## THE CENTRAL COUNCIL MEETING.

When the Central Council meet at Hereford next Tuesday they will probably find that the agenda will give them a full day's work. As a rule the 'provincial' gatherings do not provide quite as long a programme of business as the triennial meeting in London, but this year the agenda contains contentous matters about which many members will desire to have their 'say." There are nine committees to report, and while some of them may be only formal, the Methods Committee's recommendations as to method names is almost certain to provoke considerable discussion. In connection with this matter it should be remembered that what is decided upon next week will practically settle the names of the regular Minor methods for all time. Hitherto there has been opportunity to discuss them and to make changes, hecause there is no printed publication in which many of them have been attached to the figures. But after this meeting, a new edition of the Collection of Minot Methods ' is to go out. and what is printed in that volume will stand, for good or ill. The fact that members are, perhaps, rather tired of the subject ought not to prevent then giving careful consideration to the matter.

After the reports, there are motions on the agenda alhout which there are divideri opinions, and a goocl deal has been heard at ringing meetings during the past: year on the subject of providing peal diplomas as an encouragement for young ringers. Many associations have expressed views for the guidance of their representatives, and this item is not likely to be quickly disposed of. Among the other motions the proposed definitions af what shouls constitute a 'peal 'on five or six bells may prove controversial; while the proposal to set up a committee to consider the best method of dealing with cases of extraordinary sickness among ringers is not unikely to provoke a lively debate.
And when the agenda, already published, has been disposed of, there is an addendum, upon which there are three motions for consideration, if there is time and the Council agree. One puts forward a proposal that the associations should be asked to unite in a scheme for keeping those ringers, and particularly the younger anti less enthusiastic elements, who move from one districh to another, in touch with ringing. This comes from the: Guildford Diocesan Guild. The two other motions have: originated with the Suffolk Guild, raising the question of giving consideration to the defunct Nomenclature Committee's recommendations, and expressing views on the issue of diploma

## IINCOLN DIOCTSAN CUILD.

THE FOUR NEW BELLS FOR THE OATHEDRAL.
Thu annual meeting of the Lincoln Diocesan Guild was held at Linceln at Saturday, April 28th. A large number of members attended cyensong at the Cathedral, jmmediately after which the four new bells to be added to the axisting peal of eight were dedicated by the Very liev tho Dean of Lincoln (Dr. T. C. Jry, D.D., president of the Guild), as reported in issue of May 11th. The new bells were arranged on tha floor of the neve, immediately in fromt of the great west damr, und asound were grouped the full Cathedral choir, the clergy, and a large congregation of ringers and others who had been attracted by such an uncommon event. After an impressive address by the Dean, the dedicatory prayers were xecited, setting the bells apart for sacred purposes for all time. The service concluded with the singing of the Hymn, 'O Heavenly Jerusalem.'
The new bells, like the fight bells alroady in tho Cathedral towor, are by Messes. Taylor and Co., and are very berutiiul specimons of the bell founders' art. The inscriptions and other orvamentations have been produced by the cire-perdue process, which results in a Wighly artisuic limeh. Tho alphabet nsed is copied from that found on the famous South Somercotes bells, dated 1423, each lefter being आम elaborate work of art,
The cost of the 2nd and 3rd bells las been defrayed by the members and friends of the Lincoln Diocesan Guikd as a memorial to those of their number who sacriffeed their lives in the Groat Wrar. Tho ist nnd tath bolls have been provided by the generosity of an anouymous Amenican bonefactor, and are parli of a largor gift to the restoration tund.

For the beaçt of any zeaders who may happen to be visiting Lineoln in the near future, it may be stated that tho new bells will probably remain in the mave, near the rrent west door, for some thme fo come, and they are well worth a visit of inspection.
Tea was provided at the Co-operative Hall. The Dean of Jincoln Was present, but baving to leave before this prirt of the proceedings was over, spoke a few words to the gathering while still at tho tables, reforving espetially to the progress of the Cithedral restoration, which he said was proceeding satisfactorily. He expressed the hope that lue full peal of twelve hells would be lang in the south-west tower by the antumn of this yerir.
To the gratification of all prosent, the Lord Bishop of Liscoin (patron of the Guid) arrived while tea was stith in progress, and proaded at the business meetirg which followed. Fe rougratulated the Guild upon baving accomplished their work in regard to the provision of the new bells, and said he understood thoy would be a very fine addition to the peal, which be hoped would be installed before the and of the year. Fg said it would be a great thing that, whon the

