## THE LIVERPOOL MEETING.

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THE $18 \ddagger$ TON RINGING BELL.
the Bourdon of the Cerillon of 64 Bells, about to be instelled at RIVERSIDE CHURGH, NEW YORK, U.S.A.

The agenda of the Liverpool meeting of the Central Council is published in this issue. Its belated appearance is, we learn, due to the absence of Mr. Young, the hon. secretary, from this country, which resulted in a certain amount of dual responsibility in regard to it. On the face of it, the agenda is much like that of many previous provincial meetings, except that it contains an item which, for more than a quarter of a century at any rate, has been found only in the business of the London meet-ings-the election of an honorary secretary and treasurer. This indicates that Mr. Young, who has served the Council so zealously for ten years, is seeking relief from office. He wanted to retire last year, but gave way to the pressure put upon him to remain so that a double change of president and secretary might be avoided. Now, apparently, Mr. Young thinks that the time has come when he might conveniently lay down the burden of office, and he can do so in the knowledge that his work has been well done and his services highly appreciated by the Council.

The rest of the agenda looks, to some extent, commonplace; but it is possible that the meeting may prove of more than ordinary interest. The Standing Committee will have to report on the suggested amendment of rules, which in effect means an amendment of the constitution of the Council; the Methods Committee will have something to say on the delayed publication of the Minor Collection; and on the report of the Analysis Committee there is likely to be a challenge to the admission of peals of a certain type. Here are three subjects, at least, which may lift the discussions out of a humdrum atmosphere and perhaps give rise to a certain amount of liveliness in the debates. In addition, the Council are to be asked to give their official support to the scheme for commemorating the Stedman Tercentenary on the lines suggested by 'The Ringing World '; and there may be divided opinion among the members upon some of the other motions of which notice has been given.

The Council's business proceedings have the promise, therefore, of providing a full day's work, but this will be pleasantly sandwiched between a reception by the Lord Mayor; a lunch given by the Lancashire Association, and a tea at which the members will be the guests of Liverpool's chief magistrate, Many other social arrangements have been made by the iocal commitlee, extending from Saturday until Wednesday. There is, however, one detail in the arrangements which it has not yet been possible to settle satisfactorily, and that is the question of railway fares. BIISTOE BRANCH AND THE: CENTRAL COUNCIL.
The monilsly meeting of the Bristol Brancin was held at Winterbourne on Salurday, April 85th, and degpite the wretelad conditions of the wather was fairly well attended, twelve towers being represented. Geod use was made of the bells, and service was conducted by the Rev, G. Conlson, in the unavoidable abseuce of the Vicar, and gave a most interesting address, in the course of which lie reviewed the bistory of bells and referred to the reform which inad taken place in the belfries during the last 25 years. Tea was nicely served in the schoolroom, and at the business noeting which followed the Rev. G. Coulson presided.
A discussion toak place on the leading articles appearing in the two preceding weeks" issues of "The Ringing World,' whicls were remd to the mombers present by the branch chatirman (Mr. F. Skidmore). A resolution was unanimously passed, to be sent to the Master of the association, to the effect that the members of ilhe Bristol Brameh unatimously uphold the actiou of the association in regard to reaffiliation with the Central Council, and asking in wiew of the fact that the agend for the forthoming meating of the Council had not been issued in accordance with the rules, how could the association agree to pledge its allegiance to a body which failed to carry out its own rules?
The Chairman remarked that, as an oulsider and unbiassed observer, brought inla louch wilit the matter for the first time, it seemed to him there was ronm for improvement in the methon of confact between the associations and the Council. The obvious remedy, and one which he ttought would allay feeling in the ascaciations, was to alter matters so that associations, as such, could send up their resolutions to the Central Council. In order to give them an opportunity of discussing resolutions, it was highly important that the agenda of the Council should be published unfailingly some time beforeland. It was difficult for associations to be loyal to a bocly to which, as an association, they could send no resolution. It was an anhappy pesition for a representative to have to bring forward, in his own name, a matier with which, possibly, he might be out of sympatliy as an individual, just because his association desired it. He wotild be ant uлwilling und, therefore, laglfhearted advocate. Again, acting individually, he might support a propesal which did not commend ifself to the association he represented.

Tho Bristol United Ringing Guilds' chairmen, M1. H. Burt, proposed a hearty vote of thanks to the Vicar for the use of bells, and to the ladies for waiting at Een, and this concluded the meeting.

