BY J. W. CLARKE, MASTER OF THE CHESTER GUILD In 1540 the Abbey of St. Werburgh became the Cathedral Church of Chester. Records show that there were then installed six bells, not, however, in true musical sequence. This peal was later reduced to five in rather interesting circumstances, as revealed by the following extract concerning the third :-
first there was a great bell in the Cathedral Church of Christe in Chester which hanged in the new steeple there, which bell was taken doune and solde by the Dean and Chapter of the same Cathedral Church the 41 h . May 4 Ed . VI, for the somme of xxxiiii 1 li and the said somme is alleged by them, to be paid unto the Ministers of the said Church for their stypend.' This bell still exists at the Parish Church of Conway, N. Wales. This practice was not unique.
The five remaining bells at the Cathedral were recast in 1605 and again in 1606. This second recast was probably due to the higher standard of musical sequence and mechanical efficiency demanded by the forerunners of change ringing. The fine rings unique to this country are due to change ringing, an aspect of it which balances the criticism of its responsibility for bells of antiquarian interest being recast.
The year 1626 provided a separate sanctus bell, still in regular use as a service bell. Its clapper is of the type then common with a wooden contrivance fixing it to the crown staple, as a means of combating clapper roll.
The following extracts of Cathedral records of 1738 give a most interesting picture of proceedings then :-

This tenor was recast in 1867, local repair having resulted in 361b. of metal being knocked from the sound bow. The full octave was completed by Messrs. Warner and Sons, of London, at the same time. and a chiming barrel installed, which is still in use, capable of ringing a plain course of 'Bob Triples.'
About this time the Curfew started in Chester, being rung on the tenor, the date being sounded on the present 7th and the month on the sanctus bell. The wear resulting from the tenor being rung up for this purpose led to its being rehung in roller bearings, with the whole peal, by Mears and Stainbank, in 1927. The year 1937, in commemoration of the Jubilee of the Chester Guild, saw the octave increased by the same firm to the present ten. consisting of bells dating from 1606 to 1937.
St. Oswald's Church formerly occupied the site of the present south transept to the Cathedral, and ita parishioners therefore claimed this at one time as their Parish Church. Local patriotism extended for a period to the building of a brick screen across the neck of the transept, and the provision of a 'ring' of two bells in a campanile in the upper interior of a buttress of the main fabric!

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## NEW HANDBELL RECORD

13,664 OF DOUBLE NORWICH COURT BOB MAJOR.
As briefly announced in our columns, the record length for Major in hand has been lowered by a peal of $1 \mathbf{3}, 664$ changes of Double Norwich Court Bob Major, rung at Bushey on February 29 th in 6 hours and 4 minutes by four prominent nembers of the Exercise. Details of the peal are recorded in this issue.
The peal was first discussed during the war and the idea revised about 18 months ago, but February 29th was the first occasion the four had met for the purpose. Everyone who participated was very pleased with the peal.
The composition was by the late Mr. J. A. Trollope, and it is singular that the two prevous records of Major in hand were composed by him.

In the past Major records on handbells have been achieved by young bands of ringers. The previous one was 13,440 Bob Major, rung at Pudsey, Yorkshire, on June 5th, 1911, in seven hours and seven minutes, for the Yorkshire Association by W. F. Thorpe ( 16 years 6 months) $1-2$, F. W. Jones ( 20 years 3 months) 3-4, Ernest Mann (19 years) 5-6. Ernest Hoyle ( 19 vears 9 months) 7-8. Ernest Mann was the conductor.

Previous to that the record was $11,200 \mathrm{Bob}$ Major at Norwich on April 26th, 1894, in which the ringers were J. A. Trollope (aged 18) 1-2, G. P. Burton ( $18 \frac{1}{2}$ ) $3-4, \mathrm{~J}$. E. Burton ( $17 \frac{1}{2}$ ) $5-6$,
C. E. Borrett (19) 78 . J. A. Trollope conC. E.

