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## BELLS AND THE PUBLIC.

The recent case in which an action was brought by a parishioner against the Vicar of St. Alban's, Golders Green, for an injunction to restrain him and anyone acting under him from annoying the plaintiff and his family by the toiling or ringing of the belle, is not only of great interest, but importance to church authorities and ringers, despite the fact that a settlement, by agreement, was arrived at before the defendant's case was heard, and the Court was not called upon to decide the issuc. The bells at St. Alban's Church are not hung for ringing, and the complaint was against the chiming of the bells for prolonged periods and early in the morning and late in the evening. The settlement arrived at limits future chiming to a quarter of an hour before the usual morning and evening service, and a single bell for five minutes before early service.

The publicity which was given to this case may encourage others who dislike the ringing of church bells to take similar action, in the hope of restricting the time of the ringing of which they are within earshot, and the prospect is not a very reassuring one to ringers, because one or two objectors in a parish might very easily succeed in effectually closing a tower to change ringing if only by 'agreement ' with the authorities. In the Central Council's booklet on 'The Law affecting Church Bells' it is pointed out that 'bells may be a private nuisance fiable to be restrained by injunction at the instance of any person specially aggrieved,' but, 'so long as bells are rung in moderation-even for peal ringingit is unlikely that the Courts will interfere with such an old established custom.' We are not sure that this comforting opinion would stand the test of a legal action, although obviously it must make a difference whether the objector settles himself within the range of the ' nuisance ' or the ' nuisance' is brought to the objector.
A noticeable thing in most cases of objection to church bells is that those who complain seldom have any interest in the church or even in the observance of Sunday except as a holiday. There will, therefore, generally be a much stronger claim to resist the efforts of those who would restrain ringing if the bells are regularly rung for their primary purposes- the church services - and if other ringing is done in moderation, and under conditions which will reduce the possibility of annoyance to a minimum. It must be admitted that many rings of bells are far more noisy outside the tower than they need be. Let the sound go out in full volume, by all means, for the service ringing and on public occasions; but there is no reason why the people living round about the church should be given the full benefit (?) of the bells when the (Continued on page ${ }^{482 .)}$

ringers are practising or ringing a peal for their own annsement. In these days there are simple and inexpensive means of considerably moderating the noise from the bells in the neighbourliood of the tower and ringers, in their own interests should see that steps are taken to that end, particularly in crowded towns. It is wiser to safeguard the ringing by taking reasonable precautions, thatn to risk the closing of a tower-not necessarily by High Court action, but, as sometimes happens, by the 'pressure' put on the incumbent by some inlucistial resident or residents.

## DEATH OF OLD IRTHLINGBOROUGH RINGER,

## MEMBER OF A FAMOUS BAND.

We regret to record the death, which took place on fuly 18th, of Mr. Alpheus Perkins, of lrthlingborough, Northants, the oldest member of the band that achieved fame many ycars ago for their Surprise ringing. Mr: Perkins, who was 71 ycars of age, had been connected with St. Peter's belfry for 40 years, having joined the band which was formed after the restoration of the tower in 1893 . He rang his first peal in 1894, and afterwards took part in the first peals of Cambridge and Superlative Surprise Major in the county. His last peal was one rung muftied on the death of Queen Alexandra in 1926. One of his peals was a 9,312 of Superlative Surprise
He was not a great pent ringer, as poin ringing is counted in these days. Ro bad taken part in all in about 50 . But while always willing to let others iake his place in poal attempis, he was a regular Sunday service ringer up to the beginning of lis long illness, and, even sines a serious operation some fiftecn months ago, the was frequently to be Jound in the belify on Sundays. He was always keen on laving good striking. His follow-ringer's have lost a loyal and devoled colleague, and liis place will be dificult to fill. To the widow and family, the greatest sympathy has been extended in their irreparabile loss.

Jolin Tayler and Cos the proud distinction of having amongel their employes a band capahte of ringing a peal on eight bells. In addition to those who rang in the peal referred to, there are Mr. E. Denison Taylor, head of the firm, and Mr. J. Oldham, the manager, who often take a rope when visitors to the foundry wish to see an exhibition of clange ringing on the bells in the foundry campanile.
Messrs. Taylor and Co. hare usually had a muster of men who understood the practical side of riuging in addition to bel! banging, for as far beck as 1888 the late Mr. J. W. Taylor, sen., with kis two sons, the late Mr. J. W. Traylor, jun, and Mr. E. Deaisan Taylor, iogether with seven of their employes, rang ot Loughborough larish Church a peal of Stedman Caters.
More frequent attempts for peals would be made by employes of Lte Loughborough Foundry were it not for the fact that some of them are ravely at home at the same time.

