## THE MINOR CONTROVERSY

## BY SYEPHLUN H. WOOD

Since my last article appeared in 'Jhe Ringing World ' 3 have taken every opportumity, both by correspondence and personal discusgion witl rimers in many paris of the country, of finding out as much as possible of the genchal lecling of the Exercise on this manh debated question.

While what fullows can claina to be no mote flath my own estimation of the gencral feeling of the majovity of the Exereise, it may, 1 think, he of some use to sive it at this shate; its accuracy for otherwise) can, of cotrsc, naly be tested by the vates of the assaciation representatives at the Cential Council's meeting at whitsun. Of one thing, however, there fis doubt whatever, and that is that the vast majority of those who have the intereats of ringing (aud six-bell ringing in particular) al heart, are earnestly desirous that the Contral Countil shall at long last reach a dolinito and pratical agreement on Ilsis question when it Eicets in hondon in func

In trying to arrive at an fdea of how the Exereise fects ou the whole questions of what shall constitute a peal of Minor (and Doubles) 1 have divided the issue up into three main headings:-
(1) General principle of a peal of Minot.
(2) The Bankes James arrangenient.
(3) Other compositions which do not conform ta the old defnition.

With regard to (1), there is monger any doubt in my mind that the vast majority are of the opinion that a peal of 5,040 Minor should in general consist of seven separate 'extents,' ${ }^{\prime} 1 m \mathrm{mg}$ consecutively and without interval. In ease there is anyone who is skill not clear as to the acthal meaning of an "extent," it means the full number of changes possible on a number of hells (in the case of Minor 720) linked together to form a true and complete round blook; it may be assumed theoretically tu start from any of its 720 rows (although the conventional 'rounds' is afways used for practicat ringing), but the imporlant point is that it must come baek at the end to the place it slarted from.
I lave said 'in general' purposely. I mean hy this that having foxed the goneral prinuple it shouid still the possible for the Council to make special arrangements fur recognising compositions which do not conform to it, if they consider that the circumstances justify it, hut fhat such compositions must be treated and recognised as exceptions to the general principle.
Now I have expmessed the opinion that the ' wast majotity ${ }^{3}$ incline o this yicw, and it follows that those who do nov are the a small minority. Bul it must he clearly recognised-and I bayself am lla first to do so-that this small gromp contains some of the best hoains of the Exercise, men who have done and are deing an enomous amount of viluable work on the theretieal side of ringing, and whose opinions must necessarily carry considerable weight. It would be no less than sheer insolence on the part uf myself or anyone else to ignore the opinions of sach men as Messrs. J. A. Trollope, E. S. Towell, E. M. Atkins, C. T. Coles amm E. C. S. Turner, just becouse oue does not lappen to agree with them on this point. Rather let us make a sincere atempt to maderstant their point of view aud to give somo sound reasons for clisagreeing with i

As far as I can gather these gentlemen feel (they will, 1 'm sure, forgive me if I am wrong, but they have as yet sairl very little about it, that peals of Minor should be as nearly as possible on the samat part composition which contains eacli of the 720 possible changes seven times should he accepted as a peal of Binor. They say that you can spliee together several true round blocks of a Major method -or ever several courses of different methods-into a single conposition of more than 5,000 clanges and call it a peal of Major, therefore why not splice together several round blocks of Minor in the same way and calt it a peal of Minor? My answer to that is simply this: you cennot. put peals of Minor and Major on a common basis, becanse they are fundamentally diferent thints. In dealing with a "peal' on eight or more bells fout are denling with a selection of 5,000 or more of the much larger number of possible clanges. On sevon bells there are just 5,040 possible changes, and this number rand not * 5,000 or more') has always been accepted as the criterion of a peal of Triples. But on six bells there are not 5,000 different changes, there are only 720. We say, therefore, join up your courses nud your faund blocks just as you would on any other number of hells, splice away to youl heart's content and get in as many methods as you like, until you've got your 720. But when you have got there you have reached tho axtent of the possible changes and you cannot get any further-not, mark you, beause of any man-made or arbitrery rule, but because in the fundamental nature of things you have come to the end, and no power on earth can get you any farther. Therefore, if you want to ring 5,040 of Minor you must ring each change seven times, aud the most logical way of doing it is fo ring seven separate extents. This is the view of the majority, and if those wha disagree with it can show how any possible gain can be achieved by mixing up the extents jnto a one-part connposition I do most enrnestly beg of them to put their ense before the Fxercise, lhrough the medium of this paper, at the earliest opportunity, so that those who have to vole on the issue at the Central Council meeting may have plenty of time to consider both sides of the question.
We will now leave the geueral principle and discuss compositions which do not consist of scven separale exteris of Misor for 42 of

