METHOD COMMITTEE'S INVESTIGATION

IT is disturbing to find within the Brotherhood of the Exercise those who can resort to the despised trick of hiding within the cloak of anonymity for launching an attack. The front page article by 'Libra' in issue No. 1,994 does so, upon individuals and associations alike. This largely unreasoned and unfounded diatribe not only wastes more 'ink and space' in repeating some of what has actually been stated already, but also shows a lamentable lack of appreciation of the real point at issue. This, about to come before the Methods Committee for investigation, must not be prejudiced either by 'Libra' or anyone else. Following are some facts which are at variance with what he says or suggests:—

- (1) The idea of a motion to come before the C.C. originated not within the Universities' Association, but came from an 'official' source, and for a good reason, different from that he suggests. (See 3 below.)
- (2) The question of London extension is purely incidental, and has been discussed only as exemplary of the main cause.
- (3) Protracted and futile discussion in the past, as to extension in general, has been due to a lack of stated principles of method structure and of their development, in unambiguous and precise terms. Present-day publication of hundreds of new methods, and the growing practice of them, demand a C.C. declaration of policy as to recognition of methods and their extensions.
- (4) While most of the material arguments on method extension may have been *implied* years ago, they certainly have not all been stated explicitly, discussed and resolved. A system of exposition, embracing old principles part-declared and part-implied, has more recently been developed for the average rather than the mathematically-minded ringer, aiming at a clear-cut statement of conclusions to be reached.
- (5) The recently published articles served mainly to indicate the need for 4 and 3 above. They did not claim that if theoretic extensions fail to produce conventional lead-rows, then the nearest will do.' Indeed, the late C. D. P. Davies' publication, 'Lead Ends' (1918) showed clearly that 'regular lead-ends' are not essential or necessary. But if they are to be rigidly adhered to, then, as the recent articles maintained, deviations in extension from the basic form should at least be kept to a minimum, and that the issue should be decided upon a basis of 'the Ideal, the Proximate or nothing.'
- (6) The Universities' Association has merely performed a suggested service in bringing the matter before the Council, for reference to the appropriate committee; and Dr. Hatcher, the Association's general secretary, simply deputised at the last moment for the U.A. representative, whose professional duties had intervened. The veiled sneers at both are unbecoming and, by an anonymous critic, unpardonable.

MASONIC PEAL BOOK

Dear Sir,—I shall be obliged if you will publish the following account of the Masonic Peal Book that is housed in the Grand Lodge Library and Museum. I was allowed to inspect this recently and came to the conclusion that there must be quite a number of peals that have not been recorded therein.

It is quite probable that there are a number of Brethren who are not aware of the procedure to be adopted in adding to these records, and possibly some who do not even know of the book's existence.

An account was published in 'The Ringing World' when the book was started, some 25 years ago, but I feel that it would be of benefit if the information was re-issued.

The first known Masonic peal, Stedman Caters at St. Clement Dane's, was rung on December 4th, 1919, as a peace peal. Several were rung subsequently, and it was felt that some permanent record should be made of such performances, and the idea of a Masonic Peal Book was mooted.

I was deputed to get in touch with Grand Lodge to ask if the Library would be prepared to house the book and issue it as and when necessary for the writing up of peals.

The librarian replied that the regulations would not allow of him acting as a custodian and that he could only accept it as the property of Grand Lodge, and that it must remain in their possession.

I then proposed a loose-leaf book with a plentiful supply of sheets that could be issued to a writer as required, and returned to the librarian to be fixed in the book. The an appeal, through your columns, to the Brethren, for subscriptions. The response was sufficient to cover (almost) the cost of the book and the writing of peals rung to date.

The book is a handsome volume, bound in light blue leather, with appropriate Masonic light blue leather, with appropriate masonic adornments, and a suitably inscribed flyloaf or frontispiece. The writing is decorative, after the style of an illuminated address, and is the work of a professional writer. book may be inspected, upon application to

the librarian, at any time that the Grand Lodge Library and Museum is open.

It is very desirable that all recordings should be made by a qualified writer in order that its high artistic standard may be main-

One page is accorded to each peal, and they are in much the same form as published in 'The Ringing World,' save that the names are all in one row and the name of the Association is omitted. Instead, the heading, 'United Free and Accepted Masons of England' or other appropriate title is used.

The record is not restricted to Craft Masonry. One, at least by Royal Arch Masons and one by Mark Masons, are included, and perhaps the future may provide peals by other Degrees and Orders.

Details are confined to name and rank in the Degree and the name and number of the

Lodge (one only), e.g.:—

Bro. John Wm. Smith, M.M. ... Lodge No....
W.Bro. Henry Brown, P.M. ... Lodge No....
or W.M.
Grand or Provincial Rank or ranks in other

degrees are not quoted. Footnotes are not given. A possible exception might be made upon an occasion of more than usual Masonic importance, such as the laying of a founda-tion stone with Masonic honours.

Application should be made to the Grand Librarian, Freemasons Hall, Great Queen Street, London. Three sheets should be asked for (in case of a spoiling) and an undertaking given to return all three, used or unused. All expenses would, of course, be borne by the Brethren concerned.

There should be no difficulty in obtaining the services of a professional writer, but for the information of Brethren. I may give the name of Mr. Thomas, the steward of the Con-stitutional Club, Calverley Road, Tunbridge Wells, who would be willing to do the work for 30s. per peal.

THEOLOGICAL STUDENTS & RINGING

There are problems arising from the limitations of time (as students are on short courses and, in any case, are only in Bristol during term time), but the instructors of the St. John's School of Ringing have most generously devoted one evening a week to the training of men from this College, and during the past two years 12 men have gained some know-ledge of bell-control and rope-sight that bodes well for the relationship between clergy and ringers in those parts of the country to which they will be going to serve their cure.
