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TESTING FOR PLAIN BOB LEAD ENDS

If one is given a method by its places, it is only necessary to write out half a lead of it in order to discover whether it will yield a Plain Bob lead end. Take Cambridge Royal as an example. If 20 changes of this method are written out, counting rounds as the first, the change 7480529631 is produced. The next change will be made by the treble making 10ths place and the 3rd making 9ths place. The other eight bells will cross in pairs.

The second half-lead will contain the same places in reverse order. Provided this is so, the four pairs of bells crossing at the lead centre enable us to determine whether a Plain Bob lead end will result. Write out the figures 246809753 in a circle in that order. They are in the natural coursing order of Plain Bob Royal. They should be fairly evenly spaced out. Join the pairs of bells by lines in the circle which cross over on the centre line of the lead, leaving the place making bell or 'pivot bell' (the 3 in this case) unmarked. The result is four parallel lines. Whether or not four parallel lines result is a test in all Royal methods, plain or treble bob, as to whether or not a Plain Bob lead end will result.

This simple test works on all numbers of bells. It is not claimed as original. In Minor methods the circle is of five figures 24653, and the test must give two parallel lines.

In all cases, if the test is successful, there is the choice of place making when the treble leads—either 2nds place or 'last place' (10ths in Royal). But there are three snags. First, the place chosen may interfere with the method places (e.g., London Surprise Major cannot be varied as an 8ths place method). Secondly, one of the two may give rounds in one lead. Thirdly, as 9 is not a prime number, Royal methods may give a 3-lead course only.

The test may be adapted so as to examine large numbers of methods. No figures are written. The half lead is built up by strips of card, one between each pair of changes, with only the paths of the bells on them. Thus any desired half lead can be formed by its places. The course-circle tester is at the top, the figures joined by lines to where 'rounds' would be at the head of the half lead. Counters run up the lines to the course circle soon test for plain bob lead ends.

The technique also works with methods and principles on odd numbers of bells. As an example, here is a Caters principle produced. The changes underlined are changes in the plain hunt on nine bells and so preserve the natural coursing-order. The sections in between them are symmetrical and will be found to obey the general test for natural coursing order. Four pairs cross over on their centre lines, giving four parallel lines on the coursing circle 124689753.

Mr. Maurice Hibbert is believed to be the first to circle the tower at Barnet Parish Church. The first peal he rang on the bells was in 1904. The task was completed when he rang the 3rd on December 20th, 1947.

COMBINED UNIVERSITIES' RE-UNION

CHESTER WEEK BEING PLANNED.

Some 50 members of the Combined Universities Association participated in the fourth annual reunion festival in London on Jan. 7th.

Ringing facilities started at 10 a.m. at St. Mary's, Lewisham, and included St. John's, Deptford, St. Giles', Camberwell, and Southwark Cathedral. The Association attended Evensong at Southwark Cathedral, at which the address was given by the Vice-Provost, Canon F. S. L. Fitz-George. The lessons were read by the Rev. C. E. Wigg, vice-president of the Association. Mr. C. John Dickinson, of the Oxford University Society, was at the organ.

The annual dinner was at the Old Bell Restaurant, Holborn, the president, Mr. E. H. Lewis, being in the chair, supported by Canon Fitz-George, the Rev. C. Elliott Wigg (Master of the Oxford Guild), Mr. A. A. Hughes, Miss Marie Cross and Dr. E. S. J. Hatcher. Seven universities—Oxford, Cambridge, London, Bristol, Reading, Birmingham and Sheffield—were represented.

After the toast of 'The Church and the King' had been proposed from the chair, Mr. E. H. Lewis said two years ago he had some rather rude things to say about the striking of the Association, and last year he tried to encourage them to buy some copies of 'Hints for Beginners'—the Central Council publication. Unfortunately, he was not able to hear much of the ringing that day, but what he did hear was immeasurably better. 'I did not hear such good firing as at St. Gabriel's last year' (laughter).

DUFFIELD FOR SERVICE RINGING.

He understood that a plain course of Duffield was rung. For service ringing he did not think there was anything better than Duffield, and it was a pity it was not rung more. For a peal it was poor.

Dr. Hatcher proposed the toast of 'The Universities Association,' which, he said, took the form of a short report on the year. They all regretted the absence of Dr. John Spice and hoped that it would not be long before he was able to attend a University Association gathering.

Since the annual meeting last year they had not met officially until that day. He hoped too many people were not blaming the poor secretary—they had a chance to meet at Chester in the summer, but that effort 'came to naught.' They hoped, however, to go to Chester in 1948.

Despite their official inactivity, the University Associations had not been standing still. London had rung several peals and it gave him great pleasure to announce that Bristol had scored their first at Wincanton, his native town. They hoped that Reading would be the next to score their first, as they were getting an active group together. As to the Association, the number of peals rung had been poor, chiefly because they did not hold their ringing week. He thanked all members for their support.

