THE VALUE OF THE PEALS ANALYSIS

The analysis of peals rung in the year 1933 is published to-day, and once again ringers will admire the painstaking labours of that little committee of the Central Council who week in, week out, carefully record and tabulate the peal ringing activities of the Exercise. It is a monumental task, the size of which is only known to those who do the work, and involves infinite care. This tabulated record of the year's peal ringing is welcomed with interest by the majority of ringers, whether they are themselves peal ringers or not, because it gives a valuable indication of the progress of the art in one of the principle directions in which progress can be measured.

And in this connection our readers may be reminded that one of the best ways of measuring advance is by the number of ringers who ring their first peal or their first in a new method and the number who join the ranks of the conductors. These are important marks of progress, but they lose their value if they are not accurate. In the past some of the returns have suffered through the omission of particulars of this kind, and it is to urge those responsible for peal reports to make them complete in essential details that a resolution is to come before the next meeting of the Council. The details which the Analysis Committee are at so much trouble to extract lose force if they, from any cause, lack accuracy, and while the committee can only compile the statistics recorded, it is up to every conductor to see that the things that matter are duly noted. It may not be worth mentioning that a peal was rung on the birthday of somebody's aunt, because the ringing happened to coincide with that event, or even that the band want to thank somebody for opening the belfry door for them-that sort of the thing can be done with much better grace if it is done at the time and personally-but if the object of the analyses is to be achieved and the tables and the accompanying report are to become not only of present interest, but of historical value, then those details which actually indicate progress not only deserve but require to be placed on record.

From the tables which appear this week, it will be found, as 'The Ringing World' recorded some weeks ago, that there was a further falling off in the number of peals rung, compared with the preceding year. actual number rung in 1934 was 1,784, against a total in 1933 of 1,833. This difference is far less marked than in the comparison of the two previous years, in which 1933 showed a drop of 369 against 1932, and a difference of less than fifty could be accounted for in many ways other than a slackening of interest or endeavour. There are, however, other factors which give food for thought, and

with these we must deal in another article.

TRIBUTE TO THE LATE MASTER. Mamorial to be Provided.

general meeting of the Middlesex County Association and London Diocesan Guild was held in the City on Saturday, May 4th, in the midst of all the Jubilee decorations and excitement, and in a real holiday atmosphere. The attendance, well above 150, constituted a record for the association, and a gratifying feature was the presence of a large number of provincial members and friends, who combined 'business with pleasure'; ringing at various London churches and seeing the sights on one trip to town.

The service was held at St. Botolph's Church, Bishopsgate, and was conducted by the Rev. P. Wilton Valc. The sermon was preached by the Archdeacen of London, who reminded his hearers of the Jubilee, and said that the first thought in all our minds was the appropriateness of such a meeting on such a day as this. 'On the way here,' proceeded the Archdeacen, 'I saw signs and tokens of love and loyalty to the King and Queen. At St. Paul's Cathedral were throngs of people, such enormous numbers that they could hardly move, people visiting the spot where the King and Queen will worship on Monday. This day and time is full of thanksgiving for the blessings bestowed upon us. So let us pray that this may be a great time in the history of our country. We have to thank God for the last 25 years, during which time our King has been a power for the good of all of us.

'We realise,' went on the Archdeacon, 'that you who belong to this association have a proud task, that it falls to your lot to give effect to the nation's joy. You have the privilege of representing the nation's thoughts and expressions of love and loyalty. We do thank God for you and your work, a work that other people cannot do. The message I give you to take away with you this afternoon is this: "The ringing of the bells should be an expression of faith and a tribute of love, our faith in Jesus Christ and our love for Him." MR. PYE'S GREAT WORK FOR THE ASSOCIATION.

