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GEORGE WILLIAMS

THE historian invariably prefers a lapse of 20 years to apprise the contribution of an individual to the community or to draw his conclusions to a set of circumstances. With the journalist his writings are generally confined to an expression of the immediate factual incident and the marshalling of facts and emotions as available at the time. Thus, in recording the passing of George Williams, the elements of greatness associated with his very long life have not the benefit of perspective.

In the realm of achievement he certainly earned the title of a great ringer. He had amassed the immense total of 1,508 peals, and the fact that he had called more than 1,000 peals on tower bells tells its own story of amazing accomplishment. Viewed from the varied lists of advanced ringing to-day, his contribution was not exceptional, but of his total there were 475 peals in Surprise methods, and this indicates that in the prime of his life he was in the very forefront as a master of his craft. And his mental faculties remained unimpaired; he stepped quietly across the threshold of the earthly to the spiritual life as a normal process just like going to bed.

This phrase 'stepping quietly' seems in a sense to sum up the life of George Williams. From the formation of the Central Council in 1891 he had enjoyed continuous membership. With Canon Coleridge he saw the birth, growth and development of change ringing on a national foundation. Quietly observant of the trend of decisions, he put into practice the principles enunciated, and in his own county of Hampshire worked diligently for their fulfilment. While he was naturally keen on peal ringing, in no sense could it be said that he neglected the art of teaching, and he had the satisfaction of seeing this work bear excellent results. When he started the county had to be scoured for a Grand-sire Triples band; to-day there are bands of advanced ringers in a number of centres.

'Stepping quietly' in life and character is one of the attributes of spiritual grace. Bellringing to him was not merely a pastime; it was accompanied by an inborn love of the Church. At North Stoneham he added to the beauty of the Church by a beautiful oak screen symbolic of a sense of knowledge that the belfry is not the spiritual centre and that there is a duty entrusted to ringers to enrich by gifts and service other Church activities. It is important to ringers both young and old to retain that true balance in spiritual and temporal things as George Williams followed in his life. Ringing was not the all-absorbing thought; in his locality he gained the respect of the community for his work for the friendly society movement and in local government, and running through his veins he had the Englishman's love of cricket. Thus mingling with the Hampshire earth at North Stoneham are the remains of one who stepped quietly amid a surround of greatness. Ringers in every Guild and Association will honour his name as one of the creators of modern ringing who has set a standard by quiet but purposeful endeavour that has enriched our art.

Mr. W. T. Beeson, of Cranleigh, will receive many congratulations on his 500th peal. His list should make interesting reading.

The peal at Longbridge Deverill, Wiltshire, on January 22nd, was the first by the local Sunday service band and contained four first peals.

A double silver jubilee was associated with the peal of Doubles at Oxendon, Northants—those of the Peterborough Guild and the last rehanging of the bells by John Taylor and Co., Ltd. The old font in the church was of special interest to Mr. Ernest Morris.

Mr. T. E. Sone enquires in connection with the peal at Headcorn, Kent, whether James Bartram rang any of his peals in this tower. The peal is the 50th recorded in the K.C.A. reports.

It was a sad coincidence that the first peal on the restored bells of Christ Church, Ealing, should be in memory of the Vicar (the Rev. A. A. de Vere). At the conclusion of the peal Mrs. de Vere and her sons thanked the ringers individually.

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MR. GEORGE WILLIAMS: HIS LIFE AND PEALS

BURIED NEAR THE TOWER HE LOVED

GEORGE WILLIAMS was born at East Meon, Hampshire, on May 7th, 1857, and was educated at the Dame's School, Corhampton. He was apprenticed to a miller at Droxford and afterwards worked at Exton, Wickham and various mills in the district, before moving to Brighton in the early nineties. He returned to Hampshire in 1905 and was employed as chief clerk at Gaters Mill, West End, until he retired in 1923. He came to reside at Eastleigh in 1930.

