## AN OBJECTIVE FOR THE NEW YEAR

To all ringers everywhere ' The Ringing Worid ' once again extends hearty wishes for a happy and prosperous new year. It is an old wish which, by reason of its age, has to some extent become a convention, but surely there never was a time when it was uttered on all sides with greater sincerity than it is to-day. For some time past the nation, indeed all the world, has been looking from beneath the clouds of depression towards the coming of brighter days, which seem just beyond the horizon, but whose advent is so long deferred that it is not surprising that many who are suffering are in the grip of despair. The hope is in every breast that the new year will bring with it a new tide of prosperity and that from this dear old country of ours the grim spectre of unemployment will be banished. In many quarters its presence is having an adverse effect even on ringing; mectings are suffering because men cannot afford to attend them; associations are finding it a little difficult to get in a certain proportion of their subscriptions because men who are without work cannot afford even this small sum from their straitened means.

In spite, however, of the difficulties of the tinnes, there is no need for pessimism over the outlook for ringing. The art is more than holding its own in face of many handicaps. But if there is one thing more than another to which attention might be devoted in the coming year it is in the direction of creating a greater interest in the work of the ringing organisations. Unless a ringer can take the wider view of his work and all that appertains to it he loses a good deal of the interest and inspiration that is to be gained from an active share in and an appreciation of what is being done by the county and diocesan associations and guilds. Parochialism in ringing is as stiting as parochialism in any other department of church or civic life. The limitation of activity and interest when a ringer is concerned only with what goes on in his own tower can never lead to real progress; indeed, this confined outlook will almost inevitably result in evaporation of any initial interest there may have been and a growing indifference to the real objective of church bell ringing. There are greater ideals and possibilities to be achieved from slaring in the work and forwarding the objects of an association; the wider view and activities of a diocesan or territorial organisation are much more interesting than those of the individual tower, and more stimulating ; just as a wide panorama is better worth looking at and more inspiring than a courtyard. During the coming year, then, let the efforts of all who have the welfare of ringing at heart be bent to awakening in the indifferent an interest (Continued on page 846.)

TREBLE BELL ADDED AT BILLESDON.
Possessing but tive bells for twenly yearg, the Parish Church of Billesdon las been able to boast of an enthasiastic band to ring them. Alilough the "go' was anything but good, the company manfully Etuck to it, and some nine or ten good ringers regularly 'penled ' them week by week. For a long time they agilated and worked for an extrat bell, and at last their desires have been gratified. The old tenolv is one of the fery pre-Reforbation hells left to us, and like al village bells its weight growed.' Eventually it was reputed ta be 16 cutt., but thase interested will lize to know that she is but 11 ewt. $3 \mathrm{gr}, 4 \mathrm{lb}$. In F . Other bells were added in $1624,1628,1862$, and tho treble to make the five put in in 1912. A number of peals of Doubles hava been rung on these five, including the longesit by the Midiand Counties Association-6, 800 clanges in 1926.
Tho five bells have now been retured and a new treblo added by Messrs. F. Taylor and Co., and all rchung in ball bearings on the of frame, with thew portion added to tako whe extria bell.
The sarvico of dedicalion was conducted by the Fan. Archdeneon F. B. Mannult, M.A., F.R.Fist.B., Provost of Loicester Cathodral, on Monday evening, December 19th. Inmodirtely after the dedientory prayers the new treble was pulled up, then all six bells rung in rounds while the clergy proceeded to the clatncel.
The Arcladercon, in a powerful sermon, congraturated the Billesdon parishioners on their cflort, and appaled to the congregation to make an effort to cloar the debt balance of some 560 . He quoted nung historic faets from the late $T$. North's 'Clurela Rellas of Leiese tev'shire, and also Morris' "History and Art of Change Ringing.' He aspecially welcomed in the conategation the presence of the latter author, Mr, Ernest Morrta, F.R.Hist.S., well krowil throughout the diocese fol his keenness on all matiers referviug to bells, and a valuable consulant to the Bishop's Advisory Commitee. He gave many personal reminiscences of bells and ringing, and especially he recalled bis weding day when, in leavirg the cintrels nmid itse escitement and ringing of bells, he left his top hat in the vestry.
After the servico Bob Minor; Grindsire and Plain Doubles were Fung by the local benul aud visitors from Hallaton, Lacicester and Loughborougl. Ewergane concermed was pleased with tha "EO" of the bells, and the now troble is a perfect splice to the rest. The lourics have been bormed up, nud the sound immediately below att side the tower is much softened, while the carrying effect is greaty marked. Billesdon mow has a line rimg of six, and we look forward to seeing abundnat peals of Minor by the jocnls.

## BELFRY GOSSIP.

The Sussex County Association, one of the first to be orgauisted un district ' lines, has for over forly years comprised three dixisionsEust, Central and West. An inmeasurg mumber of towers and greater activity has now led to a rearrangement, and from January 1si fiere are to be fout divisions-Last, West, North Central and South Central.

