The tablet to commemorate the Grandsire Cinques rung at Painswick on November 8th last year has been unveiled. The wording has been carefully drafted, but, even so, we venture to suggest that the record may be open to misapprehension in future. It is true that the performance is not described as a peal, but in generations to come, when actual recollections of the event have vanished and people turn to this commemorative tablet for what they will believe to be the best evidence of what was done on that day in 1931, it may well be that it will create the impression that this was a true peal, 'otherwise,' we can imagine them asking; ' why slould it be recorded ?' Everyone who understands ringing gives the band credit for their feat of endurance, but endurance by itself is not even the first essential of a peal. The primary essential is that it shall be true, and no effort in change ringing is really worth placing on permanent record unless, first and foremost, it is true.

Writing when the falseness of the composition was first revealed, the conductor said the Painswick Youths made their own rules and still claimed to have rung the greatest number of true changes on twelve bells, because more than sixteen thousand had been rung before the repetition occurred. We pointed out at the time that, from the beginning of ringing history, falseness in a peal irretrievably condemned the whole, and no portion picked out from the remainder was entitled to a claim to any honour. The Painswick Youths have, apparently, a different standard, a standard which, we think, the Exercise at large will not envy. In these days, when everyone knows what happened, ringers can, perhaps, afford to smile at the erection of this tablet, but future generations may be misled by it, not by what is recorded on it-although even in that respect it may be open to criticism-but by what it omits to say.

If this tablet is to be any more than a passing compliment to the twelve men who rang Painswick bells for over $11 \frac{1}{2}$ hours on end, if it is to stand as a record for posterity to read and by it to jucige rightly the merits of the performance, it should have been frankly stated that the composition was false. That would not have taken away the 'endurance' credit, but it would have put the achievement in the place it ought to occupy. There is nothing in the wording to lead future ringers to suppose that it was anything but a true peal, and it gives to the composer a credit which, in the light of the actual facts, is not deserved. We are sorry that any of the Painswick Youths should have assented to the erection of this tablet, which seems to have been due to a misdirected sense of (Coutinred on page 830.)

## THE PAINSWICK ‘PEAL.’

A TABLET UNVEILED.
The 224Lh anuiversary of the Anciont Sociely of Painswick Youths was celebrated on Saturday week, on which oceasion a tablet to commenorate the ringiug of 17,687 changes of Cundsire Cinques in 11 hours 35 minutes, an Saturday, 8th, November, 1930,' was unveileti ant diedicated. The story of this' 'peal' is well known. In February, 19ad, a peal of 13,001 Grandsire Cinkues was rung in Painswick and remainet the record lenrth on twelve holls until on Angust Bank Holiday, 1923, the 15,312 Cambridge Surprise Maximus was rung at Asiton-under-hyne. Therofter the Painswick men made a series of attenpts to regain the record, which culminated on November 8th, 1930, in a peal' of 17,687 Grundsire Cinques. When, how-eve:- in the fallowing Jamury, tho figures of the composition were published in 'The Ringing Werld,' it was yuickly discovered that they contained a false lead, and the record went hy the board
The minsecessfn] performance, nevertheloss, has been permanently recorded in Paiuswiek Cluweh, and it was unveiled by the conductor of the peal, Mr- Albert Wright.
According to the Choucester" "Citizen," the labiet bears the following inscription 'This tablel commemorates the riuging of 17,686 cbanges of Grandsire Cinques in 12 hours 32 (35) minutes on Saturday, 8th November, 1930." Then follow the names of the ringers: H. Phelps (treble), T. Baldwyn, W. Irelanai, E. H. Sioneley, L. Barry, A. Wright, s. T. Price, W. Staite, A. G. Hannis, J. D. G. Harris, i. F. Ballinger, J. George (tenor'). The tallet adds: 'Weight of tenor, 26 cwt . Composed and conducted by Albert Wright.'
The Vicar, before dedicating the tablet, said they lad come together that day to unveil a tablet which was to commemorate a great feat of endurance. This was not done in pride, but as an act of justice. They realised that even the hest they could do always had its faults, but they tried to tell the truth as it stood, believing that God desired mercy and not sacrifice, and so they were ready to commit themselves and their deeds into His keeping, knowing that the Alminhty was also the All merciful.
The Yicar aflerwards dedicated the tablet with the prayer: 'Accept, o Lord, this memorial of endurance and skill and deliver us from all pride and uncharitahieness, for Jesus Chrisl's sake.
The Gloncester- 'Gitizen' adds:
'Tany of the $r$ ingers who assisted ins the cstahlishment of the record were present, and later the anmal cimmer of the society took place at the Golden Fart Inn, when momhers from many parts of the country assembled. Mr. Alhert Wright presided, and among those replying to the toast of "The Ancient Society of Painswick Yonths" was Mr. James George (Birmingham), who is nearing his 80th birthday, and who was the ringer of the tenor hell in the rrcord created last Nowemher, since when he has suffered a serious illness in no way comeeted 'wilh that feab of endutance. Fo pronounced bimeelf fit to stand at the ropes for anotlier lwelve honrs if called upon to do so!'

