## THE FUNCTIONS OF AN ASSOCIATION.

To what should a ringing association limit its attentions? This question is raised by the discussions which took place at a meeting of the Surrey Association on Saturday, when the members were called upan to adopt new rules. In the draft presented by the committee the first rule provided for four things: (a) the recognition of the true position of ringers as church olficials; (b) the due care and use of church bells and belfries; (c) the cultivation of the art of change ringing; ( d ) to supply, when required, information of a practical character concerning the condition of the beils and their fittings. The inclusion of two of these objects was challenged, not casually, but deliberately by one of the District Committees, and for that reason the subject deserves more attention than it otherwise would. It was urged that ' the due care and use of church bells and helfries ' was no part of the business of the association, but the duty of the church authorities; and that ' 10 supply, when required, information of a practical character concerning the condition of the bells and their fithings" was the business of local ringers and bell founders, and not of a ringing organisation. The oljection to the first of these two points was successful; the second objection was defeated.
Looking at the matter broadly, it seems to us that anything which will lead to efficiency in the belfry, whether in the men who act therein or in the beils which they use, is to be encouraged. It is true that the duty of maintaining the bells and the belfry in proper condition devolves upon the church authorities, but to say that a county or diocesan association should have no part in promoting it seems to us to be excluding from its objects one of the most useful purposes it can serve. The wording of the rule, in this particular instance, may have been a little unfortunate, although, we imagine, the members fuly understood what was, in principle, intended. Some of the other associations have this object more clearly stated by defining their attitude as being one for 'the encouragement ' of the preservation of bells in an cfficient condition; and there could be no object more worthy of ringers' attention than that. Frequently the influence of an association has been the means of getting bells restored, and it is a pity that the Surrey Association have not looked with more favour upon their opportunities for usefulness in this direction.

On the second point which it was proposed to eliminate, other counsels prevaited, and the association will still be able to supply, when required, information concerning the condition of belis and their fittings. The resolution to retain this rule was, we think, wisely made, because it opens the way to doing valuable work. It is in no (Continuced on page 14.)

sense impinging the prerogatives of a local company or the bell founders. If local men have any difficulty in convincing their church authorities of the need for renovations, it considerably strengthens their hands if they can call in independent evidence such as the association should be in a position to provide. Indeed, many of the associations have been able to go a step further than this, and either get a representative on the Diocesan Advisory Board, or a person recognised by the Board to whom reference is made in every case where augmentation or restoration of bells is under review. Ringing organisations should seek to extend their sphere of usefulness and influence rather than curtail it; and no association, is our view, is properfy fulfilling its functions if it does not keep its eye upon the structural and mechanical conditions prevailing in its towers and stand ready to give advice when asked. The maintenance of bells in a proper condition is just as important to the success of an association as the maintenance of bands, for, without efficient bells, the bands will ultimately disappear.

Dear Sir, The following is all account of the peal of Triples rung at Braughing on September 30 th, 1746 , and I give it to you as copied from the board in the ringing chamber:-

These 8 bells ware rung for se first time September 25th, 1745, and ye first peal of 5,040 Priples were rung in 3 lirs. 10 mies., Septomber Ye 30th, 1746. By Fno. Scripps treble, Wm. Welch 2, Geo. Wallis 3, Thos. Hubbard 4, Thos. Raymeni 5, Wm. Wetch 6, Win. Ghamberlain 7, Fran. Uacle tenor. All of this parish. Given by Wm. Freeman, Esq.'

This is quite a diferenl band from the one that rang the Aspeaden peal. No method or conductor is given on either board, but evidently both peals were Bob Triples.

Mr. Archibald Jackson, of Sawbridgetrorth, has written soveral ntideles relating to the belis of Aspenden ant Braughing, and they have appeared in the "Hertfardshire Mercury' from time to time.

Wm. Chamberlain was evidendy one of the workmen engaged when the new frume and bells were placed in the tomer in 1745 , as his intials 'W.C.' are carved on one of the braces aad also on the stonework on the stairs. One is 'W.C. 1739. ' Probably he was the village carpenter at that date, and made the frame from aak grown on ite Hamels estate.

The first peal of Grandsire at St. Dunstan's-in-the-West, Lonlun was rung un April 1st, 1834, by St. Dunstan's Society, conducted h Thomas Toliaday, who was a prominent member of the old St. Tames' Sceiety. The bells of St. Dunstan's-in-the-West are seldom, if ever, rung how. Thay overlang Flect Strect.

The Dutble Norwick reeord was broken on April 3rd, 1899, when 9 hrs. 24 mins., nt Erith, wembers of the Kenl County Association rung a peal of 15,072 .

