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

#### FIFTY YEARS OF PEAL PROGRESS.

The jubilee celebrations of numerous ringing associations and guilds have been a reminder of the changes which have been effected in the last fifty years in our art and all that appertains to it, but nothing is more striking than the remarkable progress made in regard to peal ringing during the half century. The peals analysis for 1931 — compiled with stupendous labour by the Analysis Committee of the Central Council — which we publish this week, reveals the total of 2,082 peals rung in the twelve months, the greatest number ever recorded in one year, except in that phenomenal period, 1912 and 1913, which produced 2,329 and 2,358 peals respectively. We are getting back close to the peak figures of twenty years ago, and it is significant that it has taken so long to make up the leeway which resulted from the war. It is not our intention at this moment, however, to trace the recovery in peal ringing in the last twelve years or so. In this year of many 'jubilees' it is almost more interesting to carry the comparison back, as we are able to do for the first time, a full fifty years and note the progress that has been made over the fuller period.

In 1881 the total number of peals recorded was 156an average of exactly three a week. In 1931 the average weekly number was 40! The year 1881 was the first for which any details were compiled, but there are no analytical statistics available and one can only take a general survey of the performances. The performances consisted chiefly of Grandsire Triples and Treble Bob Major, with an occasional peal of Caters or Royal and a still rarer peal of Stedman Triples or Cinques. Compare such a record with last year, with not only its huge aggregate of peals, but its vast variety. The peal ringers of fifty years ago may have known something of the complexity of the higher methods, but what knowledge they had gave them the impression that peals of the kind were almost unringable. Surprise ringing, even on eight bells, was all but a closed book to them; to-day it is common everyday practice all over the country. On eight, ten and twelve bells, 387 Surprise peals were rung last year-considerably more than twice the total number of all peals rung in 1881, when even Double Norwich was almost unheard of in peal ringing. Now one finds more peals of it rung than of the simpler Plain Bob. The occasional peal of Stedman half a century ago has developed into more than 300 in a year in these days, while peals on five and six bells have been developed to a remarkable extent—they have multiplied nearly a hundred times.

Let us not, however, despise the work which was done by the peal ringers of those days. They were laying a foundation from which we have reaped an advantage. The success of one band is the inspiration of another; and it was (Continued on page 298.)

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the records of the 156 peals in 1881 that encouraged ringers to do more and even greater things in 1882; just as to-day peal ringers strive to do better in one year than they did in the year before. The Treble Bob of 1881 was the root out of which sprang the tree of Surprise ringing in 1931, and the men of fifty years ago who made themselves proficient in those simpler methods are as much entitled to our respect and admiration as those who to-day, with greater knowledge to draw upon and greater facilities for practice, achieve triumphs in the higher realms of the art.

The bells are a pleasant ring of six (tenor approximately 11½ cwin F sharp). The tower is unique, being octagonal in shape and very small. The restoration work has been most excellently carried out by Mr. Richard White, of Appleton, who has hung the bells in a cast-iron frame, with iron headstocks and ball bearings and all the latest improvements in bell hanging. The bell frame is very ingeniously arranged in three tiers, the fourth and fifth bells being at the bottom, the tenor and treble in the middle, and the second and third at the top. It is a fine piece of engineering, embodying all the traditional master craftsmanship of the White family. Despite the difficulties, there is an excellent circle, and the whole job is one of which the parish of Standlake may well be proud.

#### THE REMOVAL OF BELLS.

A MANCHESTER EXPERIENCE.

A MANCHESTER EXPERIENCE.

To the Editor.

Dear Sir,—In your leading article of April 22nd you discuss the future of a peal of bells at present hanging in St. Andrew's Church Wells Street, London. I am glad to note that the Middlesex County Association and London Diocesan Guild have already taken steps to ensure the bells being preserved locally. At the same time, I would like to make known the experience we had in Manchester in similar circumstances. In 1928, St. John's, Deausgate, came under the axe of a Commission set up for the purpose of joining redundant parishes, and the parish was united with that of St. Matthew. St. Matthew's Church possessed a tower which, in the opinion of Mr. Harry Chapman, then bell adviser of the Lancashire Association, would carry St. John's bells. After his report was presented, the ringers began to set about a scheme to raise funds for the removal of the bells, but before we had started we were informed that the bells were to go to Eccles, which was some five or six miles away. This was surprising, as Eccles already had a peal of bells. Our protests were of no avail, and subsequently St. John's bells were installed at Eccles, after treatment by Messrs. TOWER BELLS.—There is a considerable decrease in the peals of Maximus, being 7 less of Surprise and 6 less of Treble Bob. Three peals of Plain Bob were rung this year, but none in 1930. Stedman Cinques have increased by 14 and Grandsire decreased by 5. Surprise Royal remain the same; Treble Bob Royal have decreased by 2, and other Royal methods increased by 10. In Caters, Stedman have increased by 14 and Grandsire decreased by 3. In Major methods there has been an increase of 33 in Surprise, 21 of which are London. Double Norwich have increased by 2, Treble Bob by 10, Plain Bob by 7, and other Plain methods by 6. Triples show a decrease of 36. Stedman have increased by 56 (due to the number of peals rung for the Stedman Tercentenary). Grandsire have decreased by 90, and other Plain methods by 2. Minor peals are 5-less and Doubles 34 move.