## THE ENGLISH PARISH CHURCH.'

AN INTERESTING FOLUME.
Ringers, as a whole, lave all intenso intarest in flacir matisia cluarclics, and many of them have a fair knowledge of the history of their own particular church. How many, however, feally know the origin of the parish or bow the parish church, as sueh, las developed? 'Lost in ibe mists of antiquity,' is the way in which the layman generally sums up the poaition in explanation of his jgorsnce. Actually, of course, the mists, if they existed, have long simee metted under the sun of historical resench and antigunrian investigation, and there are numerous books on the subject. The Intest, and one within the rencit of all, has been written by Mr. A. R. Powys, secretary of the Socioty for the Protection of Anctont Buiddings, under the litle of "llue English Pacisk Clatreln, asd publisbed by Longmans, Green and Oo. ait 3 . 6d. in the Eagish Hioritage Series. The volume covers the subject in th pory rendable form; it is an admirable survey of tho growth of the parish chutch from the earliest days, wiewed from tho spiritual, ecclesiastical, secular and mrelitectural aspects, whith Ho wreated in a manner that recaptures something of tho varying 'atmosplere" of tho ages nud enables the rester to appreciate the changing setting of parochial life, centriag round the church througlt the passing centuries, and its inflience upon tho development of the cherch.
'The materinl manifesiation of the activity of thr village people," says the gathor in lis 'foroword,' 'ate the luvildings which housed them, sheltered their bensts and gave storeroorn to ihuir goods. The benuty given to farm lands and woods and the gracions riuality of the buildings that sorved these find their truest expression its the parish churches that are among them. The conntry purish church reets against sumh a background, draws life from it:, and returns to those who live beside it a gentle pervading incentive to remember that the fulness of lifo cannot be enjoyed unless the simpla acts neterssary to existence are ennobled by the poetry of skifful achieve-ment-that is, of Arl."
"'lue sturly of the older churehes,' ho says, "is of great interest. From them we may learn, without turning to othor buildings, the development of medigeral and later architecture, the changing emphasis daid on different parts of the churel scriecs, something of the education of the common people, and much of thes slate of tha frts.' And Mr. Powys procoeds to his task with the- skill of ont who is nater of his subject.

The field which Mr. Powys covers includes the origin of the purish and the provision made for the cure of souls in it; the plans of perish churches ant their architechure; the furvilnue and fitting of a parish church. Fle licvotes ma intoresting chapler to secular and unusual nses of charelios, and another to chantvies and chantry priests. The author devotes a few pagos to bells as part of the assential equipment of churches. "Bell cages built at the end of the fifteenth century, and in tho fisti yeres of tilie sixtegnth, hat reminds ns, 'still hore and there have escaped the ardour of some morlenn bellringers, who associate with the word "medimenl" Hings out of dete, clunsy and inefficient.' As an antiquarian, Mr, Powys may be forgiven if he does thot agroa with these morlern bellumgers, bull wo would renind him that it is not only madern hellringers who have considered it necessary to replace oul-of-date, elumsy and inefficient. ' equipment in tho belfry. This has been going on all throngh the ages. There is a greator desira in these days to preserve what in worth preserving than eper there was, but when, for instance, a bel] frame hecomes ineffeient end beyond effectivy rapail, ringers cannot be blaned for advocating that the old limbers should come right out of the town. This, however, is not the place where we need discuss the matter. Mr. Powys luss writhen a delightful bonk, both interosting aud instructive, which slould lie in the possession of overy ringer who loves bis parish church aurl nit that it stands and has stood for.