A fiundred and twenty years ngo next Thursday, a peal of 10,097 Granusire Caters was ruag ut Shrewsbury in 6 hoe 50 mins. A tablet was erected by the Union Saciety to record the pent, which, if smrpassed by future practitioners, wil] stand as a memorial that their predecossors were not deficient in skill and perseverance.'
The Norfolk Guild report for 1927, which has just been issued, shows that 44 peals were rung by tho Guild in 1927, of which two wero on ten bells, 25 on eight bells, 14 on six bells, and threo on tiva bells. This compared with 61 in 1926, and is the lowest number for a grent many years.

For the ather service that day would be better to ring whe bells unmuffed.
In the case of a Royal personago, a mational personality, or u municipal loss such as a Lord Mayor, requiriug national or municipat mourning, it, would be better to ring for all services on the Sumdiny, espectally if tife week-end interveres between the death and lha fuweral.
The best form of muffed ringing is, of course, the 'whole pull and stand, which should be practised by every bar? of ringera for swall occasions. It is simplo and most effective, and is apprecinted $\ddagger$ mendously, not only by relatives of the deceased themselves, hut ly the outside public. We raserve tha last five to tes minntos of the riaging following a tolech far this purpose.
On armistice Day we rivg as above before the service, but ring ilns congregation out with open bells, to larmonise with the 'Roveille, a rejoicing for tho resurrection.

## SURREY ASSOCIATION

## AMALGAMATION SGHEME DEFEATED.

An important meeting of the Surrey Association was held at LeatherHead on Saturday. It was specially convened mader a resolution of the annual meeting, first to receive the resutt of a plebiscite arang the members on a proposal to approach the Guildford Diocesan Guild, with a scheme of amalgamation; and, secondly, to consider a new cleaft set of rules. After ringing on the ten bells of the Parish Church in the nfternoon and attending service, the members partook of a sabstantial ment tea at the lnstitute. They then settled down to husiness, which ergaged their attention for a full thyee hours, and thexe wore some animated discussions. The Master (Mr. J. D. Drewett) presided, supported by Mr. C. H. Kippon (hon. secretary), Mr. U. Dean (hon. iteasurer), and neariy 60 members from most of the towers in libe area of the association.

The Master, in reviewing the steps which had led up to that meoting, referred to the original proposal made over a year ago, that the question of amalgamation with Guildford Diocesan Guild should be considered. This rewulted in a cenference with the organising committee of the Guild, who pointed out that they had no powers to deal with the subject, but suggested that the Burrey Association Committee should formulate a scheme which might to put before the mombers of the Guild when it was formed. As i result, a scheme was submitted at libe Surrey Associafion's last annual meeting in January, when it was resolved to take a plebiscite upon it. This scheme pro posed that amalgamation should take place on January lst 1929 , that the society be called the 'Surrey County Associntion and Guildford Diocesan Guild of Church Bellringers, with the Bishops of Southwark and Guildford as ex-officio joint presidents; that the rules of Guildford Diacesan Guild be adopted wath cortain minor alterations, and that the two orranisatioas should coutinue absolutely as one society.
The Hon. Secretary then apnounced the result of the plebiscite. He said 263 members were circularised. Of this number, 69 were in farour amalgamation, and 104 against, while 90 did not vote.
The Master gaid the result was againet amalgamation. There was, bowever, a motion beforo them, adjourned from the annual meetiog, that they sinould nmalgamato with the Guildford Guild, and in wiew of the plebiscite something must be done to get that motion out of live

Mr. Wr. T. Trappitt movert as an amendment to the motion that no further steps he thken in the rratter. He did not see why they need malgamate. The Surrey Association was nearly 50 years of age, and it could stanrl on its own legs. He was, he believed, the only original momber of the association left, and he strongly objected to amalgamatian with Guilaford.-Mr. G. Hoar (Reigate) secoaded, and the amendment was carried with only threc dissontients.

## NEW RULEE.

The meeting then procecded to consider, serkatim, new set of rules, and a mamber ai alterations were made to the committee's draft, the changes being made principally upon the representations made by Mr. Northover, oll behalf of the Southern Diatrict Commibtee. The first rule provided that "That society shall be called "The Surrey Association of Change Ringers," and have for its objects, viz.: (a) The rowgnition of the true position of ringers as church officials; (b) the ajue care and use of church bells and belfries; (c) the cultivation of the art of change ringing; (d) tu supply, when required, information of a practical character concerning the condition of the bells and their fittings.'