Cathodral ropairs were campleted and the great service of thankegiving was held, the bells would be able to signalise the occasion in full beauty and power.
The following officers of the Guild wero re-ciccted: President, the Vary Rev. tho Dean of Lincoln; Master, the Rev. 프. Law James; hon. secretary, M3. F. W. Stokes; hon. treasurer, Mr. T. F. Jinley.
The meating pessed a vote of sincere gympathy with tro Dean of Lincaln in the loss recently sustained by him in the death of his wife.
Votes of thanks were passea to the Bishop of Lincoln for presiding, and to the incumbents of St. Peter-it-Gowts, St. Botolph's, and St. Peter-at-Arches for the use of their towers for ringing during the afternoon end eveming. As the bells at tha last-named tower ara 的jill out of actian, the Rector kindly allowed the use of the belfry for handbell ringing. A number of members avniled themselves of this npportunity for praetice, while others made foll use of the poak of pus at tho two first-numed towers.

## SIX BELLS DEDICATED AT CROFT.

## BELFRY GOSSIP.

By a typograplzical error tho analysis of peals in our last issue was headed $1926{ }^{7}$ it should, of course, have heen 1927.
A fuw Yotkshire ringers will be pleased to welcome old friends at the Berkeles Hotel, Fictoria Street, Bristol, on Saturday.
Tho Eerts County meeting at Benington, which is usuall held as near to the old 'Ehnging Duy' as possible, is posiponed thas year to June 16 th on accounti of the Whitsuntide holiday.
A hundred and thirty yearg ago to-morrow it peal of 5, 120 court Troble Bob Eight-Iu was rung by the Cumberlaud Youtlis at Edmonton, "the first ever rung in that method on the bells.' It was com. posed and conducted by George Gross, and William Sbipway took pert in it. Doubtless Shipway, to whom tho Exercise owes a great deal, learued much from this competent ringer, George Gross.
The first peal of Stedman Caters the eompranan
 down, London, on May 28th, 1787. This ring of bella is now dereliat. What a pity it is something cannot bo dono to put them in order.

Tho existing Bristol Surpriso record was set up on May $28 t h$, 1912, when 15,264 changes ware rung by members of the Middlesex Association av Hornclurch, in 9 hrs. 49 mins.

The first Surprise peal rung out of England (Superlative at Bray) was rung on May 20th, 1901. and the first Surprise peal in Wales (New Cambridge at Bangor) was ruag on May 291b, 1901.
On this latter day also the first and only peal on the sea was rung (Stedman Gaters) on tho passage botweer Doblin and Holylhead.

## THE LATE MR. J. P. RAYNER.

As briefly reported last weck, the death of Mr. Joseph Philip Rayner, the reteran steeplekeeper of St. Atudrew's, Holborn, occurred on May 8th from mronchitis at the age of g2 years.
Born on January list, 1836, at Clerkenwell, he was baptised at Gt. Andrew's Church, Holbora, where eventunlly he became a ringer, and was in charge of the bells and tower for about 50 gears.

His ringing activities were confned to "call changes," but nevertheless, he joined the St. James' Socicty on Ootober 18th, 1875, and the Ancient Society of College Youths ou January 15th, 1878.
It was only natural that is native of Clerkenwell should adopt the profession of clackmaker, aud ho carried on this work antil about three weeks before his death, never wearing giasses. He maintained all his faelllies until the end. He was also a litelong non-smaker,
The funeral service on Muy 14th was conducted by the Rector at St. Andrew's Clurch, Holborn, tho coflu being carried into the courch by the followidg members of the loctl soctety': Messrs. J. S. Hawkins, U. J. Chooet, W. J. Nor£on, and E. C. Rusself. Among the rinyer ${ }^{\text {also }}$ prescni were Bicssis. J. C. Adams, T. Beaney, H. Langdon, W. Roughton, and C. F. Vitlar. There was a Iarge gathering of prishionerg and friends, The intement took place nt Totfenbam Cometery, and among the wraths was one in the slape of a bell, sent by the St. Andrew's Rinuers Society.

On Sunday eveniag; May 13 th, at St, Andrew's Church, the Dead Matcl in San was played by the organist, and touchas of Stodman and Grandsire Triples tunt by members of the local Guild with the bells lalf-muffed.
The late Mr: Ratber was widely known and respected by metropolitan ringers, abdi his much deplored death severs a great fima with the past.