A wisitor: bu the village of Knowlo can scarcely believe lie th but a stepping-stonc fium the great commercial city of Birmingham, for thid yillage endeavours to retain all its old-world associations; its Ginikd Hall, adjacent to the churelt, dates back a grote many years, whilst ulte wrouglit torn sigu ontside tite Swan Inn, near to the elnueh, is of the enrly 15th century. The church was founded in 1402 atad is fanous for its statuary and wood carvings. It occupies a commanding posiliou abutiag the main road.
Whiist reluming its old-fashionedness in many ways, Kucwle has secn that. su far as its bells are concerned, it has moved with the timus. The colebrate the Diamond Jubilee of Queen Victoria in 1897 the three hells wire recast and three new bellis added, making a ring of six, James Barweld, of Birmingham, carrying out this work. Some few muntina ago the 5th bell cracked, so Taylors were called in.

It was dewifed in liave the cracked bell recast, also to hang the peal witl hew gudgeong and hall bearings. Mr. Williams, one of i.le churchwardons, then offered to give a new bell, and eventually two new tremles to complete the ring of eight were ordered, and the nedication of these look pince on Saturdar, September 19th, by the Ven. Archileacon of Aston, who prenclied a most homety and interesting sermon. Mr. E. Denison Taylor was pregent as founder of the recast 50 and two new trebles, and besides a quartet of liculpants from loughborough, there were visitors from the Birmingham and Covenly distriets and neiglobouring fowers, in addition to Mr. Hanry Wehb, of Groft, and Mr. R. F. Deal, of London.
Some excellent ringing book place, and it was surprising to note how the reast nad new bells, with their wonderfal carrying poser, semmed to wrap up the deficiencies which previously were so noticealhe ta those who hat formerly known the old peal of sis. The these "Taylon" bells have certainly made a splendid improvement, and Knowle Parish Church now possesses a very luandy and most plensing riag of cight bells.
Through flae generosily of the Vicar, the Rev. Canon Downing, antil the churehwardens, the clergy and visitors were invited to tea, and. with the weather un its best behnviour, evercone present had a most enjowable time.

One hears so much to-day of complajnts about the ringing of bets that it is quite refreshing and decidedly encouraging to read that occasionally \& peal-be it ever co lumble-meets with apprecintion. Tha following notice respecting a peal of Grandsire Dobbles at Bulwick (near Stamford), Northamptonshire, recorded in a recent issue of 'Tlie Ringing World,' appeared in various local papers:-

- Kingers rang a special peal of bells in the Parish Church on Satur day fast, in 2 hours and 40 minutes. The accomplishmeat was 5,040 Grandsiro Doubles ( 42 six-score with ten different cellingg). Accord ing to records lept, this is the firat occasion for 30 years that the above result has been attained. . . . We should like to congratulat those five gentlemen (i.e., the ringers) on their porformance, also to state how much their effarts wers appreciated. May we, Jike Oliver Twist, ask for more ${ }^{\text {P }}$

While the npening phrase may, perhaps, eangaerate the merits af the performance, there is no doubt about the enthusiasm expressed in the concluding line.

Each is different and one represents King David playing on bells, whilo another shows a bell in a circle which bears the Enscription and date seon on the treble bail. It would be interesting to know if any readers are aware of other carvings showing bells or ringing, apart from the carvings of campanarif at Belton (Jiucs), Winwick (Lames) and Stoke Dry (Rutland)

Several new mombers were electen, and after votes of thanks had been zassal to the churchwardens for their kindness in granting the use of tho bells, and to tho Kirkby Wishe ringers and their heluers in providing such a bountiful tea, the ringers adjourmed to the tower for furbher ringing.

THE COLLEGE YOUTHS, I750-1788.
BY J. ARMIGER TROLLOPE.
(Continued from page 607.)

> XV, THE CLAVIS.

After the trouble of 1787, Willian Jones left the St. Martin's band and took refuge with the ringers of his owth district, with whom he seems to have kept in pretty close touch throughout his life. He rang three or four peals in 1787 and 1788 at Fulham, Battersea and Kensington. 1'robably he hoped with their aid to revive the fortunes of the old society, but Irons' action put an end to that hope. There was now only one Society of College Youths, and so Jones went over to the Cumberlands. He joined them on February 10th, 1789, and in that year and rogi he called a couple of peats of Bob Major for them, one bis own composition. In 1791 he returned finally to his own district and made no more changes. He was now once more a College Fouth, but he seens to have had nothing to do with headquarters. He continued peal ringing for the next iwenty years, sconing his last in 1812, when he must have been getting an old man.
Villiam Irons joined the Cumberlands on August 4 th, 1788. In iz90 he was elected Master, and when he died he left that society the property fe had brought from the College Youtlis. What happened to it afterwards is a story which can be told later.

