ENTHUSIASM

THE people who really live are the enthusiastic; they are the salt of the earth. But be enthusiastic about a worth-while object. There is the mass enthusiasm of the football field; we have known ringers 'cut' a Saturday afternoon meeting and arrange for their peals at other times than when 'the City' is playing at home. And now at the end of the season, and relegation is in prospect, the futility of it all is apparent. Their enthusiasm did not win through, although they had their enjoyment; they cheered or groaned their team into the Third Division. Much of life's enthusiasms are individualistic in character or personal. Some might ridicule an enthusiasm for measuring tenor bells, or others who exert their mental faculties in endeavouring to present a proof that for its logic would have satisfied Euclid of old, as to the way a method should be extended. Do not belittle such efforts: they are great things to the individual concerned and deserve to be treated with respect.

When the qualities of enthusiasm and leadership are coupled together then is the keenness transmitted to others and something purposeful is accomplished. Our main news story this week deals with the restoration of Hawley bells. Critics might regard the Editor as lacking in a sense of proportion in giving so much space to a £450 job, when contracts exceeding four figures are at times summarily dismissed in 400 words. Why make a song about this village of 2,000 souls on the borders of Surrey, Hants and Berks?

Behind this village enterprise there was the unbounded enthusiasm of one man. He came to the village and found the bells in a deplorable condition; he was only an average ringer and would not write of his exasperation to the Editor if he was described as being among 'the lesser brethren.' As a Vicar, however, he realised the place of bells in the life of the Church, and as a ringer he loved bells, knew of the thrill of ringing in a strange belfry and the good fellowship of ringers.

To his parishioners he talked bells and talked the subject with enthusiasm, with the result that within a year of his induction he had the satisfaction of having a ring of bells fit for any country parish and more than twenty of his congregation in various stages of initiation into the art of change ringing.

Hawley people have made a fine start, and we trust that the name of this village will figure frequently in our performance columns. The next stage will be harder—the art of ringing the bells well. This is where the initial enthusiasm is tested; some of the leader's zeal will probably fall on stony ground, but it is to be hoped that the greater part has fallen on good earth and will yield its appropriate harvest. Good luck to the new band at Hawley!

WHEN THE PARSON'S A RINGER: HAWLEY'S EXAMPLE

FOR many years the bells of Hawley Parish Church have been silent and, apart from the rooks and jackdaws, few people found their way into the belfry, except for the oldest inhabitant who occasionally plodded into the tower to grease everything in sight, in his efforts to persuade some to enter into the bearings. The Farnborough band rang there on Victory Day, and the Farnham District have tried practices, but the 'go' of the bells was sufficient to keep most people away, so that, for Farnham, the tower was the one black spot in the district, the only one where there was no Sunday ringing.

The bells are a ring of eight, six installed in 1881, and two trebles added ten years later.

In April, 1948, the Rev. Kenneth C. Davis was inducted into the living, so once again the 16½ cwt. tenor and his seven sisters pealed out over the lovely countryside, just bursting

holding the treble, second and third, from wandering around the tower; to arrange for the clappers to hit the bell in the correct place and not almost at right angles to it; ball bearings were needed throughout; it had been difficult for the treble and second to dodge in 6-7 because the swing of the tenor caused the second to drop. These troubles, to quote only a few, were to be cured.

Vicar and villagers, Church Council and choir, ringers and not forgetting the oldest inhabitant, all combined to raise the money. When it is realised that there are less than 2,000 people in Hawley, that the money had to be raised in addition to the normal church finances, and that there were no donations of more than £5, then one can realise the full extent of the effort.

In January, Messrs. Gillett and Johnston took possession of the belfry, to the disgust

During the second hymn, Vicar and choir processed towards the belfry. The Vicar and the ringers of the choir, together with other members of the Hawley band, ascended to the ringing chamber, where the Ringing Master and secretary of the Farnham District were waiting to receive them.

