FIELDS STILL TO CONQUER.

Within the next few weeks many of the leading ringing associations will hold their annual meeting, and, in addition to the yearly election of officers, will be called upon to make the triennial appointment of representatives to the Central Council; while only two months ahead is the meeting of the Council itself. It will be a time of general stocktaking, and, perhaps, from the statistics, which it is proposed to gather in connection with new elections to the Council, it may be possible soon to get some clue to the real strength of the Exercise. From time to time there is somewhat disquieting news that, in this or that district, ringing is a dying art for want of new blood. On the other hand, there are many places where an optimistic view prevails, for one finds a good sprinkling of young ringers at meetings and reads of the election of useful numbers of new members, such, to quote one instance, as the twenty-two fresh names added to the Sussex County Association at a district meeting a fortnight ago. Judged merely on expressions of opinion, the optimists seem to cancel out the pessimists, but now that the Council has a plan for obtaining reliable statistics it should be possible to gauge much more accurately where the Exercise, as a whole, stands. It is, however, the duty of the individual associations, in their own interests, to examine closely the position in their respective areas.

There are very few parts of England, now, where ringing organisations, to promote the interests of the art and draw together individual companies in a common purpose, have not been in active operation for fifty years or more. Despite all their labours through half a century, however, there remain a vast number of towers unconnected with the associations, either because there are no ringers, or because such ringers as there are have no interests outside their own belfry, if, indeed, they have more than a casual interest inside it. One of the most successful territorial organisations in the country is the Kent County Association, yet the vice-president (Mr. E. H. Lewis) admitted the other day that only half the towers in the county are affiliated. And that, we imagine, is not an unusual state of affairs. The same conditions obtain in many parts of England, and, even if the figures which will presently be available through the Central Council should show that there is no falling off in the aggregate membership of the affiliated societies, it will be no reason for complacency. After fifty years of work, the associations still have fields to conquer, and those societies which are now about to meet to discuss their domestic affairs, might well devote some of their attention to formulating schemes, not only for raising recruits, but for bringing

into their organisation the towers which remain outside and which, between them, must have a very considerable number of ringers of sorts. Success will not be achieved by waiting for these people to come in of their own accord. It is necessary to go after them; to create interest, to use persuasion and, if possible, get it backed by the influence of the clergy. Why should not a start be made now in every territorial society to take a census in its area of the ringers inside and outside its organisation? It would provide some most useful material as the starting-point of what could be a general campaign, which should supplement the drive for young ringers.

Kent Treble Bob Major at
Galleywood, Essex, in 1934, and rang in the first peals of Ealing and
Pinner Surprise Major. He also took part in a peal of Minor at
Deeping St. James, Lincolnsbire, in which 28 Surprise methods were
spliced into seven extents.

Mr. Turner has rung 215 peals altogether, 189 on tower bells and 22 on handbells. Of these he has conducted 75 on tower bells and 12 in
hand, while the church bell peals have been rung in 79 towers in
20 counties of England, Wales and Ireland. One hundred and fortyfive of the peals have been rung for the Middlesex County Association,
in which he was Ringing Master of the South and West District from
1933 to 1937. Mr. Turner's mathematical and professional training
has given him a great command of figures, and it is only natural
that, intimately associated with Mr. J. A. Trollope, he should have
developed an extensive knowledge of composition. In this field he
has already rendered great service as a member of the Methods Committee of the Central Council, having been elected as an honorary
member of this body in 1934.

The Pride of the Parishioners.

A very successful meeting of the Chertsey District of the Guildford Diocesan Guild was held at Chobham on Saturday, at the invitation of the Vicar (the Rev. F. T. Robinson). A few months ago the bells at the Parish Church of St. Lawrence were rehung and placed on hall bearings by Messrs. Mears and Stainbank and a great improvement was thus effected, but of the bells themselves the less said the better, except that they are of venerable age and the pride of the parishiquers, who readily subscribed to their restoration. No fewer than five of the eight are scheduled for preservation on account of their antiquity, and even if the Chobham people themselves desired to improve the bells, which they do not, it would be impossible without providing at least five new bells.

The sixth is a pre-Reformation bell, cast by William Culverden, brazier, of London, who died in 1522, and is dedicated to St. Margaret. The fifth and seventh are bells dated 1597, cast by Richard Eldridge, and the tenor came from the same foundry at Wokingham in 1610. The fourth is dated 1684. Chobham has thus good reason to be proud of the antiquity of its bells.

Last Saturday's meeting was attended by nearly 40 ringers, but most of the touches rung were of the 'educational' variety, although the methods included Cambridge, and in this way much good work was done. What was equally gratifying was the feet that the majority of the Chobham ringers joined the Diocesan Guild for the first time and they were given a specially warm welcome by guild officials. The Vicar was also elected an honorary member.

Prior to the tea and meeting, service was held in the Parish Church, conducted by the curate. The Vicar presided at the organ and gave an address, in which he welcomed the Guild to Chobham. Going on to speak of the place which bells were rung muffled on Good Friday, and he added that the bells were very dear to the hearts of the people in the village. When it was necessary to restore them

Going on to speak of the place which bells took in the life of the parish, he said that in Chobham the bells were rung muffled on Good Friday, and he added that the bells were very dear to the hearts of the people in the village. When it was necessary to restore them there was a wonderful response and he had never known money come in easier for any church scheme. Moreover, it came in largely from people who could give only small amounts, and while the bells were sileut they were greatly missed in the life of the place. Proceeding, the Vicar spoke of the qualities demanded by hell-ringing. There was, he said, no better illustration of team work than that done by a band of ringers, and the work was one of self-effacement in which the individual had to subordinate himself to the interests of all. He spoke of ringing as a valuable piece of regular church work and referred with gratitude to the conscientious work of his own band. They wanted the traditions of their church towers maintained, he added, for deep down in their hearts men knew that the bells stood for the union between God and man.

At the close of the meeting Mr. R. Whittington inquired the nature of the ringing at Chobham on Good Fridays, and was informed that it was now half-muffled before the services. Formerly it was full muffled, with the tenor open at backstroke. It was a very old custom, and the Vicar said there was no question that it edded to the solemnity of the day and at least made people think. That was important when there was a growing tendency to convert the most solemn day in all the Christian year into a public holiday.

MORE HONORARY MEMBERS ELECTED.

A successful meeting of the Guildford District of the Guildford Diocesan Guild was held at Worplesdon on Saturday, March 18th, when over 40 members and visitors attended. Dear Sir,—I was very interested in the two methods on a new plan in your issue of March 17th, Checkendon and Northrepps Major, and I congratulate Mr. Nolan Golden and his colleagues upon their achievement.

As I have a new plan for producing Stedman extended to eight bells, it may interest your readers to give a lead here:—

It will be seen that the method is a combination of Plain and Stedman Principles. The treble in a plain hunt from lead to 6th's place and back to lead, the other seven working bells doing Stedman, alternately quick and slow, with 7-8 up and down double dodge between, plus 2 intermediate sixes between last 3rd's and 7-8 up, and also between 7-8 down and firsts 3rd's (in slow). By this extra work it will be found that all changes are triple changes, with not more than two blows in any one place. The work of the seven inside bells is divided into sixes, as in Stedman, but the method treated as a plain method for all other purposes. There are 12 changes to a (treble) lead, 84 to a course, and the method can be extended to Royal and 84 to a course, and the method can be extended to Roy F. E. PITMAN. Maximus Bromley


