## BELLS WITHOUT RINGERS.

In the annual report of the Peterborough Diocesan Guild attention is called to the fact that, out of 98 towers in union with the organisation, over 40 have not sufficient ringers to ring all their bells for services. This is a state of affairs which, we are afraid, is common to nearly all our associations, and the actual position is really worse than this, for there are still many towers unaffiliated because they are without ringers, or possessed of only a few indifferent ones. It is only another version of the story so often told, of the difficulty of finding new ringers-a difficulty which, so far as can be seen, is likely to be ever present. At any rate, no solution of the problem has yet been found, but that is no reason why we should not go on trying.

It is really lamentable that valuable instruments should hang in church towers and be allowed to fall practically intodisuse and often become derelict, because sufficient interest cannot be aroused to produce ringers to utilise them. A good deal of the fault, and we say it advisedly, lies witin the church authorities. There are hundreds of churches where large sums are spent on the organ, substantial payment is made toan organist, and every effort made to maintain an efficient choir: yet not a finger is lifted to ensure the proper ringing of the bells as a preliminary to the services. In hundreds of other churches the same conditions would prevail but for the ringers themselves, who are for ever seeking to improve their skill, and to keep their ranks filled. If the organ failed or half the choir was absent from one service, clergy, churchwardens and congregation would want to know the reason why; yet almost equally costly instruments, such as bells are, may fall into disrepair, or there may be only half a company of ringers to handle them, but who cares?

This barrier of indifference on the part of church authorities in so many places has got to be broken down and it is the ringers and the associations who will have to do it. A little plain speaking may not always be relished, but it would often do good. Church authorities should realise that it is as much their obligation to see that the bells are properly rung as it is to ensure that the Psalms are properly sung. The efficiency of the ringers is as important as the efficiency of the choir, and it is the duty of the church authorities to find recruits for the one as much as for the other. The clergy are in touch with the young life of their parishes and their influence ought to be used to find ringers as well as choristers. They could succeed, where no one else could, but it is for the ringers or the associations to bring home a realisation of this duty to the parsons. In some cases, it may be, the clergy only need tactful prompting, but where (Continued on pago 274.)

The bells of St, Mary's Church, Calne, Wits, hove been rehung in ball bearings, and a new third hell, the gift of the Merquis of Luusdowne, has been provided. The old third bell has been placed in fil oats frame on the floor of the churoh, with its history inseribed on a plate attached to the frame. This action provides a good exemplis ia other church authorities when dealing with historic bells.
On Saturday, at the invitation of the Ver. Archdeacon Coutter, a rimgers' gatheriog was held at Calne. Touches of Grandsire, Stednant, Plain Dob, Treble Bob and Double Nowwich were rung, as welf ns "Churchyard Bols' for tha local men. Ringers to tha mamber of 50 wore present from 20 diferent towors, Brikport, Bishop's Full anal Ifmingter being the farthest points from which they came. Everyone agreed that Messrs. Mears and Stainhank had carricd out the worts quito well, conaidering the difficultios nader which theg labourful, uwing to tho movement of the tower when the bells ure ringing, and the ungainly size anti constuction of the exinting onk fram: which was retained. Although tho bells go well, it was tha geacrisl opinion that it wotld have been murh better hat the bells beren brought down below the loupres. "Whis, however, would have menni, perlapy, a new frame.
A meefivg of the Calne Branch of the Salisbury Guild was hald nifler tes at Maslen's Testeurant, presided over by the Rey. N. V. White, chnimanis of tho branch. Bremlijll was aclected for the next meoting on May 26th.
The ringers desire to thank the Archuteacen for the use of the bells, also the organist for presiding at the oryan. A very enjoyable afterstoon was speat.

## THE SILVER BELL FOR H.M.S. ' NELSON.' A MELLOW $\triangle$ ND SWEET NOTE.

 To the EditorDear Sir,-Following on my letter of some months ago, I am onclosing of latter from the hend of the firm of Messra. Reid and Eons Noweustio-on-Tyne, silversmiths and jewellers, who have carriced through, the contract for the presentation of a silver bell to H.M.S. 'Nolson from the citizens of Neweastle, where the vessel was built. I have las full permission from Mr. C. Leo Reid to send it to you for puib lication, and it gives sanne very interesting details.
At his request I compared the two small experimental castings at their shop, and the tone of the silver bell, though not so streng as hat of bell metal, was very much mellower and sweeter, but about thrte or four notes down is tho scale.
1 have been down to day to see the finished article, and it is a ycry boatutiful casting, highly polished and lymished, except on the crown, beltuw the camons, where it is left in a 'malt' condition. It is of a good, modern, elgyant shape nud thickness, and evidently has been cast by an expert in malten silver-
It, is 20in, inl height from lip to crown, with a base width of 19 in . and weigbe 2,749 ozs., tray, that is, 1 cwi. 2 qu. 21 lb . avoirdupois. Fwen the tongue is of solid silver, the rod heing fin. in diameter and the ball 3 in. ueross. It ends in a 'looled' flight with a tassel of silk rope for striking gurposes. The inscriplion is to he engraved on it later, but will be of the simplest description. It gives out the noto of 13 fiat, but my untutored mar could not erasp whether the graduations of tono were true as I struck the bell from sound-bow to waist aud crown.
It woula be interesting to know from one of our expert founders what note a bell of equal size and weight would give out if cast in bell metal.