The clock chimes have been specially composed by M. Denyr (the fumous Belgian carillonnetur). The first three quaters are variations on, and the fourth quarter the refrain of, a popular Flemish air. The four is struck oti the F sharp Bourdon beh, an octave betnw the keynote of the chimes.

Bach of the clock dials is 15 feet in diameter, and has spucially desigucd stars to take the places of the usual numerals. Thus, thure will be a bell and a star for each of the Sazes of America.
The University lihrary froats a fine square, that forms an idcal aufftoviurn for carillon concerts. A millian contributions fram Anucrieall cilizeus provided the cost of the building. The tower is 285 feet high, and the bells will bo hung 230 feet above the ground.

## VISITORS SEF BELLS CAST.

The carillon proved of immense interest to the visitors on fridar, the company, in addition to those already montioned, including Pilace and Priacess de Croz, Lady Maddon (wife of the First Sea Lord of the A fmiralty), Miss Maddon, the Mayor and Mayovess of Croydon, Lady Fwaytbling, Mr. Maudsley (secretary of the Anglo-Bolgian lion), Mr. D. Camphell Lee (secretary of the American Society), Rev. W. S. T'akenlam-Walsh (Vicar of Sulrrave, Northants), and Mra. Wiski, Camon Woods (Vicar of Croydon), etc.
On arrival, the visitors first iuspected the Louvain carillon and clock, and then moved to the foundry to watch the casting of throe belle. The jurst was that for F.M.S. ' Kent, ${ }^{\text {, }}$, and inmediately befrore the molten mass was poured Lady Stanhope dropped n newilymiated threopenny-piece into the cauldron, declaring, I wame thee Kent." ## GLOUCESTER AND BRISTOL DIOCESAN ASSOCIATION

## SKETGH OF I'TS FOUNDING AND FOUNDERS.

HT HEV. C. D. [. DAVBES, MASTER OF THE ASSOGIATION.
Iti winw wi the approaching jubiled meoting of the Gloucester and Hriskal Doceasn Association at Bristol on Whijtsun Monday, the Edilor ul' "'lua Ringmg World' has asked me to 'write a story of the foundialion of tha association, and somethimg ahent tha folmders." EgotisLicul thought it may appert, let me tuke the last of these first.
(o) thunders, there were only two-Mr. Phillott and myself. Fur years jun mehooldays I used to frequent the Chelienham tower every I'hursday eveaiag, and there sit in patience for an hour or an hour and a half in the hope of being asked to take a hand fin falling one of the bells (generally the fifth of ihe ald len) in peal when the ringhe wus done. Please note this carefully, all ye rising young ringers ot the prosent gencration, who have instructors provided for you, and tunetnges arranged far you, and Hssociations ths help you, and books taluro tia teach tou- 1 had mily', Ranister, 'and had not even got that finen-and ' The Ringing World ' to chear you on. Please note it carefully.

Wcll, on one of these evenings, in about the year 1875, up came in pleasantiy-looking persou of apparently gomewhere near 23 years of age. Whu, wis asked to rigg, and got flirough a touch of what I lisue sinco nuphosed was Grandsire Triples very creditathly. The Cheltenham company in those days were, most of them, old stagers; at uny rate, 1 iancy were all well over 30 at least, and so I was maturally Irams to the new person. We left the tower together, and from that day ford bucame firm friends. He comforted me, and told me that I "should soon get ou, i.e., in learang change riugiag.
Gearge Fenry Plillott was the only child of Rev. Canon H. W. Phillotri, then lector of Staunton-on-Wye, who later on became Gamon Rexidentiary of Herefurd, and went to live in that city. His son had heen edmcated at Charterhonse, where his father, in early days, was mine of the masters, and from Ihere went to Christ Church. Oxford, where be lata recontly taken bis dogree, wlen he appeared in the Cheltenh:m towor. ILis regson for coming to Cheltenham was that He had been articled as a pupil to Mr. Johm Middeton, at that time "nars of the leating architects in tho town and neighbourhood. Mry Middatan dosigmed All Saints' Chnech and the Ladies' College nad atlier mutible buildines. Ona of his fellow-pupils there was Mr. H. A. Lruthwn, who, with Mr. Middletan's son, Mr. Heury Midileton, and took 1 lu business together ats partners. Mr. Henry Middleton died nol long arthr this, and some fifteen or twenty years later Mr. Prothera
fieal, jeavine Mr. Philloth in sole possession. It thus cnme to pass that that whole of his working lifo was spent in Cbeltenham.

