## THE JUBILEE OF RINGING SOCIETIES.

References made, both at the Norfolk Guild meeting and the meeting of the Gloucester and Bristol Diocesan Association, on Easter Monday, are a reminder that quite a number of out Associations are approaching their jubilee. Two years ago the Devon Guild acbieved this distinction; last year the Yorkshire Association completed its half century of existence; this year the Lancashire Association reached its jubilee; next year the Norfolk Guild will reach its fiftieth year, having been established as the Norwich Diocesan Association; and in the following year the Gloucester and Bristol Diocesan organization will celebrate a similar milestone in its history. In the course of the next few years also the majority of the other territorial and diocesan associations will reach this important stage, and it is well to recall that it is the period which has elapsed since their foundation which has seen the most rapid advance in the art.

Prior to the 'seventies,' ringing had no organizations within its ranks except the old London societies, and a few provincial bodies, whose activities were confined mostly to the towers from which they took their mames. For the rest the ringers were chiefly a oondescript body, owning allegiance to no one, not even to the church whose bells they rang. Change ringing, except for a few shining examples, made but poor progress, and bell ringers, as a whole, had fallen into sad repute. Eetween fifty and sixty years ago, however, a spirit of reform in the conduct of church bell ringing began to make itself felt. Some of the clergy became interested in it and, in turn, interested others, and, gathering round them mes of enthusiasm is the art, they laid the foundations of modern ringing associations, whose slogan was 'belfry reform and advancement of the art of change ringing.'

The success which has been achieved in both these directions is, in these days, apparent, but for many years it was an uphill struggle, and the present generation probably does not recognise to the full the debt which it owes to those early pioneers who had not only to fight down the prejulice, which existed among many ringers against the introduction of scientific change ringing, but to strive with determination to eradicate those practices which had brought ringing into disrepute with the public. It was a slow process, but the work has been none the less successful. Not only is the standard of method ringing generally much higher, but change ringing has vastly extended in the number of those who practice it. There are probably dearly as many peals rung now in a weel as there were in a year half a century ago. The elimination of the undesirable element has raised the status of the

To the associations largely this is due, and as in turn they each attain their jubilee they are, while reaiising that much yet remains to be accomplished, entitled to take credit for and congratulate themselves upon good work patiently and well done.

## ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING AT FULHAM.

The 2gth annual general meering of the Middlesex County Association and London Diocesan Guild was held at All Saints', Fulham, un Saturday, April doth, when some ;o memisers altended. Jivine scrvice was held it $4 \cdot 30$, when in inspyining sermon was preached by the Rector of Acton (Rev. J. H. Sewsham Taylor), ath honorary mem ber of the association, who kiseal his address on the text, "Lo, I am with you slusy. even tinlo the end of the world, takee from Mathew 2 K , zers:

After cea, which was servert in the Church llall, the usual business meeting was held. The chair was taken ly the Presifent ( $M 1$, F. A. Milne. J.P.), who was supported by Messers, W. Pickworth (vicepresidens, W. Pye (Master), R. Holloway and N. A Tomlinson (Districe Masters), C. I. Coles and W, H. Hollier (hon. secretaries), T Bealle, J. Waghoms. A. W. Coles. G. R. I'ye, W. H. Oram, etc.

The adoption of the report was moved by the $\Gamma$ resiticut, seconded by Mr. G. R. F're, and carticd. Extracts from the very interestiog repo t are appended :-
lis: year we commented briefly on the necessity for regular practices, especially at those churches where lach of facilities for practice had caused ringers to become slack. We urged our elergy t, sat aside a definite night which the ringers could consider their own, and pointed out that unless ringers had practice, the Sunday ringing twould suffer. We hope that our few words an this subject have not been entirely without good results, but there are still somle of our towers where we feel there is room for improvemeat. Without practice we cannot train young ringers, and the need for a contirtual supply of recruits to our ranks is ever present. Some of our bands have had no additions to their numbers for years, and we would drge the leaders of our lowers always to be mindful of the necessity of providing for the days ahead. when age causes members to fall out of the ranks. Even apart from the latter as a molive, it is for the good of ringing in general, and for the Association in particular, thas we should always be on the look-out for somebady whom we can teach to ring. In these days of the broadcasting of ringing it should be easy io get people quichly interested, ant we should make the most of our opportunities.

