree to allow sudin fine bells to be destroyed tar the sake of a so-called carillon, hut that they will work in the opposite divection, and make provision for them to be properly rang, cinher in the slately steeple of Sil. Michael's, or in a separato campanile, as al Chichester.

As I ann most likely the only one living who rang on that day in 1864, I trust the opinion of the ald ones will bear some weigh in prevonting the destruction of one of the finest peals in the comntryFonts truly.

But they hnve got da make room for a carillon of 14 bells. Afore's the pity. At one time the citizens of Covendry would have made a strong protesi sgainst having their famous bells hroken up, but for many yerrs fite prople of Coventry have not heard their bells rang to advantage.
[n consequence of tower trouble, the bells lave cone to he forgotten. as it were. Indeed there would seem to lanso been some event to celebrate edt Si. Margaret's round about this date, for on .Wuly 9th, 1749, Holt tomk part, there in a peal of 6,000 of Bob Major. Was it, we wonder, snume royal, mational, ar eampanologital anuwersary? Perhaps one of our historians cant tell us.

Jabics Barlinm, the renowned Kentinh ringer, rang his Inst peal on July 8th, 1817, when lot Look pari in a peal of Leeds Trehle Buh af his own tower of Leeds, the seene, nathy years before, of the peal of 40,300 Bob Major, Can those who are now couducting researohes into melhod names tell us what rariation of Treble Bob "Leeds was?

Mr. T. H. Beams, in seconding, drew attention to the desirability of reducing the number of elasses inta which methods were divided. For ringing purposes, it was only those who liked to strain at tho gnet und miss the camel, that were not satisted with three classificalions. With regard to the confusion of nanies, Mr. Bearns referred to the method rung varionsly under the names of Oxford Delight, Woorline and Merclants" Return.
Tev. F. Law Janes: They are not fit to bo rung, and are rapidly ring out.
Mr. Beans: But they are still rung.
Rev. H. Karw James: And "Clurchyard Hob' is slill rung (lauglier).
Mr. Reanis went ant to ask those who were not salisfied ujth three anssifications to tell them how many more were needed. He suthquitten that if they were to get rid of the ohjectionaternames, there ronld we no hetler time than the present. He understood that the presont edition of the 'Collection of Minor Methods' was nearly exlatisted. The new etition should be published with the new names, and lue was guite sure tlat in wenty years lime they would be the anrmes under which all these methods would be rung. If they looknd at the Press, which knew little about ringing terms, they saw the way some of thes, names could be 'sercwed, aliti this made them a layghing-sobek. That was what they wanted to avoid, and if they enuld do that thoy would do sombling which would help forward the movemeat.
The Rev. F*. Ll. Pidwards pointed out that no place was allowed in the elassification for " Principles.

## ANCIENT RIGHTS.

Mr. F. W. Elwrll said he undersfood that, if they ndopted the report, the naraes would, ipso facta, change aver. He thought, therefore, it would he fnirer ta everyone if they could give it further consideration by having the report published and dealing with it next vear. Fie came there that day wilh. certain insetructions from his Guild. ## RRINGING ORDER OUT OF CONFUSION

the Rev. H. Drake said when he signed the report he was under the impression there ware three classes of methods and a class of priseptos. With ragal to the amendment, he certainly had no objention ta it. sud he rlit not think the other mombers of the commitice had. Thev had no wish to try to he aulocratict whad they Wratad to do mal what they were fisked to do nf. the last meeting
was to iry to trang order out al confusion, and also ta avoid, if tiluy could, any names that secmed to bo causing ridicule. They had done that in this report, and they would he very glad indeed if jt could be published, and be considered next year; but one had to remearber that lhey were cold at the last meeting, and previously by correspondence, that it was a very urgent matfer, and that those nemes should be fixed as soon as possible, becanse people were waiting to ring the methorls, and did nol know under what names they should be rung. The ameadment to some extent took away from the value of the rider he suggested, viz. : That in the case of all new metheds, which lave been rung under names proposed to be altered, an opporbunity should be given to those who Arst rang them, to approve af the proposed new name.' He liad not been alde to get his fel-low-mersbers on the committee to go with him and support the rider, hecause they thought it would be impracticable. He would sugaent womething on these lines: that when the list of names, such as fhose Lle committee pul forward, were agreed to, they should be puthlished for a certain lengtls of time, so that the people who were interested, that was those whiv had rung the method, and the ringers in the place after which the method was called, could lave the oppor tunity of objecting to il; that these objections should be considered by the Cauncil or the commiltee; that if no objections were marle wilhim the period, the changes should be absolute. These ridera did not exactly conse within the terms of reference, but. they were things which might be adopted as resolutions, so that they might know what ther were to do in future. This mattor of terms was one that weat beyond that of names. The committees reference at present was only in regard to names of methods. Mr. Trollope hat spoken of manes like "Bob" and 'Treble Bob.' They could not call them names of method, they miglit call them descriptions or descriptive terms. What thes requires was an authorily to deal with terms as well as names. He did not think it was guite right that a man should be able to sar. because he had used a name, that that names must always be useci in fulure. They. as a Council, should exercise 4. heir authority as to what terms should be used, and as to the aciund meaning of the terme.