## LINCOLN DIOCESAN GUILD.

## ANNUAL MEFICING AT LINCOLN

Considerably over 100 ringers assembled at Lincoln on Seturday last for the annual meoting of the Diocesan Guild. They were able to take part in ringity at Lhe Gathedinl, where, in St. Hugh's tower, luang a very fine ring of twelve, the product of the Loughborough Foundry. Not anly are the bells themsalwes an exampla of modera excelleace, but both inside and oat of tho tower the sound hes been modalatea so that the ringers can hear every bell perfectly, and iho public suffer not the sliglatesi annoyance. In faet, the acoustical arrangements are a perfeet cample of what overy bell tower onglat to be. Many of the visiting ringers rang on twalve bells for the first time, and went away highly gratified with a new experience, buf naturally wnder such conditions the twelve-beli ringing was not alway elatracterised by good striking. At the two sik-bell towers of St. Peler-at-Gowl's and St. Bolalph's touches in many Minor methods were rung.
Sarvice, brief but iospiring, was concincted by the Bishop of Granthan in ono of the Cathedral chnpels, and the address on the witness of the ringers through tins bells was cloquent and uplifting, and its lessons likely to be long reacmbered by all who heard it,
'l'ea was served in the Co-cperative Hall, after which the annual business meeting was held, over which the president (Sub-Dean Jewiwine) presided, supparted by the Master (the Rev. H. Law James), who is unly just recovering from a rather prolonged illnass, M: W. Stokes (han. secretary), Mr. F. F. Linley (hon treusurer), Mr. F. S. W. Butler (Northern Branch acoretarg), Rey. H. T. Parry and Messis. G. Chester, J. A. Frceman, F. Dewey and J. T. Brown (members of the committee). An apology for absence was teceivad from the Recarder of Lincoln (Alderman J. S. Pritcletet), who said that at his suggestion a copy of My. Einest Morvis book, 'lhe History and Art of Change Ringing, bad been placed in Lincoln Public Library
'fhe 1resident said that the Dean of Lineoln bad been president of the Guild for a great many yedrs, and be had approached the present. Dean, suggesting that low was the aghti and proper person to be moninated far the office. He had printed out that the ringers would gruatly appreciate his acceptance of the office, hut the Dean, on each occasion that the mater had been mentioned, hati given the same answer, that lie would rather not be nominated ai present
The Master bnid he thought he could guess the reason why the Dema did not desire to be nominated af present. The Sub-Dean had been, as Dearl Fry was, atgreat friend to the ringers, and he proposed bie re-clection as president for the pnsuing year.
The motion was carried with applause, and the Sub-Dean said in reply that he would da anything lie could to promota the objecls of the Guild.

## MORE CAREFUL INSTRUCTION NEEDED

The Rev. H, Law Jimes was unanimously re-clected Master, and the Sub-Dean expressed the hopo that jo would soon be ontirely restored to health.
Mr. Stokes was re-elected hons. secretary, and Mr. Linles hoc. treasurer.
The Master prescated an report, in which he congratulated the Cathedral bund on the peal of Stedman Cinques. The eighty-seven peals rung in the year were the largest number that the Guild had reached 6 far. Sixteen Surprise melhods in a peal of minor was a great crerlit to the Southera Branch. "Thesa three items," Mided Gha report, "ure very encouraging and the various meetings which I have atitended during the year all slow signs of progress, and the appearance of young ringers at these meetings is very satisfactory; but I wish that thote who initiate young vingers into the art would bo much more careful in instructing them in the proper way to jandie a bell rope. It is far easier to teach a heginacr to handie his rope properly at once, than it is to cradicate faults afterwards, and thack rope invariably produces bad striking.
The report was received and the loalance slrect of the Diocesan $G$ Guild was adopted. The receints had been 5282 . 4 ., and the expenditure 527 3s.
Thu Dieecsan Advisory Committee Having intimated, iu reply to a resolution passed at the last anmunt mecting of the Guild, that they would welcone a representative of the Guild to give them adviee on matiers connected witl belis, the Master was unanimously appointed.
$A$ letter from the Editor of 'The Ringiug Worda, drawing attention to the proposed commemoration of the Stedman Terecntenary, having been received, Mr. J. S. Goldsmith, who was present, was invited to speak on the subject. Ho expininod the scheme, and outlined the proposals for the restoration of the bellis. The probable cost, ho gnid, was s350, and ilhis would mean a big effort, bet he believed, if the Exercise would enter whaldeartedly into the project, it could bo carried through. Tha opportanity wis unique, and he hopert that the associations and yingers of thes country wodd do something wortlyy of the opportunity

Phe proposal was faveurably received, and the Master suggested that if elioutd be brought before the bianch mectinger for the branches to deal with.
Thanks to the clacirman and in the authorilies who had phaced their lells at the disposal of the ringers enteluted the business, gud riaging thon occupied attention at the three towers.

