## LONDON'S BELLS.

Just two years ago a suggestion was made in this column that the ringing societies of London might get together with a view to endeavouring to bring about an improved condition of affairs in the belfres of the Metropolis, Up to the present nothing has been done. It is an acknowledged fact that same of the towers in London are anong the worst cared for in the country, and this is certainly not creditable to the authorities who are responsible for the upkeep of the fabric and the furnishings of the churches. Many peals of bells are in such a neglected state as to be almost unringable, and they are gradually falling into disuse. There is in this a cause for regret, particularly in view of the gradual closing, from various reasons, of other towers for peal ringing. For instance, among the eight twelve-bell towers there are only two which are freely available for peal ringing. There are, we believe, sixteer peals of ten within what may be termed London's inner radius, but how many of these are regularly rung and how many are available for regular peal ringing? How often now does one read of any noteworthy performance at towers like Christ Church, Spitalfields; St. James's, Clerkenwell ; St. Dunstan's, Fleet Street-to mention only three out of the many rings of eight?

What does it all point to? That the majority of towers in London are closed to ringers, unless under exceptional circumstances. Surely there are some among the 'derelicts ' that mikght be recovered for ringing if among the ringers of London some sort of united effort could be made. In might be an uphill task, and at the outset, perhaps, a discouragitg one, but a steady application to the object would nost assuredly result, in the long run, in improvements here and there. Joint action by the various London socicties would, we feel convinced, be the best method of tackling the problem. It may bristle with difficulties, but to adopt an attitude of indifference is only to set a bad example to those whose apathy is largely responsible for the condition of many of the rings of bells in the Metropolis. We are not quite sure, however, that it is entirely indifference that has resulted in nothing being done by the ringing societies. It may be they feel they cannot press bell restorations in churches where they could not offer to provide service ringers. That is one of the chief difficulties which wouid confront any committee formed to deal with the subject, but we venture to think it is not entirely insurmountable; indeed it opens an additional avenue for effort in the training of more ringers. There is, however, another obstacle, we thiak, to any combined action, and one that we should like to see removed. Under the surface in London there

## DEATH OF A COLLEGE YOUTH.

MR. J. C. SMITH SUCCUMBS ro EFFLCTS OF WAR gERVICE. A lalented musician, bs well as a ringer and a member of the Anciont Socioty of College Youlls, Mr. Josepli Cubith Smilh died at Friston, Sussex, on Oetober 16th. Fad he lived until the 2last be would have been 42 years of age,

Deceased was the sor of Mr. Wialiam D. Snitit, late superintonient of the E.C. District Ofice of the London Postal Service, now rosiding at 8, The Arenue, Eastborme, and a broilier of Mrs. A. A. Hughes, of the Whitcohapel Foundry. Mr. J. C. Smilh was well kuown to the older generation of Colloge Touths, aurl althaugli he never took part in a peal, he was always interested in ringing. On several oceasions he had takeu na orchestrn to the Colloge Youtha aunual dimner, and he was, like his sister, the expert hamboll ringer.
The late Mr. Smith served from the outhreak of the war in the postal section of the R.E., that as a result of his service with the colours le contracted pleurisy, which dereloped into pulmonary tuberculosis. He made a mosi grillant fight against this insidious disease, to mbich, uninappily, he linally succumbed.
Besides being a proficient performer on a nunber of instrumente he was a keen student of classieal musie, of which he had a valuable collection. After baving to retize from the postal sarvice through the breakdown of his health, he joined the orehestra at Devonshirs Park Theatro, Eastbourne, and took a keen interest in local musical affairs. He also helped materially to resuscilate the Theosophical Socieiy in Fastbourne, which owes its present sound position to bis efforts.

The funcral took place on October 20th, at Ocklynge Cemetery, Fastbourne, when He Rer. A. B. Evans, Yicar of Friston, officiatod, and many beautiful foral tributes weve received.

Neweastle Cabhedral Guild has scored a Masonic peal with n fancl of Sunday Service ringers, except for one honorary member. When is 'the Ringers' Lodge to be formen?
"Six hats will bo given to the company who ring the best found peal for the space of 30 minutes. This novel olfer accompanied thit announcement of the opening of the bells at Glinton, near Peterborough, which took place an Norember 11th, 1799. It would be interesting ta know who was the donor of the hats, and who were the winners. The bells were a ring of six, cast and lung by Thoma= Osborn, of Downham, Norfolk.

