SPLICED SURPRISE MAJOR

A MONGST the many interesting developments of the present century, Spliced Surprise Major ringing must take a foremost place. London Surprise Major used to be the goal of every ringer, but now the most prominent bands do not consider themselves accomplished until they have achieved a peal of Spliced Surprise. The conductor of such a peal has a full-time task: mastery of the composition itself is an intricate mental exercise. His band must be on the alert at every lead-end, awaiting his instructions, be it a change of method, a call, or, as most frequently happens, both. The greatest factor contributing to success is good method ringing between the leads. There is no room for slackness, and thus a first-class team spirit is essential.

The first peal of Spliced Surprise Major ever rung was in two methods-Cambridge and Superlative-in 1924 at Whitley Bay, Northumberland, for the Durham and Newcastle Association, the composition of J. W. Parker, conducted by Joseph A. Gofton. The Rev. H. Law James and Messrs. A. J. Pitman and E. C. S. Turner have, amongst others, turned their attention to this branch of composition, and bands have been found ready to tackle what they have produced. The first peal in four methods was rung in 1927, conducted by A. H. Pulling, and in the years immediately following William Pye and his band rang up to twelve methods in a peal. Not many peals are accomplished in more than four methods, although before the war Mr. S. T. Holt, in Worcestershire, rang up to eight, and Mr. E. C. S. Turner to nine. The Lincoln band rang up to ten, accomplishing this in 1939, when the war put an end to their efforts. Before the war, Mr. H. G. Cashmore and his famous handbell band rang up to six methods-one of the most brilliant performances of all time.

Since the war, two bands have striven to reach the record in Spliced Surprise Major ringing on tower bells—those of Mr. W. F. Judge and Mr. A. J. Freeman. With a peal in sixteen methods in 1947, rung for the Lincoln Diocesan Guild, William Pye's achievement was eclipsed for the first time. The Oxford band have rung a twelvemethod peal twice recently. Now comes Mr. J. A. Freeman with a peal in twenty-two methods, which is the greatest number of Major methods yet rung in a peal. The whole Ringing Exercise will wish to unite in congratulating him and his band on this latest achievement by their Guild.

A LINCOLN ACHIEVEMENT. With regard to the peal of Spliced Surprise Major in 22 methods, rung at Harmston, Lines, on November 27th, I should like to place on record the following facts:—

(a) That I sat in the belfry during the whole of the ringing, and, with the composition before me, checked off every method as

tion before me, checked off every method as rung.

(b) That every lead-end was checked by me and came up according to schedule.

The peal was a good one and, apart from two trips in the second part, only one of which looked serious, a high standard of ringing was maintained throughout.

The Lincoln Spliced band began its activities in 1937, ringing the first peal of Spliced Surprise for the Guild that year with a peal in four methods. By

in four methods. By February, 1939, they had accomplished a peal in 10 methodsonly the second of its kind at the time -when the war interrupted their activities. After the war the same band began practising again, determined to carry this branch of the art to a higher level. After considerable practice, 16 Spliced Surprise Major methods were rung in March, 1947, for the first time. Since then, many nours of practice, intensi-fied since last summer, have been put in in order to achieve the present record.

Great credit is due to Mr. J. A. Freeman who, at 64 years of age, conducted the peal without fault. His enthu-siasm is largely re-sponsible for this latest success. But Spliced Surprise requires the finest team spirit, and this per-

formance is en-hanced by the fact that the band as a whole is not a young one—Mr. F. W. Stokes is 65. I should like to thank the band for the privilege of umpiring the peal, and to offer my congratulations on the occasion of one of the most difficult feats in the art of towerbell ringing.—K. S. B. St. Benet's in Danger

FABIAN STEDMAN'S CHURCH. We have received since our brief announce-ment in our last issue of the danger to St. Benet's tower, Cambridge, additional details of the trouble confronting this church. St. Benet's is the oldest building in Cam-

bridge, and is one of the best examples of late Saxon architecture in England. It is Fabian Stedman's tower. Here he was parish clerk in the 17th century.

The tower was originally covered with a thin coating of plaster, a feature which survived until about ten years ago, when it was removed by the Cambridge Camden Society. The loss of this protection has accelerated the process of decay, and the surface of the tower is now in a serious, even dangerous condition, though the fabric stands firm.

Many of the rag-stones weighing up to 10lb. are loose, particularly those under the parapet, and some, which can be lifted out by hand, constitute a danger to anyone standing underneath. Other defects which will require treatment in quire treatment clude traces of death watch beetle in the timbers above the bell frame.

The tower has been examined by Prof. A. E. Richardson, R.A., and Mr. James Macgregor, head of the University School of Architecture, and their estimate for making the tower safe is nearly £1,400. Towards the cost the Pilgrim Trust, Corpus Christi College and a number of individuals have made contributions, but ap-proximately £500 is still outstanding.

Ringers will remember the great effort made by the Exercise in 1931 to put the bells in order.

The University Guild use these bells regularly for practice during term, and so far the authorities have not called for a cessation of ringing. The hon, treasurer of the repair fund is Mr. T. Whitby, 83, Norwich Street, Cambridge, who appeals for donations.