THE BELLS OF A WORCESTERSHIRE VILLAGE.
HOW RINGERS HELPFD TO PROTIDE \& RING OE EIGH's"
The little parish of Hinton-on-tho-Green, near Evegham, is now is proud possession of a handy and musical octave of bells, with a terer of 102 cmt , in G. For over 200 years five bells had done duty, these Laving been cast by Mressre. Clarke and Bushell at Evesham, and in spite of the fact that the frame was constructed for gix, and spach left in tho tower for two extra trebles on the same level, a fuov could not bo made until the old ones became unsafe to rixg jusi over a year ago. The old onk frame, which is in good condition, lams been considerably stiengthened by massive angle plates and tio boits, and secured to a supporting beam underneath. The exteasion to the frame is also of oak. The old five were removed to Messrs, Jolin Taylor and Co.'s Loughborough Foundry, where a complete clearance of the old fittings was made and the bells tured, saudblasted ant quarter-turned. They were fited with canon-retaining headstocks, ball bearings and new fittings throughout. Thanks to the gemerosity of Mr. E. P. 'lhomas and his mwther, of Claines, and to the wforts nad subscriptions of ringers, thee new trebles were cast (the cast ing being the accasion for an ouling to the foundry). The resuld is a dirst-class job, the tone and blending of the new bells being all finat can be desired, and the "go" excellent. In the ringing chana ber, which is also the vestry, the churels, and on all sidos of thu cower outside, every bell is clearly heard and bulanced to porfection The bells bear the following inscriptions:-
'Ireble.-Hhis bell was givonl by Mrs. E. Thomas and her son, E. P. Thomas, of Claines, Worcester, 1931.

2nd.-Ringers and Friends of the Dioceso gave nee, 1931.
3rd.-Serve God and be wherr[ul. F. G. Jlyth, Rector man, F. Sheaf, Wardens,
These three also 'raylor, Loughborough, 1931."
5th. Magdelenze Gnmpana.
Each of the fire old bells also have an iuscription on the waist and chiefy of interest is the mothod adopted in dating the bells. The Roman ummerals are insctibed in large capitals, and the sum of ench line added together gives the year 1705.

## THE COLLEGE YOUTHS, I750-1788. <br> BY J. ARMIGER TROLLOPE.

## II. BENJAMIN ANNABLE (contimued).

About this time Holt was preparing the broadsheet of his peals for publication. Among the subscribers there are seventeen London College Youtlis, but not Anmable. The names of these subscribers, so far as I can trace them, are interesting. Samuel Killican had joined the Society at the same time as flolt and rang in both the peals he called. John Hardham had ceased to take an active part in ringing and was busy with other things, theatres and smuff-making. His last peal was thirteen years before. William Underwood had belonged to the London Scholars, the old rivals of the College Youths, and had rung in two of the three peals by the former of which the record has come down to us, Grandsire Cingues at St. Martin's, in 1,727 , and $6,20+$ in the same method at Cornhill in 1729 , In 550 lie joined the Union Scholars and rang in two or three peals with Holt, including Grandsire Cinques and Court Bob Major. Samuel Thompson (or Tomson) trad belonged to the City Scholars and rang in their 6,oiz Grandsire Caters at Cripplegate in 1732 , the only peal by that society we have any record of, except one of Boh Aajor at Bermondsey in the same year, reported without particulars by 'The Norwich Gazette.' Thomas Bennett was a keen ringer, who started with the Eastern Scholars, and changed from society to society as suited his purpose or fancy. Most of the others were well-to-do members who did no peal ringing, like Thomas Lester, the Whitechapel bell founder, Willam Oram, and William Skelton. Skeiton was Registrar to the Bishop of London and a proctor in the Court of Arches.

The man who managed the whole allair was Joln Cundell. It was he who got the subseriptions and it was at his address, 'Ye Golden Eagle,' in Duke's Court, Covent Garden, that the broadsheet might be bought. Cundell was Master of the Society in 1753.

Whether there would have been a struggle between Annable and Holt within the Company for the leadership we cannot say, for Holt died before his broadsheet appeared.

These things very much weakened the Society for peal ringing, and probably diminished Annable's authority. He rang only one more College Youth peal, which was on May 3rd, $1753,6_{2} 080$ Union Bob at St. George's-in-the-East. Union Bob is an old name for Oxford Treble Bob. Bennett and Thompson rang in this peal. There is a record of another peal which, if genune, throws a lot of light on the situation. Somewhere about 1840 , John Cooper, then beadle of the Collcge Youths, came across an account of a peal, and as the books were being rebound, he suggested that it should be included. But it was objected that it could not have been rung or it would have been booked at the time. There is a much better reason for its not being booked, and that is because more than half the band were not College Youths.

