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#### **ENTHUSIASM**

THE people who really live are the enthusiastic; they are the salt of the earth. But be enthusiastic about a worth-while object. There is the mass enthusiasm of the football field; we have known ringers 'cut' a Saturday afternoon meeting and arrange for their peals at other times than when 'the City' is playing at home. And now at the end of the season, and relegation is in prospect, the futility of it all is apparent. Their enthusiasm did not win through, although they had their enjoyment; they cheered or groaned their team into the Third Division. Much of life's enthusiasms are individualistic in character or personal. Some might ridicule an enthusiasm for measuring tenor bells, or others who exert their mental faculties in endeavouring to present a proof that for its logic would have satisfied Euclid of old, as to the way a method should be extended. Do not belittle such efforts: they are great things to the individual concerned and deserve to be treated with respect.

When the qualities of enthusiasm and leadership are coupled together then is the keenness transmitted to others and something purposeful is accomplished. Our main news story this week deals with the restoration of Hawley bells. Critics might regard the Editor as lacking in a sense of proportion in giving so much space to a £450 job, when contracts exceeding four figures are at times summarily dismissed in 400 words. Why make a song about this village of 2,000 souls on the borders of Surrey, Hants and Berks?

Behind this village enterprise there was the unbounded enthusiasm of one man. He came to the village and found the bells in a deplorable condition; he was only an average ringer and would not write of his exasperation to the Editor if he was described as being among 'the lesser brethren.' As a Vicar, however, he realised the place of bells in the life of the Church, and as a ringer he loved bells, knew of the thrill of ringing in a strange belfry and the good fellowship of ringers.

To his parishioners he talked bells and talked the subject with enthusiasm, with the result that within a year of his induction he had the satisfaction of having a ring of bells fit for any country parish and more than twenty of his congregation in various stages of initiation into the art of change ringing.

Hawley people have made a fine start, and we trust that the name of this village will figure frequently in our performance columns. The next stage will be harder—the art of ringing the bells well. This is where the initial enthusiasm is tested; some of the leader's zeal will probably fall on stony ground, but it is to be hoped that the greater part has fallen on good earth and will yield its appropriate harvest. Good luck to the new band at Hawley!

# THE WHITECHAPEL BELL FOUNDRY

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#### WHEN THE PARSON'S A RINGER: HAWLEY'S EXAMPLE

FOR many years the bells of Hawley Parish Church have been silent and, apart from the rooks and jackdaws, few people found their way into the belfry, except for the oldest inhabitant who occasionally plodded into the tower to grease everything in sight, in his efforts to persuade some to enter into the bearings. The Farnborough band rang there on Victory Day, and the Farnham Dis-trict have tried practices, but the 'go' of the bells was sufficient to keep most people away, so that, for Farnham, the tower was the one black spot in the district, the only one where there was no Sunday ringing.

The bells are a ring of eight, six installed in 1881, and two trebles added ten years later. In April, 1948, the Rev. Kenneth C. Davis was inducted into the living, so once again the 162 cwt. tenor and his seven sisters pealed out over the lovely countryside, just bursting

holding the treble, second and third, from wandering around the tower; to arrange for the clappers to hit the bell in the correct place and not almost at right angles to it; place and not almost at right angles to it; ball bearings were needed throughout; it had been difficult for the treble and second to dodge in 6-7 because the swing of the tenor caused the second to drop. These troubles, to quote only a few, were to be cured.

Vicar and villagers, Church Council and choir, ringers and not forgetting the oldest inhabitant, all combined to raise the money. When it is realised that there are less than 2,000 people in Hawley, that the money had to

2,000 people in Hawley, that the money had to be raised in addition to the normal church finances, and that there were no donations of more than £5, then one can realise the full extent of the effort.

In January, Messrs. Gillett and Johnston took possession of the belfry, to the disgust

During the second hymn, Vicar and choir processed towards the belfry. The Vicar and the ringers of the choir, together with other members of the Hawley band, ascended to the ringing chamber, where the Ringing Master and secretary of the Farnham District were waiting to receive them.

The ropes were formally handed back to the Vicar by Mr. Newsom, for Messrs. Gillett and Johnston, and Rev. Davis rededicated his bells. The Hawley band then rang a few rounds (the local paper described them as 'changes,' which cannot be truthfully denied!)

to christen the bells.

In his address, the Vicar spoke of the spirit of co-operation which had enabled the repairs to be carried out. He likened bellringing to life, for in both all must pull their weight to achieve harmony. He was proud to say that every one of his ringers was also a keen



with the first flush of spring. It seemed that this glorious spring day was to be the start of a fresh lease of life for Hawley, as it was known throughout the village that the Rev. Davis was an enthusiastic ringer, and that now he had at least achieved one of his ambitions, to be Vicar of a church with bells.

Mr. Davis set to work in his new living with enthusiasm. The church became full for all services. Young and old came to like this man, who was never still, but who always had a cheery word for all, and a special corner in his heart for anyone who might be a prospective bellringer. So there came back to his church there ringers of presward days to his church three ringers of pre-war days and over twenty others who were fired by their Vicar's enthusiasm, to learn to ring the bells. With the help of a few others from surrounding towers, they learned to ring and call changes despite the great difficulties of the 'go' of the bells. so that, within a month of his induction the Rev. Davis had opened a fund for the restoration

Davis had opened a fund for the restoration of his bells, and he had advice from the arms prepared to do the work. Eventually it was decided to entrust the job to Messrs. Gillett and Johnston, at a cost of £450.