Lt.-Comdr. Gordon Cross proposed the toast of 'Kindred Societies, the Visitors and "The Ringing World."' In connection with the Ancient Society, he mentioned the pleasure it gave them that Mr. A. A. Hughes had been able to attend all their dinners. The Cumberlands were represented by Mr. George Cross, who always went out of his way to help young ringers. He also welcomed Mr. Philip Corby, Mr. Jones and Mr. T. W. White, Editor of 'The Ringing World.'

Mr. White, in his reply, mentioned the popularity of peal ringing to-day, the number of peals in the last quarter reaching as high a figure as ever recorded in the Exercise since the start of 'The Ringing World.'

'DICTATORIAL CONDUCTRESS.'

With grace and wit the Rev. A. G. G. Thurlow proposed 'The Ladies.' In coupling the name of Miss Betty Spice with the toast, he said after having been put in their places

all day by their dictatorial conductress, it was nice to think that little girls were made of sugar and spice.

Miss Spice said it must be admitted that the ladies of the Society had played quite a notable part, and she thought it could be said that were it not for the ladies the Universities Association would have been in a poor state. During the war it was left to the women to carry on at Oxford, and during the last two years the ladies had largely carried the day. Now that the men were coming back to their own, Oxford would begin to degenerate into the state Oxford had always been without the ladies.

THE ANNUAL MEETING.

The annual meeting followed. The accounts, which showed a balance in hand of £10 0s. 2d., were adopted. The meeting confirmed the election of the following new members: Oxford, Messrs. P. V. Baker, R. Meadows, G. Moorhouse, the Misses J. Brierley, D. Castell, M. Craster, A. Dickinson, R. Dodd, R. How, J. M. Livingstone, C. Morton, S. Rymer, C. M. Trist; Cambridge, J. B. Rowsell, the Rev. and Mrs. R. H. I. Williams; London, J. T. Dyke, D. Martin, G. R. Smerdon; Reading, R. Cropley, R. J. Garner, Miss P. Smee; Sheffield, G. C. Briggs, P. Taylor.

The officers elected were: President, Mr. E. H. Lewis; vice-president, the Rev. C. Elliott Wigg; hon. secretary and treasurer, Dr. Hatcher; Central Council representative, Miss Marie Cross.

A discussion followed on the question of a ringing week. The secretary explained the difficulties of the week planned for Chester in 1947, which had to be abandoned owing to inability to find accommodation. For 1948 he had been in communication with the principal of the Chester Training College and he had been offered accommodation up to 100. He was aiming at an attendance of 40.

Miss Spice declared that 40 was too large for a successful tour. The optimum should not be more than 20. In subsequent discussion she compromised to 25.

The secretary was instructed to ascertain whether the principal of the Training College would be prepared to accept an attendance of 25. Members hoping to attend the week are asked to communicate with the hon. secretary as soon as possible.

Regarding the peal at Canterbury Cathedral in 1946, the secretary announced that the authorities had sanctioned the erection of a peal board.

RAMPTON'S BELLS

The Bishop of Southwell dedicated on Dec. 21st the ring of six at Rampton, Notts. The tenor of the old four has been recast and the other three retuned. A new treble has been given by an old ringer and a second subscribed for by the parish in memory of the men who served in the war, to be called 'In Grateful Memory Bell.'

After the dedication the Bishop unveiled the war memorial to the seven men who had lost their lives. Seven blows were rung on the two new bells, and after a pause rounds were rung. A mixed band rang 240 Plain Bob after the service, and in the afternoon ringing included Cambridge, Single Court, Single Oxford, Kent and Grandsire Doubles.

The bells are a useful addition to the North Notts District and are the work of the Loughborough Foundry. The cost, £830, has been raised during three years.

In honour of the 70th birthday of Mr. Herbert Gates, of the St. Mary's, Apsley, band, 1,440 Cambridge Surprise Minor was rung on January 6th by A. V. Good (cond.) 1. P. Holness 2. T. Morton 3. F. Tompkins 4. E. Upton 5. W. Puddifoot 6. It was the longest length in the method by all except the conductor.

Another Eight for Devon

BISHOP PRAISES A 'THRILLER.'

The Bishop of Plymouth dedicated two new bells and rededicated the rehung peal of six at Buckland Monachorum at a special morning service on Sunday, December 21st.

Mystery stories are popular with the Bishop, and, telling the large congregation that he knew very little about bellringing, he said what he did know was the result of reading Dorothy Sayers' 'The Nine Tailors.' 'If you do not know it, I recommend it very strongly,' he said, and added that if the discovery of the murderer had depended on his reading of the bellringing changes he would still have been at large.

The Bishop explained that the two new bells which had been added to the peal had been given by Mr. C. P. Brown in memory of his wife, and the tenor bell recast in memory of Major Bundock's brother. He congratulated the parish on having raised for the balance about £1,050 and a gift of £370 to the Diocesan Fund.