St. Leonard's, Shorecitich, 1754 . The Company rang a peal of 5040 changes of Bob Major in 3 hours 28 minutes. John Underwood r, Thomas Bennett 2, Benjarmin Annable 3, Robert Holmes 4, William Underwood 5, Emanue! Crouch 6, Robert Bly 7, Joseph Monk Tenor. William Underwood call'd Bobs.'

The two Underwoods, Bly, and Monk were at that time ringing peals with the Eastern Scholars. Bennett had belonged to that society before 1750 and was now a member of the Cumberlands Society. Holmes was one of the Twickenham Scholars, churchwarden, and a country member of the College Youths. William Underwoud was not the man who had subseribed to Holt's broadslieet, but his son, and probably the brother of John Underwood.

The peal was not booked by any society, and the first notice of it is eighty years later; but it looks to me like genuine. If so, it shows the College Youths as a divided house and Anmable looking for support outside. He would not leave the socieiy he had led for so long, but he would ring with other people. They were waiting and watching for an opportunity to profit by the old Company's troubles, and werc ready to welcome the great man, although he had derided their cherished method a few years before.

Annable did not ring another peal. He died early in r556, and was buried inside the tower where he had rung his first peai and which was the scene of so many of his ringing triumplis. He left behind him one of the biggest reputations in change ringitg. As an all-round manringer, composer, conductor and leader-he has had few equals and no superior. His is the greatest name on the College Youths' roll and the Society has a right to be proud of him, for he stuck to them from first to last. In this the differed from all the leading ringers of the eighteenth century. They passed from one Society to another as ambition or pigue moved them. All of them changed once, some many thoes, and it is almost bewildering to try and follow them through their changes. Jasper Snowdon, in his list of composers, gives John Reeves as a College Youth. He was a College Youth at one time, but the name of almost any other London society would have done as well. He started as a Cumberland, then he joined the London Youths, then the ancient' society of College Youths, then the Cumberlands, and finally the second society of London Youths. His fellow authors of the 'Clavis,' William Jones and Thomas Blakemore, had as many changes.

Note 4. Whon I said that the first College Xouths pal was the Grandsire Cinques in 1724 I did not forget the entry in the peal book which professes to record a peal of Bob Triples rung at St . Sepulchre's in 1689 . That record is manifestly spurious. Annatie, who was born in 1703, can hardly have called a peal fourteon years earlier; and there is sufficient evidence that he and his conteyrporaries knew notbing of any such performance. The entry is is late insertion.

In acknowlodging this, the Rector suid it was an equally prourl moment to him to recoive it. He had already thanked them, but ons thing be must add. It seemed to hito that to acbieve such a splendid result, not only the ringers of the dioesso and their friends, but a wide circle of ringers throughout the conntry mugt lave stood solidly together, aptily illustrating the motto, "Unify is strength.

Mr. J. Hall, in moving a Yote of thaske to the Rector for his hearty, welcome, said he took that opportunily of congratulating him and his Chureh Gouncil on the courage with which 1 boy undertook a
 scheme. He also congratulated Messrs. Taylor and Co. on the excellent job, overyone being well satisfied with the tone and 'go' of the bells.