It was at Droxford, where his uncle was sexton, that he learnt to handle a bell by raising and lowering the curfew. He soon transferred his affection to the neighbouring tower of Soberton, where the ring of six had been increased to eight. Here there was a band that could struggle through Grandsire Doubles, and with them he had his first lessons in change ringing. At that time he possessed a penny-farthing cycle and often rode to Southampton, a distance of 16 miles each way, in order to ring plain courses of Grandsire Triples. Among his recollections of those days was ringing the half-muffled bells of Holy Rood Church, Southampton, when the body of Livingstone was brought ashore on the last journey to Westminster Abbey.

His first peal, Hoyt's Ten-part of Grandsire Triples, was rung at Soberton in 1884 and was conducted by Mr. S. Brooker, who brought most of the band from Leatherhead. This was the first peal in Hampshire by the Winchester Diocesan Guild, which was formed in 1879. Mr. Williams joined the Guild in the following February. His third peal was also at Soberton in 1885. This he conducted and thus began the long career of one of the most able conductors the Exercise has produced. It was in the same tower that he rang the last of his 1,508 peals—Double Norwich Court Bob Major on May 8th, 1940.

Previous to moving to Brighton Mr. Williams had lived for short periods near Midhurst, Sussex, and Capel, Surrey, where he quickly built up good ringing bands. At Midhurst he trained two complete bands at the same time—his 'second eleven' as he termed them. These ringers included Dr. George, a very great friend, and Mr. W. R. Madgwick, who was killed in an air raid on London.

At Brighton, in company with Mr. Attree, he quickly built up the famous Surprise company that scored many firsts. The Brighton weeks of Surprise peals were something that had not been achieved before. Of this famous band Messrs. George Baker and Frank Bennett are still living at Brighton.

It was largely due to his energy and enthusiasm that ringing in Hampshire occupies its present position. He saw ringing in the area develop from Grandsire Triples to Surprise Royal. Mr. Williams called the first peal in the county in very many methods, and the number of ringers he piloted through their first peal was probably greater than any other conductor. He was secretary of the Winchester District from 1908-1911, general secretary of the Winchester Diocesan Guild 1912-1917, and Ringing Master from 1918-1949. Since 1905 he had missed only one annual general meeting of the Guild.

In the wider field of ringing he was elected a member of the Central Council on its formation in 1891, and had enjoyed a continuous membership, missing only five meetings. From 1891-96 he represented the Winchester Diocesan Guild; 1897-1905 the Sussex County Association; 1906-17 honorary member; 1918-27 Winchester Diocesan Guild; 1928-49 Winchester and Portsmouth Diocesan Guild. He had served on the Peals Analysis Committee. The popularity of ringing tours owes much to his initiative;

Last week we briefly recorded the death of Mr. George Williams and mentioned certain salient features in his life which did much to advance the art of change ringing. We are indebted to Mr. George Pullinger for the fuller account of his life.

he was the forerunner of this pastime and many of his peals were the result of these journeys that took him to all parts of the British Isles.

North Stoneham Church will always be associated with his memory. He joined this band in 1905 and was largely instrumental in raising funds to make a ring of eight in 1909. He gave two trebles in 1932 as a golden wedding gift and erected a beautiful oak screen in 1938 to the memory of his wife. Mrs. Williams died in 1935. She was the first lady to ring in a handbell peal, and to mark that occasion the Editor of 'Bell News' presented Mrs. Williams with a set of 15 handbells. Mrs. Williams rang in two peals of Grandsire Triples in 1897, but never took part in tower ringing.

Although best known as a ringer, Mr. Williams did not shirk from his responsibilities as a member of the community. He was a parish councillor, a volunteer, was a life-long Liberal, being at one time chairman of the West End Liberal Party, and a member of the Central Body of the Hampshire and General Friendly Society.

THE FUNERAL.

There was a large attendance at the funeral service at North Stoneham Parish Church on February 1st. The Rector (the Rev. J. Stranack) officiated, assisted by the Rev. K. W. H. Felstead. Psalm xxiii. and the Nunc Dimittis were sung, Mr. D. Cecil Williams being at the organ. Dear Sir,—Quite recently I was asked to give an opinion of a very old book on the art of change ringing. As I have never seen any of Fabian Stedman's original books, I wonder if you could give me the title of the one in question from the following description.

