

THE CARE OF CHURCH BELLS.
The Central Council is undertaking a work of considerable value in their effort to place in the towers of this country a carefully drawn up card of instructions on the care of church bells. This is not the first time they have turned their attention to the subject, for there has been for years, among their publications, a brochure dealing with the preservation of bells. Useful as the latter is, however, it is probable that the card which has now been printed, may be of ever greater utility, for, whereas this should find a permanent place in the belfry, a leaflet is likely to be torn or lost. A matter of importance in putting these cards to the most effective use is that of distribution. They will be valuable in any belfy, but they will be of greatest value if they can be got into the neglected belfries and the authorities brought to realise the importance of the instructions being acted on. Here is where the diffculty arises, lecause where the bells are neglected there is seldom anyone to be found who would trouble to act upon the advice. The Council were well advised to take steps to bring the cards to the notice of the Rural Deans, as the most likely means of giving effect to their desires, but they will probably find it necessary to go a step further if they are to make the most of the opportunity they are creating.

The present position with regard to the oversight of bells, as with other church property, is that it is the duty of Rural Deans to inspect belfries periodically and report to the Bishop. This report, in some dioceses at any rate, is gone through by the Archdeacon, and recommendations with regrard to repairs, etc., are made to those responsible for the upkeep of the church. There is, however, no power to enforce these recommendations, and it lies with the Incumbent, Churchwardens and Parochial Church Council to accept or reject the advice as they think fit. We have no-doubt that when recommendations come from higher quarters to the church authorities, every effort is made, as far as funds permit, to carry them out; but the trouble in the case of bells and belfries is that very few Rural Deans bother about them-were it otherwise there would not be so many instances of dilapidated bells and dirty belfries. Indeed, so little do some Rural Deans know about bells that they could hardly be expected to be able to report upon their efficient maintenance, even if they climbed into the tower.

This particular matter is exercising certain members of the Chester Guild, and it is likely that the Central Council may be asked at their next meeting to discuss a suggestion that, through diocesan or other channels, Rural Deans be asked, where they have no personal tech-

The place you want is a small town, with a Cathedral that can offer its Chapter House, or surch like, for the seturl mating. a good pend of bells or two, plenty of tistorical ancl arehitectural buildinga, the whole set in heautiful country, and last, but by mo means least, qood railway facilities. A big order, Jon say, but Salisbury supplisil it with gomething added; and Choster equalled, if it coukd not sulpass, Salisbury's record. What can lpswich do next jearp You can be pretty sure that so far as warmth of hospitality goes the Enst will nat lag behind the West or the South. The couniry vound Ipswich is fairly interesting but there is no New Forest and no Eaton Park. Atrd the town is well enough in its why, but there is no Cathedral, or even a parish church of first rank. The biggest church, St. Mary-le-Tower, is a modern affiry, and maner uninteresting at that. Gae thing Ipswiel has, and that is a most historieal ring of twelva bells. There is no olher twelve-belf towet that. has angthing like the record that Ipswiel lins. Peals of Plain Bob, Kent and Oxfort Treble Roh, Double Norwich, fud Camhridgn Surprise on ejght, ten and twelye. Peals of Grandsire and Stedman on seven, mine and eleven: besides Supperlalive and London Major. And the reputation for good striking las always been as high as amwobte in the courtry. They wsen! to say that all the peals at Jpswich hat to be good ooes, Thecruse if there was a muddle nobody could put the bells right it was a case of a good peal or none at all. Thero is something to be saind for thel.
It must be ten years or more ago when we firs began to think about going to Ipswieh. Anyway, we are mach overdno, and the pity is that Jimmy Motts, first-class ringer, and best of fellows, is no longer alive to meet us.
But for one thing, what a glotious place for a C.G. meoting Wells would lio? There is everything you want, $A$ iocauliful CathentralChester is not to be mentioned along side itr-one of the heaviest and finest rings of bells in Eugland, a maniml old ciby, set in most beantiful country. Then there is sty. Cuthinert's Church, with, its noble tower mad henvy peal of bells-that by itself is wortli a visit. While for the fortunato ones who mamage to Ebgin on the Saturday and end on the thednesday or Thursday. there are Glastonbnry and Cheddar, and Bath and Bristol quite handy. Really we must think of going to Wolls one of tiose days. Only would that the railuay factities wero betier.
Big towns are not much goon. I suppose we must mot altagether Eeglect them. There is Notfingham aud Liverpool and Southanpton. Theiv turn will no doubt cone, but, the small towns are the thing. Tven the Lutadon meeting might sometimes lo held with adrantage in a small town. Whieh is how so Trish as it looks. Why not hold it ane Year at Si. Albans or Guildford?
Alderman Pritchard's motion to discourage making eight-bell rings inta ter was treated matrrally eyough as a luge joke, the crowning touch of comedy being supplied when the only one who woted for it was Mr. Pryee Taylor. Hut don't you think there is something to be suid in its favout from the point of view of change ringing? Just gee what happens often enongli. Tou have an cight-bell tower and a goad band. They ring Stedmen Triples, Kent and Double Norwicl. and perhaps two or three of tho Shrprige Methods. Plain Bob and Grandsire they could ring, luth probably don"t. Then, says one: Fow muclu better lo have ten bells! And thep gitate, and with a litfle luck the money comes, and they get their ten bells. And then? Well, instead of ringing five or six methods, henceforth and for overmore thacy ring Stedman Caters, and nothing else but Sterlman Gaters. Now, Stedman Caters may be a vely fine method, but I submit you can Jiave ton mituch of a good thing-even of Stedman Gaters. But, say 5ou, rou can ring Major methods in an eigbt-bell tower if pot want to, can't you? Yos, you can; but the point is that you don't. Af lenst not uniess you meet sliort.