The ropes were formally handed back to the Vicar by Mr. Newsom, for Messrs. Gillett and Johnston, and Rev. Davis rededicated his bells. The Hawley band then rang a few rounds (the local paper described them as 'changes,' which cannot be truthfully denied!) to christen the bells.

In his address, the Vicar spoke of the spirit of co-operation which had enabled the repairs to be carried out. He likened bellringing to life, for in both all must pull their weight to achieve harmony. He was proud to say that every one of his ringers was also a keen

with the first flush of spring. It seemed that this glorious spring day was to be the start of a fresh lease of life for Hawley, as it was known throughout the village that the Rev. Davis was an enthusiastic ringer, and that now he had at least achieved one of his ambitions, to be Vicar of a church with bells.

Mr. Davis set to work in his new living with enthusiasm. The church became full for all services. Young and old came to like this man, who was never still, but who always had a cheery word for all, and a special corner in his heart for anyone who might be a prospective bellringer. So there came back to his church three ringers of pre-war days and over twenty others who were fired by their Vicar's enthusiasm, to learn to ring the bells. With the help of a few others from surrounding towers, they learned to ring rounds and call changes despite the great difficulties of the 'go' of the bells, so that, once more, Hawley was in the ringing news.

Within a month of his induction the Rev. Davis had opened a fund for the restoration of his bells, and he had advice from the firms prepared to do the work. Eventually it was decided to entrust the job to Messrs. Gillett and Johnston, at a cost of £450.

It was necessary to stop the top frame,

of the jackdaws, who found that their housing efforts were not appreciated; in fact, the tower captain took down twelve barrowloads of sticks and rubbish.

'When will they be ready?', everyone asked. 'March 19th,' said the Vicar, 'that must be the day.'

The great day approached. What would the bells be like now? Would they still be 'lumpy' and difficult? What about that dodging in 6-7? Would the fourth sally still defy all efforts of the ringer to catch it? We should soon know.

The rededication was made during evening-song, conducted by the Rev. Davis, and attended by nearly 130 ringers and friends, and before a congregation of over 300, mostly from the village.

churchgoer; some were in the choir, some on the Church Council.

After the service, the first touch—of Stedman—was rung by officers of the Guildford Diocesan Guild.

About 120 sat down to an excellent tea served by the ringers' wives in the Village Hall, where the Vicar and Mrs. Davis together cut a large iced cake, inscribed 'Rededication of Hawley Church Bells, March 19th, 1949,' an inscription which was quickly consumed but not forgotten.

The Farnham District Ringing Master, Mr. C. W. Denyer, expressed his satisfaction at the excellent work carried out by Messrs. Gillett and Johnston. Mr. Denyer proposed a hearty vote of thanks to Rev. Davis, to Mr. and Mrs. Maule (the captain and secretary of the Hawley band), and to all the Hawley ringers for the way in which they had worked for their tower.

'During the evening the bells were ringing merrily to a variety of methods, and the day concluded with a social evening in the Village Hall.

Hawley bells will now be ringing for Sunday services and for practice on Wednesdays, when the Rev. Davis will welcome anyone who cares to ring.

HARRISON'S FOUNDRY

Dear Sir,—May I add a further note to the interesting letter by Mr. Shuttleworth which appeared in the issue of April 8th.

The period in question, 1789-1833, applies only to bells in Lincolnshire churches, which were founded at the Harrisons' Barton foundry.

The bells of St. Michael's, Hawkhead, were undoubtedly cast by the first James Harrison. He would be assisted by his son Henry, as he died in the following year (1766). The work would be done at Barrow-on-Humber, about three miles from Barton, for it was not until 1770 that Henry started his work at Barton.

May I take this opportunity of mentioning that 'Barton Bells' costs 3s. plus postage, and not 3s. 6d. as previously stated. Also I wish to thank the Editor and many readers for their kind interest in my book.—Yours faithfully, W. O. VARAH.

A company of 50 friends gathered for tea and the meeting, during which Mr. Rowley was presented with a clock, a token of the appreciation in which he is held by the Vicar, the churchwardens and his fellow-ringers. Mr. Rowley, who is 81, is still very active, and on April 5th participated in 2,520 Minor. He was a founder member of the Barnsley and District Society in 1909.