In the midst of these stirring times the 'Clavis' was born. It cane out in the early part of 9788 , and on the title page were the names of Villiam Jones, John Reeves, and Thomas Blakemore (Note 23). These three had been pulfing different ways for a long time and were now hopelessly divided. Although all three were, according to the standard of the times, irreat peal ringers, there was only one five thousand in which all of then took part. This was a peal of Bol, Najor at St. Giles-in-theFields on August 28 th, 1785 . It whas composed and conducted by Reeves. The composition was a one-part in forty-threc courses (fourtecn bolss Before) and has the Sixth twelve times each way. It is given in Shipway's book.

The Norwich risit closely followed this peal, and the rivalry between Reeves and Blakemore soun came to a head. Blakmore appears to have been conscious of his own great abilitias as composer and conductor, and was jealous of his colleague's still greater abilities. It is impossible now to judge between the two, but posterity has tone Blakemore something less than justice. His name is unknown to present-day ringers, and his compositions do not appear in any ringing books, while Reeves is nniversally acknowledged as one of the great ringers of all time and his peals are still rung. Yet it would be surprising if some of the peals in the 'Clavis' were not the work of the lesser known mat. The rivalry between these two was, as we have seen, the factor which decided the fate of the old Society of Collewe Youths.

For the moment Blakemore has got everything his own way. At St. Martin's he was supreme. His rival was gone. The most active and skilful members of both societies of College Youths were at his disposal, and on October 6th, 1788, he achieved his ambition and called the first peal of Stedman Cingues, his own composition. The length was 6,204. In addition In Blakemore, the band included Christopher Wells, lnvile and Williamson, from the old sociey; and Donkit, Povey, Worster,

Lyford, Sylvester and Pilgrin from the junior society. Hammett and Lawrence were members of a band which was ringing peals at Fulnan and the district. Almost as interesting are the names of those who did not ring. Besides Reeves and the tenor man, five of the 1787 Stedman Caters band were not included. Of the junior company, Holdsworth (Note 24) and Monk and Samuel Muggeridge and Winstanley Richardson were dropped. Monk had been ringing peals regularly since r755. He rang one on July 12 th, 1788 , and then no thore till a peal of Treble Bob Major in 1792 , the lirst on Leatherhead bells. This was his last peal. He died in his seventyninth year and was buricd at Camberwell.

The collapse of the ancient society left the ground clear for the junior company. They removed their headquarters and belongings from the Barley Mow to the Barn (Note 25) and assumed the rights and traditions of the old Society of College Youths. Presently they added the word Ancient to their title. Up till then the title had been the Society of College Youths, whether borne by the old or the junior company. As was the custom in the eightenth century, people sometimes added fancy or complimentary adjectives. Thus Stedman calls them the 'noble' society and the 'honoured' society, and elsewhere they are the 'ancient' and 'respectable' society. As the survival of a similar thing, there are still the Worslipful Company of Spectacie Makers and the Honourable Society of Lincoln's Inn, and suchlike.

When the adjective 'ancient' is used of the society between the years 1756 and 1788 it always means, as in the 'Clavis,' the original society, which afterwards lapsed, in contradistinction to the other and newer company which was using the same name.

Richards) plliciated, assisted by the Rev. T. B. Edrdip (curate). The riugers atterded. Hymns were sung and the Vienr gave an address.

After the garvice the hells were rung to Grandsire Triples by the members of the loma company, with the addition of Mr. R. White.

Following the ringing the ringers were entertained to supper by the Vicar at the Angel Hotel, the guests also including the Rev. W. Favard-ivnes and Mr. W. T. Ruok (ehumehwarden).
Mr. G. Childs, eaptain of the Gadalming company of ringers, thanked the Vioar on bohalf of the rimers, and remarked that they were pleased to receivo the report of Mr. Whifle that hone of the bells is crictied.
The Vicar said that in 1741 lite hells were newly cast and lung; and increased frem five to their present umber of eight in 1799.
Tho bells have been quarter turned and rahung on ball bearings, with new clappers, wheels and headstocks. The fiame has also been stremathened.

