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MORE ABOUT THE GROUP THEORY

DOCTOR JOHN E. SPICE'S article on a Mathematical Theory of Change Ringing has created interest. Squadron Leader A. York Bramble suggests that the application of Group Theory to problems in change ringing is very timely. 'There have been,' he writes, 'frequent "mathematical" considerations of it; but hardly anyone, apart from the late W. H. Thompson, had hitherto set out any specific treatment of the subject in truly mathematical or "scientific" fashion. Only a week previously we read a note by one claiming originality in, and by inference, I think, mathematical (or scientific) consideration of, some aspects of the theory of change ringing; but these claims can hardly be substantiated.'

Mr. Brian D. Price, while welcoming Dr. Rankin's work with enthusiasm, writes that it would be a mistake to think that it is the first thorough approach to Group theory in change ringing that has been made. Rather it is that such advances have not been made public simply because there has not been a demand for such knowledge among ringers.

His letter continues: 'After a study of W. H. Thompson's papers, it is clear to me that he knew much more of Group Theory than Dr. Spice's article would suggest. The so-called Thompson Papers in "Grandsire" are not the originals, but rather a much-simplified extract of them from the point of view of the practical composer. Last year I made efforts through his relations and associates to find any remaining papers and to preserve his unpublished works (he died in 1934 at Brighton). The Central Council ought to have these in its library. Where are the genuine Thompson Papers?

'There are three good reasons for knowing that Thompson was conversant with Group Theory. Firstly, he used the dodecahedron for plotting the lead-ends of Grandsire Triples. This in itself has a very deep connection with Groups. Secondly, he almost completely explored part composition of peals of Grandsire Triples (I have found only one plan that he missed). This involves an exploration of sub-groups among the lead-ends. Thirdly, from his handling of Q-sets, not only in the well-known case of the extent of Grandsire Triples, but also in the part-diagrams of his, and in using various singles and other calls, it is clear that he knew the general law of Q-sets.

'In 1944 I proved the general law of Q-sets as follows: "When an odd-membered Q-set is altered in calling it does not alter the oddness or evenness of the total number of round blocks." Similarly, substituting "even-membered" and "does alter." This law is only operative for one-way traffic through the Q-set. For instance, one can compose the extent of Original Minor with bobs only. This may be what Dr. Rankin has proved. I am convinced that W. H. Thompson had proved it too.

'Another law I proved, which W. H. Thompson must have known, is as follows: "It is necessary and sufficient for the part-ends of a composition in similar parts to form a sub-group." There is a definite technique in part-composition utilising Groups with which composers such as John Carter, Law James, J. W. Parker must have been familiar, although they may not have known the term "Group." John Carter could not have composed his odd-bob peals of Stedman Triples by trial and error.

'It is my humble opinion that processes such as splicing Surprise methods, or composing the extent of Bristol Surprise with the tenors together, can never be done by any other than "ad hoc" methods.'

OBITUARY

Mr. S. J. Reddell, captain of the Yateley, Hampshire, band of ringers, died on April 10th. He had been a ringer for over 55 years and had rung many peals, his first being on May 1st, 1892. He was laid to rest close to the tower of his church, his own band of ringers acted as bearers, and many ringers from the surrounding district came to pay their last respects. He will be greatly missed.

Hertford County Association

OPPOSITION TO DIOCESAN SCHEME.

A large number of members and friends attended the annual meeting at St. Albans on April 3rd, the southern half of the county being well represented.

Cathedral Evensong was attended, the preacher being the Rev. A. St. G. Coulthurst, Vicar of Aldenham. A boy soloist rendered very beautifully Handel's 'I know that my Redeemer liveth.' A collection was taken in aid of the Association Benevolent Fund.

Members then adjourned to the Christ Church Parish Room for tea, the junior members acting as stewards.

The business meeting followed, with the president, Mr. L. Fidler, in the chair, supported by the Vicar of Aldenham, Mr. G. W. Cartmel and the general secretary (Mr. W. Ayre).

The secretary, in his annual report, stressed the importance of obtaining new members, particularly in the districts having wider scope for expansion. He suggested that meetings be held at towers where change ringing was either at a low ebb or non-existent, and that greater efforts should be made towards breaking down district isolation, thus creating more unity.

The district secretaries' reports were read and accepted with appreciation for their services, the general secretary emphasising the fact that more support was required.

Forty-four peals had been rung, mainly in the south, with Mr. H. G. Cashmore as the leading conductor. Peals worthy of particular notice were Albanian Surprise Royal, Barnet, Jersey and Felstead Surprise, all rung for the first time; Surprise Minor in three methods (Northern District) and the all doctors peal.