Of eourse, tastes differ There ore men who are content to ring nofhing but Stedman Cinques from year's end io year's end.

Talting of Stedman Caters, whe does not some brave conductor cali a peal with the bie bells in the natural round at loack position? Il , is pretty aerrly as good as the littums position, and a lot better than the handstroke position. But, no. It's not done. Te are a lot of slicep. We all go tho same way as the others.
Mr. Young has given notice of a resolutions practienlly contiemning what is called simpson turing. Fou may be sure we shati] have a hasted debate. The partisans on one side and the other will raily to the call. The trouble with so many of us is that we really ron't fnow anything definite about the matter. We know what we like, and we mow what we rlislike. And we say what we think pretty of tem, and without sparing of words. But, the experts have us at their merey. Yon can't argae with an expert, for he knows and you do not. Fie may bo wrong in the lang conclusion: and you may be right. But what he knows lan does know; while wat don't know anything. Tn the
intereats of spoctsmanslip aud tair play let us hope we may have experts on lepth sides. Then we can enjoy the battle. And perhaps (who knows?) learn somothing worlh knowing about the matiter.

And surely the Coventry peoplo ought to think twice and thrice be fore they pul their famons ring of ben into the melting-pot. When we were young-how mmuy years age, has !-tho old uns used to say that the three best peals of ten in England were Coventry, Rotherham and Stepney. I think they waro tho thrce. Anyway, Goventry was one. Rotherham hayu been recast; Stepney are somewhat fallew from their higl estate; and now Coventry are to go. I dare say a good doal of ibeir reputalion whs due to the tower thoy lung in. I dary say that winat made a good ringing peal will not aecessarily make good cnrillon bells. Hul, if they are anything like ns good sa people said, it would be a pity to recrast.

What a link with the past is Mr. Ted Horrex, 'father' of the College Youtis! We knew he Loak part in the 15,840 of Kent Treble lobs Major al Bethanl Green in 1868 , and now we leari, from his pertin. ent letter last weok, that lie whs one of a band hat rang at Corentry in 1864-sirty-one years ago!
It was pleasant to meet in the belfry at Lichfield, on Snturday, Hr, W. W. Worthington, whose business ofaims havo prevonted hime from taking parl in may ringing for morm than two years past. dr. Worthington began ringing in his Undergraduate days at Oxford, but was some years before be came ecquainted with a change ringing hand. When he did so, his entlusiasm quickened apace, and his interest is still maniained, despite his restricted opportunitios of taking part in a favourive hobly,

Mr. Worthington's hone is the beatiful place, Majle Hayes, just outside Lichfield, and overlooks some of the most charming senery to be found in the county of Stafford.

The fitst peal of Wrin Caters was rung at Nortll Shields on aloly 12t $\mathrm{t}, 1909$.

Ou July 15th, 1830, a penl of 5,000 new Treble l\}ob Royal was mus at Leeds. What in those days was known as "New, is now the Keni Yariation.

An interesting nolice concerning Yeavil bells, appeared in the "Westein Fiying Post' of July 14th, 1760: "There is tately Hang to Saliy aud sel going by Jolan Bush, Bell Hanger, of Chew Stoke, nenr Bristol, in the Conniy of Somersat, at large Peal of Six Bells in llu: Town of Yeovil, in the gaid Country.
'The Tennor consisling of near 50 cwt., they sre alllowed to bo tho largest Peal of Six that is in the Country, and required, before nesy Hung, 22 or 23 Men to ring the Six Belts; but since they are bang by the said Bush, the same hag been ruug for several Hours by 7 Meus only, and 503 or 4 different Peals of Changes, consisting of I2 Grandsite Changes in each Peal.
' N.B.-The said Busla has work'd in the luosiness for upwards of 50 years, and is thought, to be a very experienced Man, and will be ready to serve any Parish if required.'

There are aow ten bells at St. John-the-Baplist's Church, Yeorit, the lenar being 42 ewt . This bell and the present 9 th were recast ly Bilble in 7728.