## NEGLECTED BELLS

There is another matter that gives us cause for concern. The state of the bells in several of our towers is far from satisfactory. Some of them have been going badly for ycars, and urgently need the attenrions of tive bell-hanger, but for various reasons nothing is done. If bells go badly it is essential that they should not be neglected, and we would urge those responsible to do all that is possibie ro have the bells in their charge kept in good going condistion. There are far too many peals of bells which to-day are never rung, simply because of neglect in the past, and it is our duty to see that the inetis handed down to us are left ins good urder for those who come after 43 . A card of instructions, drawn up by the ringers' Central Council. aad containing expert advice on the care of bells, has recenty been distributed in all our towers, and we hope that our bands witt sete that the belts in their charge are properly looked after. Ringers hhouid also see that the attention of the clergy and Parochial Church Councils is continually drawn to cases of badly going bells, with a vicw to their having proper and expert attention.

The the etings luld were argain very satisfactorily atlended. Our present memhership is $\overline{39}$ an increase of ten compared wirit last year. lin the $N$. and E. District we elected 2 honorary and 38 ringing memleers, whist in the 5 . and W. District 3 honorary and 36 ringing mentuers were admitued. The continued increase in our by resignation, or by their falling into arrears with subscriptions, is to be deplored, zent we trust that every efort will be made by masters of locat bands to stimulate interest in ringing amongst their members. A standing still attitude is never a good one, and alterrpts to improve what we have already done is the only sure waty of

Duting the rear the hand of dealh has taken three of our members from us. Edgar Wightman, of Usibridge, died on February 15 th
at the age of 30 . He had only recently rejoined the Association on moving finto the councy, but had been a member in our earlier days, He was a good ringer and a capable conductor, and rang 31 peals for the Association, having conducted five of them. He took part in the firsi handbell peril al Cinques runc by our menabers.

On Juse 1 th the death of Danie! Lorett occurred, in his 73 rd year. He had occupied the position of sexton and verger at St. Sepushre's, Holisorn, fur upwards of 45 years, and during lis quarter century of membership had proved a loyal friend to us. He did not greatly aspire to moal ringing, tut on one occasion he rang the lenor at his , wh church kr :1 peal ul Siedman Caters with this Association.

Herbert Buker, of Herthord, died on Decemher $28 t h$, aged 62 . He had beell a member since 1902 , and hat rung three peals witlz us. He served in the late war in France, and was second in compand of his batalion of the Herts Regiment. He served the public at Fertord in many canacities, befing in tura cotncillor, alderman, and mayor.

## NOTEWORTHY PEALS.

Turning to the peals, we note a considerable reduction in the number rang during inz5, but as we have no record of the number of attempts that have been made we are unable to say whether the reason for the decrease is that fewer have been attenpted, or thay a larger number than usuat have been lost. As, however, peal ringing, if not the whole object of our existence, is a sigth of aur fiveligess as an organisation, we hope that members will put their best into this bratch of our aetivitics. It is in this direction that interest among the younger mentisers may he stimalatei.

The total number of peals rung was 60 , and 178 members took part in them, 25 sharing in the conducting. Thitsen members rang their first peals, and 54 their "Irrsts" ins a new method or on a different numiser of helts. Among the latter were three of Cambridge Masimus, one of Cambridge Royal, one of Stedman Cinques, three of Bristol, and two of loondon. Sieven members rang the ir firss peals of Bols Royal, two their "firsis" of Stedman Calers, and six of Steiman Triples. Among those who ralyg their first peals was Master C. T. W. Coles, aged i4, sont of the joint hon. secrelary, who rang the treble to Grandsire Caters at St. Mary's, Walthamstaw, on February asit. Mastur ILoward Nackiman, also at the age of 14 , accomplished at fine performance it ringling his Grst peal of Stedman Triples at Acton on June moth. Miss 31 . Ringtose rang her first peal af Burnham-on-Crouch on suygust 2ath. Mrs. R. F. Deal rang her first peal of Cambridge Maximus at Whatham Abbey on January 3 3rt, and her first of Bristol Surprise at Culsit Town on October 17th;
whilst Miss P. Moss accomplished Douthe Norwich at Wislesden on whilst Miss P. Noss accomplished Douhle Norwich at Wislesden on Sanuary $13^{\text {th }}$, ant Bols Royal at Hillingilon on Decenaber 26 th. Several others of out fady memabers are well to the front int the list of
peal ringers, and it is worthy of notice that on Jantuary aotis, Iq26, ten members of the Laclies' Guild atang az peal of Stedman Caters al Clement Danes Church, the whole of the hami being also members of this Association. Messrs. . I. I'. Putland and A. Cross have the honour of appearing in the list of conductors for the first time, the former actually, calling his own first peal. Mr. R. Sanders rang his tomth prat during the year. To all of these we exiend our heartiest congratulations.