A penl of Stedman Triples rung at Erdinglom last week was the one thousandth peal by the St. Aartin's Guid. Mr. G. F. Swam, who is tha peal recorder of the Guild, supplies us with the following interestiug particulars. Of the fotal number, 823 have been rung ou churei bails in 81 towers, and 177 on tatubuels, by 506 rimgers. No fewer thrn 178 of the tower bell peals have been rung at St. Martin's Church, while 84 have been ung at Eidington.

There was a time when change ringing for Suday services was not oncouraged; in fact, in some quarters it secms to have beon deprecated almost as much as prize ringing. In the issue of Church Bells of Jauuary $10 t h, 1874$, a 720 of Bob hinor was tecorded as having been rulg for evening service on Sunday, Deember 21st, 1873, at Belbroughton, Worcestershire. Appended to it was the tollowing footnote by the editor: 'The next time the Telbroughton ringers go in for Bob Minor we hope they will not do it ans Sumday, there being six days a weck for work and pleastre." We have progressed since then!

## NEW GRANDSIRE CATERS RECORD.

SUCCESS OT 'JHE APPLETON PEAE.
At Appleton, Berks, fromous for many noted ringing performances, a new record for Grandsire Gaters whas set up on Tuesdaj, when a band of the Oxford Diocesan Guild wero succestinl in ringing the peal of 16,271 changes in this method. The bells started into changes abi 8.40 a.m., aud "This is all' was called at exactly six o chock, tho peal having this occupied 9 hours and 20 mins.
Excellent ringing was heard in the peal, which was rung at ant averaga rate of nearly 29 changes per minute, and the hand were heartily congratulated mon the successful completion of their great effort. Among those who visiter Appleton duning the day to listen to the ringing were ilie Rev. O. W. O. Jemky口, Master of the Oxford Guild, and Mr. A. F. Pegler, of Bangor, Nordla Wales.

Many long peals have been rung at Appleton, inchuding the greatest length ever achieved by one set of men, the 21,353 Stedman Caters on April 22nd, 1922 , in which were three of tho Eingers who took part on Tuesday, Messrs. George Holifold, jun., Richard White and Frederick White.
The 16,271 Grandsire Calers supplants as a record lenth of Grandsire Caters the 15,227 rung at Clicltenham on April 22nd, 1889, in 9 hours 43 mins., which, in its turu, hed heatea the $13,265 \mathrm{ruag}$ at Appleton on Apri! 11th, 1888.
The congratulations of the Exereige will go out to the band of Twoeday hasi upon thoir successful performance, with whick must be associater that Appleton veteran, Mr. George Holifeld, sen., who composed the peal and who took part in most, in fact we thelinve all, of the previous long lengtlis tung in this tower.

Sir,-Here is a faint indication as to early dates of change ringing. Act III., Seene III., of Nicholas Vidall's comedy, 'Ralph Roister Doister, written between 1552 and 1553 :-

And come forth parish Clarke, let passing bell toll.
Pray for your mayster, sirs, and for hym ring a peal.'

## A NEW RING OF TWELVE.

## HEAVIER PEAL FOR LEEDS PARISH CHURCH,

The bulls of the Parish Church, of Leeds, Yorkshire, have been recast and rehung, and are to be dedicated tomorrow (Saturday).

According to the history of the church it would appear that in the early part of the eighteenth century the church. had six bells; these were increased to eight in 1746, then to ten in 1798, and, when the new church was bailt in
form a bandy light ring. The entire peal las been remodelled aud bung with the most modern type of fittings in a massive iron und steel framework, which accommodetes all the thirtean bells on one lewel.
The boll chamber windiows have been treated with sound deadening material so as to reduce the sound of the bells in the immenfate vicinity of the church. Five of the bells of the peal are utilised for tho sounding of the Westminstar quarters and hours, whilst to each of the thirieen belis are fitted two additional striking hammers which are operated by a carillon playing machine, which is atutomutically set into operation at certain hours by a connection with the cloete movement. There is a further hammer fitted to each of the bells, so that the entire pal of thirteen bells may be operated by one person from an Ellacombe chiming apparatus

1841, a peal of thirteen bells was installed, i.e., a ring of twelve, with tenor approximately 35 cwt , and an additional semi-tone bell between the treble and 2nd so as to form a light ring of eight.
The going order of the bells lud been very unsatisfaclary far some gears, until in February, 1931, the 8th bell collapsed in its hell pit owing to a breakage of one of its gudgens. The question of restoring the peal was then taken in hand. It was eventually decided to entrust the work to Messers. John Taylor and Co., Lunglitoraugh, who have recast the thirteen bells and added sufficient new bell metal to form a penl of twelve in the diatonic scale in the key of C natural, but the semoi-tone bell is now between the 6ith anil 7th bells of the peal, i.e., commonly known as ' $\Omega$ flat 6th, which produces another diatonio scale of eight in the key of $F$ naturnl. During the period 1890-1900 he was associated willa tha, Henz fanmes Kidderminster land whielh, under Mr. Rhehard Matthews' conductorslip, was doing much ringing in the higher methouls. In receat years his peal finging linal been much curtailed, hut in 1930 he took part in a peal of Stedman Triples by past and prosent afficers of the assoviation.

