Service ringing should be the best-that is an aphorism of which ringers are constantly reminded, but it bears repetition -and if it be only rounds, good rounds for service ringing is to be preferced to bad changes. But whatever the rirging, it cannot be carried out on any prearranged plan unless all the ringers can be depended upon to be punctually in their places. This is the first step towards the removal of 'haphazard' service ringing.

## RINGING IN AUSTRALIA.

## CONDITIONS IN SYDNEY

## The First Peal Reaalled.

Hitherto in the story of the tour in Australia there has been opportunity to say little about the conditions of ringing in the Commonwealth. So crowded were the days for the English visitors that it was only possible to keep pace with the actaal doings of the party, but readers of "The Ringing World ' will probably be interested to learn sonething of the conditions existing in Australia when the visitors arrived.

In only one place it the whole of the Commonwealth was change ringing practised wilis any regularity, and thet was at Melbourne, wheh has been the one real centre of activity in the art in Australian riggitig hislory. Bells are huag in maly towers and in quite namber aro regularly rung, in come cases in spite of their heavy going; but outsido Melhourae little or mo change ringing has been dowe by local ringers. This bas not, of course, been thelr fault. There has been in tho majority of cases no nitc capable of teaching.
Outside Melbounce, Sydney is the only place where any serious altempt has been made to keep a change ringing band, but even there it had feded out before the srrival of the English visitors. And yet Sydaey offers the groatest prossiblities of all.
Within a comparatively short radius there are lialf a clozen towers containing peals of bells. At tho moment they are not all ringable, but they could be put into ringing order. At St. Mary's Roman Catholic Catliedral and at St. Mark's Darling Point, are rings of eight poth going well and ench manned by eutlusiastic baads of young men, whic showed themselves eager to learn. St. Jude's Ghuch, Randwick, also has a keen compras of youlig men, fut hare they are liandicapped by having 'bells' Gadly in need of attention. Indiced, so bady do thcy waut atterltion that they should be sold aither as garden oruaments or for old metal. Ther are a set of ciglat stect bells, of oxecrable tone, and in any case reguire rehanging. Mo be quite honest, they are not worth spending money on, but the enthusiastic joung band anxious to serve the charch in the belfry deserve a peal of bells worthy of the very fine luilding, and wortisy, too, of their own eflorts.
At Darling Point and Randmick these young men have been doing regular service liuging, but, lacking help, had nof been able to make any attenat with change ringing. At St Mary's Basilica, the
Roman Catholic Cathedral, there has been the nueteus of a clianga ringing band, which for some years lad Mr. R. H. Macdonald at ids head. Mr. Macionald is an old and valued servant at the Gathedral but his advancing years have led him to hans over the leadership to his son, Mr. E. A. Macdonald. Just two or three who can ring Grandsire Triples remain in the band, which has recently received a largo influx of young hoot, and round this company considerable hopes for a revisal of change ringitig in Sydney centres, supplemented by the band at Darling Point.

At St. Plijip's, Sydney, where tho first peal in Australia was 7 me g In the ycar 1890 on the accasion of a visit of a party from Melbournc, tho boils have remained unrung for a considerable time. At present. the tower is considered unsafe: but there is the prospect of carly steps being taken to have the fabric restored, and then, it is hopent, the bells will once more bo put into proper order and a new band of ringers formed.

St. Benedict;'s Roman Cathalic Clurch possesses a ring of six bells, hut in their present condition they aro diflienlt. to ring. In the not distand, futare, however, there may be considernble improvement
effected. The cluurch, as it stands at present, is scheduled for demolition for road improvement. It will be re-erected on the remains of the site, and it is hoped the reconstructed fower will be sulficiently large to instal a ring of eight. There ought then to be no difficulty in raising a company of ringors, for youth seems very active in the Australian churcies, and by that time change ringing, it may be hoped, will be established in some of the other Sydney churches, and instrueters in the art will be available for St. Benediet's.
Parramatta, within easy reach of Sydney, being only about 14 miles away, las had a band of ringers who in the past bave done great things for the church, particularly. in raising money, but whose interest in the tower, it was gathered, has waned somewhat. They have a very nice peal of six, going well, and a revival of ringing interest is looked for as a result of the English tourists' wisit. It was at this church that the band from Darling Point, under Mr. Gfarles Porter, having rung a peal of Grandsire Minor at their own church in 1903 , repeated their performance.

It will be seen that, given bells in good ringing order, Sydney las a fine opportunity of establishing a community of ringers that might go on and do great things for ringing in the Commonwealtl. The interest stiryed up by the visitors from England brought from their sechision three or four ringers who had come from the homeland but had done nothing in the ert sime thent arrival. Wikh thair help it onglat got to be long before change ringing gets a new footing in Sydney, and, with goodwill and co-operation between the varions towers, with interchange of visits and united practices, much might bo done. Indeed, we look forward in the not distant future to learing of the formation of a New South Wales Association, binding theso warious socicties together in a united whole and with a common purpose on the lines of our English county and diocesan organisatiuns. At various times in the past, ringers from Melboume lave visited Sydney, and it was an one of these visils that the first 720 changes were rung on the bells of St. Mark's, Darting Point. It is recorded as follows: Victorian Society, Mclbonme. At Sydney, N.S.W., on Friday, $28 t h$ December, 1888 , the first 720 changes were rung on the bells of St. Mark's, Darling Point, in the Grandsire Minor method, by sir members of the above sociely. Time, 30 minutas: J. Clark 1 , W. Shenton 2, J. M. Guest 3, W. Atkinson 4, J. Is, Iurtay 5, T. B Fall tenor. Conducted by J. L. Murray
But the greatest performance in Sydney, was tha ringing of the first peal in Australiz on a subsequent visit of Melbourne men. It is thus recorded on a marble tablet given by the Melbourae rinmers and arected in St. Philip's Church, where the peal was ring