Of the peais themselves, 39 were rung on tower-beils
diferent towers, and one an hanrlbeds. Four tower-bell peals
rung with half-muffed clappers as a token of respect to her late Most Gracious Majesty Øueen Alexantrat, at Stanmore, Heston, Edmonton and Bishopsgate, whilst severat quarter-peals were rumg at other towers as part of the natiopal mourning. At the meeting of the S. and W:. District helf at Hillingion on November $21 s t$ the hells were rung half-muftecl. A vole of condolence with the Kink and Queen, passed at this meeting, was most graciously acknowledged by their Majestios.

One outstanding performance was accomplished,
7,392 Cambridge Surprise Maximus, which was rung at 5 t. Mary-leBow on December zath. This is the longess peal yel rung in the method on twelve bells, athed also the longest lengith in any metlood rung on the bells in tie tower.

## ACKÑOWLEDGMENTS.

So far as bell restoration is concerned, there is lithe to report Twickenham, Messrs. Mears and Stainlank have retuned and hung the bells in new gudgeons and bearings, with very satisfactory results, whilst fohs faylor and Co. are at present engaged hangiag the beils an all Sains', Poplar, in an entirely new frame. The scheme to add two trebles to the existing peat of cight at IEseworth is maturing. About a thiref of the sum of Et8o required has been collested. A small committee has been formed to carry the matter to a successful conclusion, and we trust that our mentibers will give thern all the financial help they can.

Before closing, it is our pleastat duty to record our grateful thanks to Mr. "F. Beadle on his retiremem from the ofice of Distriat Vice-President. An original mentber of the Association, he was one of thoae mainly instrumenta! in lringing about the amalgamation of the two district societies. He has serwed the society its many ways, and was for some years Master of the S. and W. District. He has our sincere thanks for the good work he has done for the Association, and our good wishes for many more years of happiness amongst his ringing Iriends.

Mr. G. B. Lucas, too, retired from office last year, although his
netident whilst cycling was the cause of his giving up ringing，and he resigned the office of Master of the $N$ ．and $E$ ．District，which he lixd held since 1922．Prior to that date he had been a member of the Cinnral Cimmitice since the commencement of the seciety．We thank him for his many years of service，and trust that he will fully re－ cover from this unfartunate accident，and may again be able to take tin uctive part in the worts of the Assaciation．
guite a number of our members deserve our thanks for their work as voluntary instructors，among them being Mliss P．Moss， Messrs．A．W．Coles，1．Corke，F．A．Edwards，R．A．Fardon，F．W． Goodfellow，J．II．Hunnisett，J．K．Mackman，J．Milner and N．A． ＇lamlinsor．Without such assistance as is givers by these members， the Association would quickly come to an end．

We also wish to acknowledge the invaluable services rendered $t 0$ the Association by the joint han．speretaries．A great deal of their work is done silently and unseen；wa can best show our appreciation ul cheir efforts by supporting thom at the Assoctation meetings and by prompl payment of sulascripstions．

The halance sheet was next considered，and it was especially noted that，in spate of an expenditure of over $\boldsymbol{x}_{7}$ on a new and improved association certificate，there was on small balance to the good an the yexts warking．

The wisole of the ofticers were re－tected，as follows：－Presiden， Mr，ド．A．Milne，J．P．；vicespresidents，Messrs．C．S．Bird and W． Hickworth；Master，Mr．W．Eye；hon．treasurer，Mr．F．A．Milne： hum．secretaries，Messers．C．T．Coles and W．H．Hollier．Messers，J． b．Miller and W．Pickworth were appointed autitors．

A recommendation by the Central Committee that 60 per cent．of the subscriptions，in lies of the present 70 per cent．，be aflocated to the Gentral Fund，was carried．

Dear Sir,-In your issue of April Sih, you published the unique record of Mr. Eopkins of Ibstock, Leicestershire, and asked how many ringers land passed their 70th birthday before attempling their first peal.
The late Mr. Wrs. Featon, a member of the Colne Irarish Churvh ringers, who died in April, 1920 , had a simblar record. He was a ringer at the şame church for over 70 years. Four yors after the two trebles were added he rang his first peal, Bob Major, at the age of 72. He rang nino peals int all: 4 Boh Major, 3 Kent Treble Boh Major, and 2 Grandsire Priples. He mang the tenor ( 16 cwts ) throngh thom rall. His frst peal was on Whit Mondey, 1904, and the last on Whit Monday; 2908. Fe rang the lenor to within a fow montlis of hiv death, which occurred in his B8th yeer.-Fours, etc.