On Oct. 8th, 1888, a peal of 6,720 London Surpriso Major was runt at Burton.
The jubilee of the first peal by the Yorkshire Association oceurs next weck. This was rung on November 9th, 1875, at Holy Trinity, Hull, and was Holt's six-part peal of Guadsire Triples, conducted by the late Mr. Clatles Jackson. This event should be fitingly celebrated in the consty of broad acres,
The first peal of Oxford Treble Bob Major in Liverpool wes rung on November 9ih, 1800.
The Society of Cumberland Youths $\operatorname{Hang}$ a peal of 5,136 Orford Trobte Boh Maximus nt Southwark on Nor. 10th, 1766.

Mr. William C. Rumsey, of Deherham, has lad a unique, aud, ן世1haus, a lucky experience in his ringing at Framlingham. Framblinefam is eiglat miles from Defenham, and in eight euccessive attempes he has rung eight peals in Dic tower, and on each oecasion has rung a differenl bell, the number of methods being six. It has taken ATH: Rumsey over trenty years to do it, but the "cirele, or should it be the 'octagon'? was completed with the peal of Stedman Triples recorded in our issue of October 16th.

The policemen of Manchester have scored another petl. It is fortunate for them that the threatened Act of suppression is not yet passed, otherwise the dock justead of the witness-bor might haw been their future lot.

## 1,111 720's.

To ring one thousand one lundred and eleven 720's of Minol, and to keep count of them all, is the noteworthy achievement of Mr. K Clinkard, of the Oxford Socicty. He reached the 'four ones, when he took part in 720 Kent Treble Bob at St. Mary Magtalere's Church, Oxford, on Sunday evening, Oct. $25 t h$, the band boing H, Tolleg 1, F. Clinkard 2, G. Stace 3, W. Collett 4, C. Coles 5, W. F B. Wilkins (concuctor) 6 .

## BIRTHPLACE OF THE COLLEGE YOUTHS.

WHERE THE SOCIETY WHLE MEET TO-MORROW.
St. Michnel's, Paternonter Royal, situnted on Colloge Hill, in the City of London, where the College Fouths will hold their service tomorrow, prior to heir nnmal dinner, was the birthplace of the Ancient Sociely. Sir Rieland Whitlington founded the College, together with some almghouses, mull the old chureh atilached to the College possessed a peal of six belis.


THE FIRS' " HOME OF THE COLTFGE YOLTHE,
Here the young gentlemen of the neighbourlood used to amuse thetaselves by chiming the bells in rounds. Some of them were members of the uristocracy, and in 1637, on the 5th of November, they founded the society.
They called themsolwes 'College Youths,' and thoir object was to practise and promote the art of riuging. Anmong those associaterd with the formation of the society were Lord Broreion, Sir Cliff Clif1011, the Marguis of Salisbury, Lord Dacre, some of the city aldernen, and many gentemen in the neighbonrinood of the College. Eor कume time only rounds aud cal! changes were rung, bul, in time, they sludied thange ringing, and eventually achieved 100 of Rob Doubles. This was, it is supposed, alrout 1642. Litile progress, however, wiz made, until about 1677. when Fabian Stedman, the Cambridge printel", published bis 'Campanologia,' and dediented it to the society, of which be was an honoured member.
But this later arlvance in change ringing was not made at the chureh on College Hill. St. Michael's, with ils tower and six bells, was swepl away in the greal fre of 1666 , and was rebuitt from Wren's designs. and finished is 1694. The lantern and turrel, bowever, were not whled until 1713, and alas, the tower has siner contained only onc bell. It was originelly cast by John Eodson in 1674, and was recas in 1892 at the Whitechapel Foundry.

## OXFORD MASTER'S WEDDING.

Mary Magdalene, Oxford, 720 Kent and 720 Oxford Treble Pah by members of the $\mathrm{Ox}-$ Ford Scciety, in honour of the wedding of their present Master. Mr. William Harris, which was solemnised at the Ohurch of St. Ebbe on that day: W. Finch, w. Henegough, H. Tolley, G. Stace, F. Clinkard, W. Collett and W. H. B. Wilkins (conductor).

