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BELL ROPES

To the practical ringer the state of the bell ropes on entering a ringing chamber conveys an immediate impression of the status and interest of the local band in the Exercise. Such little points as the position of sallies and of the tucking-in of back-ends tell their own story, apart from the general state of the ropes. A keen band is ever-watchful of its ropes, and the history of peal ringing records numerous occasions when the prospect of a meritorious performance has been rendered void through the snapping of a rope.

Ropes to-day are costly, and it is not always easy to convince parochial church councils of the need of replacements. Normally for a belfry with eight bells rung regularly on Sundays and a weekly practice night with occasional peal ringing a year, a new rope each year will make ample provision for wear and tear. In the writer's own tower a set of eight ropes lasts on an average ten years, with a wear approaching 18 peal attempts a year, plus ringing three times on Sundays and a weekly practice. This basis is only maintained by constant watching and splicing.

The Central Council in their handbook, which is still not so well known as it should be, give this advice: 'Like the rest of the fittings, a bell rope requires attention to keep it in good condition. It should be well rubbed with tallow or castor-oil where it works in the fillet hole of the bell wheel, and wherever else there is friction, and it should be shifted from time to time slightly up or down. Also care should be taken to see that it runs freely in its course. It will add to the life of a rope and to the comfort of the ringers if one of the company at least is able to make a really good splice when occasion demands.'

Ropes are subject to the greatest strains when the bells are being raised and lowered. A youthful ringer's pride in being able to raise or lower a bell with a few strokes should be discouraged because of the added wear on the rope at the wheel, especially by severe checking. Bells should always be rung steadily and evenly without jerking.

We feel that there is some obligation on the part of visiting ringers to small country towers for peal ringing for the care of the ropes. There are towers where ordinary service ringing is very limited, and at least half the use of the ropes is by peal ringers. The privilege of ringing the bells carries with it a corresponding obligation, and we feel that a contribution towards upkeep is a legitimate demand. One country incumbent with a very small parish makes a charge of 10s. for a peal attempt, but the practice is not general. The question has been reviewed by one Guild, who have under consideration the creation of a rope fund for churches in their area. The suggestion has been made that a levy of 6d. a rope for each peal attempt should be collected. Naturally, if any such fund was created the committee administering it would be the leading conductors, and any provision of new ropes would be in towers where the incumbents were sympathetic towards peal attempts.

The Story of the Lincoln Diocesan Guild

11 HE formation of the Diocesan Guild in I 1899 presupposes the existence of centres of activity in Lincolnshire before that date. The most important of these was at Lincoln itself, at the Church of St. Peter-at-Arches, which then stood in the centre of the town. Here a band practised methods up to Surprise Major in the 'nineties, names connected with it which are now of historical interest being those of Gabriel Lindoff, Arthur Craven and John Austin. About this time, the production of a long length of London Surprise occupied composers' minds, and Lindoff worked on his in Lincoln. It is worth noting that James' composition in the same method, one lead longer, was rung by a Lincolnshire band almost half a century later, and it seems fitting that this should be so in view of the work done on this method by

men having connections with the county. Much of St. Peterthe county. Much of St. Peter-at-Arches Church is incorporated in the modern one of St. Giles', including the eight bells, by Rudhall, which have not

been recast.

EARLY PERFORMANCES The first recorded peal for the Diocesan Guild is one of Bob Major, rung at Heckington, near Sleaford, in November, 1899, conducted by the Rev. H. Law James. Six-bell bands were also very active, and this has always been so in a primarily rural Guild. The first recorded peal of Surprise is Cambridge Minor, conducted by John W. Lake. It is interesting, too, to note in passing that the first peal of Surprise Major was rung on handbells, the method being Superlative. This was rung for the Guild by William Keeble and his band, who not infrequently made excursions into the county from South Yorkshire. The Lincoln Guild can also claim the first peal of Spliced of any kind ever rung, 14 Minor methods, conducted th minor methods, conducted by the Rev. H. Law James.

Members of that band still living are Messrs. Arthur I.

Holmes and John W. Lake.

That well-known figure of the day, the Rev. F. E. Robinson, also visited the

Guild, usually as the guest of the Master at Surfleet. The customary peals of Stedman were rung, and no doubt the Guild's love of this method in all branches is due to that

early stimulus.