## TIRST PEAL IN AUSTRALTA

On April 9tls, 1890, seven members of the Viotoria Society of Change Ringers, Melbourne, with the ascisfance of Mtessrs. T. H. Joyner and J. Horton, of Sydncy, rang on the bells of this clurch, in 3 hours and 15 minutes, a true and complete peal of Grandsire Triples, 5,040 changes, being Holt's Ten-Part: William Strenton treble, John Becchey 2, Jabez Horton, Royal Gumherland Youtlis, 3, James $\mathrm{I}_{1}$ Minray 4, William Atkinsom, College Fouths, 5, Thomas B. Hah, College Fouths, 6, Harry Adams, St. Mary's Society, Kiderminster, 7 Thomas H. Joyper and Ernest O. E. Collins tenor. Conducted by J. L. Murray. J. D. Langley. Incumbent

Mr. James Murtay fells an interesting story about this peal, Six of tho Melbourne mea went up to Sydney for a holiday and travelled by sea. They rang at St. Philip's on Sunday, and, on coming out of the church, saw a man standing outside looking all the tower. Harry Adams asked him if he was a ringer, and, to thelit sulprise, he eaid he was. He was Jabez Horton, an old Cumberland Foull from Wngland. His scrvices were at once enlistod, \& peal fixel up aud Mr Murray had the lonour of calling the first peal in Ausiralia
And now, veally 45 years later. Mr. Marway, at the nge of 73 , has taken part in the first twelve-bell peal in the Commonwealth. His entlusiasm during the visit of the English tourists to Melbourne mas as kean as it was in thnse days when they occasionally went on ringing expeditions to Sydney and Jobart. SLXTY YEARS OT PEAL RINGING AT APPLETON.
Sixty years of peal sing ing is a wouderful record. Mr. Gea. Holifield, seln., of Appleton, iang his first peal in that celebrated tower on June $5 b \mathrm{~b}, 1875$, and last seturdey took part in a peal of Giundsire Otems to celebrate this diamond jubilea. Throughout this long period he bas also been a service ringer at the chureh and has flgurcd in all the record lengths rung there, except the last long peal of Gracisire Caters. But he was associated with tlus as the composer of the petal. The pea] last Satarday was also of his composilion.

March the 4th' is Apploton's great day of celobration. Every year since 1818 , when the


MR. G. HOLIFIELD, SEN. bolls were firse opened as a ring of six, this 'movable feast, has been held, and Mr. Hulifeld is a living link with that far off date. Born in 1858, Mr. Holifield knew and talked with villagers who were present at that first foast, and he has a still closer counection with the first Appleton ringers. The first recorded change tinging on the bells was a 720 of Bob Minor rung in 1821 by Joaeph Trowall 1, Edwin Selwood $2_{1}$ Alired Wbito 3, Jamee Newman 4, James Maslin 5, Rielard King 6. It was conducted by Jnmes Newman. In Mr. Holifield's first peal on June 5tht, 1875, were Alfred White and James Newman. dlfred White died in the following year at the age of 73, and James Nowman was 80 when he died in 1880 . It is a wonderful record that these two penerations of Appleton ringers, linked by a peal, should cover 117 years of ringing at ane church.
Incidentally also the wellnnown Appleton family of White, two representatives of which were in the peal last Saturday, have had a continuous connection with the Appleton Socictry through succeeding generations from 1818 to the present day.

On Octoher 16th, 1880, he rang in a pual of 10,272 Kent Treble Thols Major at Debenham, conducted by Wiliam Ireland, of Diss, whe is still with us. On Jure 6til, 1892 , he taok parto in the celebraled 16,608 Oxfond Treble Sob Major at Debenham, conducted by the late James Motts, of Ipswich. David raly the fth to this peal, this, if faet, being his favourite position. The remaining ringers of this long peal now surviving are Robert, H. Brunde, Wilfian G. Crickmer and Frefierick J. Filletit, who rang the tenor. On October 28 th Mr. Collins took part in a septuagenarians' peal of 5 , 184 Oxford Treble Bob Major at Pullam Market, Norfolk, conducted by the late John Souter, of Diss, David beirg the oldest member of that band and then in his 75 th year.
In all he rang over 50 peals and was perfect 112 striking
Ringers in ipswich aud Suffolk liave lost a personal friend and a ringer much esteemed for his sterting qualities.
Mr. Collins celebrated his dianond wedding last year, having been married at Worhingworth in 1874. His wife died during the year. All their six children had predeceased them and are buried in Worlingworth Churelyard.