## OPENING UP A NEW FIELD. A STANDARD WORK ON 'sPLICING.'

All ilial is best in six-bell melhods has, it is believed, been abInimed, and most of it tas been included in the Central Council'x Collection. A few years ago, however, seven true extents could nol be tung unless it was made up of seven melliods, or of less meilods with one or more of them repeated. Liut recent advances in ringing lanve shown that it is possible to put guite a number of mefhods into a true 720, so coupled togethor that clanges come in perfect seguenco anci rounds, or any other change, occurs only once in the 720 .

A Lew bands late pureud this branch of Minor ringing, and have proved it a fascinating stucy. Up to the present, 35 methods have been included in a peal of 5,040 changes, but even that large number is not the limit, and the future of Minor singing lies, we beliere, in the direction of spliciuy-it is at any rate the only direction at pruscth open for advance. Regular Minor ringeran-and others who only ring on six belfs occasionally-will find, therefore, that to keep paea with llie limes, they must understand method splicing.

Until the Thinging World' published the recent series of arlicles Ly Mr. J. P. Fidler, the subject was little inderstood, bui Mr. Fiuler lus thrown a flow of light upon this interesting form of ringing, ant mumerous bands are now laking their first steps in "splioing.' The linging World' articles stired interest in and a desire for closer atreunintance with the subject, but a fav more convenient means of study would be provided if all the information were collected under one cover.
This we propose to facilitate by reprinting Mr. Fidler² articles ju book form, and supplementing the work by an exposition on splicing gemerally (Mr. Fider lawing devoted timself primeipally to the practiwal application of the problem) written $b_{j}$ that woll-known authority, Mr. Joseph W. Parker, of Sunderland. In addition the book will contajir on number of spliced extents, employing in their consfruction sis and eight methods, go that in its complele form it will be a standard wark upan the subject.
We anticipate a big demand for this publication, because interest in 'splicing ' does not rest merely with those who slesire to ring peals. Serrice and practice ringing will receive added interest if a band can ring a spliced 720 containing anything up to eight methods, insfead of being confined to one only.

## NOTES BY THE WAY.

THE: EVOLUTION OF NAMES-HISTORY IN THTLES. By J. APMIGER TROLLOPE.
The Rev. Mr. Herbert brake is, 1 understand, wat at all pleaseri with me. 1 have, so if seems, abused the committee, of which he is so distinguished an ortament. I have not played the game, imasnuch as when criticising that commitled 1 said the same thing twice lout in different form. But the head and front of my offending is lhat my criticism has not been conetuctive eriticism; I lave not helper the commitlee. True, Mosl true. Hut then 1 did not infend to help the comastiee; rather, in fact, I wanted to hinder them, and so far as in me lay, to brag their scheme to nought. Let us grant to the full i'tis bui justice) their good inteations and their genera] ubilities; but I have yet to learn that good intentions give a man intunnity from error, or that general ability is any adequate substithte for tecluical knowledge.
The committec tells us that in the naming of methorls ' a state of alacost indescribable confusion has arison,' and gives that as the reason for proposing traslic changes afiocting the titles of methods past, present, and to come. I totally deny the truth of the statenient. When you look at the names used for methods, you will certainly find $\pi$ lade of any casi-iron system io guile their selection, hut could you expect it? or should you wish it?
For more than three humdred years men have been inventing and urming, and ringing new methods, and these names are witnesses io the progress and hisfory of the art. The ancients' ideals in method maning may mat be lioc sanue as ours are todry, but they haci perlecily good reasons for whal they did, and often gou can leam a lot by studying the names they used. But of this our committee appears to take no heed.
For instauce, the method Mr. Drake uses as an illustration-Lon Hou Scholars' P'leasure. Apparently to him London is the name of the method, and Pieasute a classification subtitle, as Troble Bob is. Of 'Scholars' he can make neither head nor tail. It is rather brulal to tell नhim the truilh, but I think it ought to be done.
During the seveutcenth and early eighitentla centuries a good many ringing socinties were formed, and their custom was usually to call ${ }^{1}$ Jemselves Fouths or Schelars. Why, I do not know, but ihere is no reason why they should not have done so it they thought fit.
Anong these were the 'Schollers of Chepesyde ' (founded in 1603), the Norwich Scholars, the Eastern Scholars, the College Youths (not ihen ancient), the Union Scholars, the City Scholars, the Cambridge Youths, and flue London scliolare. Dolemin was a member of this lass, and their performarees included the first peal of Gramdsite Calms, rung at St. Bride's Fleet Street, on January 1 Th $h_{1}$,
6.006 Grandsire Cinques on March 14th, 1727, at St. Martin's-in-the Fields (the first peal on the bells), and 6,204 in the same method at Se. Mifhael'z, Cormhill, in 1729. These were three very notable per formances, aud shor that the society included some very skillat ringers.

