YOUR PAPERS

Most peal ringers and, in particular, conductors keep records. Some are systematic affairs, with peals tabulated and indexed with professional efficiency; with others they consist of exercise books pasted up with ringing data or perhaps a card index file. Such records are to a degree personal secrets; to the individual concerned they are an unfailing source of joy and memories of past achievement, and they constitute a life record. In addition, most conductors have their scrap book of peals and touches, cherished possessions which are constantly being added to, invaluable to the Exercise at large. With the limitations on printing to-day, these must of necessity be mainly in manuscript form or of cuttings.

Recently we have had one or two private letters from well-known leaders in their associations who, while compiling Guild histories and biographies, have regretted that in the case of certain ringers who have passed over their papers relating to ringing have been treated as salvage and destroyed. Their executors had regarded these manuscripts and records as of no intrinsic value, and they had been consigned to the waste-paper basket. One naturally can understand the point of view of the tidy housewife when confronted with an accumulation of papers (one noted ringer left a garage full of documents, some of which were valuable, but they required hours of time spent in sorting.) Too frequently when death occurs premises have to be vacated at an early date, and it is when confronted with a time limit that the uninitiated unceremoniously hands over the mass of papers to the salvage collector.

The point we are asked to emphasise is that all ringers should leave instructions as to the disposal of their papers. So many noted personalities regard their records of little value to ringing in general—probably a characteristic of a modest make-up—that they take no thought as to the eventual disposal of their papers. What every noted ringer really requires is a ringing executor who will sift and sort the papers and make sure that nothing of value to the Guild or Association is destroyed.

In ventilating this subject we trust that ringers, both individually and collectively, will consider the creation of the appropriate machinery for dealing with such masses of documentary data. Each Guild or Association should have a ringing executor to whom relatives of a deceased ringer could send such papers. We note that the Irish Association have this week appointed a librarian to deal

not only with the establishment of a library for the Association, but also the manuscripts left behind by that famous ringer and composer, Gabriel Lindoff. There are in most Guilds retired ringers with the necessary knowledge and aptitude for this work, and we feel certain, if general instructions and guidance could be issued from the Central Council, those inexperienced in this work would know what to look for and retain.

Tower Snatching

MORE FOUR FIGURE MEMBERS.

Dear Sir,-My old friend Pat Cannon seems misunderstand the letter from Mr. Nobles. Mr. Nobles asks how his record for the year 1946 compares with that of other ringers for the same year. I consider it would be hard to beat for 1946, both as regards the number of new towers rung in and Sunday service ringing. Congratulations, Mr. Nobles, on a very fine achievement!

Several names can be added to the five men-tioned by Mr. Cannon, Mr. Alfred W. Brighton was the first ever to accomplish four figures in the number of towers. He gave up round the 1,700 mark. The lead was then taken by Mr. J. H. Shepherd, who has, of course, held it ever since. This information was given to me by Mr. J. S. Goldsmith at Bristol in January, 1938.

I believe Mr. John Thomas during his career as a bellhanger has run well into four figures.

This number includes every ringable ring of bells in Somerset. Although he is of a modest, retiring nature, perhaps he would like to confirm this! The late Mr. Francis E. Dawc claimed to have rung in 1,100 towers, but it was always doubtful if he could produce a written record to substantiate this!

On looking at my own record I find the following: 1937, 164 new towers, 10 'old' towers; 1938, 201 new towers, 32 'old' towers: giving an average of 'new' towers for the two years of one every other day! I rang in my 1,000th tower, Southwell Cathedral, Notts, on March 12th, 1939, at the age of 31 years 71 months. I should be interested to know if 1.000 has been accomplished at an earlier age than this.

My total is now 1,165. I have rung in all English counties excepting six, also four counties in Wales. Owing to pressure of work and family responsibilities, which are my first consideration, I only get an occasional chance of ringing in a new tower these days. Tower snatching, although laughed at by some snatching although laughed at hy some ringers, has its values. Besides giving its devotees the opportunities of ringing under all sorts of conditions, it creates friendships of life-long duration. My best wishes to all who have an interest in this side of ringing.