Partiss liad also welcomed the visitors, Mr. Askew, who liad made himself responsible for nollecting the money necessary for the work, stated tiat the wholo of the amonnt required to retume nind reliang the bells, over f600, had now been raised. Another finbet records the peal of 5,017 Stedman (inques by the St. Murtin's Guild, Birmingham, on duly $51 \mathrm{~h}, 1924$, the first of Cinques an the bells, conducted by Mr. A. Wulker, while a thired, given by the Rey. N. Kelly (ex-President of the Guikd) records a peal of 5,015 Grandsire Clinques, the lirst rumg
menters of the Dewon Guild on Jabuary 9th, 1926, coudueled by the president, the Rev. E. S. Powell. Punctnally nt 2.15, the tima appointeil. the Dean (the Very Rev. H. R. Gambley with Canons Melaren am? Newlon Teeke, arrived in their robes, the cougregation flan manbering th, wheln ineludet eight. ladies.
Caraun McLaren reciled the sentences, and leai the simging of au appropriate lyym, which was heartily 1enderefi. Then Mr. Sonde, ont behalf of the triples peal hand, Mr. Walker, for the Birming. ham peal band, and the Rev. E. S. Powell, om thehalf of Mr. Kelly, respectively offered the tablets for the acceptanes athd enstorly of the Chapter. Folforing the dedicatory affirmation, a fiealm and prayer, the Dean gave an instuctive and encouraging address, which, with the usnal Blessing. concluded the funclinn.
Two touches of Grandsire Cinques by meminers of the various pera batals who were present, wert then rang prior to the afternoon service. The Rey. SI. Kelly himsole, in spithe of his adwaced age athe plysical infirmity, managed to ascend the tower steps, fant Mr. A Waiker came specially from Birmingham to be present.
A tea and mecting werg held later in the afterneon ato the Trade and Labour Fiall, thout 60 (tepresentative of five of the six branches) being present.-Mr. Kelly, addressing the meetner, ronnacited on the great advance in change ringing by the Guila siace the early days when he scored his first 120 of Donbles, and pointed out that the cercmony for whieh they harl met that day, wris, nat probably would bo, unique in the amals of the fuith. The frot tablet, he Eaid, who ande possible by the munificence of a wertly trootina, Mr. A. C. Thomas, who hat given the two new trebles. Fine scoud, for the peal of Stedman Cinques by their Birmingham friends, of which they were equally proud, for ringers were brothets all the world over, and the minitiated could not anderstand their language, was a liandsome tablet well worliny of the occasion, for he had ile pleasure of listening to a part of fle peal himself, and could testify to its excelience And then the one for their own Devon peal of Graudsire Cinques, which was a consummation he never really expected in his lifetime although he had long hoped for it, whe he considered Mr. Powell, 85 conductor, deserved especial praise.

## EXTENSION OF Mr3HODS.

 wiht hand ind warkiag bells, from even to odd numbers, was to adtl, not to the working toills, bul to the huthes.

How th"s ean be tone you will easily see from the follawing diagrams. Thu first shows oue hunt and five working bells, and beside it two humts and five working heils. The second slows Oxford Bob Mjor, and beside it the same thing with two dunts. T'o ennute these to the comparod I liave marked the hunts $A$ and L , and in both ceses given tho workitg bells as 23456 . Finally, 1 hara written out the Binor and Triphes thate in the tretal way,