## GUILDFORD DIOCESAN GUIED

## (iUILD LIERARY TO DE ESTABLISHED

A very satisfactory financial position was revealed al ihe anmad goneral meating of the Guildford Diocesman Giald, held at Guildford uns Satarday wenk ani attended by worly a hundred nambers. After having lival attended a special semvice in the Cathedral, tea wan anved in Haly Triaity Pavish Hall, whero subsequently Mr. Walter Harrisou (vice-presirlent) presided over the business mecting. Fe was supported hy the Provost (Canon Fis. C. Kirwati), Mr. W. H. Ryte, K.C., the Masim (Major J. IZ. B. Hesse), the lion. treasirer iAnmical 7. 13. Walker) and the han. sceretary (Mr. J. S. Goldsmith).
At the emamemement of the meeting a shorl silence was obsenved n metrory of Areldeacon Irwin.
Tha cormation, is their manal repurt, anid they looked back on 1930 with mixted feeliugs. The Guild's activities were fully anitulaned, uad in some directions extended, but they had experienced increasing difficully of obtaining the support of some of the ringers which they filt thoy ought to receive. The ringing membership of the Guidd remainer almost the same as at the end of last year. The influx of 57 zew mombers was mode thun digeounted by lapses ancl rloatits, so that there was actually a loss of four ringing anembers. it was gratifying to recard a growing interest in the Guild by churehpeople, wilh flim result that the lronotem members increased from 38 tu 63 dwhig the year. Twa new life hon. members were electen, hut three wete lost by dealh. Eight compounding members brought the total numbership of tho Guild to 587, as compared with 559 in 1929. The committee did not think the position was entirely satisfatory. There were in the Guild 375 resident ringing members, but, gmotding to the Churel Year Book, thore were in the Diocesc of fuidfford ja 1929619 tingers, 467 boing voluntary and 152 paid. Allowing for the fant that some of these were 'ringers' at churches which had mo tingable zeals of bells, there woukl 'geem to be a considerable margia of ringers in the diocese who ought ta he in the fiuld, but were not. The Guitd was constantly endeavouring to buing the adrantages of mensuership before the ringers of the diocese by frequent meelings and combined practices hut there was need fol greater affort by all officers and members of the Guild. The committee felt that incumbents and charch antharities in parishes where the ringers were not members of the fuila should do their utmobt to induce usem to juin to assist in promoling the abjects of the fiuld and to incrense their efficiency hs churchwowers through the Fncilities whict the Guild was ready to provide by way of practice and instruelion.
The Guild was gaining a sound financial position. The balance in Ile geamal thad at the end of 1929 was increased at tite end of 1930 lyy 51595.9 d . 10 i total of 5522 s ., and the balances in the disirict funds had risen by 81295 . 6d. to 2312 s . Sk.
The summer festival at Eghitu was attendod by eighty riagors, and the programow of district meetivgs had provided is scries of enjoyablo galheringe. At erost of them the numbers attending were very salisfactory, but they wegretted that more ringers did not take advarage of the menlinga. Tlianks were due to a certain number of monbers who layulty supporfed the work of the Guild in that direetion, and they hoped that ins the coming sear more members would support the mectings. The combined practines, organised in different preas, had met with varying atacess, in waluable addition to the memhership laning resuled from work diane in the Cranleigh area.
In peal ringing the Guild had had a succesaful year, vinging 47 preals, an futwane of twelve on the preeceling year. TThe success was largely tue to the energies of Mr. A. H. Pulling, who conducted 26 peals for the tinild cluring the year, inctuding the first peals of Surrey Surprise, Doublo Dublis Surprige and Reverge Dublins Surprise Minjor wer 1.thig. the first panls of Guildford Sarprise and Norfols Surprise, and the first peal on handholls by the Guild." Mr. A. Harmar conducted six peas during the yar, and did valuable work in the Leatherlsead district.
The amanitem emphasised that the primary duty of the ringerg' oflice was tur mftuent ringitg of the hells for Surday services, and every (ffort whould be made, where hands were helow full strengity, to suok out zuitable recruits. There were n mumber of bands is the diooeste without sufleient numbers io ring all the bells for the chureh services, and ther appealed for renewed energy it remenging that serious defect.
The report and the treasuror"s statememt of accomats were adopted.
On the prapmition of Mr ( i , J. frover it wus agreed that a sum not exceeding es shoutd be expended upon the purchase of Central Council pabhertions for vesale to members of the Cinith, and a suby commilfec, contisting of Messrs. A. FT. Pulling, A. C. Hazelden, G. L. Grover, J. S. Goldsmith and Majoy Hesse, wns appointed with fuwer to purelase the publications.