The size is roughly that of a postcard, bound in real leather; it has 226 pages, the first 14 are missing. The last page is subscribed by F. S.

The contents mention the 'late dreadful fire of London,' 'Muskets' used as illustrating changes, also plain changes, cross peals, and among others are London Paradox, Phoenix, London Pleasure, Mr. Tending's peal (call'd Grand Paradox, a cure for Melancholly), The Experiment, The Wild Goose Chase, Cambridge peals by Mr. S. S., My Honey, The Whirligigge, Jack on Both sides, Jumping doubles, The Grand Experiment.

Stedman's Principle does not seem to be mentioned in the book, so I wondered if it is a copy of 'Tintinnologia.' The book is not in a bad condition. In places the changes have been ticked off, also there is one alteration in ink which has faded. There are also two or three names written in ink, now almost faded out, on the last page, which has an 'errata' note printed on it.

Is the book of any value or are there many of them still in existence? The book in question is not in my possession, but it is being well looked after.—Yours faithfully,

University of Bristol Society

This Society held its first reunion ringing afternoon and dinner in Bristol on January 29th. The Society was formed in 1943, while tower bells were still banned, Bristol being the first provincial University to have a Change Ringing Society. The first peal scored by the Society was at Wincanton in 1947 and was conducted by Dr. John Hatcher.

This year the Society is far stronger than ever before, and rings regularly at St. Michael's (6) and All Saints' (8).

Old members attended from many parts of the country, and visitors from the Bristol City Branch of the Gloucester and Bristol Association, from the Bath and Wells Association and from London and Reading Universities were present.

Towers visited in the afternoon were the Lord Mayor's Chapel (6), All Saints' (8), St. Stephen's (10) and St. Mary Redcliffe (12). Ringing ranged from rounds to Cambridge Major and Stedman Cinques, the last touch of the day being the service touch of Stedman Triples at All Saints'.

The service, conducted by the Rev. Arthur Roberts, was greatly appreciated, especially his address, which was on different lines to the sermons one usually hears at ringing services.

Dinner was at the Full Moon Hotel, Stokes Croft, Dr. S. H. Piper, the president, being in the chair. It was felt that the whole day, both in the towers and at the dinner, was a great success, and it is hoped that this function will become an annual affair.

SHROPSHIRE ASSOCIATION

The annual general meeting of the Association was held in Shrewsbury on January 22nd. Ringing commenced at St. Chad's at 2.30 p.m., and after a rope had broken at the second pull, continued until 4, when a service was held in St. Aidan's chapel, conducted by the Vicar, the Rev. F. T. Horan. The party then went down to the Parish Hall, where 38 members sat down to an enjoyable tea.

St. Mary's was unfortunately unavailable owing to repairs to the steeple, and ringing was again at St. Chad's in the evening. Methods rung included Grandsire Caters and Cinques, Kent Treble Bob, Little and Plain Bob Royal, Double Norwich and Superlative Major on the back eight.

QUEENSBURY BELLS

Dear Sir,—With reference to question four of the Christmas Quiz, Mr. George Grills states that the bell frame of Brentor Parish Church is 1,155ft. above sea level, and asks the height of the bells of Holy Trinity Parish Church, Queensbury, near Bradford.

The answer to this is that the bell frame is 1,190ft. above sea level. This figure was given a few years ago in 'The Ringing World,' and as it was not subsequently challenged we ringers at Queensbury felt we had a claim to ring on the highest hung bells in England.

It does seem, however, that the height at Brentor is very close to the one at Queensbury. May I also thank 'Kewsett' for his Christmas Quiz and look forward to receiving another instalment next Christmas.—Yours sincerely,

A NOTE ON METHOD STRUCTURE

(Continued from page 62.)

FORMULA FOR LONDON.

1. A hunt-controlled method constructed on the Treble Bob principle and having one hunt-controlling bell, the treble.

2. A single method (as distinct from a double method) and having differently-positioned pivot-places at the Grid-link and Grid-junction.