Now you will notice that Oxford Boty Trijles bears exactly the same relationship to Oxford Bob Minor that Grandsire Triples does to Dlatu Thab Minor, 'And, indeed,' as Shipway anys, "The Grandsire systern is jn- reality mothing more than the Boh system with a belk in The hunt, being imperfect without it on acconat of the two whole pulls behind af the dodgiag.' And further on he repeats that 'Grandsire is merely Bols Jingiug with a bell in the hunt.' And lie goes on in suggest that all the extensions with a bell in the lant slanif hava Granisire as a sulu-bitle. Thus jt would he Oxforif Boh our even eursbers, and Grandsire Ontord Boli on odd. Double Norwicli Court Bob Major on eight bells and Grandsire Double Norwich Court Boh Caters an nine beils. I wonder what Mr. Burton ihinks of the last?
Putting a belf in the hunt does not alter the wore of a method other than youl have to reckon on two trobles instead of one, and that, the doulping above tios treble, whielt is at bach stroke on even
numbers, comes at laand strake on odd nambers, aud necessarily different bofs and sugles must be neer. So that if rou know a method on eight Frells you will havo no particular difficuly in ringing it ou ninc. And herein lies a big opportunity for iruproving ringigg in ten-bell towers. Al present, Gater ringing is practically confined to Stedman, with oreasionally a liftle Gramdsire. But for a progressive lund there ure quite a mambor of excellent, and by no means dificult melhods ready to hancl. Double Norwich Cators, for instance, which is much superior to Stedmat Caters; Cambritge Courd is anotler. And evers one of the fifteen Major methods described in "The Ringiag World" of April, 1924, cata have au hdditional bell in the buat, and be turned inle a good Cater methorl.

## NEW PEAL AT AXBRIDGE

ONE OF THE FINEST FOR ITS WEIGHT TN SOMERSET.
The bells at Axbridge Parish Church, Somerset, have been recasi by Mesars. Taylar and Co., of Longhborough. An iton frame on steel girders bas been substituted for the old wooden cage, and the six bells, with tenor of one ton, in E flat, have been lung in modern fittings.

For about eight pears this ring had been silent, and the scheme fas tho restoration of the tower and bells lans geen errien out at a cost of aboul $£ 1,000$, towarde which a legacy of 8550 wili be derated.

The rededicnition was performed on March 24th by the Fural Donn (We Rev. Prota. G. M. Lambrick, Recter of Blagdon), and was aktended by a lavge cougregation. The service was conmucted by the Rechor (ilue Rev. E. Tofi), and after the formal cermony the Raial Đean preachets. He took as his text the words, from a preface of the Irayer Book, 'The Curato shell cause a boll to be tolled,' and his address was wonderfully fistorical, interesting and practical, The collection, in aid of ine Bell Fund, frmounted to 5417 s - 1d.

After the Blessing had been pronoumced, the congregation remained seated listoning to the sweet tomes of the hella as they were being rung by sompe of the old Axbridge ringers, assisted by frimuls fromz Winscombe and Chedtar. Everybody was enthusiastic in their praise of Messes. Taylor's wort, nnd it is considered that Axbridge now possesses one of the fineat peals for its weight in the county of Somersiel.
On Sulday, April 11th, for the evening service, a quarter-peal of Grandsire Doubles was ruag in 40 mins.: G. E. Shallish (conducton" 1, G. R. Brown 2, E. Avery 3, G. Gilling 4, R. Roborts 5. J. Fincent 6. The first quarter-penI on the bells since they have been relügr.

## DEATH OF A BATH RINGER

A well-knowti Bath ringer Mr. Thamas Hogstlest passed away stiddenly at his howe on April 1st, at the age of 57 years.

Mr. Hogsflesll had had a long ringivg career, nud went to Babla 20 years ago. For many years he was tower master at St. James's, and at another time was a ringer at Si. Mary's, Bathwiek. Twelve years mgo the beame a ringer at tho Abber. where ge remaned up to the time of his death He won extremely poptinar among his collengues, and had an interesting record, and lind rung a considerable number of peals, his lasi being Grandsire Cinques aE Painswick on February 13 tit.

Besides being conmected with tho Bath and Wells Diocesnu Associa tion, Mr. Hogsflesh was connected with the Gloucester and Bristol and Salisbury Guilds, and the Ancient Societs of College Youths. Ony last Werember he was one of the party fuon the West who attendod the society's annual uinner in London.
The fureral took place at St. James's Cemetery on April Tth, when the Rector of Batl (Archdeacon Bord) officiated. Maty ringers and fellow workmen of deceased attenuled. The chief mourners were the widow, Mr. Donald Hogsfiesh (son), Miss Allard (niece). Mr', and Mrs, Mabley (Exeter), and Mr. aur Mrs, H. A. Dyke (brothers-in-law and sisters-in-faw), and 3Ir. W. C.