## SQUIRE PROCTOR AND DUFFIELD.

G\#ILDREN "TEACE ' THEIR FATHER.
As a complement to the rimging history of Beanington and its assaciation with the revered name of Squire Leonard Proctor, it may be of some little interest to those of his brother ringers in the midi Victarian period to give some extracts from an amusing letter re ceived from hime by Dr. Symons, of Penzance, in July, 1885:-
4 had a fortoight sinee a great ringing treat in wisiting Duffeld. near Derby. Mr. Percival Heywood is a capital ringer, his fanily all ring and the peal of eiglat are very ringable near his house. Stirted for a peal of K.T.B., rang well for 75 minntes, when the tenor man caught his foot with the rops as it lifted from the tenor box, this kinck knocked hino clean off tho borl and also not being satisfied with his own fall, but lie monst meods cannon ngainst the seventh man and Knock him over too, so they both came gprawling into the middlo of the ringing foor and "Mr. Gencral Stand" was immediatejy called into requisition.

Wonderful to eee lithe danglaters of Mr. Hewwood ringing two hnndbells in hand well-"Suparlativo Surprise" telling their father whare to go to-three daughters and two sons, fll ring, seven and cight years old! When hunting "quick" they say, "Father, we are going ly the "express train," yon by tho stopping trajn; therefore, dodag and stop at intermediate places ancl stations,
'Father has a private rail in his trounds, stationg, atc., 1,000 yards long, tunnels, etc., and drives bis own engine. A wonderful clower man ind fine place.'

## A CELEBRATED SOHAM FAMILY.

NOTABLE PERFORMANCES RECALLED.
A mecting of the Central Division of the Ely Diocusan Asseciation at Solana, Cambs, on Salurday, recalls the notable porformanees at this eharelt in the distant past, when a society calling themselves the Solarn Youthe flourishod for many years.

Prior to the yent 1788 the tower contained a ring of six bells. Then Thomins Obborn, of Downham, Norfolk, cast a peal of eight to replace the former ring, aud it was on this octave that the Soham Youtlas began their activities. They soon gained proficiency, and at unmber of peal haards in the tower record some of their more notabie achievements, the first appears to have been a peal of 5,120

In the following year the bells were increased to ten, the two old tricbles being recast and two more bells added by Jolin Briant, of Hertford. Robert Tebbit was at that time one of the claurchwardens, und his name appears on the bells.

Another tablet recards a peal rung on Novenber 16th, 1820, 'in honour of the Queen's scquiltal -bulien parly feeling ram high over the King"s treatment of Queen Carolinc. A year later came a peal of New Treble Boty Royal (what we now know as Kent), and the last of the tablets records a peal of Grandsire Titium Caiers, rung in 1830, in which, again, the name of Tebbit occurs- William, who was the conductor, John, Robert and Thomas, jun. And with that peal the ringing history that is left to us of the Tebbits and the Soham Youthis comes to an end.


SOHAM CHURCH.

Oxford Treble Bob Major rung in 1790. Arnong the ringers were Thonas, Robert and Fiwnod Thebbit, whe played a prominent part in the ringing in this tower for many yenrs thereafter, and were sueceded by iheir sons.

In 1795 they rang a peal of Norwich Court, in which the mame of Thomans Tobbit, jum, appears, and in 1800 came a peal of Imperial the Third. Jake, Goldshrow, Joseph Finch, Rabert Silver, Thomas Brown fud Tlsomas Thabot are olher names which appear in the records, and some of then were still actively engaged in peal ringing in 1820.
The mosi notable performance was in 1809, when the Tebbit family, of 'thtee luothers and their sons, rang a peal of Oxford Theble Fob Major: Thomas T'eblit 1 ; Robert Tebbit, son of Robert, 2; Benjamin Tebbite, 15 years of age, $\mathbf{3}_{1}$, Tohn Tebbit, son of Thomas, 4; Robert Tehait 5; Edward Tebbit 6; Thomas Teblit, son of Thomas, 7; Willian Tebbit, son of Thomes, 8.