Mr. C. T. Coles (joint hon, secretary) referred to the death of their Master, Mr. William Pye, and moved a resolution of sympathy in the following words: We are met together to-day under the shadow of a great loss, the loss by death of our Ringing Master, William Pye. Much has been said during the past few weeks about this remarkable man, but no praise has been given him that has been too ligh. Mr. and has been said during the past few weeks about this remarkable man, but no praise has been given him that has been too high. Mr. Pye joined this association in 1899; he was elected Ringing Master in October, 1910, and thus held office for nearly 25 years. During that period of time he did an immense amount of work, which has had the effect of greatly improving the standard of ringing throughout the county; indeed, one might say throughout the country. To ring with him was not only a privilege and a pleasure, it was an education in itself and many good ringers of the present day over Mr. Pye a with him was not only a privilege and a pleasure, it was an education in itself, and many good ringers of the present day owe Mr. Pye a great debt for the encouragement he gave to them, and to the stimulating influence he imparted. It was impossible to do anything else but put one's best into ringing when Mr. Pye was in the band, and this has done very many ringers a great deal of good. Mr. Pye's peal performances for the association constitute a record that it will be difficult for any ringer to surpass. He rang 1,114 peals, of which he conducted 859. There were many remarkable efforts amongst these I will content myself with mentioning the 15 268 Byistol Surprise he conducted 859. There were many remarkable efforts amongst these: I will content myself with mentioning the 15.264 Bristol Surprise Major rung at Hornchurch in 1912; the 7,392 Cambridge Surprise Maximus at St. Mary-le-Bow, Cheapside, on a 53 ewt. tenor, in 1925, and the series of Spliced Surprise Major peals in all number of methods from three to twelve which he conducted a few years ago at Willesden and elsewhere. There were also the first peals of London Surprise Major ever rung double-handed, and the only peals of Bristol Surprise Major so rung, besides the very remarkable performance of Stedman Cinques on handbells when he called a short-course peal in this method from a pair of non-observation bells—exactly 21 years ago to-day. At the funeral on March 16th the association was represented by several of its officers and members: the Central Council was represented by several of its officers and members; the Central Council was represented by the president (Mr. E. H. Lewis) and the hon. secretary (Mr G. W. Fietcher). Many other ringing societies were represented, and a large number of Mr. Pye's old ringing friends were present. Amongst many floral tributes was a wreath from this association.

Amongst many floral tributes was a wreath from this association.

Mr. Coles went on to mention that he had received many letters of sympathy with the association from the secretaries of other societies, as well as from many well-known members of the Exercise, and he added: 'Our Master has gone on, he has left the association much stronger than he found it, and it will be our duty to carry on the work to the utmost of our ability. A year ago he was with us at our annual meeting, which was the last meeting he attended. I will ask you all to stand for a few moments as a mark of respect to

our late Master, and to show our sympathy with those whom he has left to mourn him.'

The resolution was carried in silence.

POINTS FROM THE COMMITTEE'S REPORT. The usual business of the meeting was then proceeded with. The annual report, which was taken as read and was adopted, recorded that a strong programme of district meetings was arranged during the year. Whilst attendances at some meetings are quite satisfactory, it is felt that the proportion of members who habitually attend them is much too small. Many members never attend, and the committee assured these members that a welcome will be given them if they

assured these members that a welcome will be given them if they will support the next meeting of their district, with every opportunity to ring whatever their abilities may be in this respect.

During the year seven honorary and 57 ringing members were elected, but a considerable number was lost by death, resignations, etc. The total membership stands at 871, a few less than last year.

The peals rung during the year numbered 92, a post-war record. With one exception they were all rung on tower bells, in 30 different towers. There were 25 conductors, an increase of eight on last year; and 168 members took part in the peals. Seven members rang their first peals, and 104 their first peals in a new method, or on a different number of bells.

The retirement of Mr. William Pickworth from active work, the report proceeded, has also caused his retirement from the office of vice-president of the North and East District, in which he has done so much valuable service since 1924. FOR BEGINNERS.

HINTS ON CONDUCTING

Every conductor should aim at being able to call a touch or peal from any bell and not be tied to ringing the observation bell. There are occasions, perhaps, when it is well that he should ring the observaare occasions, perhaps, when it is well that he should ring the observation bell, but as a general rule it is an advantage to ring one of the
'working' bells. For instance, in almost any method, if the conductor is ringing one of these bells, he is eliminating one of the
'risks' of the human element. He knows (or is presumed to know)
where the fixed bells are (that is, the bells which follow an unbroken
course, as the 6th does in the 720 of Bob Minor which we have been
using for our purpose), and if he has one of the movable bells on
his own hands there is one less risk of someone else going wrong. It
has other advantages. If he is among the bob-making bells it is much
casier to see what the rest are doing than if he has to look at them
'from afar,' as it were, and it is also easier to watch the continually
changing coursing orders. changing coursing orders.

It is only a matter of practice to know exactly where your boll will be at the next bob, as long as you keep close contact with the positions all the way along. You may not be able to tell with certainty if you 'wake up' in the middle of a course without any recollection of what has gone by or your relationship with the observation bell. You must concentrate sufficiently to keep track of all your calling

Suppose you start with the 3rd, in Bob Minor, as suggested last week, for a touch. If you are in 3-4 up in one lead (where the 3rd starts), or, which is the same thing, have run 'out' at a bob, you will run out again if a bob is called the next lead. You also run in' at a bob if you have been in 34 down or have run in at a bob in

'm' at a bob if you have been in 3-4 down or have run in at a bob in the previous lead. If you make a bob at one lead you come into 5-6 down at the next, bob or no bob. A bob at the lead after 5-6 up brings the bell to make 4th's.

