The question of what should be the conditions governing a peal of Minor is again coming into the arena of controversy, as a result of the suggested definitions put forward by the Rev. H. Law James in recent issues of 'The Ringing World.' Stripped of superfluities Mr. James' proposals are that the changes in a peal of Minor may come up in any order as long as in 5,040 none appears more than seven times, and he puts forward the proposals in order to get rid of what he calls an 'absurdity.' The absurdity is, however, only of his own making. Ringers whose standard for a peal of Minor is that each 720 shall end with rounds will disagree entirely with Mr. James when he says, in effect, that a peal. rung with seven different callings or in seven different methods does not come within this standard. To the practical ringer it will sound equally absurd to be told that, because each 720 ends with rounds, each other of the 719 rows must fall in exactly the same place in each extent if it is to come within the limits of the above mentioned standard: Practice does not require it ; common sense does not demand it and whatever justification there may be for a definition which permits the repetition of changes within the limits of each 720 , let us avoid false reasoning as to the need for it.

In his letter justifying the definition which he puts forward, Mr. Jarnes remarks, The truth is that the peal is really one round block, not seven.' We do not want to do Mr. James an injustice, but if this statement refers to all peals of Minor, inciuding those in which each 720 ends with rounds, is he not asking the Exercise to stretch its credulity a bit too far? A round block' is described in 'The Glossary,' as 'a block which comes round to the same row or point from which it started.' Although Mr. James may think differently, we imagine that the majority of ringers, with this definition before them, will have no hesitation in saying that seven 720 's, each beginning from and ending with rounds, constitute seven round blocks. The theory of the 'one round block' is, of course, one of the essentials to Mr. James' proposal to permit the rows to come up in any order, irrespective of the truth of individual 720's. Unless he can convince the Exercise of this, one of his main props goes. If he is correct that seven 720's each ending in rounds is one round block and not seven round blocks, then two 5,040's of Grandsire Triples, rung without interval, would be one round block and not two. If Mr. James* proposals are to be accepted, the Exercise has got to alter its whole conception of a peal of Minor and in this conrection it is interesting to recall that it was only about 40 years ago that the term 'peal ' was applied to seven 720 's.

When wo observed the other day to a prominent nember of itse Oxford Guild that it was a pity lhat 'March the 4th' at Appleton so often clashed with the Johuson dinner, we were reminded thut the fault lay with the organisers of the Birmingham feast. March the 4th at Applaton has been colebrated for 112 years.
But the Gloucester and Leicester dinners cannot lay claim ta the same nntiquity. Perhaps next year the promoters will swoid Februaty 28th.

On this rlay, 203 years ago, the first peal was rung att St. Mrrinnts-in-the-Fieids, London, wheu the Jundon Scholars (now the Royal Cumberland Youths) rang 6,006 Grandsire Cinques. On the foilowing day, the College Youths had the use of the bells and went ane better, by ringing 6,314 in the same method.
On March 14 th, 1837 , a pend of 10,133 Graudsire Ceters wrs vung at Christ Church, Bristol.
A cryptic posteard las reached us from Norwich containing division sums to prove that the peal of Grandsire Caters recorded at St. Peter Mfancroft, which Ftated ilsat 12,303 changes were rung an March 8th, 1737, is three changes over 700 leadg-a rather unusual length truly, if the record is correct. Perhaps the peal was actuelly 12,600.
The attention of Suffolk ringers is called to the alteration of clate of the mecting at Uford. Ithe moting will be held on March gend.

## WRINGTON BELLS

ONE OF TEE GLORIES OF SOMERSET
Somerset is a particularly fortumate county in regard to its rings of bells, for there are many glorious pents within its bounderies. Not far from the foot of the Mendips lies Wrington, a fine old-world village, with a magnilicent church, whoss tawer is said to have formed the model upon which the architect of the Houses of Parlianuent modelled the Fietoria tower. And Wringion has one of the finest rings of bells in all Somerset-a ring of ten with teror of 37 ewt. in O sharp. The foundation of the peal is some old ones cast by the Bilbies, of Chewstoke, who prit the hack six into the tower at variens dales in the eighteculh ceutury. I'reble and tenor were recast in 18:55; and in 1911 four trebles were added by the Whilechapel Foundry. Previons to 1845, the treble of the six weighed $10 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{cwt}$., and the tener $33 \frac{1}{2}$ ewt. Recently the bells have been overluanled by Messrs. Mars and Sininbunk, and there is an eathusixtstie local haud who are muking headway in change dinging.

It would lave an important bearing on the structure of the tower, for a modern framework would strengthen it by one hundred per cent. He hoped before agother twelve montlis had gone by something might bo done. He believed if an appeal werc made to the eitizens of Birmingham for money for the renovafion of the Cathedrat bells it would come in just as fast as for the fabric and the beautiful organ (applause)
Mr. .J. Fr. Smallwood proposed "The Visitors, whom, he said, they were alweys glad to see and welcome. They valued the presume of those who came from near and far, and they appreciated the homonr which the visitors thus conferred upon them.

As he rightly says, A consista of three trae and completa 720 's, containing 9,12 and 15 bolos, each having nine 5 -6's at hand, whilst $B$ contains three 720's, trane of them true or complete, and bringing up no less than thirty-sis 5-6" at band, one being rounds. Which would six-hell ringers prefer to ring?
With reforence to Mr. James* statement that there are only five possible 720's of Minor, via., $9,12,15,18$ and 21 bobs, I give below four 720 's, and would like Mr. James to explain that, if Nos. I and 2 are one and the same, what are Nos. 3 and if?

## THE LATE MR. GEORGE BOWEN

LJELONG ASSOGLATION WITH ILFRACOMBE CHURCH, As briefly reeorted in our lazt issue, Mr. George Bowen, of Htiracombe, passed away on Saturdny week. Hr. Bowen, who was 83 years of age, was a diescendant of a famous Ilfracombe family. One of his fncestovs, Capt. Richand Bowen, cammanded FL.M.S. "Terpsichore' and lost his life at Tenevifte in 1797. Gapt. Bowen was one of those who were ardered to stay and spike whe guns so that they would be useless to ilue enemy. The task was fulifled, but ail who took part lost their lives.
George [Jowen had been associated with Holy Triwity Church, Iffracombe, practienlly all his life. He bad been a choxister for over 70 years, a ringer for more ilan 60 years, and parish clerk turing literally lived for his elutch. His life was one of the most selfless and benutiful that man could live. Thinking always of others and how best he could be of service, Mr. Bowen was loved by all who kner him inismately.
He was not a great ringer as ringers are reckoned in these days, but his whole life and work leave a splendid exnmple. Ee was responsible for the introduction of change ringing to Jteracombe when ualy six bells lung in the tower, and when two trebles were offered in 1893 lie undertook to raise the funds for the nenessary framework and the langing. He was ever ready to help foung ringers, and those who know the coast hills of North Devon will realise what it meant for hina to eycle tho 20 miles to Lynton and back every week to give instrtiction to the local band. It was his elforts, also, which resulued in the only peal that has been rung on Lundy Island. The funeral serviee was fully choral；half－muffled touches were rung before nad after，and in the evening a quarter－peal of Grandeire Triples was rung by：A．Histead 1，W．Wicks 2，E．Smith 3，O．W． Porter 4，G．Cleave（conductor）5，J．Hiscock 6，O．W．Porter，jun．， 7，R．Allum，8．The sfriking in this touch was of a very high standard．The men at the ropes gave of their best to the glory of God and in memory of a gentieman．