SMALL ATTENDANCE AT SUMMTR FESTITAL

## A NOTABILE CHURCH.

but orondalis bells neted restoration
Theiked away in the falds of the low hills, through whiels the roat rom Farnam to Winclaster mus, but a mile or two oft the main niglaway, is the village of Crondant. It is a village not muels known to fame, hut it can ciamin priweless possession in its Norman clarelu -one of the lest and most complete examples in the South of Cugland. Its chancel, at any rate, was built by a muster land, for the roses in the vanlied ceiling bear the marks of one of the buthers of Canterbury Cathedral, and, so it said, no other chnerch in the sountry can boast of it. Only in Canterbury and Crondall can you find the marks which distinguisla this particular master trafteman. The clurch, trailt almost as it stands at present, was erceted about 1150 , on the site of an earlior building, probably of Saxon origin. The oirvular Saxon lont is still in use, and there seem to the traces of Sison workmanship in the remans of an ancient fower, which at one Lime was entered by a doorway from the chaticel.
Nearly three handred years ngo a mex tower of imposing proporlinns but of complete incongruity with the aucicnt charch wats built in brich and to the eastward of the old tow cr, from which it is separated by a space of some twelve or fifteen feel. The base of the tower is used as $\pi$ vestry; to gain access to the upper floors the stone stairway in the old tower (where pigeons nest) is still usect, and the ringing room and the floor above are connected wills it by open galleries. Thus, to reach the bells troin the tinging roum, one lins to cross a galiery, mount the stairs in the old tower, and recross another gallery. Thie last stage of tho journcy is up a fairly long and precipitous ladder.
There nre six hells in the tower hung in a frame, bearing the date 1642, which has long since passed the stage of usofultreas. It is matesive but deerepit, and, in bingers' parlance, 'walks ronnd the towor' when the bells are rung. The tenor moves in three directions, in addition to rovolving, when it is pulled off. The looso franie goos hackward and forward; the hell goes trom side to side throngh illfitting bearings, end up and down owing to loose gudgeon plates, and it also "wobbles ' on the slock, coupled with all of whicla the bells are badly out of tune! The serious need for the attention of a competent beil hanger is obviously indicated.
Of the bells themselves three were by Hemy Kuight, 1616 and 1619, two by Robert Welts, of Aldhourue, 1788 , and oue a pie-Reformation bell beating a Latin inscription, which, broadly interpreted, reads, Chirning I will call to mraver; I ring when folk do wed and toll in lanentation for the dead.' Tho tenor was recast ahout 50 years

It was here on Snturday that the Farnlam District of the Guildford Diocesan Guile held a mecting, which was attended by about 25 ringerts, but the actual ringing was liniled by the physical ensergy necessary to keop the tenor going. Six scures of Grandsire, short touches of Bob Minor and cotrses of Treble Bob and Canbridge werc all that were rutig, longer leng hat being worth the effort required.
The Rector, who has not long been in the parish after many years in the mission field, conducted the Guifl's service and gave an impromptas address. Fe also presided at the subsequent tea and business moeting, at which he was elected an lown amember, and the gencral hon. secrefary of tho Guild (My. J. S. Goldsmitil), in proposing a vote of thanks to him, took the opportunity of pointing out the necessity of calling in an expert to report on the condition of the bells.

A gloon was cast over the gathering by the news of the sudden deatla of Mrs. W. Denyer, of Adershot. Her husband, Mr. W. Denycr, is the 'father' of the Aldershot tower, where be is constantly traiming literally young blood, ancl has a band of over twenty ringers whose degrees of advancement vary from rounds to the Surprise stage. Her eldest son is Mr. C. W. Deuyer, the enthusiastic and capable hon. secretary of the Farniam District, and a daughter and two other sons-one aged only nituc-are ringers at Aldershot church. Mrs. Denyer, who was 54 years of age, lad a seizure on Thursday morning, and passed awry in the nfternoon. Despite lis bereavennent Mr. C. W. Denyer very courngeously carried out his duties in comnection with the meeting, at which the hom. gencral sectetary expressed the Guild's regret at the death of Mrs. Denyer and their sympathy with Mr. William Denver and lis family.
The funeral had taken place on Saturday morning, when the choir loys and organist altended, and two of Mrs. Denyer's favourite hymns, 'Jesus lives 'and 'O hlest Redeemer,' nud Psalnı 23, were sung. As the cortego lefi the chureh for the cemetery the bells were rume half-nuffled, and as the commitinl was being said their distant notes were wafted on the breaze to flue mourners and formed a filting requiem to one inta whose life bells had so largely entered, allhough she lierself land not been a vinger.

Leating Burg, the main rond was forsakeu, and tle sigmposis to Lavenham cagerly followed. The past prosperily of East dnglia is slown in a remarkable manuer by comperison of church accommodation and the present population. A vory siriking example is Laventom, surely one of the linest Perpendicular cburches in the country. This cburch was built is the fiftecuth century, mainly through the generosity of a family of clothiers living at Lavcuban. 15 is 200 ft . long and 60 ft . wide, with a lower, the finest in Suftolk, 141 ft . high. The population of Lavenlam to-day is 1,620 ! The beflo are indleed worthy of the tower, with a lenor of 23 cwt , cast in 1625 by Miles Graye. The opinion of the visitors, however, was divided as to whether 'its equal cannot be found in England,' as slated on a peal board in the tower! After ringing and enjoying the extensivo views from the top of the tower (what a climb!), a reluctaut departure was made
Sudbury, the nexi stop, possesses three fine churches, all being built or robailt in the fourtenth and fifteenth centuries. St. Gregory's, where the bells were rung, occupies a site of an old wooden Saxon building, which it is thought existe] up to the time of the Conqueror.