The new president, Mr. A. S. Carter (Hertford), was elected, and the treasurer (Mr. G. E. Debenham) and secretary (Mr. W. Ayre) re-elected. For the post of Librarian there were two nominations, Mrs. A. M. Fergusson and Mr. C. F. Sayer, the former being elected. Messrs. H. G. Cashmore, C. W. Woolley, R. G. Bell and W. Ayre were elected as representatives on the Central Council.

On the question of the formation of a Diocesan Association, it was agreed that 'no useful purpose could result from an amalgamation with the Bedfordshire Association having the above object in view.'

The amended rules were then dealt with, and after further amendments had been agreed upon, were adopted.

Mr. G. W. Cartmel then proposed a comprehensive vote of thanks to all who had helped to make the meeting a success. The Vicar of Aldenham expressed pleasure at being able to attend and said how glad he was to have his bells rung again after eight years' silence.

RESTORATION

BLETCHINGLEY, SURREY.

After a silence of about ten years, the bells of St. Mary's, Bletchingley, have been put in ringing order. The bells were rededicated on March 27th by Canon R. H. Cragg, Rural Dean, and were rung at the dedication ceremony by the following members of the Surrey Association: D. Cooper, L. Penfold, W. Slaughter, E. Razzell, W. Claydon, G. Oliver, A. J. Bull and F. E. Collins. Ringing continued during the evening from rounds to London Surprise Major.

Ten years ago the main beams which carried the bell frame were found to be unsafe owing to damage by the death-watch beetle. This year the local builder and the architect, Mr. E. D. Jefferiss Mathews, O.B.E., have co-operated with Messrs. Gillett and Johnston, the bellfounders, the outcome being a new oak undercarriage built for the bell frame by the builders and the bells hung on modern ball bearings by the bellfounders. The result of this work has put Bletchingley bells once more in good going order and worthy of the tower in which they hang. The Rector (the Rev. A. Aitken Crawshaw) is to be congratulated on getting the job done.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Savouring of a 'Wangle'

Dear Sir,—The Rev. K. W. H. Felstead has misunderstood the purpose of my recent letter. The difference between Double Norwich with a 4ths place bob and with a 6ths place bob is slight—so slight that it is difficult to understand why the conductor of the peal in question (who is far from being one of the 'lesser brethren') should have put to it a footnote which would at any time have been rather ludicrous, but which in these days was an unnecessary waste of space. The conductor of my second peal of Reverse Bob might equally well have put that it was my first in the method in which the bob was made when the treble was leading!

His other questions may, I think, be answered in this way. The Exercise as we know it has existed with little fundamental change for over two and a quarter centuries, during which time certain customs have been observed by ringers and composers alike. One, which Mr. Felstead regards as the first consideration, is that there shall be no repetition of changes in a peal. Another is that singles shall not be used in Treble Bob methods. It makes no difference to the listener or to the mental or physical effort expended by the ringers if either of these customs is broken, but to do so would be contrary to the general feeling of the Exercise, which has always rejected anything savouring of a 'wangle.' Thus as soon as it was found possible to produce peals of Stedman Triples with ordinary bobs and singles, all peals with extraneous calls, admirable though they may have been up to that time, went out of use at once. (Now that Treble Bob can be spliced at the lead-ends, 'Ilkeston' and similar mixtures should also be barred.)

As mathematical exercises, Lockwood's 9,120 of Treble Bob and Brian Price's peal of Cambridge with a single are undoubtedly very clever, but for practical purposes they are merely wangles, and no ringer with any respect for the traditions of our art could tolerate them to-day. The fact that several prominent ringers took part in the latter peal is all the more to be deplored.

The peals of Cambridge with a 6ths place bob are rather different, but there is a perfectly adequate selection of compositions available using the ordinary bob, the fact that the tenors are parted on occasions being immaterial.—Yours faithfully,

PEALS IN HOLY WEEK

Sir,—I feel sure that I voice the sentiments of many ringers in protesting against the ringing of peals in Holy Week. Recorded in your issue of April 16th are two eight-bell and six six-bell peals rung in that week, seven of which were rung on the Saturday. I admit that one of the eight-bell peals was rung in a secular campanile, but the listening public are not likely to differentiate between secular and church bells.

To discuss this matter at its very lowest level, it is surely a deplorable exhibition of bad taste that, on the day which is sacred to Christendom as commemorating the lying in the grave of our Lord, ringers should be found who consider that a peal is the most desirable method of recalling that event.