At Oxiord he had fallen in with Mr. J. E. Acland Troyte \{now Cint. 3. F. Acland), brolher of Mr. Troyte, of Huntahum Court, who was at Hoviety of Change Kingers. Heve Mr. Plillatt had been well rroundeil in ani art, aurl thus was able to tate a goorl place in the Cheltenham tower.

Anal nuw I suppose thai I must say somelthing about myself. Ny onrlist recollection of any cannection between myself and bells is thai ane Christonas morning, when I musi have been about seven or eight Wears ndd, I was persiaded by a Tewkesbury youth to take bis latud net acemat to the ringing room. What I there saw and heard hus fidel from my memory. Hut $f$ duly went down aud entered the Vicarnpe' ' jew,' which in those days was just below the altar steps. strivizg at minute or two after the commenerment of matins. My fubher't eotlergue was reading prayers, my father bimalf standing in I.hin shar dury. He immediately came down the steps, surplice and all - Sharch ritual was easy goinge in those days-and fold me in my ear Lhatid had beet a eery maungty hoy
 ha bas lhere regularly, arad by the time that I whs 13 i could ing any heit there, ineluding the tenor of 23 cwt . In those days there was the rat chande ringing at Tewkesbury. There was a company who metter away in the summer, but pulled themselves together a munth or two hufnre Chushtuas, sud rang what thes called the fourtmen, i.e., them first leaf of Grumbire Thiplas, over and over agein. What i.lay did was that when they came ta 1253746 they made the noxt row $213 j^{3} 76$, mal so they went on and ons. Well do $I$ rementher the witerned shout of the trehie munt 'Of ugain

old Tewkesbury band having failly gone to piecex, Mr. Josiab Wathron and I decided lo try to do somelhing on sonnder lines-that is, to teand ourselves and a few young aspirnts to rint changes propetly, Most uf us had toen chimers far the Sunday services, and we could all manug: a bell. Settiag to work on the hack six at the Ablsey, with occasional visits to neighbouring village towers thrown in, we stuck to it through good report and ill report, till in about a year's time we were fairly adepts in Grandsiro Doubles, and, I must confess, in Graudsire Minor Of course we soan began to try our haud at Grandsire Triples, and bes the beginning of 1876 had evidently made sontething of it, as it wis ian February af that year when 1 went up to Oxford to compete for sholarship, thas at Magdalen Collego I rang eny first long tount
Sio far as 1 know thene is, heside myself, only one of that evanury company, Mr. J. S. Pritahett, still left. Possibly it was in Oxfori that [ whs tolit that I ought taget a ringing hook. At any wate, thero lies opna before me at this moment is copy of "Banister" (1874), the following inseription on the inaide of the Gover: "Charles [). 1". Davies, Vicarage, Tewkesbury, and Josiah Wathen, Waterwork, Tewkeshury, went halves for this book, 靠rech, 1876.' In April, 18177 , my father died, and my mother took a house in Cheltentam an mained there for two yellys.

Strrie Lwo or three Jears later it was deemed advisable to inaugurate elishtef brancles wilh a view to getting into claser contact with indiricinal parishes. Accordingly the three archidiacoand branches of Giloneester, Cirencester and Bristol were cstablibled. These did splentilil work for ten or twelve years, when ft bogan to be felt that a extension of the same priaciple of subdivision would be of adraatage. When 'Thintarn,' "Kourntains, 'Glatonburs,' ete.; ure mentioned, nas es maturally eniaks of the Abley of that nume. ihat to drag in thai worl (Abhey) is mecu-less-e.g., ' Tintern Delight' is a tolerably goud mame; 'Tintern Abljey Delight' cumbrous and Tess euphonjous.

Dxactly the same is to be said of the castle names, apart from which quito a vumber of these duplex names have been adopted by the finion Castle Line for ticir steamslips-G.g. Carishrooke Castle, Chepstow Castle, etc. Why need the names ui well-known steamers be cmployed in our ringing nomenchature?

The original infention in choosing names from abbeys and castlosin itself is most happy iden-has been misumderstand and misapplled.
F'urthemore, such glaving combinations as 'Duke of Nortolk,
Duke of Clarence, "Queen Victoria, "Woodeock's Victory, etc., at
 cock,' etc., if these ummes must be retained.