TENORS SIZE AND WEIGHT
LITTLE RELATIONSHIP.

Dear Sir,—It was with some amusement that I read Mr. Frank Warrington's letter. He would be well advised to reread it, and then ask if its contents do not befit himself in every degree? I refer in particular to his remark, 'It is easy to make errors by guessing the weights of tenors.' That is exactly what Mr. Warrington did in reference to Yaxley and St. Mary's, Peterborough—he guessed them! He could easily have found the exact weights had he taken the trouble, both are so well known.

If he looks up my previous letter as regards Eynesbury he will see the words, 'I put it nearer 9 cwt. than 14' are used, therefore in this case the actual weight is not guessed as he tries to assert.

Contrary to this, Mr. Warrington causes to be printed an actual weight, going on the assumption that because Yaxley tenor is 44in. it is bound to be 16cwt., and Eynesbury, 43in., 15 cwt., which incidentally has 'grown' yet another cwt. since the report of his peal, which he then gave as 14 cwt.

Whilst I agree with Mr. Warrington that one cannot come to a conclusion as to actual weight by ringing or the 'go' of a bell, experience tells me that neither must one come to a conclusion of actual weight (or even approximate weight) by diameter at the sound bow. I fail to see where Mr. Warrington is an authority on weight by measurement at the sound bow, which proves nothing, any more than his boasts of having rung tenors from 4½ to 54 cwt. (a claim which I can make myself—Brokenhurst and Bow). It is a mistake also for one to think (as some do) that because one can ring a multiplication of Surprise methods they are impregnable on every other issue of bells. And the pitch of a bell is also no guide, as will be noticed by a few instances here given, which will no doubt set the infallible Mr. Warrington's a puzzler:—

All Saints', Northampton, 52in., 21cwt. 1qr. 10lb.; Kettering, 52in., 23cwt. 1qr. 4lb.; against which is Oakham, 49in., 24cwt. 2qr. 9lb., and Hanslope, 49in., 22cwt. 8lb.; Higham Ferrers, 50in., 22cwt. 3qr. 17lb., against which is Rothwell, 50½in., 21cwt. 3lb., and Castle Abbey, 50½in., 19cwt. 2qr. 24lb.; Tichmarsh, 46in., 17cwt. 3qr. 22lb., against which is Claybrook, 46in., 13cwt. 3qr. 7lb., and Wootton, Northants, 46in., 13cwt. 2qr. 21lb.; Badby, 45½in., 17cwt., against which is Long Buckby, 45in., 15cwt. 1qr. 27lb., and Walgrave, 45in., 13cwt. 2qr. 8lb.; St. Peter's, Northampton, 43½in., 12cwt. 2qr., against which is Pattishall, 40½in., 12cwt. 2qr. 12lb.; Weekley, 37in., 8cwt. 10lb., against which is Stoke Albany, 37in., 10cwt. 5lb.

And here is an even wider variation: Whiston, Northants, 42½in., 15cwt. 4lb.; Welford, 42in., 12cwt. 1qr. 26lb.; Naseby, 42½in., 12cwt. 3qr. 19lb.; Piddington, 42in., 11cwt. 1qr. 6lb.; Orlingbury, 42½in., 10cwt. 3qr. 8lb.

Now we come to pitch. Each of the following are in key E flat: St. Saviour's, Leicester, 25cwt. 3qr. 12lb.; All Saints', Northampton, 21cwt. 1qr. 10lb.; Castle Ashby, 18cwt. 2qr. 24lb.; Claybrook, 13cwt. 3qr. 7lb.; and Wootton, Northants, 13cwt. 2qr. 21lb. This last tower I would like Mr. Warrington to visit. He'd say, 'Not only does the tenor sound like a ton but rings like a ton.' Tenors in D: Birmingham Cathedral, 31cwt. 21lb.; Olney, 25cwt.; Coalbrookdale, 19cwt. Tenors in F sharp: Empingham, 15cwt. 2qr. 8lb.; Hazelbeech, 15cwt. 12lb.; St. Sepulchre's, Northampton, 14cwt. 3qr. 7lb.; Welford, 12cwt. 1qr. 28lb.; Burton Latimer, 10cwt. 3lb.; Sharnbrook, 9cwt. 3qr. Similar instances apply in other keys. If so, how does Mr. Warrington account for these variations, especially between Whiston and Orlingbury tenors on the question of measurement? P. AMOS.