In view of present-day austerities, he said, the Chancellor had to consider whether he could give the faculty for the restoration or giving of bells, and it was strongly pressed in some quarters that bells were a luxury, not a necessity. Personally, he had maintained that bells were more than a necessity, they were an opportunity. One thousand pounds, he contended, was not too much to pay for an invitation to the House of God.

The Tavistock ringers, under their captain, Mr. M. Deacon, had the privilege of ringing the dedication rounds. During the afternoon bands of ringers from Plymouth (St. Andrew's and Emmanuel), Plympton St. Maurice, Tamerton Foliot, Whitechurch, Eggbuckland, Meavy, etc., were given a short ring, each in turn, and while most of the ringing done was rounds and call changes, the Plymouth St. Andrew's band rang the first touch of 'scientific' on the bells—a well-struck 168 Grandsire Triples.

Everyone present expressed great satisfaction with the 'go' of the bells, and Mr. (Bert) Newson, the representative of Messrs. Gillett and Johnston, the bellfounders, was also told to congratulate his firm on effecting such fine blending of old and new bells.

There is, however, in St. George's, Renenden, Kent, a peal board inscribed:

March 7th, 1821. A true and complete peal of 5,040 Oxford Bob Triples, the first ever Rang on this system, was this Day performed in 3 hours and 8 minutes by the resident band, 1 George Southon, 2 Edward Wenman, 3 William Lansdell, 4 Robert Chasmer, 5 George Manwaring, 6 John Hatcher, conductor, 7 George Gibbs, 8 John Wenman.—Yours sincerely, M. A Cornish Report

The last two months of 1947 have seen three restorations completed. On Nov. 15th, the two new trebles and retuned six were dedicated at Towednack by the Chancellor of Truro Cathedral, Canon R. H. W. Roberts. The whole cost of the work was defrayed by Mr. Hugh Dunstan, who is treasurer of the Truro Diocesan Guild, and who has been churchwarden for more than fifty years. The new trebles are memorials to his parents. This is Cornwall's fortieth octave and has come to the neighbouring parish of Carbis Bay, where the first post-war octave was installed just a year before. Messrs. Gillett and Johnston carried out the work, and the result is a very pleasing light eight with tenor of 7½ cwt. Mr. D. Bradford represented the bellfounders at the dedication.

On November 29th, Canon Roberts also rededicated the rehung six bells at St. Broward, near Bodmin. This six had been unringable for some 18 years, and it was the enthusiasm of the Vicar, the Rev. W. H. L. Jennings, which got the work done. There was a large gathering at the opening, and this tower is situated in the centre of the prize-ringing area, but the Vicar's courage has banned competitions on his bells. Messrs. Mears and Stainbank carried out this restoration with their usual efficiency.

The ring of eight at Stokeslimsland was rung again after Evensong on the Sunday before Christmas in readiness for the festival. They are to be rededicated by the Lord Bishop of Truro in January. This parish is well known because of the Royal Farm being here, and very recently was visited once more by the King and Queen. The bells have been rehanged, and the sixth recast by Messrs. John Taylor and Co.

The Penzance Branch of the Guild is holding monthly practices for method ringing, and some useful work is being done. The winter programme was begun at Carbis Bay in October, on November 22nd Towednack was visited, and Gylval on December 13th. The January practice is to be at Helston on the 24th. Recently the Madron band rang a quarter-peal of Grandsire Doubles under the conductorship of Mr. G. W. Taysom, and this was the first quarter on the bells for over thirty years.

Limerick's Bells Recast

The bells of the Redemptorist Church at Mount St. Alphonsus, Limerick, have been recast and consecrated—the 11 bells weighing five tons, the tenor being 2¼ cwt. There is a ring of 10 and eleventh bell for chiming. The work was carried out by Messrs. John Taylor and Co., of Loughborough.

The ceremony of consecration by the Bishop of Limerick was one of solemnity and dignity. The bells were suspended from a great beam 10 ft. high, stretching across the church some distance in front of the altar rails, each bell being about 4 ft. from the ground.

The ceremony started with singing seven psalms. The Bishop then washed the bells with the blessed water. Four priests followed him, completing the washing, inside and out, of each bell. As they finished a bell the Master of Ceremonies approached and measured each bell with a tape and marked it with chalk where the crosses are to be made with holy oil at the anointing.

The solemn anointings consisted of seven crosses on the outside of each bell with holy oil of Extreme Unction, and four on the inside with chrism, each cross accompanied by a dedicatory formula.

Then followed a procession from the sacristy of eleven little white and red clad thurifers, each with a shining thurible. They approached the Bishop, who poured into each censer its quota of incense. Each thurifer then placed his thurible under a bell so that the ascending smoke should fill it.

The Bishop concluded the ceremony by making the sign of the cross over the bells, and as the procession went towards the sacristy the ringers struck the bells with small wooden mallets.