Twenty-seven societies show an increase, the most noticeable being the Yorkshire Association with 53, the Hertford County with 24, the Worcester and Districts with 23, and the Oxford Diocesan Guild with 20. Nine-teen societies show a decrease, the greatest being the Chester Guild with 42 less, and the Stafford Archdeaconry 25.

MacDermott, M.A., Archdeacon of Norwich and president of the Norwich Diocesan Association. Among the ringers present were the Misses H. W. Bill, A. Cushing, M. Robertson, G. Tunnadine and Messrs. A. L. Coleman thon, secretary of the association), W. L. Duffield, W. C. Duffield, and representatives from neighbouring towers. Mr. Bert Newson, himself a Norfolk man, was in charge of the work, while Mr. Ronald H. Dove represented the founders at the dedication in the unavoidable absence of Mr. C. F. Johnston. These received the congratulations of everyone present on the excellence of the 'go' and the successful returning of the former 'pans.' Messrs. Gillet and Johnston have more than justified the confidence placed in them by the crowded church at St. Giles', Norwich, on Friday have more than justified the confidence placed in them by the authorities.

For the purpose of the service, rounds were rung for about three minutes by Messrs. F. H. Knights, G. Howelin, F. Howelin, G. Mayers, N. Golden, W. E. Bason and G. Bailey, and this company rang at the conclusion of the service a touch of 576 Kent Treble Bob Major. Those who had heard the peal before being sent to Croydon for 'rejuvenation' were agreeably surprised at the transformation, which, while possessing power, are quiet to stand under. It is a pity the new teak frame, a fine piece of craftsmanship, could not have

The total weight of the peal is thus 57 cwt. 23 lb., while there is also a clock bell, 24 in. in diameter, and weighing approximately 3 cwt. Messrs. Gillett and Johnston are, incidentally, attending to

the clock.

The balls have been retuned and relung with new fittings throughout, including iron headstocks and ball bearings, in a new teak frame. Five of the bells are pre-Reformation workmanship, and the canons have been retained by fitting to these bells Messrs. Gillett and Johnston's patent canon-retaining headstocks. The peal in the new frame was on view at the 'All-England' ringers' meeting at Croydon on April 2nd.

Norfolk has now a fine addition to her rings of eight. It is hoped these bells may be heard often, and an attempt is to be made to provide a band of Sunday service ringers.

#### DEATH OF MR. E. G. BUESDEN.

The passing of Edwin G. Buesden, conductor of the Cathedral band at Canterbury, in the prime of life, came as a shock to his many ringing friends in Kent. His affliction had been borne in silence for many veges. Little his affliction had been borne in silence for many years. Little did we, who had rung with him and admired him, know until he was gone that the end was so near, and that Thursday, April 28th, 1932, would see us gathered together to take part in the last sad rites inside the beautiful old-world church, and afterwards in the churchyard of St. Stephon's on the outskirts of the carthodral city close to the sound of the hells he loved and so

afterwards in the churchyard of St. Stephen's on the outskirts of the cathedral city, close to the sound of the bells he loved and so often had rung. It was some solace to know our departed friead is resting in such a peaceful, hallowed acre, as yet unspoiled by atrocities in coment and beaver board.

The service was conducted by the Rev. Canon F. J. O. Helmore, who, in spite of advanced years, walked the whole distance both ways from and to the Cathedral precincts. Mr. W. E. Pitman, Mus.Bac., was present at the organ.

Besides the bereaved family, many other parishioners of St. Stephen's attended the service, as did his fellow-ringers of the Cathedral and other ringing friends from Dover, Tunstall, Tenterden, Stone-in-Oxney and Sturry. Included amongst the wreaths was one from the Cathedral ringers, and one from Mr. H. Parkes.

A guard of honour was sent from deceased's old regiment of Royal Engineers, in which he served as scrgeant mstructor during 1914-18. The bells of St. Stephen's were rung half-muffied to touches of Stedman Triples after the interment, and in the evening the Gathedral bells were rung half-muffled to his memory. Personally I would have wished the great bell should have been tolled in memory of one of the greatest ringers the Cathedral company has ever seen.

How many peals Ted Buesden had rung I cannot say, as he did not talk or brag of his accomplishments, but he has called Stedman Triples all round the octave, his favourite being 'Pitstow's Transposition.' He called the writer's first of Stedman Caters from the tenor at the Cathedral on the old ten, and when the two trebles were added he called the first peal on the 12—Stedman Ciuques, his first of Cinques, along with ten other firsts. It was Ted's peal from first to last, and one often wonders what he would have done had he been ringing in the vicinity of London. But his was a quiet, unassuming nature, content to ring and conduct peals with lesser lights, although he was master of nearly any method and a first-class striker and conductor. conductor.

We regret to record the death of Mr. Edward Youngs, of Thornham Magna, Suffolk, who died on Monday, April 25th. He had been captain of the local band for 40 years, and for the same length of time had been the respected foreman on the Thornham Hall Estates. He had rung 136 peals, chiefly on the bells of his parish church. A performance he was justly proud of was ringing the 2nd to a 10,080 in 14 Treble Bob methods in 1912. His funeral took place on Thursday and was attended by a number of parishioners and ringers from several parishes, who rang a course of Grandsire Triples on handbells round the grave, and touches with half-muffled clappers on the tower bells. In the evening an excel-lently-struck peal was completed by a representative band.