With xegard to (b), it was urged that this was not the provinco of ful association, the duty of the care and use of chureh bells and belfries devolving upon the incumbent and charch authorities. On a vote being taken, if was decicled to eliminate this clause. A similar proposal to take out (d), as beiag a matter for the local bands or bell founderg, was upposed by several members, and the clause was retained by a considerable majority;
In discussing the 'govermment of the association, it was resolved that the prosident should be elected annually like the other offecers thot the auditor ghould not be an ex-officio member of the Central Committee, nni that therc should bo no honorary members (as in the past) on the commitiee.
It was reselved that non-resident members should pay a compoundine subsoription of 5s., but any manber, who hat paid an annual sulseription for fivo consecutive years, ghoud on leaving the county automatically become a compoundirg member without further payment. The area of the assuciation for this purpose is to be treated s tho geograplical boundary of the county.
It was decided to eliminate the proposed rule giving aubliority to dismise a member from the association for misconduct, it being argucd that it did not look well in a sef of rules for bellimgers, wha could all he relied upon to behave themselves.
A discussion took place on a finaucial rule divecting subseriptions of hon. life members and compounding mombers to be paid into the goneral fund. ## MR. EDWIN BARNETT, SEN. CRAYFORD VETERAN'S 700 PEALS.

The name of Edwin Barnett, senior, is one of the most faniliat to ringers throughout the country, and in the Exercise he bas a large circle of friends, which a gentle nature and a genial disposition has continually widened Lhroughout the years. In the course of his long ringing career Mr. Barnett has achieved a number of distinctions, and his latest is to join the comparatively small group of men who have rung $\quad$ oo peals. Among this little circle, however, Mr. Barnett stands almost unique in the number of mothods which he has included in his big peal total, a total which has certainly not been amassed from selfish ends, for much of his peal ringing has been done to help others, as witness, for instance, his ito peals of (irandsire Ilriples.

Mr. Haranti, sen., was born at Ross, Herefordshine, in 1862, and was educated at the Bluccoat School there. At the age of 13 he remaved to Welshpool, where be beame a Sunday "chimer," thero being no ringiug there at thal timne. Thuee gears later he went to Leytonshous to live, nud there ho came in contact with Mr. Arthur Gardener (who left for Soulh Africa more than 40 yeaus agol, and there bepan his real comection with ringing. Opportunities for enthasiastie foungsters were not numerous in those days with the old school. Mr. Barnett, however, succeeded in ringing his first peal of Triples at West Ham in 1882, within four months of learninis to liandle a hell. Two peats of Grandsire Caiers with George Newson followed very quickly, after which Mr. Barnctt left London to wake up an appointment at Moumontry, where he found the church and bells undergoing restoration. It was nearly two years before the work was completed, and cluring this time he walked regularly (with rery few exceplions) once a fortnight to the nearest place where he conkl gel a change-

As suon as the bella al Nommouth were venung, Mr. Barmett fomed it lanal, co all of whom he hacl to leach tro handling of a bell, but in 14 Ithih mort tham a year they succeeded in ringing a peal of Grand-siri- 'J'ripleg, which was his firsli as conductor. It was also the first peal win the bells nad the second in the connty of Monroonth, the previous bue having been reng at Clapstow many yenrs beiore. During Ihr: frriud he was at Monmouth, Mr, Burnett married, and his son, Mr. Dirwin karnett, jut, was harn there. Very soon after tha noal abown monitioned, tha returmed to London and joined the hand at Leytoustine, where do remained a member until 1889, when le removed to Crayfurd, wibh which place his name has been aesociated ever since. Herr he found practically a 'stoncy' band, but excellent material, whind he very quickly tiansformed into-at that time-ome of the Lust -lange-ringing companies in the county, as whe tecords in 'Bell Nows af the "go's testify.

Mr., Barneti was elected on the committee of the Kent County Assaciation in 1894, and has represented ihat body on the Central Council since 1903. He is one of the oldest mambers of the Itoval Cumberland Youlhs, und in his carly days was closely nssociated with the late (ienter. Newson, Johtn Cax, Henry Dains, nad many others whose numary will live as long os ringing lagts, Fo is a member of many ennmy and diocesan associations.

## MANY "FERSTS,

Mr. Harmeth"g record of "firgt peal in the method for the Eent Comity Ascocintion' is probably usique, for lie las called no fewer than 26, ranging from Triples ta Maximus. Last year a serious operabion threadenert to end his Etfe, but he was happily spared, nod has madr a wontarful recovery. His 700th peal was the first he has been able le ring away from treble or 2nd for some pears, and the fact that lin wis uhle to turn in the teror in 2 urs. 40 mins. sparks for itself.