Mr'. Burton said with regard to Mr. Trollope's inguiry ns to whether the committee were penning a pious repart, that was nof the casethe committee were absolutely out for it,

The proposal to adjourn the disctussion until the report had been printed was then put to the meding and carried.

Alderman Pritchett said he would like to propose a fote of thanks to the committee for their lahours. Personally, he had been thither at wariance with them, but the subject, was one of great rontroversp. and the commithee were likely 10 get more kicks than halfpence, bul the Council would all agree flat the committee had endeavoured to do well by flye sulject, and dessrved a learty vote of ihanks (heer, hear').

The motion was put, and carried, and on the suggestion of the President, a vote of thanks was also accorded to the oflee committees for the work ther lad done during the jear.

## INSTRLCTIONS OS PRESERVATION OF BELLS.

The Hon. Secretery stated that the "Card of Instructions' as t. the carc of chureli bells had been printed, and the Rev. H. Drake hat given them 55 towards the expenses. There were three fhousand or four thousand fowers in England and Whates where these cards might: well be put on the wall, hut that would cost a great deal of money and involve a great deal of time. They could, bowever, make a afart: as. he lind got 509 copies. It was the desire of the Standing Conmittee fhat members present should bake a card with them, and ik was suggested that it would be a very good start in the ristribution if they sent one of the cards to ench of the Archteacons in the warious dioceses, and also one to oacli of the secretaries of the Guild wad Associations aftisted to the Council.

Mr. T. F. Beams eaid if they asked each of the secrelaries to tatra enough for their own athilited towers they would get over the difir-

The President pointerl ont flai secretaries had no authority over towers nof connected wilh their ussociations, and that was why the Standing Committee suggested that a copy sloould be sent fo every Archdeacon in Englanil and Wales. so that they might know about it. and bring it before the different clergy and clurclawardens.

Mr, Jandes George raid it was a pity the iustruelions were not prinied on one side of the card only. Many people would not hother to look at the back.
Thm Hon. Sceretary said that would have nceessitated a very dimbersome eard.

Mr．E．W．Elwell moved the following tesolution ：That，considel－ ing the future possibilities of Ratio，this attention of the Press and literaturs Commitien of the Central Countil be drawn to the pher－ Lomances of＂Lell chiming＂nerasionally broadcast，as sucli per－ fortances are liable to create a wrong impression of the true manare of bell ringing，and further，to request the committee to bring to the notice of the British Broadersting company all unsuitable imitations of bell ringing which may be broudeast．Mr．Whell saicl thas resoln－ ifoll wag drawn tup by the secretary of one of the branches of the Chester Guilf，and was brought iorward at the finid＇s anmunt meet－ ing when he was asked to subnit it to the Conncil．Fe said that on one or two occasions bell chiming，carillons and eflots to make a noise on bells by fammers worked hy machinery had heen broadenst． and the puhlic had pot the impression thus bell ringing came from Eel－ gian．Ot the top of that one frequently heard certain bell chining whelh took place at a Londen church．fithl which was gol hall ring－