The 'Wrong, Right and Wrong' of the 720, which has been previously used as an illustration, if the 6th is the observation bell, means a bob at the first lead, and this will ease the 5-fd to run out. means a bob at the first lead, and this will cause the 3rd to run out. Prick out the lead ends on paper, and you will see that this puts the 3rd in coursing order behind the 6th. The next two calling places are thus made easy to know. With the 6th Right, the bell following it will be 'Wrong,' and when in the next lead the 6th is called 'Wrong,' the bell that has followed it must make the bob (or 4th's). There is then one bell coursing between this bell and the 6th. There-There is then one bell coursing between this bell and the 6th. Therefore, when the plain lead course end comes up the 3rd will make second's place.

JOY BELLS FOR THE KING'S JUBILEE.

RINGERS' ACTIVITIES THROUGHOUT THE COUNTRY

It is safe to say that never in history have so many peals been rung for any public celebration as were rung for the Silver Jubilee of their Majesties King George V. and Queen Mary. The records already published or received at the office of 'The Ringing World' number 163, and there may be others to come. In addition ringing took place in thousands of other church towers and some of the events of interest are recorded below.

Reports of Jubilee peals have revealed many interesting facts, not the least being the considerable number of ringers who have scored their first peal, many at the first attempt, on this auspicious occasion. In many places, too, our suggestion that a royal salute of twenty-one 'shots' should be fired, was acted upon.

A peal was rung on the bells of the Curfew Tower, Windsor Castle, be first in this historic building for many years. It was the first

the first in this historic building for many years. It was the first peal of Major on the bells.

At Timsbury, in Somerset, the conductor of a peal of Doubles, Mr. Gilbert M. Hasell, was unable to take part in the ringing, as he is only just recovering from a broken leg.

The peal at Wigston Magna was the first in the tower by an entire Sunday service band, and the peal was worthy of the occasion—it was the first of Buckingham Surprise Major ever rung.

At Woodford, Essex, the commemorative peal, rung on Sunday, May 5th, was the first on the bells since their augmentation to eight. They were made into an occase in 1931.

They were made into an octave in 1931.

Four ringers at Ibstock, Leicestershire, rang their first peal at the first attempt, and put up a splendid performance, too.
Eight out of the ten ringers in the peal of Plain Bob at Dalton-in-Furness rang their first peal of Royal.

A JUBILEE PEAL AT 79.

Mr. John Hollows, of Middleton, Lancs, rang the treble to a peal

of Bob Major. He is in his 80th year.

The peal at Shildon, Durham, was rung as part of the official programme of the town's celebration.

By his Jubilee peal at Kirby-le-Soken, Essex, Mr. E. E. Davey comteted the 'circle' of the tower.



RING AUGMENTED TO TWELVE.

The dedication of the four new bells and the recast fifth by the The dedication of the four new bells and the recast fifth by the Lord Bishop of St. Albans took place, as briefly intimated in our last issue, on Monday, May 6th, immediately after the 8 o'clock celebration of the Holy Communion. Although somewhat early for most people, a goodly number assembled at the dedication service.

At the conclusion of the Celebration, the Bishop, accompanied by his chaplain and the Dean, came down from the high altar and the conclusion of the beauty of the tours of the Celebration.

proceeded to the space under the tower, where Dr. S. J. Madge, who with Mrs. Madge is the donor of the treble bell, handed the rope

who with Mrs. Madge is the donor of the treble bell, handed the rope to the Dean and asked him to accept the bell in loving memory of their son, Ernest Vincent Wilmer Madge.

Mr. Walter Ayre, president of the Hertford County Association, presented the rope of the second bell, and, 'in commemoration of the jubilee of the Hertford County Association of Change Ringers and in memory of our late president, Edward Percy Debenham,' asked the Dean to accept the bell.

Mr. E. R. Mitchell, representing Mr. W. W. Worthington, donor of the third bell, asked the Doan to accept it as a thankoffering. The Mayor of St. Albans presented the rope of the fourth bell with the words: 'Mr. Dean, on behalf of the general public who have subscribed towards the cost, I ask you to accept this bell to complete the peal of twelve in the tower of this ancient and illustrious Church of St. Albans.' of St. Albans.