Critics of peal ringing activities are many, and it is surely laying the Exercise wide open to the hostility of all churchmen when practices such as that in question are indulged in. Moreover, as churchworkers, which is the fundamental raison d'être of all our organisations, ringers should avoid anything which may in any way bring church activities into disrepute.—Yours faithfully,

Three Answers

Dear Sir,—In reference to the letter of Mr. Felstead on page 148 of 'The Ringing World,' most fair-minded persons will be in full agreement with the first part of his letter, but his three questions and the last part of his letter are very controversial.

Question A: The 4ths place bob interferes with the structure of the method, and is, in fact, at bob lead of Double Oxford. Double Norwich has enjoyed a great popularity for half a century and there are plenty of good compositions available, so if the 4ths place bob is no improvement, why use it? Again, Double Norwich's only blemish is the unavoidable five pull dodging at the bobs. Why make this blemish worse by introducing three pull dodging underneath the five?

Question B: The objection here is that you open wide the door to all kinds of 'jiggery pokery.' Singles have no place in Treble Bob methods, but they are necessary in Plain methods if you want a good composition, otherwise you can only have in course combinations or extents. Re the 9,120, people used to ring 14 (360's) and 21 (240's) to a 5,040, but would such a performance be attempted to-day?

Question C: There is no objection here if it is an improvement. Mr. Felstead should read what Mr. Davies has to say of Cambridge in 'Surprise Methods.'

Now the last part of Mr. Felstead's letter. Truth is not the only consideration. Many years ago the Central Council laid down certain rules about methods, and we as ringers are wasting our delegates' time and our money if we do not observe these rules and decisions. Please refer back a few months to Mr. Smallwood's letter about the standard of ringing. If puts the matter in a nutshell.—I am, sir, yours faithfully,

Clerical Ringing Week

Members of the Guild of Clerical Ringers met at Leicester, April 5th-9th. The party was made up as in 'The Ringing World,' except for the Revs. J. F. Amies, H. Benson, R. H. Palmer and B. F. Sheppard, who could not come.

A happy start was made on Monday at St. John's, Leicester, on a fine ring of 10 rehung by Taylor. The Press photographer, whose flashlight camera wouldn't work at first, found it impossible to comment as he would have wished.

On Tuesday, after Holy Communion at St. John's, we went to Loughborough, where during a most interesting tour of the foundry we saw several bells cast, tolled the bourdon bell for Liverpool Cathedral with its half-ton temporary clapper, raised the new tenor for Stratford-on-Avon and had the pleasure of sending her over the balance without breaking a stay as she hadn't one, had by Mr. and Mrs. Taylor's kindness a delightful lunch, and showed how fast parsons can be when they like, on the top six in the foundry tower.

After a ring on the fine ten at the Parish Church, on to Quorn, then to Mountsorrel, whose eight hang in a mediæval tower attached to an ancient church restored to look like a Georgian drawing room. Thomas Drake (father of Herbert) was Vicar here. Tea with the present Vicar and his wife, and then back to Leicester and a delightful ring at All Saints', whose ringing chamber has been splendidly done up by Mr. Cattell. We were glad to see several learners here, including a girl of five.

On Wednesday to South Wigston, with its peal boards recording 10,176 Kent Treble Bob Major, in 6 hours 26 minutes, 'which must ever reflect credit on the performers'; also the record 17,194 Double Norwich Major in 10 hours 35 minutes on December 27th, 1904. Despite this encouragement, Bob Major 'went west' after 1½ hours. Meanwhile the non-pealers missed a bus and went to Countesthorpe, seven in a taxi, at funeral pace. After all had rung at All Saints', Wigston, and lunched at South Wigston, the afternoon was spent at Earl Shilton and Barwell (two good eight), then to Hinckley, with a grand eight in a splendid church. Mr. and Mrs. Ballard here gave us a nice tea.

In the evening St. Margaret's, Leicester, was enlivened with a very talkative course of Stedman Cinques—reminiscent of well-known scriptural allusions to the crowd of prophets in the cave, 'great was the company of the preachers,' etc. It was a great pleasure to have Mr., Mrs. and Jill Poole, also the Morris and Ernest with us.

On Thursday a peal of Bob Major was rung at Gilmorton in memory of the Rev. E. S. Powell, and was his own composition. The others rang at Lutterworth and Claybrook Magna. After lunch at Gilmorton, the 'week' finished most pleasantly at Leicester Cathedral, whose fine 13 were greatly enjoyed, and at St. Saviour's, Leicester—a fine modern church, whose Vicar is a keen ringer.

At the business meeting the officers were re-elected as follows: President, the Rev. C. Carew Cox; vice-president, Canon R. F. Wilkinson; hon. secretary, Prebendary E. V. Cox; committee as above, also the Revs. Elliott Wigg and A. G. G. Thurlow. Southampton was chosen as the centre for next year.