We referred above to the great varicty which characteriser Mr. Bu'nete's peal list, and it will be seen that it includes four methods of Maximus, two of Ciaques, nine of Royal, two of Catera, 22 of Major, nins ol' Tripless (which is prohalily a tecoud), and six varieties of spliced rumbulds. Jis full list is as follows:-

After a good meal, somgs, speeches, handacll ringing, and instrumental music brought perting time all too suon, hut, as usual, those people who have been several times were thankful that ihey had bean spared to go once more, and those who made their first pilgrimage to that ringing Mecca' said, 'I shall come next year (D.V.).' Fisitors were presont from $\Delta$ bingdon. Bucklebury, Caversham, Faringdon, Groydon, Oxford Reading, Launton, Figh Wycombe, Wokingham, Witney, while that little place called London was also represented.

## ROWS AND CHANGES. <br> BY J. ARMIGER TROLLOPE.

Soma time ago I pointed out (not tor the first time) that the importent thisg in change rimging in general, and the problem of Extension in particular, is nob the rows, fut the chnngea which produce the rows. And I gaid that unless you appreciater bine distinction bebween a row and a change yon were not very likely to go very far in understanding the question of Extension. Of course, i was promptly contradicted. I was told that I was hair splitting, that there is no difference betwern a raw and a change, and that there is nothing between tho changet. These geatlemen, no toubt, think they hava completely demolished my argument to their entire satisfaction, and I should be anry to disturb so happy a frame of mind. But I feel sure that the man who is intecested in Extansion as a gemeral question, and who is not mercif trjing to establish ol dispute some particular case, like Shipway's Superlative or the Superlative Maximus rung at Ipswich, will agree that it is anything but splitting of hairs to make quite sure of the grouuds on which you are working, and rather important to know what you are going to extend before you try and see how it can at cxtended.
Riter all, it is a question of facts and of facts belonging to actual ringing in the tower.
If Fou are thinking of practising a new method you will probably yet that method in the form of at lead of rows. The first thing you will do will be to draw a line, either with a pen or mentally, along the path of one bell. What is tuat but puthing in something between the rows? When you gire the method out to your band to learn, you will probably give them a "skeleton course'; that is to say, rou will ignore the rowe altogeiher and give them only that sometbing you fave put in. And what is that sometbing? it is hunting, placenaking, dodging, leading, lying, snapping and ererything which we call work. These are the things which really are the method, and IJey all take place between the rows. They constifute the changes, find they produce row from
Probably the reason why people say that there is nothing between the nows is becruse there is nothing that they can gee. Pthey can see two lines of figures written on paper; they can see nothing beiween them. True, hut then, a line of figures is aot in itself a row of change ringing; it is only a symbol which represents a row. There s wothing to see of a row in the tower. On the oliter hand, when gou represent the changes by four skoleton course you have a symbol which is just as visible as the line of fyures. A row and a change aro equally real and equally nbstract. There can be no guestion of which is of the more immediate importance in actual ringing. If you ring a peal of, say, London Surprise Major, it is almost certain that you will gever know what rows you have rugg, neither the ringer, nor ihe conductor, nor epen the composer. Fon will know, you must know, what banting and place-making and dodgirg you have done, for they are eversthing that, for the actual ringer, is London Surprise.

This hrings me to my main point. A method is mot essentially a collection of rows, but min amount of movement among the bells. It is a matter of clear historical fact lhat, in that way, and that way alone, ringing was begun, was developed and atill continues. Aud it must study ringing as it is practised in the tower aud not as if it consisted of certain orders of figures written on a piece of paper. To put ( briedy, we nust study chiedy tho changes and not the rows.
Once you get ringing as essentially the movement of bells, certain faws become operative. I hare already pointed out and illustrated tho most important of these. It is that this movement is, and must lue, yclical. Lvery round block, and therefore every method, consists of number of cyclical movements. When this fact is recognised, we are in gight of the solution of tho problem of Extension, so far as any solution is possible. For this reason, a cyclical movement has as definite recognisable way of expansion. tithe plain hunting course on frur bells will mapand into the plain hunting course on six bells in one way, and one tay only. And this is true whether this hunting course is independent or whether it is part of a more complex metiod.

How this works out I will show presently, but there js one thing which I may perhaps be pardoned for refering to. It is the usual custom for prople who eriticise the views, which those of us who have lipen at some irouble to investigate these problems put forward, to call themselves plain practical ringers, and to brush us aside somewhat contempluously as mere "theoriats." They stand for facts; wo oulp for fancies. Actually, the tase is just the opposite. No doubt in these things many views are ampressed which are unsound or only partially true. But the aim is always to find out the truth which underlies the science of rimging, and that truth is being found out mora and more each year. Whereas your 'practical' man is usually ane who refuges to look an inch hefore his nose, wha thinks that the litile he can gee is all that there is to be seen, and who imagines that his projudices mod interests are all that matters in zinging. Disuajly $\pi$ very warthy sort of man (we all share his failings), but not the most trustworthy euide in finding aut the unknown.