## THE LATE MR. HERBERT HAIGH.

## MEMORLAJ DEDIGATED AT ORDSALL

The memory of the late Mr. Herbert Haigh, of Worksop, who was one of the founders al the Nowta Notts Association in 1886, and had server the nssociation in tarious capacties from that time until his deatb, in tanuary, 1932, has ben tangitly perpetuated by the seting up of a lititary in the Lower of All IIAllows Clumeth, Ordsall, in which place lace was born in 1866 . low many years Mr. Haigh was one of the mainstays of the fossemmion, and fol sixteen years furn 1912 scrved it at hon. secretary. Ho was a member of tho commilteo from the fondation of the association, and at the time of his denth was hon, trensurer. [Io also represented the asociation on the Ceatral Comeit.

Atter his death the whole of Mr. Haigh's ringing books and papers were placed by the family in the care of the Rector of Orusall, aud these form the nucleus of the libary. Ile brass tatiet bears the in-seription:-

## BARKBY BELLS RESTORED.

## FALLACY OF 'CHEAP.JAOK " WORK FMPHASISED.

Those who visited Loughborotigh Bell Foundry ot the oecasion of the recent Ladies Guild meeting had the unusual opportunity of bécing two rings of five hells standing side by side-one for Baruby, the other for Barkhy. The latder wore being retuned and relung after the short poriod of six years sinicu a prepious relanging on the latest pattern roller benrings' by a local firm of engincers.
Burlby is asmall willage sona (wo miles from Syston, Leicestershire (reently made fanous for turkeys as well as plumg!), and the Parish Church pwsessicl hirls froni ata early date. The prescnt 3rd detes from 1570, ihe 5 i 1 l is dated 1608 , 2ndi 1634, treble 1631, rocast 1854, aml the fill 1803 . After the atort-mentioned sehanging' Mr. Ernest Morris, of Leicester, took a band to the chured for a peal to add yet another tower to his Leicestershire 'collechion.' He succeeded in riugiug 5,040 Doubles on April 9tla, 1927, and witt the following note to the recort: "A stupeudous lask. The "go" was druatful, sud it was only the cletermimation and pluch of the ringers that made the peal possible. Much time was spent in splicing ropes, etc, , nud $Y$ was log exhansted at conclusion of peal to verify inscriptions.'
Subsequent peal ettempts by ofher visiting bands failed through bad 'go.' Eventually one of the bearings broke down, and thus in a short time the bells had to be overlauler by a competent firm. Messrs. J. Taylor and Co. were entrusted with the work, and the bells were dismantied and taken to Loughborough for luning and vehanging on ball benrings.
They were rendedicaled by Dr. Cyril Pardeley, Lotd Bishop of Leicester, on Sunday evening, December 18th. Prior to the service the local compary rang some 'rounds and call changes, and after the service visitors from liillesdon, Thrnssington, Syston and Leicester rang Stedman, Girandsire and Canterbury Doubles. The tenor weighs 13 owt. 2 qr. 27 hb . in E, and Barkby bells can now be pealed with ense.

## SUNDAY BELLS

## To the Editor.

Denr Sir, The stipulation of the Crown Lands Commissioners in a mew residential area sems to have diawn attention once thare to the question of bell noises. Propter hoc, there appents in Puncin an article entitlecl, "The Bells; ar Sundry Sounds, wherein Mr. A. P. Herbert directs his pen against what he calls the bell worde. Mr. Herbert's entartaining bantel cloulnes, ns usual, a serious purpose and his protest is, up to a poind, rensonable.
He puts forward the old argunent against the clagging of single bells enrly in the morning, nual sof far an can gather this is his chinf complaint. No one will deny that the chiming of a siugle bell for an inordinately long period is pecaliarly irrilating; bor can one deny that the sinultaneons ringing of two adjacent peals of bells in different keys is mything but offensive to the eat:

Where 3 Ir. Ferhert is wrong, I think, is in assuming that ringers as a body approve of such praclices. He satys: "They (the bell world) have never distinguished hetween the various calegories of bells, of which a few were mentioned ahove. They assume that all the noises they make on Sunday are admirable and must be suffered by the people withoat a wurd of photest. Any kint of bell, however awful, may le rung at suy hour on Stadny, "onwover carly." Lafer la says: "Bul any other kind of Sumlay soumd is analliema in the bell world. The laurater of childien on the muncipnl swings; ihe somd of an organ, played competently in a cinema; the languge of Shakespeare, the muste of lise world; the click of howls aud enlf halls; the whispers of lovors, the music of hands in the marks; the friendly clink of flasses at the insis.. . The bell world-the real bell wark-have hanped then all togelher as had sounds, as they have lumper atl their bolls together as good sounds.