## MR. M. SWINFIELD'S GREAT RECORD.

ONE FUNDRED DIFFEFENT PEALS OF STEDMAN TRPLES.
Mr. Mintice Swinfield's great forte is conducting Stednan Triples, and almast avery weck we recors a pal by the 'Wednesday' band which he has called, and every time it is a fresh composilion. Last week he called his on" hundredth different composition for the Wialland Cumanties Associalion, and he has called only 108 in all. Of the remaining eirht, onlp three were duplicated, as four of them wese the reverse of others, although clained by diferent camposcrs, aud one was Brooks" variation of Tlurstans'. Moveoper, many of the cempositions have been very involved, and would probably defy the efforts of many Stedman conductars: yet Mr. Swinficid conles up with a frosh one every week? We suppose there mint come a time when He has ne new worlds left to conquer, hut till then-well, more power to his burat and elbow.

## YEOVIL BELLS REOPENED.

WONDERTUL JM[ROVEMENT JN HISTORIC PEAL.
Yeovil'a historic peal of bells are one more in sound order and in buter tome than ever before. The tuebles lave been recast, the rest thated and in the opinion of those who have since heard them among the finest rimps in a county of many glorions pals. The bells lave the advantage of weight-the tenor is over two tons-and balance, Hind a marvellous improvement has beer effected.
'Thut wonk has been splendidy canvied ont by Messtr. Mears and slainhank, of the whitedapel Foundry. The appor tier framework whith anrues the becond and fifth bells, las been refitterd on a steel girdev fondation, and new and heavier sides lave lucen fited to the niain frame to carry the eighth and minth buels. Tle rest of the frumework has been refiled and tho wholo frame and supporting beatrs tieal togetwer with bolts. All the ten bells have been sehwerg in hibll learings, dew clapper staples fane been dithed and the clappers randjusted. Thase un the nintla and tenor are fitted with counterbulances to ensure the balls being pulled up "clapper right side." New rulfurs have beoll fitcoi, and these run on ball bearings.

Origimally the tenor was said to weigh 44 ewt., bitt the removal of the lapavy ennons, when the bells were relung in 1891, have re duced it considerably. Tho net weights of the helis are new :

Wori, from Fukuoka, priest in the Japanege Church.

With the elergy standing around at the west end of the church the Viear asked the Gishop to rededicate the bels.

The late Isame Shade never carried much when on lour, and, theyefore, never came late to the belfry or the dimer table his overcoat pocket was his "holdall.' Eroing to the othe: extreme $T$ recollect three members of the Surrey four, 1913 , turaing up with large bulhy cases suitable for a month's tour in America, but they have since grown wiser. To those who have never anjoyed a ringing tour I can recommend Mr, Bankes James' praciicejust a simple trucksack.
St. Ceorge"s Church, Dublin, stands at the junction of several bold Wharonghines. It is of classical design in stone, by hren, and resembles several of his churches in the city of London. It is surrounded by high jron railings, the ancient headstones of the doparted being Ievelled. With its central tower ancl spire, the west front mateles Sit. fitlessin-the-Fieldg, Bloonsbary. The bells-the oldest ritig of eight in Treland-were east br Meare in 1820 (tenor 20 cwi ). They are a sisler peal to the octate at Waterford Cathodral by the same founder in 1872 . Rehumg in 1928 ly Messrs. Tarlor and Co., we had a unique experience of good musio and good going for our firsi peal attemont, thanks to Mr. Dukes and several of the home band, who met us and rafsed the bells for us. The gronnd floor of the tawer forms a parch entrance, and stairs up to the gallerios lead out on either side. With the belfy toor open can be sean a bell of ahont 24 in. dimaeter standing on the floor, which seems to appeal to ane to cone in and ring me.' Its inscription is interesting, viz.:-

There are 11 men in the loral company. Mr. Burrows, the hon. secretary, and the Vicar, the Rev. W. F. Alman, M.A., met us and also kintly came to congratulate us after the peal, in which both our tenor and treble men proved themadves 'worthy' hands. The bells are by Rudhall, tenoy remited to be 221 cwt in E flat. Several of the team agreed the weight of metal was there, but that was "after" the ringing.
A fine portrast of saudy Milne, a Glasgow N.P. banker, who was foreman for 23 years, hangs whe belfy wall, whilst the present Vicar was president of the I.A.C.R. for 1929-30. The town is a lasge and important tuade centre, and the high level wiaduct across the River Boyne gives a good view of its many spires and the cld castle meunt, now a barracke.
Hungry and weary ald 9 oclock at night, we weve like one of the lost bribes of Isracl, saved only by the tiny tinkling of a little bell, wheh gleefilly respotded to the call, 'Are you there?' It was the White FIorse Hotel and its never to be forgoten landlady that gave us dimner hal bed at 'telcphone' notice. Yes, we were there, instead of being at Lurtan 70 miles on.