1 mey repeat hore (from my last letter on the subject) that 'solid silver,' as the silversmith knows it, is really 925 parts of pure silver to 75 parts of a copper alloy.
The Nelson is putting into part here in September formally to reerive the gitt, hnd uremwhile Mnstrs. Reid, Blackett Street, are willing to show anyone the hell, which is uow hanging by rope in a temporary frame.
I may and that the tone, contrary to my original expectations, is hoth mellow and sweet, nud fairly strong. At tre same time I think it a wise provision to lave tion bell 'wirclessed' to every wardroom on the ship, otherwise it would sol be heard over so enormous a vessel. -Yaurs faithfulty,

## C. L. ROUTLEDGE

The letter from Mr. G. Lco Rcid, of Messis. Reid and Sons, to Mr Routledge, is as follows:-

Thanks for your letter und euclosure of cutting with regard to the silver bell from the paper, "The Ringing World." I quite agree with yourself and the authorities with regard to the mixture of silver in bells of ordinary bell metal. [ have Lord Grimthorpa's book oin "Clocks, Watches and Bells," but a mixture of bell metal and silver hus nothing whatevar to do with this ense.

We have made the experiments of casting two hells-one of ortinary bell metal, and the other of ordinary etandard silver, and tie tone of the ordinary standard silver hell is good and clear. I am quite awne that there is a good dal of superstition about the use of silver in poals of bella, and also that there is a considerable dificulty in getting the tones in peals-Wesioninster, Cambridge, or other chimes-but this is a single bell, and a particular note is of no great inportance.

If you like to call in wo have the two castings, and you can hesr tirn uotes of the two for yourself. I think you wguld be interosted. Thre mixture of motals suchi as lironze, copper, and silver in an ordinery peal of church balls, for instance, may lre a somewhat dubious experimeurt, but there is no doult, that a belk of standard silver will give out a good, claar, ringing note, and os the "Lord Nelson," being a huge battleship, the note of the bell is LanBmitheri by at microphone through wireless la every mees, wardroun, bugazine, and other parts of the 'rysel."

Then follow in the usual manner the names of the ringers, composer, conductor, Vicar and wardens.
The abovo forms a pair with a similar tablet recently presented by the Rep. E. S. Powell, rocording the first peal on thio bells, and ilio first on tower bells for the Yorkstire Association to be conduoted by a lady, Miss M. Davenport.
A third tablet, to match the Above two, is also proposed, to record the first peal of Grandsire on thio bells, and the first by an entirely local company, she peal being Yicars' six-part recently conducted by Mr. Norman Short.

The first poal of 'Grandsire Bab Maximus' was rang at Soutlwhrk on Mey 7th, 1792.
Forty years ago next Monday a peal of 10,176 Kent Treble Boly Major was rung at Foxearth, Essex.
Edmanton bells were opened on May $8 t i n, 1788$, by a band of Chan barland Youths with a peal of 5,280 Oxford Treble Bob Major, cunpused and conducted by John Reuves.

On May 10th, 1777, the Cumberlands rang the 10,200 Treble Bob Royal ett Shorediteh, which was another stage in the rivalry for the record which they carried on for many years with the College Youths.
Mr. C. H. Howard, the esteemed Master of the Essex Association, has been serioualy ill, but, we are pleased to say, is now recovering.

The East Grinstead and District Guild, which exists for promnting ahange ringing among the towers within a radius of ten miles of this North Sussex town, is doing its best to organise practice meetings. As the area covered by the Guild extends into three counties (Sussex, Surrcy and Kent) it has been fonad difficult sometimes not to clash with the meetings of the county associations. Thu first report of the committee shows the Guild to be in a satisfactory financial position.

## A FACCULTY REFUSED.

TILSWORTE MAY NOT HAVE BELLS RECAST.
A correspondent writes from Leighton Buzzard: I should like to tring before your readers the plight of the little village of Tilsworth, Beds. In the year 1908-9 the Rev. T. Green (Vicar) bad the towe thoroughly restored at his own expense, in memory of his late wift and only son. The tower contains a peal of five bells, by Emerson, of Wootton, Bedford, which have been in a vory bad stata of repair for a great number of years. A year or two aro the villagers felt they shonld like to hear the bells ring again, so they sent out collecting carda, and also heldia fete and garden party, with the result that thay cleared about 8400 . The late Vicar, Rev. T. Green, was so pleased at their success that he ut onee seat them a cheque for $\mathbf{x 5 0}$.