Everyone, I think, now recognisos this as a masterpieco of eormposikion, but that im itself is urot sufficient to justify its belus atecopted as a peal. The question is, does the Excreise as a whole feol that the need for it and the desire of ringers to go on ringing it justify its being uffemily recognised in future as a peal performtuce? 「litere is slill a goud denl of mixed feeling on lhis pritur especially umongst the six-bell ringers themgelves, but I think that ot Lhe whole the majorify arc in favour of accepting it; but if so it must be accepted definitcly as un exceptional cuse, justified by the ex. ceptional cinumstances. It mint bo bome in mind that in spite of its heing at the mament rather under a cloud it is still being rung fairly regularly, and this must be taken as an indication hat there is in same quarterg a strang desire to ring it in preference to what we may call "straglit, peals of Cambridge Minar. It js also worth
while asking anscives why and how this peal ever came fo loe compowed. I lhink the answer probably is that it was composed simply ann salely becanse it was felt then that there was a definite need for something more than could be prodaced for Carabridge Minor by the orlinary watis, If we leel that that need still cxists, let us coutinue to ring it, but let us inst ask the Central Council to recognis ts performatace as an official peal.

] an convincerl that the general feeling of the Exerciso is that the onlyt exception which slould be made to the general principle of consecutive extents at tho present Lime is the Baukes James arrangemont for melhuds like Cambidqe Manor.
J bave given notice, merefore, that it is ny intention to lay the following proposals before the maxt meeting of the Central Conmeil:-
(i.) That peals of Minor shall in general cotsist of seren or nore scparale extents, yung consecutively and wilhout interval.
(ii.) That compositions arranged on what is krown as the Bankes James' principle, notwithstanding that they do not conform to the above defnitiou, slagll be recogrused as peals.
N.B.-'This armagoment tomsists of a mumber of successive hlocks of 780 buc rows, hot necossarily found blowks thenselyes but which, when joined fogether conseculively, form a round block, starting from and ending with ronats. Tt is recommended that stach compositions
slould ouly be userl when there is consifered to be some delinite gain from the point of view of variety or minsic.)
I shotuld like, before 1 conclude this article, just to touch on one ar two ofler points in conncetion with this Minor controversy. From what I hare read from time to time in *The Rimging Wortd ${ }^{+}$it appears that there is an idea in some quarters that ringers whe than dy their ringing on the higher mumbers are apt to look upon Minor ringing as something slightly inferior: and to belittle the performances of the six-bell riagers. If this wero indeed so, the six-bell men would hate evely cause to feel a wery hatural resobment, but from my experience of eight and tea-hell ringers there is no foumbation at all for such ay idea. Speaking for myself, $\bar{f}$ mast canfess that, ulthoufth I have rutig peals in 8,10 and It hells. I have yet to score my first,
 eight or ten bells. Jhere ean be no comparison, for instatice, between a peal of Minor in seven nombots and one of Bob Major or Kent Royal as far as the brainwork is coneorned, aud I innethe that spliced peal of Surprise Miner in a large number of methods involves a great deal more mental exercige \{lan one of Surprise Royal in ouly one, both, for the conductor and the oflace ringers. Plysieally, tow, it must be remembered that, athough tenors of rings of cight and ten are in general hearier than thaso of six, this is by no mantanwaps the case, and it is obviously hardet work to ring a temar to Minor than to twrn in the same bell to Major or Royal. There is, nd counse, less peal rimging done on six bells than on eight, but it must be borne in mifn that aur most inportant ringing is done on Sundiys, and on Sundavs there is mote five and six-bell ringing than amything else. It is the duty of evmy one of us to mako ithe Suuday service ringing as parfect as passible, atad this is just as improtant on six bells as on 12. The work of the six-bell yingers is therefore from every point of view as worliny and imporlane as any ollace brancl of ringung, and l can assure them that their 10 and 12 -bell friends are the first to recognise it

 and formost six-bell yingers should refrain from expressing thei wiews on a subject which does not concern them, and let the Minor men settle their own problems. This is a terribly short-siglited and dangerous idea, because anything that concerns Minor ringing connems the Exercise as a whole ant everyone has an equal right to (xpross his opinion ahout it. Consider for a mometit the ense of the late Mr. W". H. Thompson, who did such bjilliant work on the possihilities of composition in Triples methods. I de not know whether he eventualy learnt to hande a bell himstif, but I belleve I am right ith saying that lim had hardly ever been inside a belfry whon he produced his now famous proofs of flue impossibility of obtaining exients of Grandsire mid Stedman Triples withont the use of Bingles. This was an exceptional case, of coursc, but it emplasises ny point that rac's andhority to speak on a question such as this must be judged an one's knowledge of the thearelical as well as the practical side of canmanology, fand las nothing whatever to do wilh one's prowess in that helfry or on any particular number of bells.And, finally, a few words as to the mosiion of the Ceniral Council in this matter. We talk rather glibly ahout the rules of the Central Conncil, buts they are not really rules in the ordinary sense. The Council camot says, 'You are mot to ring such and such a method; if vou tho you will be brought up before a magistrate and fined or lonked up. IIs nosition is raflier that of a guide and adviser. Its jub is more to encournge anylhing which it considets is in the interests of the advance of the art, and to discourage anything that is not ifs "rales ${ }^{\text {are }}$ therefore more in the unture of recommendations as to what shall be rung. Of course there is absolntely mbling ta prevent six on eight men going into a tower and diuging anthing they like, for their own entertamment and amusement, but I do wot see why, if it is something which the Central Counell lans decider it will not ate rept, as a peal, the band should still expeet its-parformance to ho included in the ariciul list of peals ${ }^{1}$ rung.