3. Pivot places:—

Full-lead (Grid-link) Seconds, by a bell hunting UP to this place and DOWN from it; with adjacent thirds, above and below, by two other bells.

Half-lead (Grid-junction) 'Fourths,' by a bell hunting UP to this place and DOWN from it; with adjacent 'thirds,' above and below, by two other bells.

4. Grid-sections at cone axes:—

In both front and back cones, all work in these two axial sections, *beyond* the pivot place in each case, is plain hunting reversed, the limits of which respectively are set by the path of the pivot-bell in the *front* cone, and by the paths of the adjacent place-making bells in the *back* cone. *There is nothing else in these parts.* Introduction of any variation is foreign to London.

5. Front-cone work, other than as in 4 above:—

Places, which are made *inside* this cone, 'against' the hunt-bell's path, throughout, *except in the 'A' columns of the grid.**

6. Back-cone work, other than as in 4 above:—

Work as determined by the hunt-bell, that is, dodge when she dodges, and plain hunt when she plain hunts, i.e., when she is ending her work in one grid-section and entering her work in the ensuing one.

* Note. — For lack of space, grid-column nomenclature was not fully developed in previous article; but the columns of a Maximus grid, for example, are: Ao Ae Bo Be Co Ce Xo Xe Yo Ye Zo Ze.

The student will find that the foregoing defines completely the London method as exemplified in Minor and Major. Our promise, in the previous article, to produce, from the grid patterns of London Minor or Major, an identical pattern for London Royal, is now due for redemption. Starting with a Minor grid, and following the formula only, the student will be able to produce London Minor. Proceeding with a Major Grid he will be able to build up London Major. In building up these grid patterns squared paper, of course, will be used, and the student may first draw a rectangle on the paper, to represent the boundary of the grid. The treble's zig-zag path should then be drawn in red crayon or ink. The paths of all other bells may then be filled in, *by lines not figures*, so as to facilitate rapid recognition and checking of the appropriate features of the grid patterns. Pencil and rubber are advised for this lining-in so as to correct any errors made. Now comes the crux of this whole matter! Following on with grids appropriate for the Royal and Maximus, the London grid pattern may instantly be built up from the formula, and all patterns from Minor upwards to the Maximus will appear identical in structure. The majority of ringers may hardly credit this. They should try it! Half-grids, of course, are all that are necessary, to prove formulaic production of these 'Ideal' London grid-patterns.

Qualification, however, is needed.

Tracing down the lines of the pattern to identify the bells at the grid-junction, and

then transposing to produce the grid-link rows and hence the plain course, the student will find these 'ideal' London patterns in Royal and Maximus will not give the full plain course: they both run short courses only, the half-lead pivot bell in Royal being '3,' and that in Maximus being '2.' Noting that in Minor and in Major the half-lead pivot bell is consistently the penultimate bell at the lead-head: i.e., from rounds, in Minor it is '5' and in 'Major' it is '7,' the student may conclude that in Royal it should be '9.' (Preserving the progression.) Indeed, he will find that he can, by introducing the essential correlating 'Stats' (see para. 7 of the formula, below) produce quite a good version of Royal, with '9' as the half-lead pivot bell in its proper pivot-place, that is, 4ths from treble. This gives the 'natural' lead-head which is in the 'associated' order with those in the plain courses of Minor and Major. But, the internal structure of the London Grid-pattern is necessarily disturbed, and, the 9th bell is separated from the other heavy bells in this first lead of the plain course. The 9th can be kept behind, however, and still made to pivot; but not in the true London position, i.e., not '4ths' from the treble's lie, but '2nds'! This penultimate place is, of course, quite foreign to the London method, as is also the consequent non-London pattern in the rest of this axial grid-section of the front cone. But, if the truth must be told, it is by such adulterations that the versions hitherto published have been produced. The student may judge for himself how right the critics are that, so far, we have not seen true London Royal, and that the Maximus version with '11' coming down from behind to the half-lead pivot (although in '4ths') eliminates the essential London work as in item 3 of the Formula. This formula we must now complete. (To be concluded.)