At a meeting of the Church Council they decided fo obtain estimates from two well-knowo firms of bell bangers, both of which advised we casting all the old five thells. At a further mecting of the Council, it was decided to accept the tender of Messts. Taylor aud Co., to recast the old five bells and add a new treble to make a ring of six, to be hong in a mew iron frame, and at once to apply for a faculty to put the work in hand.
On applying to the Cinancellor, his advisers refused to grant a faculty for the old bells to tho recast on account of their antiquity. They also noticed a small crack at the top of the tower, large enongh ta put a sixpence in edgewayg, so they adivise the Council to spend s100 of the money on the tower.
The only brictlayer in the villige is a member of the Church Council, and he says he should like the job to fall in the crack for 55 , and that it is unnecessary to touch it af all, as he very much dunliss whether there is a tower in the country that does not show some sign of cettlement, and he will never agree to set any of the money tra ong side that was collected for the recasting und rehanging of the bells.

Wo undorstand that the mater is now being further considered.

## HERTFORD COUNTY ASSOCIATION.

A most successful mecting was held at King's Walken on Salirday; April 28th, and was favoured by a beautiful afternoon. The raerting was held especially to laclp the uow band of riugers being formet at this tower. Somo 40 ringers turned up, and good work was done. ## PETERBOROUGH DIOCESAN GUII.D.

## SHORT-HANDED ' KOWERS.

The Peterborough Diocesan Guild, whose annual report has junt been issued, has 88 towers 10 union, but in 40 of these there niog not sufficient ringers to ring all the bells for services. Tho report says the position has not improved since last year, and needs the co-aperyttion of the incumbent and the ringers in each tower to try to incrense the numbers.
The Guild's total meabership is 71 hon. members (a decressu of three), 622 ringing members (an increase of three, wiile 17 of rhis total arc free life members), 153 non-residont lifa members, making a grand total of 846, an aggregate increase of 10 on the year. Tlip report urges the mambers to try and make the total a round 1,000 duriag the coming year, which would be quite possible if all would try to add to the number of ringers in their own tower.
During the year 48 branch meetings were beld, and, getarally spouking, the attendance has becn good, but in one or two cuses there trould be more encouragement for the branch officials if the mombers woilef support them better, esnuailly hy attendance at the meetings.
There were 52 peads runr duriog the Fear, a decrease of seven on 1926. They were as follows: Stedman Caters 3, Stedman Tripleth 5, Grandsire Ceters 1, Grandsire Triples 2, Bristol Surprise Major 1, Superlative Surprise Major 2, Cambrjdae Surprice Major 3, Double Norwich Major 1, Iient, Treble Bnb Major 1, Bob Major I; Minor in 14 methods 1,7 methods 9,6 methods 1,4 methods 4,3 methorls 1 , 1 method 5, Doubles 10, Doubles on hendbells 1. The peale were ping in 34 diferent towers, in four counties, and in five cases it was the tirsi peal on the bells. The anmber of ringers taking part wes 130 , of whom 13 rang their first peal, ard elaven were preseated witb certilicates for ringing their first peal on a working bell.

Financially the Guild has improved its position, there being an increased balance in hand on general account of $\$ 14$ 10s. 7d., while the belfry repairs fund, which las had no calls on it during the year, has been increased from $£ 697 \mathrm{~s}$, 5 d , to 18855 s .7 d .

There is no better judge than the one who is on the eud of the rope. I havo had anough experience in my tima to know when a boll is ruaning well, and when it is running badly. I would like to remind ther Heptenstall eonduotor and the old ringer that I am confident that I am able bo ring the same weight of bell to the pend when it is well lubricated.

Law James Jias accepted y uxplantion of the constuction of Cambridge Surprise, and recosnises that the Treble Bob Hunting Courso is secondary in importance. Le rather overshoots the mark when he says that it is 'imaginary.' In his notes be writes: 'Double Oxiord Minor 6 in the bunt.' Let me correet bim. Six is not "in the hunt'; it is more than that: 6 is "the linnt.'
One little point he seems to have owerlooked is the fact that the mace-making bells (2 and 4) of the firgt half-lead are the pisin hunts ' of the second hali-lead; also the 'plain hunts" ( 6 and 5) of the lirst hall-lead are the folnce-making bols of the second half-lead.
I really cannot understand his argument thet 'although Lincolnshire Hurprise is another and better extension of Cambringe Minor, get it candot he called Cambridre simply because it has appeared too late in the gay." It is making statement similar to "Truth cannot be nccepted because it lias arrived too jate in the day.' I fancy much the same argunient was used to Galileo: "The earth eannot possibly go round the suty because we bave always assumed that the sun gocs round the eartli.
If Mr. James will read my article carefully ho will see that I acknowledge there is a difficulty, and also give a temporary way of surraounting the dificulty. My whale poiat is that the Major. Royal and Maximas, which he has called Tineolnshire, should have embodied in its mane the fact that it springs from Cambridge Surprise Minor.