Similarly Mr. H. Goodenough, conductor of the Cathedral ringers, resented the rope of the recast bell on behalf of the Cathedral Society of Change Ringers and the Abbey congregation, and asked the Dean to accept the bell, 'which has been recast and so made a more worthy instrument for the honour and glory of God.'

The Dean then handed the five ropes to the Bishop, saying: 'As Dean of this Cathedral Church and president of the Cathedral Society of Change Ringers. I want to delicate these hells to the cathedral Society

of Change Ringers, I pray you to dedicate these hells to the glory and praise of God, in memory of those departed, as a thankoffering of the living and in commemoration of the jubilee of the Cathedral Society and the Hertford County Association of Change Ringers, and

Solver Jubilee of His Majesty King George the Fifth.'
Solemnly then, 'in the Faith of Jesus Christ,' the Lord Bishop dedicated the bells 'to the glory of God for use in this Cathedral and Abbey Church of St. Alhans.' Followed the customary prayers and then the full peal of twelve, rung by the Cathedral ringers, sounded out over the aminut airs, whose roots as hack into Roman history. out over the ancient city, whose roots go back into Roman history.

'A LOVELY PEAL.'

The bells were soon put into motion, with rounds, Stedman Cinques and Grandsire Cinques, and the unanimous verdict of both ringers and listeners outside, many of whom were musical experts, was that the bells form a 'lovely peal.' There was no hesitation in saying that the reputation of the Whitechapel Foundry has been further enhanced and that Mr. A. A. Hughes (the head of the firm) and his skilled staff (particularly Mr. Radcliffe) are to be congratulated upon producing a musical ring worthy of their reputation and fitting to occupy a place in such an historic building. An excellent rope circle has been secured under most difficult circumstances. Room has been found for three of the additional hells, 2nd, 3rd and 4th, by the ingenious building of an iron cage in the centre of the old wooden frame, and, by making the thrust of the 4th bell opposite to that of the tenor, the strain on the tower has been reduced to a minimum and is much less than hitherto.

After the service the beliry was soon filled with ringers, their wives and friends, including Mr. A. A. Hughes, the Mayor of St. Albans, Mr. W. Ayre (president of the County Association) and Mr. G. W. Cartnel (hon. secretary). Mr. A. W. Coles (Master of the Middlesex Association) and Mr. W. Nash (North Minus), Mr. Gilbert Debenham and Miss C. Debenham, ringers from St. Peter's and St. Stephen's Churches, and a full muster of the Cathedral band. Through the courtesy of the conductor, Mr. H. E. C. Goodenough, Messrs. W. H. L. Buckingham and G. W. Cartmel, who have been members of the Cathedral commany for over 50 years, enjoyed the privilege of taking part in the first ringing on the bells

Monday was an historic day for ringers of Hertfordshire, for not only has the jubilee of the Cathedral Society and the Hertford County Association been worthily commemorated, but also the silver

jubilee of His Majesty the King.

THE RINGERS' BELL.

Latin inscriptions have been applied to the four new bells. The inscription on the third bell was translated by Canon Mayhaw, and the translations on the others are by Mr. A. L. Ellis, deputy keeper of the British Museum and superintendent of the reading room. The of the British Museum and superintendent of the reading room. The authorities are greatly indebted to these gentlemen for the work they so readily undertook and efficiently carried out. It is also interesting to note that the bell given by Dr. and Mrs. Madge is named 'Alban,' the name of one of the heavy bells in the tower before the Dissolution. As regards the small balance of money needed for the public subscription bell, this has been guaranteed by a friend, but the secretary of the County Association would greatly appreciate a few more gifts from ringers to pay for their bell, many of whom intend to and. Will they please do it now, or the opportunity may pass? In this brief account we must not omit to mention the untiring

labours of Mr. H. E. C. Goodenough, who throughout has been the 'live wire' in the organisation. He is now very happy in having in his charge a very fine peal, and the satisfaction of knowing that the efforts of himself and co-workers have culminated so satisfactorily. To all kind contributors, far and near, grateful thanks are offered. The official opening by the County Association has been fixed, by the kind permission of the Dean, for Saturday, June 1st.

This is not the first time St. Albans has had a ring of twelve bells. In 1868 Mr. John Lewis presented to St. Peter's Church two trebles to make a peal of twelve, but in 1881, the 11th and tenor becoming cracked, the two trebles were taken away to the foundry to help towards payment of the needed repairs. The two pits remain empty waiting until some kind friend is generous enough to fill them. How-ever, we are glad that Hertfordshire rejoices once again in a ring of twelve, and we congratulate the Cathedral Society upon having such a beautiful ring. G. W. C.