Alerman J．S．Pritehett nexi proposer＂That this Council，ns a seneral mule，disapproves of the angmentation of peals of eight into perals of tan．He sain the eight bells of his cwa parish eburch， King＇s Norton，were recently recast，and il was suggestod that they should bo antgmented to ton．He was happy to say that suggestion fell through，and insifad of haring what would probably have heen an indifferent peal bf ten．they had a beatiful ring of eighta There was，lue continued，an idea among ringers generally that in wis a great thing to have ten bells instead of eiglit in a chanch tower．Fery often it was it great mistake．The only reason apparently was that ringers
crot apportanities of ringing on an inger number of bells that they otherwise wanld，but there were many olloen considesitions io be takeli into account before it should be deciden to augatint a ring of eight into ten．The suggestion was ususlly made，when a peal of eight was Foing to be recasi．＂Whe not have a peal of ken while we are aboat ansier（laughter）．We can make round lovely peal of ten out，of the mota of your cight，and with a lille rontrivance we can get them into wour tower．It presented no trouble to him（laughter）．But
thene were ather considerations， bells into an eight－hell tower．Hand is so lared lhe ingenuity of the hell bangers tiat they often had to put two bella ahofe the others In that case they found iu the ringing chamher that the sounds of the iswo small bells were drowned by those inderneath．Th one tower，has remembered it was scarcely possible to heal the 1 wo trebles in tly ringing chanther．On the grotind of expenge there were often objec－ lions．The metal of the eighi betls was split among the ien，and thoy hed a light peal of ten，which，in his opinion，was almays unsatis． factory．It，was also very diffienlt to form a proper ringing circle，and a great many expedients were fesorted to．amd they bad to lane an ingenious arraggament of rails and guides．If was often a great make－ shift to get ten bells into an eight－bell lower．Morcoter．if thes were名oing to atugment the weigla of lire hells hy asing additional metal，the crassideration of the safity of the tower mersented itself．Bells lanve been placed in towers witlout due consideralion of the safe ty of the fabrio： conequently，in a short time，the tower hat bren dechated unsafe，and the ringin宫 of the brils had been stopprif．That was a thing they wanted to guard against．In his view the ident of change ringing was change jinging on eight bels－eight fairly heave helis，tenor from n ton to 25 ewt．，of even more．The musie of eiplat heavy bells what properly rung in mhanges was extremely dignified；it ereated a far gramler impreasion uprin the people oubiside flan did the masic on a
lighter peal of teth．The thasic in all shatadata methods，lat thanghe hig was right in sayine，was origianly derised for eight bells；the nusie of an ontave was the nost satisfactory to the listentr．Thu man outside could count aiglu bolls as they were rung in changes；il was extrmely ditieult for him to count len，amd almost impossible ta count fwelve in a clabge Mothods for eight bells were legion，in viting scope for ingonuity．Very few of the odd－bed melhods，haw－ ever，were capable of exteusion to nine bells，and there were few， any，tree extensions of the Surprise methods to ten bells，the so－called extensions being renlly specially consfructed methods．II was a lauti－ ahle jutan on the part of tiugurs to desite to be able to ring on ten bells，but it was also a liact that at some lowers，when the bolls hat been angmented to tea，they wore not regularly rung as len．It was only occasionally they were so rung ia changes，zuch as when visitors came for an apporituity of rimging a lem－hell peal．The words of his anotion did zot oxclute the making of ten－hell rings altogether，where a tower was suitable，and where hells were being put in for the firat lime；but where it whs a quastion of augnenting eight into ten metely for the sake of lutving more bells jt was a very unwise course to take．

## STEDMAN' AND 'DUFEIELD.

## By GEORGE BAKER.

Itiours is yery litile doubt that Fabian Stedman, whe was born ia Cambulge in 1631, was tho first individurl to produge a principle, sumb, what is mare, he produced it symmetricaliy.

Anyone would have hought that Stedman Doubleg being the froth principle discovered, would fou that reason, if for nome ather, hare hann "soget fros atack but, no, that l'inciple, like 'Dufield' and Lestk," was being described in 1913 and 1914 as "illegitimate"
Tha false definition that made the attack possible has mow been cxposed, but I venture to think that liad anyone told Fabian Stedmark, in his day, that his Principle was "illegitimate, there would have been somothing wote than a jovial dog fight,' sad the indivitun, whoever ho righl have been, would have been given the choich of swords or pistols, and a meeting-place near Cambridge in the early Horning to sotile flo difierence.

Wu are not now quite us savage as onr Forefathers.' I mentionud this fact in noy first contribution to the Inte controversy on $13 t 12$ Itme lust, and at hat time I made up my mind I would endeavour to bring to an end the constently recurring disputes about the suhject of method construction.
There is no evidence that Stedman extemied lis Primple to seven thells and upwards, and the individual who did is not likely to hero known that such a thing as a 'givot bell' existed, but, whether or no. he produced the only correet extansion possible without making additional 'moves' and the round hlocks and transpositions that follow will prove beyond a shadow of a nonbt that the Principle is the same on all numbere, in spite of the fact that the division herds in Doubles harn conssivy order, and in tho higher numbers they have not.