## RESTRICTIONS AT LICHFITLD.

Lichfield Cathedral is one of the mation's most beatiful possessions, an ornate aad siately pile, whose central spire rises uearly three hubdved foet, and is the dominating leature of the country for miles arouma. In oue of the smallur but fone the les imposing western towers hangs a fue peal of ten bells, now, alas! heard all too lithe, un account of the restrictions which are placerl on the ringing of them. The bells themselves are in excellemt order-they were tehung a iew years ago by 3r. J. E. Groves, of Birmingham-but the local thand, of which the veteran, Mr. Cupe, hats been an active member for nowe than half a century, receive scant eucouragencent, and there are fem, if any, opportunities for outsiders to ring. Even the Society of the Archdenconry of Statiord, which opertes in the area of which Liciniolid is the centre, alld which has shown its loyalty to the mother church of the diocese by returning to it practically every year for its annual festival, is finding that its visits to the Cathedral are not attogetiver weleome. This is really very deplorable, and un these days -when almost everywhere ringers are receiving acknowledgment as valued Lelpors in the Church's work-difficult to understaned. Fear after yeas in the past the society has turned to the Cathedral for its annual gathering, to be met hiss year with a consent to ring the bells for an hour and a half on condition that no application is made for the use of the bells next yenr.
When whe society met on Saturtay last this condilion was wuch commented on and regrefterl. Over eighty members attended. and made the best use of the bells during the limited time at their disposal. The ring of eight at St. Mary's wore also open, but here, unfortunately, illoess near the church put an early end to the ringing, leaviag ony the six-bell iower of sit. Michael's for use in the evening.
Thle tea and busiuess mecting were held at Lloyil's Restaurant, Mr. J. E. Groves presiding, and being supported by the Rev. C. F. Rarker (clerical secretary) and Mr. H. Knight (las secretary).
The business was fargely formal, aud ineluder the re-elecion, en blow, of the officers.
Tlle committee, in their report, stated: 'We are able to record another year of progress the number of peals rung during the year was 26, made up as follows: Graudsito Triples 4. Stedman Triples 13, Slechnan Caters 2, Sterimau Ciaques 1, Bob Major 2, Kent Tretule Bol Majoy' 1, Double Norwich Major 3. The members of the Central Council musi have been gratified at the warmth and siucerity of the weleone extended wo them at Chester. The Dean of Chester, in the rourse of his remarks, said be hoped "* we should recover preseutly the notion in England that the Cathedrals did not helong to a group of old gentlemen, but really were the mother church of each diocese. the Bishop being the lead of it, the Dean and Cltapter trustees, ant the Cathedrai belonging to everybody. That Cathedral was the one great building in the county that really belonged to everybory." "tve slould like," added the committee, "to he able to feel that ahout our orta beautiful Cathedral at Lichifid. Our larouners in the Diocese of Chester will synpathise with us when they know that we are allowed to ring the laells of our Cathedral for $1 /$ hours this year ou conclition that we do not ask to do the same next year." ' The report conciuded with an expression of deep regret at the death of four memhers, Messts. Wm. Renton (Cannock), W. Rock Small (Tiptoni),
T. Mralney (Wolverlaapion) and A. Everitt (Tamsortil).

The balauce slieet showed that there was a balance in handi at the end of the year of $£ 3015 \mathrm{~s}$. 9d., on decrease of ez 2 s . 2d., comparer] with the preeding year. Of the receipts, 222 18s, was from subscriptions, tucluding those of 221 ringing members, whose numbers show od an increase.
The report and balance sheet were adoptent.
Mr. H. Knight stated that confrihutions amounting 10 £2 7r. Had been recived towartis the Washbrook Memorial, aud he askerl thobe who had not already sent donations to do so as quickly as possible.
The three quarterly meetings, recommenteri by the commitiec, were confinmed, viz: Kingswinford, in July: Wedncsbury, in January; and Stafford, in April. The comanitlee suggested Wolverlampton or lishfield for the munual meeting.
The Rev. G. H. Barker saiti when they came Lo Liclafeld two years ago, and did not lave the Catherral bells, the attendance fell off to almost cxactly a lajf of what it had been the year before. This yenr they had got the bells on condilion that they thit not ask for them next year.
Mr. Brindley urged the members to stipk to Lichffeld. The experiment of moving away was once the downinall of their socioty. $T^{7}+1$ haps if they triofl they might get the Calhedral bells next year.
The Rep. C. H. Barker said he did not see how they coulil ask or thena, in wiew of the condition made this year.
Eventually Liclineld was selected by a enasiderable majority, eizhtepr hands being tield up for Wolverhampton.
Mr. H. Knimht, for the committee, suggealed that ma effort sloulith bre made io rerive the cycle rans to onlying towers and it was hecifled to try them and see what stecess nittendet the effort-

It was resolverl to pritat the anmwal report this year, therg being suffivient funds in lanci for the purpose.