## THE LATE MR. THOMAS SALTER.

MEMORTAL 'TABLET' UNVLEIED AT KITMJERMINSTLIR.
A Fernarkable tribute was parid on Saturday, April $29 \mathrm{ch}_{\mathrm{s}}$, to the fate 3f: J. 'ri. Salter, of Kidderminster, when members of the Worcestershive and Districts Associntion met at St. Mary"s Church to wiluess the unveiting of a memorial lablet, the gift of St. Mary's Society:

The late Mr. Salter, who was a prominent ligure in carmpanology in the collity, had spent 46 years as a hellringer at the Parish Chuted. Fe leth! the anique rocort of having rang a century of peals in one tower, a feai whiel no ofler riuger in Worcestemshine hat gecomplisined.
He lemmi he art of bellringing of Wolverley in 1881, and in 1886 he joined the Kidderminster company. At We shmo timo lo becanc a momher of the Worcostershire Association, and Je served on the conmittee from 1897 until tho timo of his dembla. For gix years ho was Ringing Muster, and for 25 yeats lo was the association's representalive on the Council.
In 50 years he had rung in 197 lowers in 22 combics in England, Ireland and Wales. He lad taken part in 370 peals in 88 diferent tomers, and 114 of these were at St. Mary's, Kidelminster.
Pl'te gaifering which incladed many olficers of the association nud represontatives from the virious towers in tho county, numbered ahnut 70 , among them being Mr. Keith Salter, son wi tine Jate Mr. Salter. The tablet bonrs the inseripuion:-
'This tablet was erected by the St. Mary's Society of Clange
Ringers to the memory of Jumes Thomas Salter, for 46 years a
ringer at this church. Departed this life May Zud, 1932.
J"he tablet was tureiled hy Canon L. l3. Sladen, who afterwards conducted a service in the whithall climpel.
The Rew. J. F. Finstings, the clerisul sechetary of the association, gave a short adrivess

He took from the epistle for the following day the words: 'leaving us fur example, nad said they were all wed aware how mueh they were helperd by those who, in varions dircetions, tried to set them rus exampla ta inspire thens. These examples were anel with in every departatent of life, ant sach a olte was their hate friend Jom Saltur: He was premminent in the art of belloinging, athed for many yents helped them in the ussocidion to carry bellringing to the wonderfal slamdard of perfection that it had now reacbed. It. was rory gratifying ithat that hand of ringens had erected a tabiet to the memory of onc who for 46 years-prachically the whalo of a man's working life-had rung in that old Purisit Cluercis. a man of kren intelligence, wilth unasua] powers for teaching the art of belloinging, he lad ledt them and example worthy to follow

MR. RICHAIRD GROVE:S TRIBUTE
Afler the service Caman Slaten ontertained the belluingers to tea, and hefore the company rose Mr. R. F. Growe saicl a lew words at special request, becanso lue could claim to have had the longest knowlodge of the fate Mr. Salter.
Mr. Grove mentioned that after the bells were rehung in 1883 the ringers at the larish Cturch were assisled by ollets who came from Chadesley Corbett and Hromsgrove, and il was about this lime that the late ML. Salter began his commetion with St. Mary's band of hellyingers. Until 1883 there semmed to have been a lapse, for the last occasion on record of any change riaging before then was in 1765, as stated on a tablet in the ringing roons. Although a statt was made again in 1883 the fhrst really serious attempt at change ringing after the lapse was on October 10hn, 1888.
Hr. Giove said that it was belween 1870 ancl 1880 that he first began ringing, but la ceased active interest in it in 1901, when he took up rife shootiog and cricket. Since that date he lad thot rumg in more flan five peals, bui he did lay cham to lane baken some part, with tho resk of the SHt. Mary's hand, lu making bolhinging Inistory with the Worenterslite Associatinn.

Ju conclusion, Mr. Grove paid a fince tribute to the late Mr. Salter, to whons he said they shonlti give crentif For a good deal of the work which lad been done to improve the standarid of ringing. He was a man of merit, and his presence gave ringets extraordinary cogfidence. Cousequently he was a great leader