OBITUARY

MR. CHARLES MARSHALL.

The death by accident of Mr. Charles Marshall at the age of 45 will be read with profound regret by his many friends inside and outside of his own county. Charlie (among his friends) had just recovered from a severe illness, which had kept him indisposed for some 15 weeks, having recommenced his work on the Monday previous to his death.

He was, and had been for years, a stalwart of the St. Thomas', South Wigston, belfry. A grand personality and ringer and a very keen Guild member, rarely did he miss a district meeting.

As secretary of the St. Thomas' band he was responsible for the organising of many very enjoyable social and ringing tours. Ringing without doubt was his chief hobby, and his greatest pleasure was to take part in peal attempts both on tower bells and handbells. A 'solid' peal ringer, he had rung in the region of 150 peals, including 70 handbell peals during the past two years.

Without doubt Charles Marshall's greatest moment in the world of peal ringing was at hand when he called 'That's all' to a peal of Double Norwich that he conducted on the occasion of their Majesties' Silver Wedding anniversary. This peal was scored by an entirely local band, the first local in such a method to be rung on St. Thomas' bells, thanks to his conducting efforts.

The interment took place at Wigston on April 5th, and the service at St. Thomas' was attended by a large number of people. Among the ringers paying tribute, apart from the local band, were Mr. and Mrs. H. J. Poole, Miss Jill Poole, Mr. Ernest Morris, Mr. J. Carter, Mr. H. Wayne and Mr. S. Cheney. The bells were rung half-muffled prior to the cortege entering the church, and handbells were rung by members of the local company at the graveside. As a last tribute a really well-struck peal of Grandsire Triples was rung half-muffled in the late afternoon and evening.

The passing of such a ringer as Charles Marshall, in such a tragic way, leaves the belfry of St. Thomas', South Wigston, so very much poorer, and indeed the Exercise in general has lost an ever present Sunday service ringer. He leaves a widow and two sons, one of whom has taken to his father's hobby. May he attain the heights as a ringer and conductor. W. A. RIDDINGTON.

MR. JOSEPH POTTER.

News has been received of the death of Mr. Joseph Potter, of Parkersburg, U.S.A., at the age of 79 years. A former conductor of the Walkden (Lancs) band, he went to U.S.A. in 1906. He joined the Lancashire Association in 1888 and had rung 104 peals for the Lancashire Association. He died on March 30th and was buried at the Olivet Cemetery on April 1st. He leaves two sons and one daughter.

MR. R. L. PATTERSON.

Mr. Robert Leonard Patterson, captain of the St. Ignatius' Bellringers' Guild, Sunderland, died on April 13th, at the age of 68. He had been in failing health for some time and the last occasion on which he rang a bell was on Christmas morning, 1948.

Mr. Patterson was the only surviving founder member of the St. Ignatius' Guild, he having joined on May 3rd, 1898, when it was first formed. He succeeded the late Joseph W. Parker as captain on June 2nd, 1947, and they were life-long friends.

From 1945 to 1947 he was president of the Durham and Newcastle Diocesan Association and was a vice-president for many years before that. He had 101 peals to his credit, 14 of which he conducted.

The funeral took place on Easter Monday.

Dedications

BUCKERELL, DEVON.

The picturesque village of Buckerell, on the northern slope of the Otter Valley overlooking Ottery St. Mary, had its war memorial, a new treble bell, making a ring of six, dedicated on April 9th.

Touques of Grandisire, Stedman, Bob Minor and Kent were rung. The fifth and tenor (weight 8 cwt. 1 qr. 4 lb.) are believed to be from Exeter Foundry of Roger or Robert Morton.