BETWEEN THE WARS.

After the 1914-18 war, the Guild was not slow to recover. At first, activity centred around Surfleet, many interesting ten-bell methods being rung, but the late 'twenties saw a great revival in Lincoln itself. The first peal of London came in 1928, conducted by John A. Freeman. The twelve bells at the Cathedral have been in good use ever since their installation in 1928, and 'firsts' in all the standard methods up to Cambridge Maximus are recorded with unfailing regularity from that time. Rivalry with the Chester Diocesan Guild produced some excellent performance in the Minor fold cellent performances in the Minor field, Vernon Taylor and his band ringing up to 80 methods in 1937. This has been eclipsed in recent times by George E. Feirn and his band, who rang 104 methods on tower bells (1939), and since the war 105 methods—the maximum in seven extents—on handbells, a truly outstanding performance.

THE PRESENT DAY

Recent peal achievements by present members of the Guild are too fresh in the memory to need further elaboration. One cannot pass by, however, the peals of Spliced Surprise Major in 22 methods, and the 14,144 London Surprise Major. It is performances of this kind which place the Lincoln Diocesan Guild on the highest level, and epitomise the sterling work put in by all members throughout the length and breadth of the county. Truly will this Guild be able to look back with justifiable pride on its first fifty years when the jubilee commemoration dinner is held this coming December.

Cowley's New Bells

THE ONLY MODERN RING IN OXFORD.

The Late Perpendicular tower of St. James', Cowley, one of the many parishes within the boundaries of the city of Oxford, held until recently an old mixed ring of five bells which had not been rung for upwards of 50 years. Two of the bells were cracked and the frame was decrepit.

As part of the parish war memorial, it was decided to rehang the bells in a new steel decided to retune the sound bells and recast frame, to retune the sound bells and recast the cracked ones, and to add a new treble. When the bells were in the foundry, how-

ever, it was found that the old bells would not tune satisfactorily and the parish nobly shouldered the extra burden of the recasting. The result is that the parish has now a light ring of six of which it can justly be proud, and the founders, Messrs. Mears and Stain-

bank are to be congratulated

on an excellent job of work.
It is strange to reflect that of the twenty odd rings of bells within the city boundaries, this is the only modern example of the bell founder's art. Oxford is known as the city of lost causes, so presumably the founders have not yet lost heart!

On October 23rd, the new bells were blessed by the Lord Bishop of Dorchester. The day could not have been worse; it rained incessantly from morning till late at night, but in spite of this the church was full to overflowing. The new bells were heard for the first time during the service, while the Bishop's procession was passing from the tower to the chancel.

The Bishop, in his address, referred to the uses of bells throughout the ages. He also remarked that the devotion of bellringers to their work was one of the encouraging signs in the life of the Diocese of Oxford at the present time, and he took the opportunity of driving home the lesson of attendance at services for which they rang and the need to become communicants.

After the service the tower was open from 4 p.m. until evensong at 6.30 p.m., and all the visitors, to the number of about 25, had the opportunity of a pull. Everyone voted them a grand little ring. A false ceiling has been placed 3ft. below the bell chamber and this has had the effect of pleasantly modulating the sound in the tower, which is only about 30ft. high and lower than the roof of the

An unusual feature was provided by Tony Price, of Feltham, who rang the third and fourth to the first touch of Surprise on the bells. The first 720 on the bells, Plain Boh Minor, was rung for evensong by the following: Miss M. A. Carter 1, V. J. F. Bennett 2, Miss L. R. Pimm 3, P. Walker 4, T. W. Bond 5, A. R. Pink (conductor) 6. It was P. Walker's longest length of Minor. Tea was very kindly provided free of charge for all ringers by the Parochial Church Council. This gesture was much appreciated.

The Worcestershire and Districts Association

Annual Dinner

The twelfth annual dinner, held at the Guildhall, Worcester, on October 1st, lost none of its popularity, a company of 96 sit-ting down under the chairmanship of the

newly installed Dean of Worcester, the Very Rev. W. E. Beck, M.A., D.Litt. Immediately before the admirable and well-served meal the chaplain, the Rev. H. Hart-ley introduced the ley, introduced the chairman, saying how happy they were that he had consented to accept the office of president. He came to them, as it were, fresh from the mint, for only that afternoon he had been installed and instituted as Dean of Worcester. They felt particularly honoured that his first public ongagement after that service should be to preside at their dinner.