Fsactly what happener to it is not quite certain, but the Lratition is that it did nol dio ont, as did the Union Scholars, the Eastern sicholars, and most of the others, bat it changed its name, and contimues to this day. In $1^{7} 45$ or 6 , the Duke of Cumberlmad returned to Lomion, after the batile of Culloden, which ended the last armed rising in favcur of the csiled Sthats. On his way to the City be phsied St. Leonard's, Shoredich, where the London Sctolars wert ringing to weleome liin. He was pleased with the ringing. and sent and complimented the performers, who wore so gratified by the princely condescension that they changed their name, and thereafter berame filu Saciety of Royal Ctumberland Youtlas; and so continue to this day.
This was the societr, and lont bofore they aspited to Grandsiye Caters or Cinques they were, like alt the others, six-bell ringers. They lad their favourite methoris, and one espeeiaty, when, if I delightt in, that they celled it by their own name-London Scholars' pleasure.
That is the liskory of the methorls" name. It takes us back to the ently days of the lixercise, and comects us with the men whose leirs we are. But the committee cares for none of these things. They da noi understand the mame; they think it unsuitable, and wothld firaw a wet sponge across it and nll its associations.
Mr. Burton is no happier in his illustration. He is consumed by a zal for simplicity. When you are in the tower, he tells us, you do not say 'Go Double N̄orwjel Court Boh Major.' Yous say, "tio Double Norwicla.' And even then there is one word too many: Norwidh alone would suffice. Siet us Elien get rid of all these superfloous words, and especially the wort " Rob,' which is ridiculous.
Naw I suppose there is no name of a method or any other ringing term which is so eloqueut of the life and progress of clange ringing as the name of Double Norwich Count Bot Major. Tach of the five walds stands for an important fact in the history of the art. ft fook more than a lmadred yoars hefore the full (itle was evolved, and each word was adoptecl to marle the recognition of an importana trullo.

Tho first scientific ringing that was practised was the olkl plan changes, the priacipio of which is that inc bells nornally theep the snme position, and that individual bells called 'Hunts' were moved mmong them. I'lhis form of ringing, which superticially somewhat resembles mokern 'Stoney, was developed with great skill by Tabian Stedman and other seventeentls century ringeres. It was in construction quite as scientific as modern method ringing, but was hound to be monotonous to the ringers ather than the conductor, and in due oourse gave way Lo 'Cross Peals.' In $n$ 'Cross Peal,' all tho bells nomanally plationimited, nut to get variety nad fresh clanges, dodging lad bo be introdnced. This codging was called a bob-why, is pretty obvicus. The distinetion between the dodging of the method and the called bob did not appear till hater. Thus, Stedman tells ug that in Crandsire Doubles thero are fwo sorts of bob, one simgle and the other douhle, which corrospond to whai we now cell a plain lead end and a bobbucl lead end. Nom, as the difference hetween melhod and methor cousisted solely in the wry and posilion these dodges or babs wore made, it was natural that mon should spenk of them and treat them as if they were the methar. Thus, the name Grandsire Roly really menns that arrangement of dodging, which we call Grandsire; is ollher words, it really means the Grandsire method.
As ringing developed, it was found necessary for the conductor to tell the ringers when to make sone of the dodges; and, to do so, ho naturally used the word "toob, which is shatp and to the pointi, and meanswhat it says; but other dodges were none the loss bobs, thongla they were not called. Nor was there any fixed tule as to which bolis shotild be called, and which understood by the ringers.
In Garthon's peal of Graudsire Triplea, the vastonn was, in some places at any rato, to call only the Fifta's place bobs, and leave the ordinary Guanclsire Third's place hob to the indivittaal ringer. Beforin the first quarter of the eighteenily contury had passed, the present fistinction between the dodges, which are the metion, and the hobs, which tre the composidiett, had been evolved.
A thited use of the word lrob survives. This is in the difle Treble Hob, which neans exactly what it says-at methorl in which the treble dodyes.
So we have threa dislinct uses of this word: all are ditectly due to the original and natural use of the terme "The word "bob," as the etaivalent of 'method,' has in quite recent times been resiricted to a parlfoular class of methad, but this is only carrying out a tendency which has for very long existed. And there is not and never has been any confusion or misuaderstancing from this triple use of the word, either in practice ar in theory.
Whon ringers began to practise diferent metlods fiey naturally begrn to give them names to rlistinguish one From another, und like any olher people they had virious reasons for those names. Some marth the comection of a method with a particular town. as Gamburidge Surprise or Oxford Bob. Some were called by the name of the society who first rang lisern, as College. Bob, Union Bob, or London Scholars' Fleasure. Some were merely fancy names, such hz 'Planix,' or "What You Please," or 'Paradox.' Some were descriplive names, sucli as Grandsire, or Crambo, or Old Donbles. And one of these tames was Court Bok, a very good mame which I suppose slowhl be included in the faneg names.