As to Double Norwich Court Bob Major, the longest length in hand was 5,248 changes rung by the Cambridge University Guild at Surfleet, Lincs, on September 9th, 1924.

The Midland Counties Association hold the record on tower bells with 17,104 Double Norwich Court Bob Major at Wigston, Leics. on December 27 th , 1904 , in 10 hours 35 minutes. Thu ringers were Josiah Morris treble, Thomas
H. Taffender 2, Charles H. Fowler 3, Thomas H. Taffender 2, Charles H. Fowler 3, Thomas William Hensher Inglesant 6, Arthur R. Aldham 7, William Willson (composer and conductor)
tenor. This surpassed the 17,024 rung at Kidtenor. This surpassed the 17,024 rung at Kid-
lington, Ozon, on May 22 nd, 1899 , in 11 hours 12 minutes.

## PEN PICTURES

The following intimate pen pictures of the participants in the new record length have been supplied to the Editor at his request:-

EDWIN A. BARNETT (1-2) Age 29. Peals rung 549 ( 134 on handbells); conducted 109 ( 24 on handbells). The third generation of a ringing family, his first peal was in 1929 at the age of 11 , since when he has added a variety of methods. Reaching his 100 th peal at the age of $15 \frac{1}{5}$, he was the voungest to accomplish this. One hundred and sixty of his peals have been with his father; 172 on the bells of St. Paulinus', Crayford, including peals by the youngest bands to ring Bob Major and Spliced Surprise, and 51 at St. John's, Erith.

CHRISTOPHER W. WOOLLEY (3-4). Age 40. Peals rung 502 (285); conducted 151 (112). The look of weariness and boredom on his face when he rings the most difficult methods on handbells has to be seen to be believed. But he has the gift which so few conductors possess of inspiring complete confidence by his ability to 'anticipate' trips, and there are many ringers who have him to thank for their handbell peals in other than 'bread and butter' methods.

Since ringing his first peal in 1919 at the age of 12 , he has taken part in many notable handbell performances, including Spliced Surprise in up to six methods, as well as nearly prise in up to six methods, as well as nearly participated in many of the new Surprise methods rung in the Bushey area before the recent war, and was also one of the band who set up the present Stedman Cinques record12,663 changes at Oxford in 1946. Since the war he has also taken part in the fint peals
of Yorkshire, Felstead and Jersey Surprise on handbells - the two latter the first ever in those methods.

HAROLD G. CASHMORE (5-6). Age 44. Yeals rung 324 (94); conduated 233 (57). The writer has been told that a well-known ringer, when Harold Cashmore was learning to ring, advised him to give up on the grounds that he would never make good! However, his first peal was Superlative in 1921 at the age of 17 , and his first handbell peal was in the same method in 1927. His peals include a record number of Surprise Major methodsover 50, in all of which he has conducted at least one peal-as well as nearly 50 peals of Surprise Major on handbells, most of which he has conducted from 5-6, including Spliced Surprise in up to six methods. His many brilliant performances have aroused the greatest admiration, and he and Ernest Turner, on their record as composers, ringers and conductors, may fairly cluim to be in the forefront of ringers of the present day.
ERNEST C. S. TURNER (7-8). Age 38. Peuls rung 420 (138), conducted 196 (77). This was his first handbell pea! for over two years, but it goes without saying that he was complately at ease throughout. His first peal was in 1927 at the age of 17 , since when he has successfully accomplished many of the difficult tasks ringing has to offer, such as calling Carter's odd-bob peal of Stedman Triples from an 'inside' pair. Most outstanding, perhaps, has been his record as a conductor of Spliced Surprise. He is the only ringer besides Harold Cashmore to have called a peal of spliced on handbells, and on tower bells he was at 23 the youngest ringer to accomplish this. Since then he has called peals in up to nine methods, mostly from a non-observation bell, and in many cases his own compositions, as was the peal in four methods at Crayford referred to above. Like Chris Woolley, he is a good chess player, at which game the other two members of the band 'also ran.'