MEOPHAM, KENT.

Five months for an idea to be mooted and brought to a successful conclusion must surely be a record. Such a feat has been accomplished at the Church of St. John the Baptist, Meopham, Kent, by the Vicar, the Rev. V. S. Nicholls. This church possessed a ring of six bells which sadly needed rechanging, and on the call for assistance, Mrs. F. E. Worthington, wife of the churchwarden, kindly offered to bear the whole of the expense of the re-hanging and in addition give two new trebles to complete the octave.

The work was entrusted to Messrs. Gillett and Johnston, who quarter turned, tuned and relung the old six and added the new bells in an iron frame.

The dedication service, which unfortunately clashed with a meeting of the Rochester District at Cobham, two miles away, was held on April 9th.

This grand old church, which had been renovated and redecorated throughout, was filled with parishioners and friends, and the service was conducted by the Vicar.

The Dean of Rochester, the Very Rev. T. Orick, Chaplain to the King, and patron of the living, gave the address and dedicated the bells. He paid tribute to the work of the Vicar and also spoke of the service that ringers were rendering the Church.

As the local ringers were not sufficiently advanced, the ringing during the service was done by a band from Milton and Gravesend, arranged by Mr. F. M. Mitchell, hon. treasurer of the Kent Association.

After the service the ringing continued until 9.30, and Mr. Bert Newsom, the representative of Messrs. Gillett and Johnston, was congratulated on the way the work had been carried out.

A PRESENTATION

Ringers from Norfolk, Suffolk and Essex assembled at Diss on April 2nd, when a presentation was made to Mr. and Mrs. Eric G. Bennett to mark the occasion of their marriage at Blo' Norton. The gift, an electric kettle, was presented to them by Miss Kathleen Harrison.

Mr. C. J. More, Ringing Master at Diss, presided and handed them an address and list of donors. He spoke of the valued service Mr. Bennett had given to the Norwich Diocesan Association. Mr. A. G. Harrison, branch secretary, South Norfolk, endorsed his remarks and referred to Mr. Bennett's long association with the Diss ringers and his popularity with the Suffolk Guild. Both Mr. and Mrs. Bennett suitably replied.

Wrexham Combined Meeting

Over forty ringers attended a combined meeting of the North Wales Association and the Chester Branch of the Chester Guild, held at Wrexham on March 26th. Among those present were Mr. A. J. Hughes, Bangor, and Mr. James Swindley, Chester, whom it was good to see are both recovering after a serious illness.

At the service which followed an hour's ringing the Vicar, Canon Robert Davies, gave a very interesting address about the parish church, which was much appreciated. He said that the present church was finished in 1472, and was the third structure to be built on the site. The first was blown down in a gale in 1331, and the second was destroyed by fire in 1457.

The tower, which is a fine example of perpendicular architecture, is 135ft. high, and the exterior is ornamented with sculptured life-size figures of thirty saints, among whom is St. Giles, to whom the church is dedicated. It is one of the seven wonders of Wales, which are rhymed as follows:—

Pistyll Rhaiader and Wrexham steeple,
Snowdon's mountain without its people;
Overton Yewtrees, St. Winifred Wells,
Llangollen Bridge and Gresford Bells.

The church has a close connection with Yale University, in Connecticut, U.S.A., as Elihu Yale, founder of the famous university, is buried in Wrexham parish churchyard, and became a mecca for American soldiers during the war. Many of them must have found the church tower very familiar, as Yale University is built as an exact replica of it, and incorporated at its base is a stone from the original Wrexham tower. The centenary of Elihu Yale's birth occurs on Tuesday, April 5th.

At the tea which followed the service, Mr. G. R. Griffiths, Chester, proposed a vote of thanks to the Vicar for his address and for the use of the bells. Mr. A. J. Hughes, Bangor, seconded.

It was decided to hold the next combined meeting at Farndon some time in the summer. Gresford bells were also available for ringing after tea.