In a suitable reply, the Dean said the one disappointment was that owing to trouble with the pinnacles and battlements the cathedral bells could not be rung that day, but the Association had gone one better and rung

all the bells of Worcester for him.

Supporting the chairman were Mr. C. Skid-Supporting the chairman were Mr. C. Skidmore (Master) and Mrs. Skidmore, the Rev. H. Hartley (chaplain), Mr. J. D. Johnson (general secretary) and Mrs. Johnson, the Rev. L. J. Birch (Vicar of Beoley) and Mrs. Birch, Mr. J. R. Newman (vice-president) and Mrs. Newman, Mr. W. B. Cartwright (vice-president) and Mrs. Cartwright, M. J. Bass (vice-president), and the gathering was representative of all parts of the Diocese. Diocese.

The loyal toast having been honoured on the call of the chairman, Mr. J. R. Newman proposed the toast, 'Church and State.' He could not feel at all sure that the altered conditions and outlook of the times were for the better, and to-day it was more than ever necessary for Church and State to get together. When so many day-to-day expedients were being adopted, it would be wise to try the influence of the teaching of Christianitya spirit of brotherhood between nations. who were churchmen should strive for that influence to be carried to the State. coupling the name of the Rev. L. J. Birch, Mr. Newman said it was not unusual to find a parson ringer, but more unusual to find his wife a practical ringer too.

In reply, the Rev. Birch said he often neard, 'Why doesn't the Church do someheard, 'Why doesn't the Church do some-thing?', but the truth was that all are memthing?', but the truth was that all are members of the Church, and its work was done by clergy and laity working together. In this connection ringers had a particularly important part to play, for the message of the bells reached beyond the church flock, and he remirded ringers that they, too, should have a some of chilipation to worship.

have a sense of obligation to worship.

Speaking as a ringer to the clergy, he was well aware that most of the clergy in the diocese did take an interest in their ringers, but where they did not he suggested the ringers should go to the parson, invite him to the belfry and teach him to handle a bell. He appealed to ringers and clergy to strive

to reach these two ideals.

In proposing the toast 'The Worcestershire Association,' Mr. W. C. Dowding said it was one to which only one with a residential qualione to which only one with a residential qualification could do justice and, although now in Birmingham, he was a Worcestershire man. He referred to early stalwarts and pioneers of the Association: W. Short, who had at one time been Ringing Master of the St. Martin's Guild and had called the 11,111 record of Stedness, the late W. Perse and P. Guild and had called the II,111 record of Stedman Cinques; the late W. Page and R. Matthews; others still active, Messrs. S. Grove, W. Ranford, S. T. Holt and C. Camm; the present Master, C. Skidmore and his inseparable companion, T. Hemming, and the general secretary, who was responsible for the arrangements that evening. He reminded the members that Rule 1 stated that their first object be 'to reorganise the true position as church officers,' and he personally never tired of hearing that ringers should be good church-

Mr. D. H. Watson, one of the younger members and the newly-elected Northern Branch Ringing Master, replied. The older members, he said, had been mentioned, but the future of the Association rested on younger shoulders, and he sometimes wondered if they accepted the responsibility as they should. He felt, the responsibility as they should. too, that more opportunities should be taken for publicity; in ringing matters the ignorance of the public was still appalling. He appealed to the younger members to support the Association in every possible way.

Mr. T. Hemming proposed the toast of Kindred Associations, and extended a special welcome to the four young ladies from Wal-lasey, who were with them that evening.

Mr. V. A. Hemming, of Shirley, replied. Although Worcestershire born, that was the first of the dinners which he had attended, but be felt that the arrangements compared favourably with any in the country, and the atmosphere of informality made the welcome all the more sincere. In thanking the Association, he wished to associate the visitors with the welcome extended to the new president.

All the items on the musical side of the programme were well received. Songs were given by Mr. G. J. Hemming, with his daughter, Miss Jean Hemming as accompanist, monologues by Mrs. J. Thomas, a selection of popular tunes by the Brierley Hill handbell band (Messrs. T. Hemming, C. Skidmore and J.