It was necessary to stop the top frame,

of the jackdaws, who found that their housing efforts were not appreciated; in fact, the tower captain took down twelve barrowloads

of sticks and rubbish.

'When will they be ready?', everyone asked. 'March 19th,' said the Vicar, 'that must be the day.'

The great day approached. What would the bells be like now? Would they still be 'lumpy' and difficult? What about that dodging in 6-7? Would the fourth sally still defy all efforts of the ringer to catch it? We should soon know.

The rededication was made during even-song, conducted by the Rev. Davis, and attended by nearly 130 ringers and friends, and before a congregation of over 300, mostly from the village.

#### TENORS SIZE AND WEIGHT LITTLE RELATIONSHIP.

Dear Sir,—It was with some amusement that I read Mr. Frank Warrington's letter. He would be well advised to reread it, and the would be well advised to reread it, and then ask if its contents do not befit himself in every degree? I refer in particular to his remark, 'It is easy to make errors by guess-ing the weights of tenors.' That is exactly what Mr. Warrington did in reference to Yax-ley and St. Mary's, Peterborough—he guessed them! He could easily have found the exact weights had he taken the trouble, both are so well known.

If he looks up my previous letter as regards Eynesbury he will see the words, 'I put it nearer 9 cwt. than 14' are used, therefore in this case the actual weight is not guessed as

he tries to assert.

Contrary to this, Mr. Warrington causes to be printed an actual weight, going on the assumption that because Yaxley tenor is 44in. it is bound to be 16cwt., and Eynesbury, 43in., 15 cwt., which incidentally has 'grown' yet another cwt. since the report of his peal, which he then gave as 14 cwt.

Whilst I agree with Mr. Warrington that one cannot come to a conclusion as to actual weight by ringing or the 'go' of a bell, experience tells me that neither must one come to a conclusion of actual weight (or even appeared to a conclusion of actual weight (or even appeared to the sound). proximate weight) by diameter at the sound bow. I fail to see where Mr. Warrington is an authority on weight by measurement at the sound bow, which proves nothing, any more than his boasts of having rung tenors from 41 to 54 cwt. (a claim which I can make myself-Brockenhurst and Bow). It is a mistake also for one to think (as some do) because one can ring a multiplication of Surprise methods they are impregnable on every other issue of bells. And the pitch of a bell is also no guide, as will be noticed by a few

instances here given, which will no doubt set the infallible Mr. Warrington a puzzler:—

#### **OBITUARY**

MR. CHARLES MARSHALL.

'The death by accident of Mr. Charles Marshall at the age of 45 will be read with profound regret by his many friends inside and outside of his own county. Charlie (among his friends) had just recovered from a severe illness, which had kept him indisposed for some 15 weeks having recommended his work. some 15 weeks, having recommenced his work on the Monday previous to his death.

He was, and had been for years, a stalwart of the St. Thomas', South Wigston, belfry. A grand personality and ringer and a very keen Guild member, rarely did he miss a district

As secretary of the St. Thomas' band he was responsible for the organising of many very enjoyable social and ringing tours. Ringing without doubt was his chief hobby, and his greatest pleasure was to take part in peal attempts both on tower bells and handbells. A 'solid' peal ringer, he had rung in the region of 150 peals, including 70 handbell peals during the past two years.

Without doubt Charles Marshall's greatest moment in the world of peal ringing was at hand when he called 'That's all' to a peal of Double Norwich that he conducted on the occasion of their Majesties' Silver Wedding anniversary. This peal was scored by an entirely local band, the first local in such a method to be rung on St. Thomas' bells, thanks to his

conducting efforts.

The interment took place at Wigston on April 5th, and the service at St. Thomas' was attended by a large number of people. Among the ringers paying tribute, apart from the local band, were Mr. and Mrs. H. J. Poole, Miss Jill Poole, Mr. Ernest Morris, Mr. J. Carter, Mr. H. Wayne and Mr. S. Cheney. The bells were rung half-muffled prior to the cortege entering the church, and handbells were rung by members of the local company at the rung by members of the local company at the graveside. As a last tribute a really well-struck peal of Grandsire Triples was rung half-muffled in the late afternoon and evening.

The passing of such a ringer as Charles Marshall, in such a tragic way, leaves the belfry of St. Thomas', South Wigston, so very much poorer, and indeed the Exercise in general has lost an ever present Sunday service ringer. He leaves a widow and two sons, one of whom has taken to his father's hobby. May he attain the heights as a ringer and conductor.

#### MR. JOSEPH POTTER.

are rhymed as follows:

Pistvll Rhaiader and Wrexham steeple. Snowdon's mountain without its people; Overton Yewtrees, St. Winifred Wells,

Llangollen Bridge and Gresford Bells.
The church has a close connection with
Yale University, in Connecticut, U.S.A., as
Elihu Yale, founder of the famous university, is buried in Wrexham parish churchyard, and became a mecca for American soldiers during the war. Many of them must have found the church tower very familiar, as Yale Univer-sity is built as an exact replica of it, and incorsty is built as an exact replice of 11, and incorporated at its base is a stone from the original Wrexham tower. The tercentenary of Elihu Yale's birth occurs on Tuesday, April 5th.