Court Boh originally was a six-bell method. In fact, until nearly tho end of the seventeenth century all tinging of practicslly all singing. Has fye and Eix-bell ringing. Stedman bes no move than a fairly long paragraph on changes in eight bells, and even this is taken ap matinly by explaiuing how to ring six-bell methons on eight bells willt $4-8$ behind, or five-hell meljods with $7-4.8$ behind, 'whidt has of late been practised by the College Youths, and excellonliy well performed by them." But when we get to the dighteentl enmtury ringers are beginning to make use of all the eight bells for
danges. What they airl was to try and extend the five and six-hell clanues. What they aid was to try and extend the five and six-hell to have some term to distinguislo the differentr numbers of bells. Doubles, of course, would tho for five bells, for you hard double changes, end Triples for seven. But the first plan of ealling six-hell ringing 'Trebles and Doubles' was cumbersome. And now you have a method rung on hoth six and eight bella. What hetter way could You have of deseribing thom than to call one ' Minor' and the othor
' Major'? A Roval ' for ton Jells was to come later and this was a mosil lappy thonght, whosenocver it was. Marimus for twelwe was fairly obvious.
Court Roh was one of the most popular of six. Well methods, as it deserved to be. Sn it was natural Ihat when men hat accomplishod Geandsire Triples, Rob Major amil Troble Bob Major, that Hiey sionald burn their attention to Courl Bob on eight bells. But Court Boh Minor, dhough il is very simple and regular in construction, has mo obviatusly correct extension like Plain Bob or Grandsim or Treble T3ob has. Why, wo need not now stop lo inquire. And so it was that almost every band that tried to produce Cowt Bob Major got different methorl. Theten at loasi were rang. When John Reeves (Continued at foot of nixi page, column 2.)