## A GUILD LIBRARY

Mr. Hazeldin, in proposing hat a fuitd Librav be established, remarked that nany old books ware lost to the rizgors when their members died, and lhe thoughe that if a gaild library could be sot up it would sutve a very ussfu! purpose. Hiajor Hesse spoke in fivour of tho proposal to form a library, and oltored to give Morris' "Hisiory and Art and Chunge Ringing,' Mr. Goldamith offered the bound wolune of 'The Ringeng Wond' for the yeris since the Guide
was founded, and a copy of Sir Arthur Heywood's 'Towers and Belfries, was also offered by Mr. C. Hazelden. After some discussian it was agreed to approach the authorities of S. Nicolas' Chureh in oh trin permission to accommorlate the libiary in that belfry, there heing ro roons for it in the Catsedral Clurch belfry. A sub-conmitited consistirg of Mr. Harrison, Mr. Hazelden, Major Iesse, Admiral Wulkea and Mr. J. S. Goldsmith was appointed to deal will the matter, ath 31r. Izazelden was appointed librarian. Canon Kirwau offered to provide a cupboarl for the books, and it was agreed that tho subcommittee should be authorised to spend a sum not exceeding 250 n the purchase of books, and to draw up by-laws to be conlirmet at the next anmual meeting.
Mr. Ptolling proposed that a record he kept of peal compositions ruag hy hae Guild, and this was agreed to. Mr, G. L. Grover undertook the duties of recorder, and the record will be Kept in itae library,
It was agreed to bold the summer festival at Farnham on July Ath, when il was hoped the Bishop of Guildford would be preseni. Guiluford was appointed as the venue for the next annual meeting, akd it was agreed to hold a second annual dimner.
M1. J. S. Goldsmith gave an outline of the proposed Stedman Terreatenary Commemoration, and asked the Guild to give a donation to the funds. On the proposition of Mr. R. Whittington, it was agreed to vote 555 s . to the fund.
The naeeting conaluded with votes of thanks to Bishop Gulding Bird (who was elected a life member), Mr. W. Harrison, Canon E C. Kirwan, the Rev. E. de G. Lucas and Mr. J. S. Goldsmitls,

## MISSIONARTES OF CHRIST

In his address the Archdeacon said lie was going to call them : name which he did not think many of them would claim, but nevertheless it was true. He was going to eall them "fellow missionaries." They were Hopelessly compromised as misstonaries of Chist's Churela because the whole excuse or explanation of the rimging of the bells wrs calling men and women to church to worship Jesus Christ. That was exactly what he and every other clergyman did. He knew that helrinting had been elaborated and tiad become a musioal art, but primerily the bells were rung to remind people of Christ and His Church. There were a great many of them who were worthy of the unme of missionaries of Christ, but ho was equally sure that there wele some of then wha did not practise what they practised. The one thing that mattered in fhe world to-day was whether they believed that Christ was the one cure for the evils of to-day.

There were three kinds of worship. They worshipped God witly their body, brain and soul. Did they realise that every time they rang a bell is God's nome and to His glory they werc worahipping Him just as when they bent their knee in prayer? Ereryihing nffered to God and done in His service was service to Him, aul ever the humblest work they did could thas become sacramental. If they realised that when they rang their bell, it mould add romance to the work.

## DEVON GUILD.

The Aylesbeare Deanery Branch lield a well-attonded meeting at East Budleigh ont Saturday, April 25th. Good uso was made of the Itandy peal of six at this chutch during the aflemoon and evening; and also of the bells in whe neighbouring towers of Otterton and Colaton Raleight. In the eourse of his aduress during the service, the Vicar of Easi Budleigh, the Rev. II. W, Gardiner, offereal a warm welcome to the Guld, and spoke of his association with its president many years ago at Bradfeld College.

Tea way partaken of in the Institute, and at the subsecuent meeting, presided orer by Rev. E. A. Julyan (chairman of the hranch), it was decided to hold a by-meating on Junce zolh in additian to the usnal attumm mecting, the place being left to the thiseletion of the secretary.

Two new nembers were clected, ant the meeting closed with a heerty vote of thanks to the Vicar, to whom the branch was indebted for a particularly delightfal service, and to the organist, blower, and those ringers and their wives who provided the tea.

## NORTHAMPTON RINGER'S DEATH.

The dath took place suddenly ou April l8th of $\mathrm{MI}^{\text {. }}$ Authur 0 . Stewart, of Northampton, who was particalarly active as a ringer in the districh some years ago. Tho deceased, who was 59 yentr of age, was one of a band of young men who learned to ring when the peat of bells was first installed at St. Edmund's Church by the late Mr. $W^{W} \mathrm{mo}$. Tones. When the bells of St. (iles' Church wore augnented iuto a peal of ten in 1896, Mr. Stewatt was appointed leader of the belfry, and did valuable work, teaching young aspirnats and helping other's to advance in the ari. He rang altogether about 20 penls.

The funeral took place on April 22nd, the service being conducled by the Rev. J. H. N. Hill, nind the lessour read by Mr. F. Wilford (lay reader and Master of the Peferbovogh Diocesan Guild). Mufferl touches were mung in the ovening at St. Giles' Church.

## A TRIP TO SOMERSET.

OR HOW A REPUTAFION WAS LOST
That ringers do read their 'Ringug World' is proved by the great ecputation that Joe, the 'Chilcompton busman,' has as a speed zoerclant.