UOMLLELLON OF GRFAT SCHEME IN GHESHIRE TOWER.
A fostival week in connection wilh the dedieation of the new ring 0f eighit betls at Normury, Chestire, began on Oet. 24th, whea the bells and the new chancel, frit of a greater church restoration schene, wero thediented and the chancel consecrated by Lhe Bishop of Choster (Dr. Paget.). There was a large atbendance of clergy and public. The service itseli was an impressive one, and the Bishop's homely address was based upan the words of Faggaj, 'Erom this day will I bless you." Il was an extraordinary happiness to he anontel them lhat afternoon, he said. St, Thomas' $\mathrm{g}_{1}$ Norbury, wha one of tho patimas in which le was parbieularly interested, for when he firs, came there he had to appoint a new Vicar of the parish. It was noti in his gift, but foe was askerl to advise, and they would agree Hat lue made a happy choise. From that day forwards he had always been struck with two thinge: One was that they at Norbury west nu extraordinarily united set of people, amongst whom there had never bean a suggestion of division on disunfon. Anolher thise was that they were also and extraordinary latd-working and earmest lat of people, wha knew how to put their shoulders to the wheel and can"y a big business through. It was an extraordimary lappiness on woning to dedicate suctu desirable and beauliful additions to the cladeh as thase with wheh they were coneerned that day, to know and feel that they latd been given by a people who belicved in tefighon, in the celigion of Jesus Chrish, and who believerl in the Chareh of England as a true hranch of Christ's looly Catholte Clnarch. Fis looclship pointed out that there were cases where people had hom so trent on bailding Their owis houses that they had shown arten slacknose in providing for the laouse of Goal. They had their flubs, Lheir shops, their cimemas and generally two or three publiehouses, but sometines it was a litbe difthent to fiod adequate provision in the slape of a churgh. There are few instances of charch restoration and improvement in which greater courage and enterprise lave been shown than ia the Norbury
The naterations lanve included lime extension of the chancels extension of the vestrjes; repair and the reslating of the roof: outside painting renewal of the windows; removal of the organ from the west gallery: re-seating of the galleries; the installation of electric lighting decorations througlout; outsite paitting, and the recasting of tour beffg and tha addition of four now ones, making a peal af aght instearl of six.
It is estiniated that the total cost will he over e5,000. The amount in hand is 64,700 , and it is lioped to raise the remainder by means the week's fertival.
The old bells manc originally from Disloy Clutch. Two, now hang in tho wast poreh, date from 1617, and rie inseribed: Jesus be our gpeed,' and 'God kave the King. The oller four date from 1682. 1748,1750 and 1837. The oldest of these wis rewast in 1873. The ald and the now inseriptions are as follows:

No. 1.-(Peter Lee, Esc(., 1750). Recast 1925, as the gift of the Nonconformists of Hazel Grove. "Behald, how geod and joytal a thing it is, brethren, to dwell together in unily.

No. 2.-(Peter Lee, Lord of Lime, 1748). Recast 1925. In memory of the men of this patish whe gave Wheir fives in the Greal War, 1914-1918. 'For God, King, and Country.

No. 3.-Ringers' Bell, 1925, In memory of Private Herbert wilLiemson, Loyal North Lanes Regiment, who died December 15th, 1918, aged 38, far many years a ringer at this church.

No. 4-Dedicated by the Freemasons of Hazel Grore and district 1925. (Squate and compasses). "Brotherly Love, Relief, and Truth."

No. 5.-(God sare this church. Thomas Legh, Esq., Lyme Park, 1837). Recust 1925.

No. 6.-(All people may betole and see the works of good Sir Peter Legh, 1682, recast 1873). Recast 1925.

No. 7.-Te Deum Landamus. A thankofforig from the congregation, 1925.
No. 8. -Nisi Dominus Frustra, 1925.

Bells 7 and 8 base been fitted with Taylor's patent balanced clapper, which prevents the bell clappering wrongly, llats "rising' the belle is a simple matter. A nets fwo-inch floor has been put in. immediately under the franue, and whilst the ringing room is not too noisy, the loisted bells can be Histincily heard. All prase is due to the contuators and their fhanger, Mr. T. Dexter, who placed the bells in the tower.

aud his coadjutors were preparing the 'Clavis,' they found two versions extensively practised, and to distinguisis them they calleal
 Norwich version is very much the superior of the otber, and I think it likely that if it had been the other wry akout, five 'Glawis' anthors would Lere given the London relsion as simply Court Bob, and rejected the other as ineorrect.
On ten bells, they say, there is but one correct extension, and they call that Coust Bob only. By what argumeat they persuaded themselres that this is in any way an extemsion of London Court Major I do not know. ?he truth seems to tae that London had no rival to the Norwich method, which was allowed to hold the field.
Otir method is now called Norwich Court Bob Major. One further step had to be made in the evolution of the nane. William Shipway is one of the great men of the Exercisc. In more than one thing fie left his mark in the development of our art. And one of the things he did was to classify methods, and give them in their proper single, reporso and double variations. He was, of contse, not the first who recogaised Ihese variations. Fabian Stedman liad dome so; so far as Plain Both on four bells is coneerned, a hundred and fifty years before Slipway's time. And several peals of Reverse aud Danble Bob and Grandsire thad been rung in the cighteenth centuty. 耳ut Shipway was the firsi to zecognise it as a geaeral law.
